MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT EL PASO

AND

WILLIAM BEAUMONT GENERAL HOSPITAL

I. INTRODUCTION

WHEREAS, the Department of Drama and Speech, The University of Texas at El Paso, El Paso, Texas, has an approved program for graduate students in speech pathology and audiology.

WHEREAS, the program requires clinical experience with patients having speech and/or hearing defects.

WHEREAS, the United States Army Medical facility, William Beaumont General Hospital, El Paso, Texas, and the Department of the Army will benefit from making clinical material and facilities available for graduate students in the speech and pathology and audiology program at The University of Texas at El Paso.

WHEREAS, it is also to the benefit of The University of Texas at El Paso for these graduate students to use the William Beaumont General Hospital facilities as training and to assist in the examination and treatment of patients with speech and hearing disorders.

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by The University of Texas at El Paso and William Beaumont General Hospital with the following conditions and responsibilities, and shall commence on February 1, 1972, and continue from year to year unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided.

II. UNDERSTANDING

- 1. This affiliation is controlled by and subject to 5 USC 5351-6, 8144 and 8331-2 and AR 350-222.
- 2. The University of Texas at El Paso graduate students will be supervised by staff members of the Department of Drama and Speech at The University of Texas at El Paso under the jurisdiction of facility officials and will follow facility rules.

- 3. The United States Army Medical facility will:
- a. Make available clinical material and related facilities for the clinical learning experience of graduate students enrolled in the Department of Drama and Speech, The University of Texas at El Paso.
- b. Designate the Chief, EENT Service, William Beaumont
 General Hospital, as coordinator of the graduate students'
 learning experience while at William Beaumont General Hospital.
- c. Permit inspection of clinical and related facilities
 by agencies charged with the responsibility for accreditation
 of the graduate program in speech pathology and audiology at
 The University of Texas at El Paso.
- 4. The University of Texas at El Paso will:
- a. Provide the Commanding Officer of William Beaumont

 General Hospital with the names of graduate students who are

 to participate in this program.
- b. Enforce rules and regulations governing the students that are mutually agreed upon by The University of Texas at El Paso and William Beaumont General Hospital.
- c. Be responsible for health examinations and other such medical examinations and protective measures as William Beaumont General Hospital and The University of Texas at El Paso mutually find needed.
- d. Insure that any publication by the students, faculty, and staff of any material related to their clinical learning experience has been cleared for release by the Chief, EENT Service, William Beaumont General Hospital and The University of Texas at El Paso.
- e. Furnish sufficient graduate students to maintain a continuing appointment schedule which will run through the school year. This schedule will be worked out and agreed upon by the Head of the Department of Drama and Speech, The University of Texas at El Paso, and the Chief, EENT Service, William Beaumont General Hospital.

III. TRAINING

The training period shall coincide with the academic year of The University of Texas at El Paso. This agreement may be terminated by either institution, upon written notice 30 days in advance of the termination date.

AUSTIN - ACCEPTANCE OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00666-0 FOR COLLEGE OF EDUCATION BUILDING.--Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00666-0 for the College of Education Building at The University of Texas at Austin has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. This grant is for an annual amount of \$49,144.00 for a period of 30 years, or a total of \$1,474,320.00. The grant will be paid annually over the life of Combined Fee Revenue Bonds to be issued at U. T. Austin and is for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$2,500,000.00 of the bonds allocated to the construction of the College of Education Building.

It is recommended by President Spurr and System Administration that the Board accept this grant as outlined above.

2. U. T. AUSTIN - ACCEPTANCE OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00667-0 FOR BUILDING FOR GRADUATE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS.--Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00667-0 for the Building for the Graduate School of Business at The University of Texas at Austin has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. This grant is for an annual amount of \$49,144.00 for a period of 30 years, or a total of \$1,474,320.00. The grant will be paid annually over the life of Combined Fee Revenue Bonds to be issued at U. T. Austin and is for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$2,500,000.00 of the bonds allocated to the construction of the Building for the Graduate School of Business.

It is recommended by President Spurr and System Administration that the Board accept this grant as outlined above.

U. T. AUSTIN - APPROVAL OF FINAL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE REMODELING OF BENEDICT HALL AND MEZES HALL, ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION THEREFOR, AUTHORIZATION TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS AND APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE TO AWARD CONTRACT. -- In accordance with authorization given at the Regents' Meeting held on April 29, 1972, final plans and specifications for the Remodeling of Benedict Hall and Mezes Hall at The University of Texas at Austin have been prepared by the Project Architect, Kuehne and Turley, Austin, Texas. These plans and specifications cover the remodeling for the Department of Psychology at an estimated total project cost of \$172,500. During the development of plans and specifications, it was determined that four existing air handling units required modification to provide increased air handling capacity with an estimated cost increase of \$7,500 above the previously authorized total project cost of \$165,000.

President Spurr and System Administration recommend the following actions for approval by the Board:

- a. Approval of the final plans and specifications at an estimated total project cost of \$172,500.00.
- b. Authorization for the Office of Facilities Planning and Construction to advertise for bids.

- c. Appointment of a Special Committee consisting of President Spurr, Director Kristoferson, Deputy Chancellor Walker, Regent Erwin, and Chairman Peace to award the construction contract within the funds available for this project.
- d. Appropriation of \$7,500.00 to this project from U. T. Austin Account No. 36-0670-7119, Replacement of Air Conditioning Equipment, to cover the estimated cost for additional renovation of mechanical equipment.
- 4. U. T. AUSTIN APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE TO AWARD CONTRACTS FOR FURNITURE AND FURNISHINGS FOR WEST SIDE EXPANSION OF MEMORIAL STADIUM AND BUILDING TO HOUSE PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES AND OFFICES. -- Specifications have been prepared for additional Furniture and Furnishings for the West Side Expansion of Memorial Stadium and Building to House Physical Education Facilities and Offices at The University of Texas at Austin. Bids will be called for to be received in mid-June, 1972. In order that an award may be made prior to the July 21 Board meeting, it is recommended by President Spurr and System Administration that a Committee, composed of President Spurr, Mr. R. S. Kristoferson, Deputy Chancellor Walker, Regent Erwin, and Chairman Peace, be appointed to award a contract for the additional Furniture and Furnishings for the West Side Expansion of Memorial Stadium and Building to House Physical Education Facilities and Offices at U. T. Austin within the funds available for this purpose in the Allotment Account for the project.
- 5. U. T. AUSTIN SALE OF AREA ON EAST SIDE OF LITTLE CAMPUS TO THE TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT AND ACCEPTANCE OF AWARD BY THE STATE BOARD OF CONTROL.--At its meeting of December 4, 1970, the Board of Regents deferred action on the request of the Texas Highway Department to purchase 20,395.1 square feet of land and improvements for \$183,884.00. On June 4, 1971, this offer was increased to \$200,560.00.

Article 6674w-3 V.C.S. states in part:

"In the event, but only in the event, the Highway Department and such other department or agency are unable to agree upon adequate compensation then the Board of Control shall determine the fair, equitable and realistic compensation to be paid."

On September 24, 1971, a hearing was held before the State Board of Control to present testimony by the Highway Department and the University. On April 26, 1972, notification was received from the Board of Control that \$225,000.00 was determined to be a fair, equitable and realistic value.

It is, therefore, recommended by President Spurr and System Administration, that the award of \$225,000.00 by the Board of Control be accepted and that the Chairman of the Board of Regents be authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to convey this property to the Texas Highway Department after they have been approved as to content by Deputy Chancellor Walker and as to form by a University of Texas attorney.

46. U. T. AUSTIN - AUTHORIZATION FOR CONSTRUCTION OF SUB-SONIC WIND TUNNEL BUILDING AT BALCONES RESEARCH CENTER AND APPROPRIATION THEREFOR.—The Department of Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics has asked the Balcones Research Center to construct a facility needed to support the Sub-Sonic Wind Tunnel and which would be located adjacent to the existing Experimental Aerodynamics Laboratory in Building 7 at Balcones Research Center, The University of Texas at Austin.

A metal building of approximately 2400 square feet at an estimated construction cost of \$12,500.00 is proposed. It will house previously purchased equipment including a new transformer, fans and motors.

Professor J. Neils Thompson, President Spurr, and System Administration recommend the following actions for approval by the Board:

- a. Authorization for the construction of the Sub-Sonic Wind Tunnel Building of approximately 2400 square feet at an estimated construction cost of \$12,500.00 based on plans and specifications reviewed and approved by the Office of Facilities Planning and Construction.
- b. Authorization for the construction of the building by U. T. Austin Physical Plant personnel, together with such technical help from outside sources as may be necessary.
- c. Appropriation of \$12,500.00 for the construction cost of the project from the following sources:

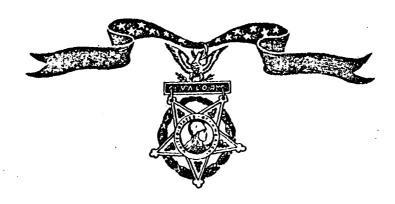
7. U. T. AUSTIN - MC DONALD OBSERVATORY - APPROVAL OF FINAL PLANS FOR SEWAGE TREATMENT SYSTEM AND HOUSING REPAIR AND AUTHORIZATION TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS.--In accordance with authorization given at the Regents' Meeting held on October 22, 1971, final plans and specifications for a Sewage Treatment System and Housing Repair at The University of Texas McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke have been prepared by the Project Engineer, Freese, Nichols and Esmond of Odessa, Texas. These final plans and specifications have been approved by President Spurr and System Administration, and it is recommended that they be approved by the Board, with authorization to the Director of the Office of Facilities Planning and Construction to advertise for bids, which will be presented to the Board or the System Administration Committee for consideration at a later date. These plans and specifications cover sewage treatment facilities and housing repairs at an estimated total project cost of \$200,000.00.

U. T. AUSTIN - MC DONALD OBSERVATORY - STATUS REPORT ON HOUSING DEVELOPMENT PROJECT, APPROVAL OF PRELIMINARY PLANS AND OUTLINE SPECIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR ARCHITECT'S FEES .-- In accordance with authorization given by the Board at the meeting held on March 16, 1972, preliminary plans and outline specifications for 18 housing units and related site development at an estimated total project cost of \$990,000.00 were prepared by the Project Architect, Dale Selzer Associates, Dallas, Texas, and were presented to the Board for approval at the April 29, 1972 meeting. The Board withheld approval because of concern over the use of wood shingles on exterior walls. Cost estimates for exterior materials made by the Project Architect and the Office of Facilities Planning and Construction are outlined as follows: Option One: Original design of 18 housing units with wood shingles on exterior walls at an estimated total project cost of \$990,000.00 as currently (Selection of this option would require an additional appropriation of \$32,000.00 from Permanent University Fund Bond proceeds to cover fees and miscellaneous expenses through the preparation of final plans and specifications.) Option Two: Design of 18 housing units with exterior masonry veneer at an additional estimated cost of \$170,000.00, increasing the estimated total project cost to \$1,160,000.00. (Selection of this option would require an additional appropriation of \$39,000.00 from Permanent University Fund Bond proceeds to cover fees and miscellaneous expenses through the preparation of final plans and specifications.) Option Three: Design of 18 housing units with exterior aluminum siding with Interfal finish at an additional estimated cost of \$20,000.00, increasing the estimated total project cost to \$1,010,000.00. (Selection of this option would require an additional appropriation of \$35,000.00 from Permanent University Fund Bond proceeds to cover fees and miscellaneous expenses through the preparation of final plans and specifications.) The Project Architect continues to recommend the use of wood shingles as an exterior material. He feels that it is an appropriate material, more fully complements the architectural design, results in economy of construction, and will be easy and economical to maintain. Wood shingles are not considered to be a fire hazard, especially since they can be treated with fire retardants. It should also be recognized that a good fire protection system is part of the site development and utilities portion of this project. The Office of Facilities Planning and Construction tends to agree with the Architect but feels that Option Three (aluminum siding with integral finish) is equally acceptable as an exterior material from the standpoint of architectural considerations, construction and maintenance. Both the Architect and Office of Facilities Planning and Construction feel that masonry or brick veneer exteriors will destroy the design from an aesthetic standpoint, and require brand new designs. Neither masonry nor brick veneers are likely to increase the life expectancy of the buildings, which is approximately 50 years. President Spurr and System Administration recommend that the Board: Approve Option Three (aluminum siding with integral finish) at a revised total project cost of \$1,010,000.00. b. Approve the preliminary plans and outline specifications with authorization for the Project Architect to prepare final plans and specifications to be brought to the Board at a future meeting. c. Appropriate \$35,000.00 from Permanent University Fund Bond proceeds to cover miscellaneous expenses and professional fees through the preparation of final plans and specifications. B & G - 8

9. U. T. Austin: Ratification of Action Naming the ROTC Building the Russell A. Steindam Hall. -- The following item was not on the agenda for the April meeting and it is resubmitted for ratification:

Committee Chairman Erwin presented the request of Colonel Lawson W. Magruder, Professor of Military Science at The University of Texas at Austin, that the ROTC Rifle Range be named the Russell A. Steindam Rifle Range in honor of First Lieutenant Russell A. Steindam whose actions are delineated in the following citation:



The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress, March 3. 1863, has posthumously awarded in the name of The Congress the Medal of Honor to

FIRST LIEUTENANT RUSSELL A. STEINDAM UNITED STATES ARMY

for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty.

First Lieutenant Russell A. Steindam, Troop B, 3rd Squadron, 4th Cavalry, 25th Infantry Division, while serving as a platoon leader in Tay Ninh Province, Republic of Vietnam, led members of his platoon on a night ambush operation on February 1, 1970. On the way to the ambush site, suspected enemy movement was detected on one flank and the platoon's temporary position was subjected to intense small arms and automatic weapons fire as wel! as a fusillade of hand and rocket-propelled grenades. After the initial barrage, Lieutenant Steindam ordered fire placed on the enemy position and the wounded men to be moved to a shallow bomb crater. As he directed the return fire against the enemy from his exposed position, a fragmentation grenade was thrown into the site occupied by his command group. Instantly realizing the extreme gravity of the situation, Lieutenant Steindam shouted a warning to alert his fellow soldiers in the immediate vicinity. Then, unhesitatingly and with complete disregard for his own safety, Lieutenant Steindam deliberately threw himself on the grenade, absorbing the full and fatal force of the explosion as it detonated. By his gallant action and self-sacrifice, he was able to save the lives of the nearby members of his command group. The extraordinary courage and selflessness displayed by Lieutenant Steindam were an inspiration to his comrades and are in the highest traditions of the United States Army.

4 10. U. T. EL PASO - AUTHORIZATION FOR CAMPUS LIGHTING SYSTEM, APPOINTMENT OF ENGINEER, AND APPROPRIATION FOR ENGINEER'S FEES. The existing campus lighting of streets and parking areas at The University of Texas at El Paso is inadequate for safety and security purposes. In accordance with the expansion of the campus and recently authorized projects, it is timely to provide a complete campus lighting system. An initial survey of campus lighting needs, at an estimated construction cost of \$120,000.00 was identified in the Phase II Electrical Distribution System prepared by the engineering firm of Gaynor and Sirmen, Inc., of Dallas, Texas, under authorization approved by the Board on October 31, 1969.

President Smiley and System Administration recommend the following actions for approval by the Board:

- a. Authorization of the preparation of final plans and specifications for the campus lighting system, at an estimated total project cost of \$140,000.00.
- b. Appointment of Gaynor and Sirmen, Inc., of Dallas, Texas, as Project Engineer.
- c. Appropriation of \$5,400.00 from U. T. El Paso Account No. 699 Interest on Time Deposits Combined Fee Revenue Bonds for fees and miscellaneous expenses through the preparation of final plans.
- 11. U. T. ARLINGTON ACCEPTANCE OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00644-0 FOR FINE ARTS BUILDING. -- Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00644-0 for the Fine Arts Building at The University of Texas at Arlington has been received from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. This grant is for an annual amount of \$116,426.00 for a period of 30 years, or a total of \$3,492,780.00. The grant will be paid annually over the life of Combined Fee Revenue Bonds to be issued at U. T. Arlington and is for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$5,000,000.00 of the bonds allocated to the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

It is recommended by President Harrison and System Administration that the Board accept this grant as outlined above.

J 12. U. T. ARLINGTON - APPROVAL OF EASEMENT TO TEXAS ELECTRIC SERVICE COMPANY FOR AN UNDERGROUND ELECTRIC DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM. -- At its meeting on July 30, 1971, the Board of Regents approved a Lease and Development agreement with the City of Arlington for the joint use of a tract of land consisting of approximately 35 acres at the corner of Fielder and Park Row in the City of Arlington. This tract will be used by the City of Arlington as a sports and recreation facility and will be used by the University in conjunction with physical education and intramural sports program. The Development agreement, states in part, that the City of Arlington will construct lighted softball parks. In order to provide the necessary lighting, Texas Electric Service Company requests an easement ten feet (10') in width and approximately three thousand feet (3000') in length, for an underground electric distribution system across a 38.75 acre tract of land out of the O. Medlin survey, being more fully described in the easement document which will be available for examination at the Board meeting.

It is recommended by President Harrison and System Administration that approval be given by the Board for such an easement to be executed by the Chairman of the Board after approval as to content by Deputy Chancellor Walker and as to legal form by a University Attorney.

T. Arlington administration, various faculty committees, members of System Administration and OFPC staff have been conducting detailed studies of physical improvements needed at U. T. Arlington. It is the recommendation of these groups that the Board authorize the following projects and approve the associated recommendations: Depression of Cooper Street 1. Provide for elimination of major thoroughfare within the campus. 2. Appoint project engineers from a list to be furnished at the Board meeting. 3. Appropriate \$15,000.00 from Unallocated Proceeds Constitutional Tax Bonds, Series 1972 for engineer's fees and miscellaneous expenses through preparation of preliminary plans. Activities Building 1. Provide approximately 150,000 gross square feet for physical education, intramurals, student activities, certain faculty activities and special 2. Authorize preliminary programming of this project by U. T. Arlington and OFPC staff with appointment of project architects to be requested at a future Board meeting. North-South Mall Provide improved pedestrian routes and beautify the newer portion of the campus. 2. Appoint project landscape architects from a list to be furnished at the Board meeting. 3. - 1. The Fine Arts Complex has had Board approval of preliminary plans and the architects are now working on final plans and specifications. It is anticipated that this project will be bid later this year and that a construction contract can be awarded by the Board in September or October. An appropriation of \$6.5 million will be needed to fund the remainder of this project budget, a preliminary appropriation of \$65,000 having been made for architect's fees and preliminary planning costs.
- 2. Expansion of Central Plant and Extension of Utilities Distribution System was authorized at the April 29, 1972, meeting of the Board, and is estimated to cost \$1.9 million.
- 3. Depression of Cooper Street. Much study has been given to the problems caused by this major thoroughfare which bisects the campus. It is also used as Farm Road 157 by the Texas Highway Department. Authorization is requested to engage a competent engineering firm to prepare preliminary plans and a cost estimate, at which time specific appropriation requests and authorization to proceed will be sought from the Board. This study will be conducted in cooperation with the City of Arlington and the Texas Highway Department, both of whom concur in the recommendation that depression of a portion of the street is the most logical solution. Alternate sources of funding will be sought as the project develops. Preliminary cost estimates are \$1.5 million for the total project cost. Authorization for appointment of engineers and preliminary planning is requested.
- 4. Activities Building. An activities complex is needed to expand the teaching facilities for physical education and to provide cultural, social and recreational areas to complement the classroom experiences. A multi-purpose facility to provide lounge and study areas, as well as food service can also be jointly used for physical education, intramural programs, student activities, and certain faculty activities. A project to provide approximately 150,000 gross square feet is anticipated, plus outdoor tennis courts and playing fields. The total project cost is estimated at \$4.5 million; site selection will be determined and appointment of project architects is to be requested at a future Board meeting.
- 5. North-South Mall. The completion of an east-west mall where Second Street was formerly located has done much to unify the physical environment and to beautify the north side of the campus. A similar project to be developed on a north-south axis in the former Yates Street right-of-way will further improve the campus. All of the streets in the interior of the campus around the Library have been abandoned by ordinance of the Arlington City Council, and the gradual elimination of these streets for vehicular flow is desirable. An improved entrance

to the Library can also be accomplished as a part of this project. Approval is requested for the appointment of landscape architects and an appropriation of \$10,000.00 for preliminary planning and fees.

- 6. Landscaping, Walks, Lighting, Parking Lots. Additional development of a total landscape plan is desirable. This will include improved circulation areas for pedestrians and the elimination of some of the small, interior campus parking lots. Replacement of parking facilities near the periphery of the campus will be needed. Additional lighting is needed on several parking lots for security and aesthetic purposes. It is estimated that several small projects will be developed from time to time, and will be presented to the Board as these needs develop. Authorization is requested for preliminary planning with OFPC staff within a total estimated project cost of \$750,000.00.
- 7. Miscellaneous Remodeling Projects. Several areas in the older campus buildings will need to be remodeled for better utilization as departments are relocated into new facilities. The buildings now occupied by the departments of art, music and architecture will be converted to other uses on completion of the Fine Arts Complex. It is estimated that several projects will be developed over the next several months and then be presented to the Board for individual approval and appropriation of funds. It is requested that authorization for planning the remodeling projects be granted, within total estimated project costs of \$500,000.00.
- 8. Land Acquisition. The on-going program of land acquisition, within the areas approved by the Legislature, will continue and appropriations from time to time will be requested from funds available.
- 14. U. T. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$2,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. Dallas allocated to the construction of these buildings and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6½% on these bonds.

At the Regents' Meeting held April 29, 1972, Revised Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00636-0 in the annual amount of \$61,940.00 for a period of $30\frac{1}{2}$ years on an increased supported loan amount of \$4,000,000.00 was accepted by the Board. The purpose for this revision was to adjust the grant amount to cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest of 5.4635% for the bonds approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 and to cover the increased supported loan amount. The Revised Annual Interest Grant Agreement contained a Special Condition providing for revision as future bond issues relating to this project were sold.

Subsequent to the acceptance of the Revised Annual Interest Grant a second issue of General Tuition Revenue Bonds was approved at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972. Dallas allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6½% on these bonds.

At the Regents' Meeting held April 29, 1972, Revised Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00637-0 in the annual amount of \$61,940.00 for a period of $30\frac{1}{2}$ years on an increased supported loan amount of \$4,000,000.00 was accepted by the Board. GRANT NO. 5-6-00638-0 FOR SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL SCIENCE BUILD-ING (FORMERLY PUBLIC POLICY STUDIES BUILDING).--At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00638-0 for the Social & Behavioral Science Building (formerly known as Public Policy Studies Building) at The University of Texas at Dallas in the annual amount of \$21,460.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$1,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. Dallas allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6½% on these bonds.

The bonds as approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 carried an effective interest rate of 5.4635% and the bonds as approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972 carried an effective interest rate of 5.2109%. In order to adjust this grant to an amount which would cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest rate, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notification of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 6.25% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%, to increase the term of the loan from 30 years to an average of 30.25 years; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$21,460.00 to \$14,971.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Jordan and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

19. U. T. DALLAS - APPOINTMENT OF HARWOOD K. SMITH AND PARTNERS AS PROJECT ARCHITECT FOR THE ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE BUILDING.--President Jordan and System Administration recommend that Harwood K. Smith and Partners, Dallas, Texas, be appointed as Project Architect for the Environmental Science Building at The University of Texas at Dallas, which was authorized by the Board of Regents at the April 29, 1972 meeting and included in the Phase II Project.

The building will contain approximately 20,000 square feet of space, and the estimated total project cost is \$1,000,000.00.

PERMIAN BASIN - CENTRAL ENERGY PLANTS - AWARD OF CONTRACTS TO YORK DIVISION, BORG-WARNER CORPORATION, ERIE CITY ENERGY DIVISION ZURN INDUSTRIES, INC., CHICAGO HEATER COMPANY, INC., FLUID DYNAMICS CORPORATION, AND THE MARLEY COMPANY FOR ADVANCE PROCUREMENT OF EQUIPMENT AND APPROPRIATION THEREFOR.--At the March 16, 1972 Regents' Meeting, an estimated total procurement cost of \$2,100,000.00 was authorized for the essential equipment for the Three Central Utility Plants to be located at The University of Texas at Dallas, The University of Texas at San Antonio, and The University of Texas of the Permian Basin. In accordance with authorization given at the Regents' Meeting held on March 16, 1972, bids were called for and were received, opened, and tabulated on April 25, 1972, for advance procurement of equipment for the three central utility plants. However, an evaluation of their alternate bid in the amount of \$985,149.00 shows substantial savings in operating costs. The saving is estimated to be at least \$7,000.00 per year.

Base Bid B:

The low bid of Riley Stoker Corporation in the amount of \$472,188.00 was not responsive to the specifications, for the following reasons:

- 1. They reserved the right to deviate from the specifications and make substitutions.
- 2. They proposed to furnish a boiler with a 175,000 BTU/hour/sq. ft. heat release whereas the specified boiler limits the heat release to $110,000~\rm BTU/hour/sq.$ ft.
- 3. They did not list a single installation of comparable size as required by the specifications.

Consequently, the second low bid of Erie City Energy Division Zurn Industries, Inc., in the amount of \$503,850.00 is recommended for the six package steam boilers.

21. DALLAS MEDICAL SCHOOL - APPROVAL OF REVISED PROJECT COST AND APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE TO AWARD CONTRACT FOR COMPLETION OF UNFINISHED GROUND FLOOR SPACE IN BASIC SCIENCE RESEARCH BUILDING.--In accordance with the authorization given by the Board at the meeting held on February 4, 1972, final plans and specifications for completion of unfinished ground floor space in the Basic Science Research Building at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas have been prepared by the Project Architect, George L. Dahl, Inc., Dallas, Texas, and approved by the Office of Facilities Planning and Construction.

The initial design directive given to the Architects called for minimal development of the unfinished ground floor space. During the development of final plans and specifications, it became apparent that it is highly desirable to develop the unfinished space more fully. Accordingly, the final plans and specifications fully develop approximately 20,000 square feet of finished basement space for such functions as electron microscopes and ancillary equipment, a Centrex telephone system, a post office, a campus security office, duplicating facilities and miscellaneous support facilities. The total project cost for developing the unfinished space is estimated to be \$376,000.00, or about \$19.00 per square foot, which compares most favorably with the cost of new construction.

At the February 4, 1972 meeting, the Board authorized \$246,000.00 for the project. The additional amount of money needed, \$130,000.00, is available in Dallas Medical School Unexpended Physical Plant Funds. The Board further authorized advertisement for bids, which will be received in late June.

Dean Sprague and System Administration recommend the following actions for approval by the Board:

- a. Approval of an increase of \$130,000.00 over the originally authorized total project cost of \$246,000.00, resulting in a revised total project cost of \$376,000.00:
- b. Appointment of a Committee consisting of Dean Sprague, Mr. R. S. Kristoferson, Deputy Chancellor Walker, Regent Erwin, and Chairman Peace to award a contract for this project within the revised estimated total project cost of \$376,000.00, prior to the Regents' meeting to be held on July 21, 1972.
- 22. DALLAS MEDICAL SCHOOL APPROVAL OF PRELIMINARY PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR LANDSCAPE-RECREATION DEVELOPMENT AND ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR FEES AND EXPENSES.--In accordance with authorization given by the Board at the meeting held on December 3, 1971, preliminary plans and outline specifications have been prepared by the Project Landscape Architect, Myrick Newman Dahlberg, Inc., Dallas, Texas, for a Landscape-Recreation Development at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas. These plans and specifications cover parking lot landscape treatment, enhancement of campus boundaries and entrances, and recreational facilities, including jogging trail and tennis courts at an estimated total project cost of \$125,000.00.

Dean Sprague and System Administration, recommend that the Board approve the preliminary plans and specifications with authorization to the Landscape Architect to prepare final plans and specifications to be presented to the Board for approval at a later meeting.

It is further recommended that an additional appropriation of \$9,000.00 be approved from Dallas Medical School Account No. 957-205 - Landscape and Recreational Projects to cover miscellaneous expenses and professional fees through the preparation of final plans and specifications.

- DALLAS MEDICAL SCHOOL APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE TO AWARD CONTRACT FOR ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM. -- At the Regents' Meeting held April 29, 1972, final plans and specifications prepared by the Project Engineer, Gaynor and Sirmen, Inc., for the Electrical Distribution System at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas were approved, with authorization to advertise for bids, which will be received in mid-June, 1972. In order that a contract award may be made prior to the meeting to be held July 21, 1972, System Administration recommends the appointment of a Committee consisting of Dean Sprague, Mr. R. S. Kristoferson, Deputy Chancellor Walker, Regent Erwin, and Chairman Peace to award a contract for the project within the \$850,000.00 estimated total project cost authorized by the Board.
- U. T. SAN ANTONIO ACCEPTANCE OF REVISED ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00634-0 FOR ARTS BUILDING (FORMERLY REFERRED TO AS ART BUILDING). --At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00634-0 for the Arts Building (formerly referred to as Art Building) at The University of Texas at San Antonio in the annual amount of \$37,576.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$1,751,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. San Antonio allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6-1/4% on these bonds.

The bonds as approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 carried an effective interest rate of 5.4635% and the bonds as approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972 carried an effective interest rate of 5.2109%. In order to adjust this grant to an amount which would cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest rate, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notification of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 6.25% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%; to increase the term of the loan from 30 years to an average of 30.25 yeàrs; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$37,576.00 to \$26,214.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Templeton and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

U. T. SAN ANTONIO - ACCEPTANCE OF SECOND REVISION OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00633-0 FOR HUMANITIES-BUSINESS BUILDING.--At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00633-0 for the Humanities-Business Building at The University of Texas at San Antonio in the annual amount of \$21,460.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$1,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. San Antonio allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6½% on these bonds.

At the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972, Revised Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00633-0 in the annual amount of \$30,970.00 for a period of $30\frac{1}{2}$ years on an increased supported loan amount of \$2,000,000.00 was accepted by the Board. The purpose for this revision was to adjust the grant amount to cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest of 5.4635% for the bonds approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 and to cover the increased supported loan amount. The Revised Annual Interest Grant Agreement contained a Special Condition providing for revision as future bond issues relating to this project were sold.

Subsequent to the acceptance of the Revised Annual Interest Grant a second issue of General Tuition Revenue Bonds was approved at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972. In compliance with the Special Condition of the revised grant, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notifica-

tion of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 5.4635% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%; to decrease the term of the loan from 30.5 years to an average of 30.25 years; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$30,970.00 to \$29,942.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Templeton and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

26. U. T. SAN ANTONIO - ACCEPTANCE OF INITIAL PARTIAL SHARE GRANT NO. 4-6-00635-0 FOR LIBRARY-ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.--An initial partial share Title I Grant No. 4-6-00635-0 in the amount of \$50,000.00 has been received for assistance in the construction of the Library-Administration Building at The University of Texas at San Antonio. If this initial partial share \$50,000.00 is accepted at this time, supplemental applications for Title I grants can be submitted each Federal fiscal year until the building is complete or until maximum grant amount is reached.

It is recommended by President Templeton and System Administration that this grant be accepted, with the understanding that supplemental applications will be submitted at appropriate later dates.

27. U. T. SAN ANTONIO - ACCEPTANCE OF REVISED ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00635-0 FOR LIBRARY-ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.--At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00635-0 for the Library-Administration Building at The University of Texas at San Antonio in the annual amount of \$21,460.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$1,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. San Antonio allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6-1/4% on these bonds.

The bonds as approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 carried an effective interest rate of 5.4635% and the bonds as approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972 carried an effective interest rate of 5.2109%. In order to adjust this grant to an amount which would cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest rate, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notification of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 6.25% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%; to increase the term of the loan from 30 years to an average of 30.25 years; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$21,460.00 to \$14,971.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Templeton and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

28. U. T. SAN ANTONIO - ACCEPTANCE OF SECOND REVISION OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00632-0 FOR SCIENCE-EDUCATION BUILDING.--At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00632-0 for the Science-Education Building at The University of Texas at San Antonio in the annual amount of \$21,460.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$1,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. San Antonio allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6½% on these bonds.

At the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972, Revised Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00632-0 in the annual amount of \$77,425.00 for a period of $30\frac{1}{2}$ years on an increased supported loan amount of \$5,000,000.00 was accepted by the Board. The purpose for this revision was to adjust the grant amount to cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest of 5.4635% for the bonds approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 and to cover the increased supported loan amount. The Revised Annual Interest Grant Agreement contained a Special Condition providing for revision as future bond issues relating to this project were sold.

Subsequent to the acceptance of the Revised Annual Interest Grant a second issue of General Tuition Revenue Bonds was approved at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972. In compliance with the Special Condition of the revised grant, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notification of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 5.4635% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%; to decrease the term of the loan from 30.5 years to an average of 30.25 years; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$77,425.00 to \$74,855.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Templeton and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

San Antonio Dental School: Ratification of Final Plans and Specifications for New Facility and Additional Appropriation Therefor. -The following item was not on the agenda for the April meeting and it is resubmitted for ratification:

Approval was given to the final plans and specifications for the New Facility (permanent quarters) for The University of Texas Dental School at San Antonio. These plans and specifications have been prepared by the Project Architects, Phelps and Simmons and Associates and Bartlett Cocke and Associates, both of San Antonio, Texas. These plans cover a building of approximately 453, 769 gross square feet at an estimated total project cost of \$28,000,000. The preliminary plans and outline specifications covered approximately 445,450 gross square feet at an estimated total project cost of \$24,140,000 but the project cost was revised February 4, 1972, and the new grant application increased to \$28,000,000.

An additional appropriation of \$23,000 was approved from Tuition Revenue Bonds to cover fees and miscellaneous expenses through the bidding stage. However, it was noted that there was no authorization to advertise for bids at this time.

30. U. T. PERMIAN BASIN - ACCEPTANCE OF SECOND REVISION OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00630-0 FOR CLASSROOM BUILD-ING.--At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00630-0 for the Classroom Building at The University of Texas of the Permian Basin in the annual amount of \$21,460.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$1,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. Permian Basin allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6-1/4% on these bonds.

At the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972, Revised Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00630-0 in the annual amount of \$39,440.00 for a period of 30½ years on an increased supported loan amount of \$2,547,000.00 was accepted by the Board. The purpose for this revision was to adjust the grant amount to cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest of 5.4635% for the bonds approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 and to cover the increased supported loan amount. The Revised Annual Interest Grant Agreement contained a Special Condition providing for revision as future bond issues relating to this project were sold.

Subsequent to the acceptance of the Revised Annual Interest Grant a second issue of General Tuition Revenue Bonds was approved at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972. In compliance with the Special Condition of the revised grant, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notification of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 5.4635% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%; to decrease the term of the loan from 30.5 years to an average of 30.25 years; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$39,440.00 to \$38,131.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Amstead and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

31. U. T. PERMIAN BASIN - ACCEPTANCE OF SECOND REVISION OF ANNUAL INTEREST GRANT NO. 5-6-00631-0 FOR LABORATORY AND GYMNASIUM BUILDINGS.--At the Regents' Meeting held July 30, 1971, Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00631-0 for the Laboratory and Gymnasium Buildings at The University of Texas of the Permian Basin in the annual amount of \$42,920.00 for a period of 30 years was accepted by the Board. This grant was for the purpose of paying the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate on \$2,000,000.00 of General Tuition Revenue Bonds to be issued for U. T. Permian Basin allocated to the construction of this building and was figured on an estimated interest rate of 6½% on these bonds.

At the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972, Revised Annual Interest Grant No. 5-6-00631-0 in the annual amount of \$76,574.00 for a period of $30\frac{1}{2}$ years on an increased supported loan amount of \$4,945,000.00 was accepted by the Board. The purpose for this revision was to adjust the grant amount to cover the excess of interest over and above a 3% interest rate based on the actual effective interest of 5.4635% for the bonds approved for issuance at the Regents' Meeting held December 2, 1971 and to cover the increased supported loan amount. The Revised Annual Interest Grant Agreement contained a Special Condition providing for revision as future bond issues relating to this project were sold.

Subsequent to the acceptance of the Revised Annual Interest Grant a second issue of General Tuition Revenue Bonds was approved at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972. In compliance with the Special Condition of the revised grant, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued a "Notification of Reduction of Annual Interest Grant Commitment" to decrease the interest rate from 5.4635% to an aggregate interest rate of 5.3358%; to decrease the term of the loan from 30.5 years to an average of 30.25 years; and to decrease the amount of Annual Interest Grant from \$76,574.00 to \$74,032.00 based on the sale of bonds on December 2, 1971 and March 16, 1972.

It is recommended by President Amstead and System Administration that the notification of grant reduction as outlined above be acknowledged by the Board.

32. U. T. PERMIAN BASIN - AUTHORIZATION FOR INCREASE IN SCOPE OF U. T. PERMIAN BASIN CONTRACT WITH HUNT BROTHERS CONSTRUCTION COMPANY FOR ADDITION OF OLYMPIC SWIMMING POOL AND APPROPRIATION THEREFOR.—The pool included in the existing contract for construction of the new campus at The University of Texas of the Permian Basin measures 45' by 75'. It has been determined that an Olympic size swimming pool is required. The estimated total project cost of increasing the pool size and making necessary modifications to the site is \$250,000.00.

It is recommended by President Amstead and System Administration that the Project Architects, Jessen Associates, Inc., and Peters and Fields, be authorized to prepare plans and specifications for adding an Olympic size swimming pool to this contract, and that an appropriation of \$250,000.00 from Tuition Revenue Bonds be made to cover the change in the contract, and Architect's Fees and miscellaneous expenses in connection therewith.

33. GALVESTON MEDICAL BRANCH - ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR FEASI-BILITY STUDY OF REMODELING OF AVE MARIA HALL.--In accordance with the authorization given by the Board at the meeting held on December 3, 1971, the Project Architect, Louis Oliver, Galveston, Texas, undertook and completed the feasibility study for the undefined scope and cost estimate for the remodeling of Ave Maria Hall at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

Due to the complexity of determining the best functional utilization, consistent with institutional requirements, future projects and master plans, the study required ten weeks. As a result of project definition interviews for institutional function relocations, and the necessity for staying within project cost limitations, the scope of the study significantly increased. Mr. Oliver developed three options of differing extent, with three descriptive floor plans and cost estimates. The necessary increase in the scope of this study was above that envisioned when, at the December meeting, the Board approved the recommended appropriation of \$5,000.00 for fees and miscellaneous expenses.

President Blocker and System Administration recommend that the Board approve an additional appropriation of \$4,000.00 from Galveston Medical Branch Project Allocation - Unexpended Plant Funds for fees and miscellaneous expenses for the unanticipated but necessary increase in the scope of this study.

34. GALVESTON MEDICAL BRANCH - APPROVAL OF INSCRIPTION ON PLAQUE FOR ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.--It is recommended that the inscription as set out below be approved for the plaque to be placed on the Administration Building at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston. This inscription follows the standard pattern approved by the Board at the meeting held October 1, 1966.

The funds necessary to cover this contract award are available in the Allotment Account for the project.

36. SYSTEM NURSING SCHOOL AND U. T. AUSTIN NURSING SCHOOL (GRADUATE AND UNDERGRADUATE): ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR BUILDING. --

On September 8, 1971, the Regents awarded a contract to J. C. Evans Construction Company, Inc., for a building for The University of Texas Nursing School (System-Wide) at Austin, The University of Texas Graduate School of Nursing at Austin and The University of Texas (Undergraduate) Nursing School at Austin, in the amount of \$2,817,093.00.

This building, when completed, will contain approximately 99,815 gross square feet. A total appropriation of \$3,213,460.00 has been approved from the following sources:

(a) Federal Grant \$1,278,124.00

(b) Permanent University
Fund Bond proceeds 1,935,336.00

As the Nursing School teaching program has been refined over the past few months, it has resulted in a significant increase in the planned use of audio-visual teaching materials. The Nursing School staff and faculty now find it essential to combine an audio-visual review room and an audio-visual library, which had been located on the second level, with a multi-purpose laboratory on the third level. A compensating shift in seminar and teaching space from the third level to the second level would make room for the audio-visual facilities. The shift would result in a more efficient and functional building.

In order to accommodate the shift in functions, it is necessary to make minor rearrangements of partitions and doors, change floor materials in certain areas, and perform minor mechanical and electrical changes to support the audio-visual equipment. These changes were not anticipated and included in the project budget and cannot be accommodated within the remaining contingency allowances which are intended primarily for unforeseen requirements.

It is recommended by Dean Willman, Vice-Chancellor Knisely, Chancellor LeMaistre and System Administration that an additional appropriation of \$19,500.00 be made from Permanent University Fund Bond proceeds to the Project Allotment account to cover the cost of these additions and changes plus associated fees and miscellaneous expenses.

37. SAN ANTONIO NURSING SCHOOL - APPROVAL OF FINAL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR PERMANENT BUILDING AND AUTHORIZATION TO ADVERTISE FOR BIDS.--In accordance with authorization given at the Regents' Meeting held March 16, 1972, final plans and specifications for a building to house The University of Texas (Clinical) Nursing School at San Antonio have been prepared by the Project Architects, Phelps & Simmons & Associates and Bartlett Cocke & Associates. These plans and specifications cover a building of approximately 79,500 gross square feet at an estimated total project cost of \$3,850,000.00. An application has been made for Federal assistance under the provisions of the Nurse Training Act of 1971, P. L. 92-158.

Dean Willman and System Administration present the following recommendations for approval by the Board:

- a. Approval of final plans and specifications with a total estimated project cost of \$3,850,000.00.
- b. Authorization to advertise for bids after receipt of grant award and clearances by all granting agencies. Bids will be presented to the Board or the System Administration Committee for consideration at a later date.

1. San Antonio Medical School: Proposal with the City of San Antonio. --

By resolution passed by the Board on February 4, 1972, the San Antonio Medical School was "authorized to cooperate with the City of San Antonio in areas where there is common concern and when programs or activities are appropriate and beneficial", with the stipulation that such agreements as are negotiated must have the prior approval of the Chancellor and Board of Regents prior to implementation.

In keeping with the intent of this resolution Dean Pannill has negotiated a contract with the City of San Antonio in support of a psychiatric screening program for police candidates to be directed by Dr. Robert L. Leon, Professor and Chairman of Psychiatry. This proposal and the letter of acceptance by the City of San Antonio follow.

Chancellor LeMaistre recommends approval of this proposal to the Board of Regents and requests authorization for Dean Pannill to execute a contract which would implement the proposal.

Thank you for the opportunity of looking into the use of mental health professionals in the selection of police cadets. During the past month, we have briefly reviewed the literature in the area, discussed personnel selection with Mr. C. McCullough, Jr. and Mr. Goodlow and talked with police officers.

It is clear that the selection of police officers is a difficult and complex problem. It is our feeling that we may be of assistance in this selection by making recommendations of "high risk" or "passable" to the Chief of Police after the applicant has passed the Screening Board but prior to his appointment by the Chief of Police. It should be understood that our recommendation of "high risk" does not necessarily carry with it the impression of "deviant" or "totally unsuitable" only that the applicant appears to have traits that may not make him a good risk for the public responsibilities that a police officer must assume. Our role in the selection process would be consultative and we would only offer a recommendation. The appointment to police cadet status or rejection would of necessity continue to be the responsibility of the Chief of Police.

The Mental Health screening recommendation would be based on:

- 1. Evaluation of personnel file which would include screening examinations and background information.
- 2. Information obtained by observation of Screening Board where feasible.
- 3. Review of the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory, administered and scored by the City.
- 4. Individual interview.
- 5. Use of a small group session (situational tests) where feasible.
- 6. Other tests as may be developed if indicated later on.

- 1. Make available personnel files.
- 2. Permit observation of the Screening Board.
- 3. Administer and score the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory and other selected paper and pencil tests.
- 4. Arrange individual interviews and provide suitable office space.
- 5. Arrange group sessions and provide suitable office space.
- 6. Permit follow-up research in order to evaluate our ability to screen police applicants.
- 7. Permit the use of trainees within the Department of Psychiatry to receive an educational experience through this consultative activity.

We anticipate that a fee of \$50 per applicant screened should cover the cost to the Department of Psychiatry and recommend that this be the negotiated rate for the first year of operation, subject to reevaluation at the end of that year. If the program had been in effect in 1970, one hundred, twenty-eight applicants would have been screened at a total cost of \$6,400.00.

I hope this proposal meets with your approval. It is understood that should the program be adopted, it will be fully evaluated after one year of service. Thank you again for the opportunity of being involved in this project. We look forward to a fruitful working relationship.

WHEREAS, the Department and the Hospitals have the following common objectives: (1) to provide clinical experience in terms of patient and related instruction for students of the Department; (2) to improve the overall educational program of the Department by providing opportunities for learning experiences that will progress the student to advanced levels of performance; (3) to increase contacts between academic faculties and clinical faculties for fullest utilization of available teaching facilities and expertise; (4) to establish and operate a Clinical Education Program of the first rank; (5) to improve patient care; and (6) to keep abreast of new techniques:

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the foregoing and in further consideration of the mutual benefits, the parties to this agreement agree as follows:

(1) GENERAL INFORMATION

- (a) The Clinical Education Program will be consistent with the trimester plan for the Department.
- (b) The period of time for each student's clinical education will be mutually agreed upon at least one month before the beginning of the Clinical Education Program.

(c) The number of students eligible to participate in the Clinical Education Program will be mutually determined by agreement of the parties and may be altered by mutual agreement.

(2) RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT

- (a) The Department will send the name, biographical data, and a report of health status of each student to the Hospitals at least four weeks before the beginning date of the Clinical Education Program.
- (b) The Department is responsible for supplying any additional information required by the Hospitals prior to the arrival of the students.
- (c) The Department will assign to the Hospitals only those students who have satisfactorily completed the pre-requisite didactic portion of the curriculum.
- (d) The Department will designate a faculty member to coordinate with a designee of the Hospitals the assignment to be assumed by the student participating in the Clinical Education Program.
- (e) The Department will enforce rules and regulations governing students that are mutually agreed upon by the Department and the Hospitals.

(3) RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE HOSPITALS

- (a) The Hospitals shall provide a jointly-planned, supervised program of clinical experience.
- (b) The Hospitals shall maintain complete records and reports on each student's performance and provide an evaluation to the Department on forms provided by the Department.
- (c) The Hospitals may request the Department to withdraw from the Clinical Education Program any student whose performance is unsatisfactory, whose personal characteristics prevent desirable relationships within the Hospitals, or whose health

status is a detriment to the student's successful completion of the clinical education assignment.

- (d) The Hospitals shall provide equally to each student participating in the Clinical Education Program, within a given trimester, the following arrangements and considerations:
 - (1) Emergency health care not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) with respect to injuries sustained in the Hospitals;
 - (2) Stipend of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month for each student assigned to the Hospitals; at no time will the number of students assigned to the Hospitals exceed six (6); however, the exact number of students will be mutually agreed upon thirty days prior to assignment to the Hospitals.
- (e) The Hospitals shall, on reasonable request, permit the inspection of the clinical facilities, services available for clinical experience, student records, and such other items pertaining to the Clinical Education Program by the Department or agencies, or by both, charged with the responsibilities for accreditation of the curriculum.
- (f) The Hospitals shall certify that it subscribes to and will adhere to the letter and spirit of Title 6 of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 in all areas relating to student participation in the Clinical Education Program.
- (g) The Hospitals shall designate and submit in writing to the Department for acceptance the name and professional and academic credentials of a person to be responsible for the Clinical Education Program. That person shall be called the Clinical Education Supervisor.
- (h) The Hospitals shall immediately notify the Department in writing of any change or proposed change of the Clinical Education Supervisor.

(4) RESPONSIBILITY OF THE STUDENT

The student

- (a) is responsible for following the administrative policies of the hospitals;
- (b) is responsible for providing the necessary and appropriate uniforms required;
- (c) is responsible for his own transportation and living arrangements;
- (d) is responsible for reporting to the Hospitals on time and following all established regulations during the regularly scheduled operating hours of the Hospitals; and
- (e) will not submit for publication any material relating to the clinical education experience without prior written approval of the Hospitals and the Department.

(5) TERM OF AGREEMENT

This agreement shall be effective October 1, 1971, and shall continue in full force and effect until September 30, 1976, unless sooner terminated.

(6) TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

This agreement may be terminated by either party upon giving ninety days' notice in writing to the other party by registered mail. Such termination shall not take effect, however, with regard to students already enrolled until such students shall have completed their respective courses.

5. WATER CONTRACTS - RECOMMENDATION RE SECOND AMEND-MENT TO WATER CONTRACT NO. 55 TO CITY OF CRANE, LESSEE, AND FIRST AMENDMENT TO WATER CONTRACT NO. 40 TO ATLANTIC RICHFIELD COMPANY, LESSEE, BOTH IN BLOCK 31, CRANE COUNTY.--In order to better utilize their water wells, the lessees of the two captioned water contracts have agreed to an exchange of some of their wells and equipment. The proposed amendments are as follows:

Water Contract No. 55
To be amended by deleting the E/2 of Sec. 22, and adding the E/2 of Sec. 15. The total acreage to remain the same.

Water Contract No. 40
To be amended by releasing the E/2 of Sec. 15. The total acreage would be reduced from 640 acres to 320 acres. The limitation of 4,000 barrels of water per day would be removed.

Effective date - March 1, 1972.

The Associate Deputy Chancellor for Investments, Trusts and Lands and the Geologist in Charge recommend approval of the proposed amendments.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - GIFT, BEQUEST AND ESTATE MATTERS. --

6. U. T. EL PASO - RECOMMENDATION FOR ACCEPTANCE OF THE PATRICIA HEWITT SILENCE MEMORIAL TRUST. -- Under the terms of the will of Patricia Hewitt Silence, who died on July 26, 1970, which will was duly admitted to probate in El Paso County, Texas, Frederick H. Silence qualified as Independent Executor. Under the terms of said will, Frederick H. Silence, as Independent Executor, was authorized and directed to establish a trust for the benefit of The University of Texas at El Paso. By instrument dated February 17, 1971, Frederick H. Silence transferred and assigned certain stocks in the approximate value of \$50,000 to the El Paso National Bank, as Trustee, for the purpose of supporting research and lectures at The University of Texas at El Paso, which fund is to be known as the Patricia Hewitt Silence Memorial Trust.

The President of The University of Texas at El Paso, joined by the Associate Deputy Chancellor for Investments, Trusts and Lands recommends the acceptance of this bequest.

7. SAN ANTONIO MEDICAL SCHOOL - RECOMMENDATION RE ACCEPTANCE OF GRANT ESTABLISHING THE "MISS ELOISE ALEXANDER MEMORIAL FUND."—The National Bank of Commerce of San Antonio, Trustee of the Eloise Alexander Foundation, which was established under the terms of her will, proposes to discharge the responsibilities imposed on it by making a single grant (consisting of all the assets of the Foundation valued at approximately \$300,000.) to the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System. A letter dated May 11, 1972, from Mr. Lane T. Sealy, Vice President and Trust Officer of the bank, to Dr. F. Carter Pannill, Dean of the U.T. Medical School at San Antonio, outlining the facts, terms and conditions of the grant is as follows:

"Dear Dean Pannill:

This Bank, as trustee of the Eloise Alexander Foundation, is pleased to advise you that it has elected to make one single grant of the entire Eloise Alexander Foundation, of some \$300,000., to The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio, in memory of Miss Eloise Alexander.

Miss Eloise Alexander was born on November 7, 1913. She was the granddaughter of a member of the Osage Indian Tribe of Oklahoma. She inherited a ranch in Oklahoma and 2.75 Osage Indian Headrights (Headrights are similar to mineral rights) which remained a part of her estate at her death. Miss Alexander, in the 1930's and 1940's, was an actress and model of some renown; however, she was handicapped with the disease of asthma which resulted in her premature death on April 25, 1969.

National Bank of Commerce of San Antonio was appointed Independent Executor under her will. Ancillary administration was taken out in Oklahoma where litigation ensued. After two years, the Oklahoma court upheld Miss Alexander's will, the ranch was sold and the proceeds including the Osage Indian Headrights were delivered to NBC as Executor.

Paragraph IVK of the will creates the Eloise Alexander Foundation and charges the Trustee with the following duties and powers:

- K-1. To make periodic grants of income or corpus or both to charitable organizations to be used for research for the prevention, cure and rehabilitation of persons afflicted with asthma and other respiratory diseases.
- K-2. The funds distributed from this Foundation shall be used in the State of Texas.
- K-3. The trustee shall have the sole discretion as to the amount of any grant to be made from this Foundation, and to select the organizations that are to receive such grants and to determine the amounts to be distributed to each. The trustee shall have complete discretion as to the distributions to be made from the Foundation, including the right to distribute all of the funds to one organization, or to distribute the funds to more than one organization.
- K-4. The trustee shall have the authority to promulgate rules and regulations, terms and conditions governing the use of the funds that are distributed from this Foundation.
- K-5. The trustee shall have the authority to distribute all of the funds from this Foundation and thus terminate the trust at such times as it deems appropriate. (Emphasis ours.)

Will you please secure the administrative approval required and the approval of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System to accept the entire assets of the Eloise Alexander Foundation, with the understanding that income and principal from the fund will be used to support teaching, research, and treatment of asthma and other respiratory diseases in the Department of Pediatrics at The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio under the direction of the Chairman of that department, subject to usual administrative approval.

It must be understood that according to the will of Miss Alexander, funds from the foundation may be spent only in Texas and in connection with treatment, research and teaching in the field of asthma and other respiratory diseases. The expenditure of funds for equipment used in these areas is permitted, and it is anticipated that some \$50,000 may be spent for such equipment immediately.

We are prepared to consumate the grant any time after May 1, 1972. We must call to your attention that due to the complex provisions of the Tax Reform Act of 1969 that should we as Trustee become liable for the payment of any taxes or penalties or incur any expense in connection with any such liability, The University of Texas System will reimburse us for the taxes, penalties and expenses from the funds we have granted to it. We took certain legal action in 1971 to try and avoid the taxes imposed under the Tax Reform Act of 1969 on Private Foundations. This action is still pending in the District Court. There will be some legal expense involved in getting that cleared up; however, we believe this will be taken care of prior to delivery.

If in the event that the Department of Pediatrics of The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio or The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio ceases to be engaged in research for the prevention, cure and rehabilitation of persons afflicted with asthma or other respiratory diseases then in that event the Board of Regents may divert all funds to any other department or medical school within The University of Texas System which does conduct such research in the field of asthma or other respiratory diseases. If the aforesaid purpose becomes impractical, or if by reason of changed conditions its further execution becomes unnecessary or unwise in the judgment of the said Board of Regents, said Regents, acting by a majority vote, may designate another purpose which they may deem more appropriate under the circumstances, and the purpose so designated shall thereupon become the purpose of this grant.

Neither this grant, nor any fund or property arising therefrom, in whatever form it may take, shall ever be any part of the Permanent University Fund, nor shall the Legislature have power or be in anywise authorized to change the purposes hereof, or to divert such grant, fund or property from the purposes herein set out. An account shall be established and maintained by the Board of Regents in the name of "Miss Eloise Alexander Memorial Fund."

It has been a pleasure to work with you and the members of your staff who have helped us carry out the wishes of the late Miss Eloise Alexander. We are prepared to deliver the assets of the Eloise Alexander Foundation to The University of Texas as soon as we are officially informed that the gift, subject to the conditions set forth in this letter, is acceptable by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System.

Chancellor LeMaistre, Dean Pannill and Mr. W. D. Blunk, Executive Director for Development, recommend acceptance of the grant on the terms outlined.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - REAL ESTATE MATTERS.--

8. U. T. AUSTIN - HOGG FOUNDATION: WILL C. HOGG MEMORIAL FUND - RECOMMENDATION FOR JOINDER IN OIL AND GAS LEASE TO CECIL V. HAGEN ON INTEREST IN 200 ACRES, WHARTON COUNTY.--The Hogg family owned 1/4th of the minerals under approximately 200 acres in the Stephen F. Austin Survey, Abstract No. 2, Wharton County, situated on the flank of the Boling Salt Dome; and 1/4th of that interest is held by the Board of Regents for the Will C. Hogg Memorial Fund. Mr. Cecil V. Hagen, after negotiation, proposes an oil and gas lease for a primary term of nine months, 3/16ths royalty, and no bonus except that he will pay liquidated damages if a well is not drilled during the primary term. The University's share of this payment would be \$125.00.

There has been some old shallow production on the tract. Miss Hogg, Mrs. Hanszen, and Mrs. Markus are joining in the lease; and we are assured that the Gary family owning the other 3/4ths are leasing. The Regents authorized a similar lease to Mr. Hagen on this tract last year. Due to a misunderstanding, it was later determined that Mr. Hagen and the Garys could not get together; and the lease on the Hogg interests was never delivered to Mr. Hagen.

The Associate Deputy Chancellor for Investments, Trusts and Lands recommends authorization of joinder in the lease.

9. U. T. EL PASO – JOSEPHINE CLARDY FOX FUND – RECOMMENDATION RE SALE OF VACANT LAND IN BLOCKS 41, 42, 44 AND 46, CLARDY FOX ADDITION, TO HUNT BUILDING CORPORATION.—After negotiation, an offer has been received from Hunt Building Corporation to buy the vacant land behind our commercial strip on Paisano Drive in El Paso. This land will consist of approximately 195,650 square feet on which they have offered to pay 96½ per square foot or a total of \$188,802.00. This land is zoned C-4 (industrial) and was appraised in October, 1970 by Mr. William W. Browning, Jr., M.A.I., for 70¢ per square foot or a total of \$136,955.00. The offer also includes 20,908.8 square feet in Block 44 at 81½ per square foot, which will total \$17,040.00. This tract is zoned for apartment useage and was appraised in October, 1970 by Mr. Browning for \$8,500.00 which is 41¢ per square foot. The final sales price on all of the land is to be determined by survey. No real estate commission is involved.

The Associate Deputy Chancellor for Investments, Trusts and Lands recommends approval of the sale with authorization for execution of the appropriate instruments.

10. M. D. ANDERSON - CAROLYN FROEBEL BEQUEST - RECOMMEN-DATION FOR OIL, GAS AND MINERAL LEASE TO ROBERT C. SINCLAIR ON TRACT IN SAN PATRICIO COUNTY. -- Miss Carolyn Froebel of San Antonio died in 1962 with the following provision in her Will, (Mr. Schultze being her cousin and now at age 73):

"I hereby give, devise and bequeath my farm land in San Patricio County, Texas, to Walter M. Schultze, of San Antonio, Texas, for and during his life. He shall manage said farm land and retain all of the income therefrom during his life time. At the death of the said Walter M. Schultze, title in fee to said farm land in San Patricio County, Texas, shall vest in the M. D. Anderson Hospital, of Houston, Texas, for the benefit of patients in said hospital who are unable to pay for their care."

The tract of land is 88 acres out of Section 38 of the George H. Paul Subdivision of the Coleman-Fulton Pasture Company Land; and Mr. Robert C. Sinclair of Corpus Christi, after negotiation, has proposed an oil, gas and mineral lease on the tract at \$25 per acre bonus, \$2 per acre annual delay rental, and 1/6th royalty for a primary term of three years. Rather than the University keeping the bonus of \$2,200 invested and paying the income to Mr. Schultze during his life, he has agreed to division of the bonus, \$815.12 to him and \$1,384.88 to the University, this being based on 6% tables used for valuation of life interests for Federal Estate Tax purposes as well as State of Texas Inheritance Taxes. Mr. Schultze will receive any delay rentals paid during his life; and he has tentatively agreed to division of any royalties using the same valuation tables and his age during the year received.

The Associate Deputy Chancellor for Investments, Trusts and Lands recommends authorization of the lease under the terms and arrangements set out above.

OTHER MATTERS. --

11. 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I. SPECIAL ITEMS

A. U. T. System

1. Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part One: Amendment to Chapter VI, Section 6 (Solicitation Rule). --

System Administration recommends the adoption of the following amendment to Subsection 6.12 of Section 6 of Chapter VI of Part One of the Regents' Rules and Regulations

Amend Subsection 6.12 of Section 6 of Chapter VI of Part One of the Regents' Rules and Regulations by adding new Subdivisions 7 and 8 to read as follows:

- 6.12 No solicitation shall be conducted in any building or structure on the campus of any component institution of The University of Texas System, provided, however, that the following activities shall be deemed not to be solicitations prohibited by this subsection:
 - (7) The collection of membership fees or dues by registered student organizations at meetings of such organizations scheduled in accordance with the facilities use regulations of any component institution.
 - (8) The collection of admission fees for the exhibition of movies or other programs that are sponsored by the component institution, a recognized faculty group, or a registered student organization, and are scheduled in accordance with the facilities use regulations of the component institution.

2. Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part Two: Amendment to Chapter VI, Section 5 (Group Life Insurance). --

System Administration concurs in Mr. Kennedy's recommendation to amend Section 5.7, Chapter VI, Part Two of the Regents' Rules and Regulations. The proposed amendment will specify that employees retiring under the Optional Retirement Program may continue participation in the Group Life Insurance Program. This should clarify any misunderstanding which might result due to the absence of a specific statement to this effect to the present rule. The rule now mentions only Teacher Retirement and Employee Retirement systems. This practice of continuing participation has been in effect since the inception of the Optional Retirement Program with administrative approval, since Optional Retirement Program law is actually a part of, and is codified with, Teacher Retirement law.

Amend Subsection 5.7 of Section 5 of Chapter VI of Part Two of the Regent's Rules and Regulations to read as follows:

Participation in the Group Life Insurance Program automatically terminates when employment terminates unless (1) the policyholder retires under the provisions of the Teacher Retirement System, the Optional Retirement Program, or the Employees Retirement System with at least 10 years of coverage under the insurance; (2) the policyholder has attained 62 years of age with at least 10 years of coverage under the insurance; or (3) the policyholder converts the group policy into one for regular individual life insurance. When an employee retires, the amount of insurance will be reduced to \$5,000 or the amount in force immediately prior to retirement, whichever is less, provided the employee has been insured continuously during the 10 years prior to retirement.

B. U. T. System, U. T. Austin and U. T. El Paso

3. Authorization to Negotiate, Execute and Administrater Classified Government Contracts. --

The University of Texas System Security Agreement with the Department of Defense requires that certain administrative officers be cleared for access to classified material and to negotiate, execute and administer classified government contracts. The agreement also requires that the list of officers so authorized be kept current. Due to administrative changes, the list of officers so authorized by board resolution on June 4, 1971, is now out of date. Therefore Chancellor LeMaistre recommends adoption of the same basic resolution, which has been amended to include the officers recommended for this responsibility by System Administration and the respective institutional heads concerned:

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That, those persons occupying the following positions among the officers of The University of Texas System shall be known as the Managerial Group as described in the Industrial Security Manual for Safeguarding Classified Information:

- 2. That the Chief Executive and the members of the Managerial Group have been processed, or will be processed, for a personnel clearance for access to classified information, to the level of the facility clearance granted to this institution, as provided for in the aforementioned Industrial Security Manual and all replacements for such positions will be similarly processed for security clearance.
- 3. That the said Managerial Group is hereby delegated all of the Board's duties and responsibilities pertaining to the protection of classified information under classified contracts of the Department of Defense or User Agencies of its Industrial Security Program awarded to the institutions of The University of Texas System.
- 4. That the following named members of the Board of Regents shall not require, shall not have, and can be effectively excluded from, access to all classified information in the possession of The University of Texas System and do not occupy positions that would enable them to affect adversely the policies and practices of the institutions of The University of Texas System in the performance of classified contracts for the Department of Defense or User Agencies of its Industrial Security Program, awarded to institutions of The University of Texas System, and need not be processed for a personnel clearance:

4. Hogg Foundation for Mental Health: Clarification of Administrative Relationships. --

This item was removed from the agenda of the last meeting at the request of Chancellor LeMaistre to insure that certain administrative clearances had been completed. These have now been completed and this item is now resubmitted for consideration by the Board.

In order to clarify the relationship between the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health, The University of Texas at Austin, and The University of Texas System, it is recommended by President Spurr, with the concurrence of System Administration, that the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health be formally declared to be an integral part of The University of Texas at Austin and the President of the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health report to and be directly responsible to the President of The University of Texas at Austin, and report through the President to the Chancellor and the Board of Regents. The budget of the Foundation has always been included in the budget of The University of Texas at Austin.

Historically, the activities and operations of the Hogg Foundation have been a part of The University of Texas at Austin. In a letter dated July 15, 1939, addressed to Dr. Rainey (the then President of U.T. Austin) Miss Ima Hogg expressed gratitude that the administration of the Hogg estate, which includes the Foundation, was in the hands of the President of The University of Texas (at Austin) and the members of the Board of Regents.

The Hogg Foundation for Mental Health has always been centered at The University of Texas at Austin, but it has provided a mental health and hygiene program throughout the State of Texas.

5. Proposed Traffic and Parking Regulations for 1972-73 (Pages 6-14). --

Pursuant to the authority granted by Article 51.202 of the Texas Education Code and for the safety and welfare of the students, employees and property, System Administration concurs in the recommendation of President Harrison that the following Parking and Traffic Regulations for 1972-73 be approved. These regulations have been approved by the System Law Office and the System Security Office.

The following letter from President Harrison and Vice-President Price sets forth the major amendments from the 1971-72 regulations.

TRAFFIC AND PARKING REGULATIONS 1972-73

1. General Information

These regulations promulgated by the Board of Regents under authority of Senate Bill No. 162, Chapter 80, Acts 60th Legislature Regular Session, 1967, govern the operation and parking of motor vehicles on property under the jurisdiction of The University of Texas at Arlington. The purpose of these regulations is to control traffic and parking and the use of parking facilities, provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia, and provide for jurisdiction over offenses. The University Police officers may issue TRAFFIC TICKETS ENFORCEABLE IN COURT in the same way as those issued by the City of Arlington police or the Texas Department of Public Safety. These regulations are supplementary to the rules and regulations of the City of Arlington and the State of Texas which govern the use of motor vehicles. THE SPEED LIMIT ON ALL PARTS OF THE CAMPUS IS 20 MILES PER HOUR. PEDESTRIANS SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT OF WAY AT ALL TIMES.

Neither The University of Texas at Arlington, nor its employees, shall be liable for any loss or injury sustained by anyone while on the campus.

Neither The University of Texas at Arlington, nor its employees, shall assume any responsibility for the care and protection of any vehicle or its contents at any time that such vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

Neither The University of Texas at Arlington, nor its employees, shall assume any responsibility for the care and protection of any personal property at any time while on campus.

Any person who willfully or through negligence causes damage to The University of Texas at Arlington property shall be liable for any damage done to said property.

I. GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 1. The purpose of these regulations is to provide for the safety and welfare of students and employees, control of traffic and parking, and protection of institutional property.
- 2. If any part of these regulations is held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provisions, and to this end the provisions of these regulations are declared to be sererable.
- 3. Due to the temporary nature of assigned parking areas, erected parking signs take precedence over any issued parking map.
- 4. On special occasions and emergencies, parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police.
- 5. The Chief of the University Police, and selected security officers are duly commissioned peace officers of the State of Texas. Upon request of an administrative officer, a security officer of The University of Texas at Arlington, or of a University Police officer, any person on the campus is required to identify himself with proper identification.
- 6. The Chief of University Police shall have discretionary powers to enforce a policy of traffic control on the campus when the same is not specifically provided for by these regulations.

- 7. The regulations governing the use of motor vehicles must be complied with on all parts of the campus throughout all hours of the day and night.
- 8. The term "vehicle" or "motor vehicle" includes automobiles, trucks, motorcycles, motorbikes and scooters.
- 9. The University reserves the right to impound any vehicle which is parked with serious impropriety or so as to obstruct vehicular or pedestrian traffic, or which is parked in violation of these regulations. The term "impounding" includes removal, immobilization, or relocation of the vehicle. The owners of impounded vehicles will be required to pay all costs involved in impounding and storing. The University shall not, nor shall any of its authorized personnel, be liable or assume any responsibility for any loss or damage suffered because of such impoundment, immobilization, or relocation.
- 10. There will be no parking on any street which is owned or controlled by The University of Texas at Arlington except where such parking is specifically indicated by posted signs.
- 11. The speed limit for motor vehicles on the campus is 20 miles per hour except where slower speed is essential for safety.
- 12. Unnecessary noise from horns, mufflers, or any other noisemaking device is prohibited.
- 13. Vehicles operated on the campus must be in safe driving condition and have current license tags.
- 14. The registered owner of a permit is responsible for each traffic violation involving motor vehicles registered to him or her.
- 15. Every car is required to stop completely, pause briefly, and then proceed with caution at each stop sign.
- 16. It shall be a violation to commit any act prohibited by these regulations, or to fail to do any act required by these regulations.
- 17. Parking is prohibited on any lawn, curb, or sidewalk, or any area not designated as a parking space, or in any restricted or unauthorized area.
- 18. Parking in loading zones and service drives is restricted to trucks and trailers and is limited to the time while actually loading and unloading.
- 19. It is prohibited to park a motor vehicle so as to obstruct the entrance to any building.
- 20. The controlled parking areas will include the University parking lots and streets abutting University property. Signs have been placed in the area to designate it as a controlled parking area.
- 21. After 3:00 p.m., lots 3, 4, and 99 are "dual lots" and may be used by anyone having a valid registration decal on the vehicle.
- 22. Dormitory students with valid dormitory decals may use any "A" lot between 2:30 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. daily.
- 23. Lipscomb Dormitory permit holders may use any "A" lot at any time.
- 24. Faculty and Staff members who have obtained parking decals may use any Faculty/Staff parking lot on campus between 12:00 noon and 7 a.m. daily.

II. STUDENTS, STAFF AND FACULTY PARKING

- 1. All persons except visitors must register their vehicles with the University Police, E. E. Davis Hall, on or before the date they commence operating their vehicle on the campus.
- 2. A student is defined as any person enrolled in The University of Texas at Arlington. This includes day, night, short courses, special, audit, and seminar students.
- 3. All personnel employed by the University are either regularly salaried or part-time (temporary) employees. These categories are divided into Staff and Faculty. Graduate Teaching Assistants are afforded the same parking privileges as Faculty.
- 4. Upon payment of the parking fee and registration, a numbered decal will be issued which will permit the holder to park in the area designated by the decal. Student parking areas are A, B, H, L, M, or T; Staff and Faculty, 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7.
- 5. Multiple vehicles owned by one person may be registered with the University Police provided proof of ownership is shown at the time of registration. A fee os \$1.00 is charged for each additional vehicle which is registered. ONLY ONE VEHICLE MAY BE PARKED ON CAMPUS AT ANY GIVEN TIME.
- 6. Persons who have previously registered only one vehicle may register multiple vehicles as in Item 5 above provided they, (a) turn in the remnants of the old decal, (b) pay the additional fee required, and (c) show proof of ownership.

 ONLY ONE VEHICLE MAY BE PARKED ON CAMPUS AT ANY GIVEN TIME.
- 7. Rider-Pool students who pay for one vehicle may obtain a special Rider-Pool decal for rotation of vehicles. The fee is \$1.00 for each additional vehicle, not to exceed four. ONLY ONE VEHICLE MAY BE PARKED ON CAMPUS AT ANY GIVEN TIME.
- 8. Individuals having physical handicaps may apply for special parking assignments by submitting a letter to the University Police office setting forth the reason for the request. A written confirmation must be received from the University Health Center before the University Police will issue a handicap decal.
- 9. Temporary Parking Permits may be purchased for \$1.00 for seven consecutive days. These permits will allow students, Faculty, and Staff members who have not previously registered a vehicle to bring that vehicle on campus for short periods of time.

III. VISITOR PARKING

- 1. A visitor is defined as a person who is neither a student nor an employee of the University, nor is he a person who uses campus parking facilities for the benefit of a student or employee.
- 2. Certain areas of the campus have been reserved for visitor parking and are identified by signs. Visitors to the campus must park in the designated visitor parking areas. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES ARE STUDENTS OR EMPLOYEES ALLOWED TO PARK IN THE VISITORS AREA.
- 3. Visitors parking in areas not designated for visitors will be charged with a parking violation. Illegally parked vehicles may also be towed away or impounded at the owner's expense.

4. When groups of visitors are involved, arrangements should be made with the Chief of the University Police, who will issue temporary permits for the visitors to park in other areas if the visitor reserved spaces are not sufficient.

IV. PARKING FEES

1. Effective September 1, 1971, the fees for parking motor vehicles on the campus of The University of Texas at Arlington shall be:

- 2. All parking fees are payable at the Bursar's Office. E. E. Davis Hall, prior to the registration of a motor vehicle.
- 3. Any change affecting the registration or ownership of a vehicle must be reported promply to the University Police Office so that the change may be recorded. Failure to do so may result in the canellation of parking priviliges.

V. REFUNDS

- 1. Students who are graduated at the end of the fall seme ster or who terminate their enrollment for other reasons at the end of the fall semester or beginning of the spring semester may receive a partial refund of the parking fee in accordance with the table below, provided they turn in the remnants of their decal and that the transaction be made on or before the Census Dates.
- 2. Faculty and Staff members who terminate their employment at the end of the fall or the beginning of the spring semester may also receive a partial refund of the parking fee in accordance with the table below, provided they turn in the remnants of their decal.

VI. PARKING DECALS

- 1. A permit to park on campus will not be honored unless the decal is permanently affixed to the lower left-hand corner of the back glass, except convertibles and station wagons or any other vehicle whose rear window is concealed. For these vehicles the decal must be permanently affixed to the lower right-hand corner of the windshield.
- 2. Parking permit decals for motorcycles, motorbikes, and motorscooters without windshields must be permanently affixed to the vehicle's gas tank or in a location in which the decal may be easily seen and the number on the decal easily read. Application directions are provided on the peal off portion of the decal.

- 3. The decal may not be affixed by tape or other unauthorized material.
- 4. Permits are not transferrable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which they are issued.
- 5. All old permits must be removed before the new one is affixed. Failure to remove old permits constitutes a violation.
- 6. The person in whose name the parking permit decal is issued is responsible for all the parking and traffic violations of that motor vehicle for which the permit was issued. If the operator of a motor vehicle involved in a violation is not the person in whose name that parking permit decal was issued, then both the operator and the person in whose name the permit was issued are responsible for the violation.
- 7. A replacement decal will be issued without charge whenever there is a sale or transfer of the vehicle, a replacement of the rear window or windshield, or defective decal, provided the remnants of the original decal are turned in to the University Police Office. Otherwise, a \$1.00 fee will be charged and proof of ownership of the vehicle to be registered must be shown.
- 8. A decal holder is eligible for up to three reissues; thereafter, the \$1.00 fee must be paid for each decal reissued.
- 9. If after having bought a parking permit, it becomes necessary to use a non-registered vehicle for emergency or other reasons, a special parking permit must be obtained from the University Police Office and affixed to the vehicle in the proper manner. A special temporary permit will be given for periods not to exceed five (5) school days and no more than three (3) in succession.

VII. ENFORCEMENT

- 1. To continue parking on campus, students, staff, and faculty members who have received a parking citation are required to pay a \$2.00 reinstatement fee at the Bursar's Office within five (5) school days from the date of the citation.
- 2. If the offender wishes to appeal a citation, he must do so within five (5) school days from the date of the citation. A formal written notice of appeal must be executed by the offender on forms available in the Bursar's Office. Such written appeal will contain the circumstances deemed pertinent to the particular citation. The Chairman of the Appeals Board will notify the app ellant by mail as to the date and time of the consideration of his appeal.
- 3. The person appealing may be present for the hearing and will be allowed five (5) minutes for a personal presentation of his appeal. If he is not present, the case will be decided on the basis of the facts contained in the written appeal.
- 4. An offender will have five (5) calendar days after the expiration of the appeal period to pay the reinstatement fee of \$2.00. Of, if an appeal was filed, and the Appeal Board found him guilty of the violation he will have five (5) calendar days from the date of the finding to pay the \$2.00 reinstatement fee.
- 5. Failure to pay the fee within the time limits may result in disciplinary action.
- 6. A Court Appearance Ticket will be written if a student, Faculty, or Staff member has three (3) outstanding unpaid parking citations. After three (3) Court Appearance Tickets have been written within a permit year, the offender's campus parking privileges will be revoked for the remainder of that permit year. Criminal penalties, as provided by law, may be imposed by the Justice Court for violations of University Parking and Traffic Regulations.

VIII. SPECIFIC VIOLATIONS

- 1. Parking citations may be received for:
 - A. Parking in areas bordered in yellow
 - B. Parking in areas not designated for the decal issued
 - C. Parking in loading zones
 - D. Parking in driveways
 - E. Forging or altering a permit, or using a forged or altered permit
 - F. Committing any of the following acts with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges to which he is not entitled under these regulations:
 - a. Transferring a permit
 - b. Affixing a permit to a vehicle other than that for which it was issued
 - c. Failing to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations
 - d. Parking or driving a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit other than that issued for such vehicle, with knowledge thereof
 - G. Parking on wrong side of street
 - H. Blocking cross-walk
 - I. Failing to park within the lines of individually marked spaces
 - J. Parking on campus when parking privileges have been suspended
 - K. Altering, damaging, moving, or ignoring University traffic signs or markings
 - L. Failing to display parking permit in prescribed manner or location
 - M. Failing to obey requests and/or directions of a University Police officer
 - N. Parking in a backed-in position
 - O. Over-parking in a time-limited zone
 - P. Parking an unregistered vehicle
 - Q. Failing to stop before passing stop sign
 - R. Operating motor vehicle in prohibited direction on one-way street or parking lot lanes
 - S. Driving on sidewalks
 - T. Failing to yield right-of-way to pedestrians
 - U. Driving vehicle into barricaded area or removing barricades
 - V. Violating any of the provisions of the Official Texas Motor Vehicle Laws Booklet
 - W. Exceeding speed limit

- X. Driving in an imprudent manner
- Y. Failing to stop or heed other instructions given by a University Police officer and/or refusing to show drivers license upon request of the officer.

IX. PARKING TECHNIQUES

- 1. Parked vehicles will be positioned so that the whole of the vehicle is located within the boundaries of the parking space. The fact that other vehicles are parked improperly shall not constitute an excuse for parking with any part of the car over the line.
- 2. Where parallel parking is required, vehicles must be parked with right wheels to the curb where two-way traffic is permitted, and on one-way streets the automobile must be parked with the front end forward in the direction in which traffic is allowed.
- 3. Where diagonal parking is required, the wheel nearest the curb may not be removed more than 12" from the street face of the curb.
- 4. No vehicle shall be parked:
 - A. With rear end to the curb in diagonal parking spaces.
 - B. For periods longer than those specifically designated
 - C. With double or other forms of multiple parking

E. U. T. Arlington, U. T. Dallas and Dallas Medical School

6. Progress Report on Establishment of North Texas Regional Computer Center and Recommendations Pertaining Thereto. --

At its meeting on December 3,

1971, the Board of Regents approved the recommendation of the Council of Presidents of the U. T. components in North Texas and System Administration for the establishment of a regional computer center in that area, and also approved the construction of a building on the premises of the Dallas Medical School to house this facility. The Board has subsequently accepted the donation of the site for the building, approved the final plans and specifications for the building, and awarded the construction contract therefor.

Concurrently with the development of plans for the building, other representatives of the institutions concerned and System Administration have proceeded with planning for the equipment for the facility and for operating systems to be used therewith. The Council of Presidents has recommended that the planning for and operations of the regional center be overseen by a Board of Directors composed of the three Chief Administrative Officers and the Deputy Chancellor for Administration.

AnInter-Institutional Committee on Computers, composed of representatives of the three North Texas components, assisted by consultants from the Governor's Office of Information Services and the State Auditor's Systems Division, has carefully studied the teaching, research and administrative needs of the three institutions, and has prepared a Request for Quotations (R.F.Q.) to be issued to prospective vendors, after approval by the Chief Administrative Officer and the Deputy

Chancellor for Administration, through the State Board of Control. The R.F.Q. provides for extensive benchmark testing as well as alternatives for acquisition of the equipment by purchase, lease, or a combination of both. It is contemplated that if the acquisition of the central processing unit, core storage and direct access storage device is under a special option lease purchase agreement, the cost thereof will not exceed approximately \$1,800,000. As previously reported to the Board, the initial down payment under such an arrangement would be approximately \$300,000 with six annual payments of less than the current rental costs of individual installations. As also previously reported, an advance from System Administration funds of approximately \$650,000 to \$750,000 will be needed for down payment and start-up expenses for the Center.

It is anticipated that the State Board of Control will receive vendor quotations around July 1, 1972, and that about five weeks will be needed to evaluate the quotations. Such evaluation will include benchmark tests, review of costs required for conversion of existing programs and installation of needed new programs, power and air-conditioning requirements, compatibility with other System and State installations, and others. If satisfactory quotations are received, the Chief Administrative Officers and the Deputy Chancellor for Administration should expect to be able to recommend the acquisition to the Board of Control by approximately August 10, 1972.

Based on the planning to date and the above schedule, the Council of Presidents of the North Texas components and System Administration recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the following:

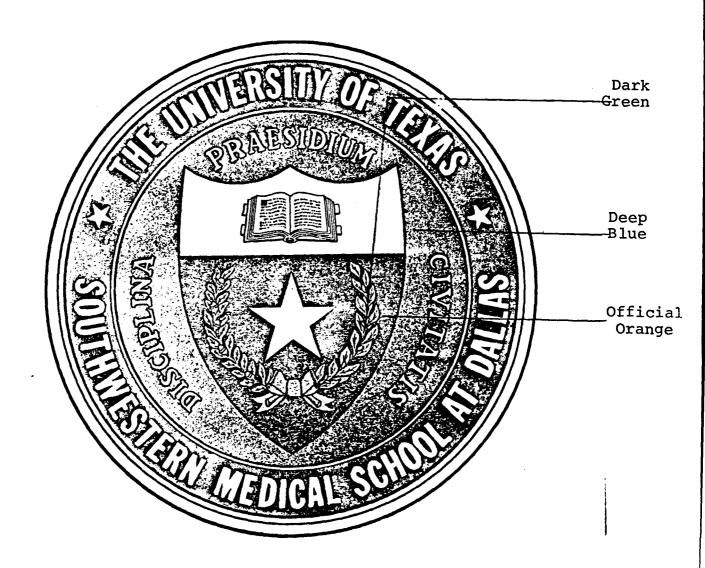
- 1. That the Chief Administrative Officers of the U. T. institutions in North Texas, together with the Deputy Chancellor for Administration or his delegate, constitute a Board of Directors of the North Texas Regional Computer Center, with authority to select a Director of the Center, set operating policies, and oversee the operation of the Center. It is understood that the costs of operation, including rental or amortization of the equipment and initial programs and operating systems, are to be funded from the operating budgets of using institutions.
- 2. That the aforementioned Board of Directors be authorized, after evaluation of proposals received through the State Board of Control, to approve either the acceptance by the Board of Control of the most advantageous quotation or quotations, or to reject any and all quotations if such are not responsive to the needs of the Center.
- 3. That initial advances of up to \$50,000 from System Administration balances be made to cover anticipated initial start-up expenses of the Center including preparation of the Request for Quotations, travel to benchmark locations, employment of director and other related items.

A report will be made at a subsequent Board meeting as to the equipment acquisition and additional advance funding needed.

RESOLUTION

BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND BONDS, NEW SERIES 1972, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$9,000,000

WHEREAS, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System (hereinafter sometimes called the "Board") heretofore has authorized, issued, and delivered that issue of Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Refunding Bonds, Series 1958, dated July 1, 1958, said bonds having been authorized pursuant to the provisions of Section 18, Article VII of the Texas Constitution; and

WHEREAS, said Refunding Bonds, Series 1958, were payable from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the Interest of The University of Texas System in the income from the Permanent University Fund, in the manner and to the extent provided in the resolution authorizing said Refunding Bonds, Series 1958; and

WHEREAS, the resolution adopted on July 23, 1958, authorizing the issuance of said Refunding Bonds, Series 1958, reserved the right and power in the Board to issue, under certain conditions, Additional Parity Bonds and Notes for the purposes and to the extent provided in Section 18, Article VII of the Texas Constitution, said Additional Parity Bonds and Notes to be on a parity with the aforesaid Refunding Bonds, Series 1958, and equally and ratably secured by and payable from a first lien on and pledge of the Interest of The University of Texas System in the income from the Permanent University Fund, in the same manner and to the same extent as are said Refunding Bonds, Series 1958; and

WHEREAS, Section 18, Article VII of the Texas Constitution provides that the Board is authorized to issue negotiable bonds and notes for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for The University of Texas System, in a total amount not to exceed two-thirds (2/3) of Twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund, exclusive of real estate, at the time of any issuance thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Board heretofore has authorized, issued, sold and delivered its Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1959, Series 1960, Series 1961, Series 1962, Series 1963, Series 1964, Series 1965, and Series 1966, as installments or issues of such Additional Parity Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board has deemed it necessary and advisable that no more of said Additional Parity Bonds shall be issued because of the excessively restrictive Permanent University Fund investment covenants made in connection with all of the aforesaid Permanent University Fund Bonds heretofore issued; and

WHEREAS, the Board is required by law to keep said investment covenants in full force and effect as to all of the aforesaid Permanent University Fund Bonds heretofore issued and to affirm the first lien on and pledge accruing to said outstanding Permanent University Fund Bonds heretofore issued on the Interest of The University of Texas System in the income from the Permanent University Fund; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a resolution adopted on June 16, 1967, the Board authorized, issued, sold, and delivered an installment or issue of negotiable bonds designated as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System Permanent University Fund Bonds, New Series 1967, dated July 1, 1967 (hereinafter sometimes called the "New Series 1967 Bonds"), in the principal amount of \$14,000,000, payable from and secured by a lien on and pledge of the Interest of The University of Texas System in the Permanent University Fund, subject only and subordinate to the first lien on and pledge of said Interest heretofore created in connection with the aforesaid outstanding Permanent University Fund Bonds; and

WHEREAS, in said resolution adopted on June 16, 1967, the Board set forth the terms and conditions under which additional bonds may be issued to be on a parity with the aforesaid New Series 1967 subordinate lien bonds, and the Board has issued its Permanent University Fund Bonds, New Series 1968, New Series 1969, New Series 1970, and New Series 1971, in accordance therewith; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined to authorize, issue, sell, and deliver another installment or issue of such sub-ordinate lien parity New Series Bonds in the principal amount of \$9,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby officially finds and determines that the value of the Permanent University Fund, exclusive of real estate, is in excess of \$617,000,000.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM:

1. Throughout this resolution the following terms and expressions as used herein shall have the meanings set forth below:

The term "Permanent University Fund," "Permanent Fund," and "Fund" used interchangeably herein shall mean the Permanent University Fund as created by Article VII, Section 11 of the Texas Constitution, further implemented by the provisions of Title 49, Chapter 1, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended and supplemented.

The expression "Interest of the University" in the Permanent University Fund shall mean all of the income to such Fund from grazing leases on University lands, and all of the other income from such Fund, after making provision for the payment of the University's proportion of the expenses of administering such Fund, excepting one-third of the income arising and accruing to The Texas A&M University from the 1,000,000 acres of land appropriated by the Constitution of 1876 and the land

appropriated by the Act of 1883, as more particularly defined by Chapter 42, Acts of the Forty-second Legislature, Regular Session, 1931 (Article 2592, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of Texas).

The term "Resolution" as used herein and in the Bonds shall mean this resolution authorizing the Bonds.

The term "Bonds" or "New Series 1972 Bonds" shall mean the New Series 1972 Bonds authorized in this Resolution, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.

The term "Old Series Outstanding Bonds" shall mean the outstanding bonds of the following issues:

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1959, dated July 1, 1959, originally issued in the amount of \$4,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on July 9, 1959.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1960, dated July 1, 1960, originally issued in the amount of \$5,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on July 13, 1960.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1961, dated July 1, 1961, originally issued in the amount \$6,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on July 11, 1961.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1962, dated July 1, 1962, originally issued in the amount of \$5,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on June 29, 1962.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1963, dated July 1, 1963, originally issued in the amount of \$4,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on July 12, 1963.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1964, dated July 1, 1964, originally issued in the amount of \$4,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on June 26, 1964.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1965, dated July 1, 1965, originally issued in the amount of \$6,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on July 16, 1965.

Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1966, dated July 1, 1966, originally issued in the amount of \$11,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on July 8, 1966.

The term "New Series Additional Parity Bonds and Notes and "Additional Parity Bonds and Notes" shall mean the additional parity bonds and the additional parity notes permitted to be issued pursuant to Section 11 of the Resolution adopted on June

16, 1967, authorizing the issuance of Board of Regents of The University of Texas System Permanent University Fund Bonds, New Series 1967, dated July 1, 1967.

The term "New Series Outstanding Bonds" shall mean the outstanding bonds of the following issues:

Board of Regents of The University of Texas System Permanent University Fund Bonds, New Series 1967, dated July 1, 1967, originally issued in the amount of \$14,000,000, pursuant to a resolution adopted on June 16, 1967.

(a) It is hereby certified and recited that the Bonds authorized in this Resolution are Additional Parity Bonds permitted to be issued under Section 11 of the resolution of the Board adopted on June 16, 1967, authorizing the issuance of Board of Regents of The University of Texas System Permanent University Fund Bonds, New Series 1967, dated July 1, 1967, and that all conditions and requirements of said Section 11 have been or will be met prior to the delivery of the New Series 1972 Bonds herein authorized. The New Series 1972 Bonds and the New Series Outstanding Bonds are and shall be on a parity and in all respects of equal dignity.
- (b) Pursuant to the provisions of the Amendments to Section 18 of Article VII of the Texas Constitution, approved by vote of the people of Texas on November 6, 1956, and on November 8, 1966, the New Series 1972 Bonds, the New Series Outstanding Bonds, and any other New Series Additional Parity Bonds and Notes hereafter issued, and the interest thereon, shall be and are hereby equally and ratably secured by and payable from a lien on and pledge of the Interest of the University in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such Interest is defined in Section 1 of this Resolution, subject only and subordinate to the first lien on and pledge of said Interest heretofore created in connection with the Old Series Outstanding Bonds.
- (a) The aforesaid resolution adopted June 16, 1967, authorizing the issuance of the Permanent University Fund Bonds, New Series 1967, has provided that the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall establish in the State Treasury a fund to be known as "Board of Regents of The University of Texas System New Series Permanent University Fund Interest and Sinking Fund" (hereinafter called the "Interest and Sinking Fund"). STRICTLY EXECUTIVE SESSION

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1. U. T. System: Personnel Matters Relating to Administrative Internship Program. --

The U. T. System Administration requests authorization of the Board of Regents to develop a grant application to private foundations or to federal agencies to be submitted upon the approval of the Chairman of the Board to establish an administrative internship program.

Much administration in higher education is characterized by understaffing, people who are involved in administration for the first time, and people who are learning their jobs as they work. This is due in part to the inadequate supply of persons prepared for and experienced in administration in higher education. In addition, few administrative positions are filled by members of minority groups and women.

Within the component institutions of the U. T. System there are individuals who could be identified for possible advancement into higher administrative or supervisory posts were they to be given appropriate training and experience in various administrative positions.

This item has been discussed with and has the unanimous endorsement of the Academic Affairs Council.

A brief description of topics which might be included in the proposal follows:

Purpose: To identify individuals with the potential for advancement in administration in business and financial affairs (such as personnel, budgeting, accounting), student affairs, and academic affairs and to provide rotational assignments in offices in U. T. System institutions to prepare them for appropriate advancement.

Participants: Qualifications by education and experience will be established for the different types of positions. Individuals will be selected based on qualifications, recommendations, and interviews, both within the institutions and new employees with potential for advancement.

Placement: Persons selected will be placed in appropriate offices under the supervision of experienced administrators. Where appropriate, the interns will be rotated among several offices for a broader experience.

The Internship Program: The supervisors of the interns will be required to give those under their supervision substantive assignments. Expectations of performance will be communicated to the interns and they will be evaluated on their performance at the end of their assignments. The program will normally cover a full academic or calendar year. It may be desirable to include in the person's personnel file upon completion of the program a letter describing the program completed.

Organization: Responsibility for this program will be assigned to the U. T. System Personnel Office. The

person responsible for this program will coordinate the program System-wide and will be responsible for the administration of outside funds for its support among the institutions. This person will also identify positions for intern appointments and will coordinate the selection of individuals for these assignments.

Resources: The primary resource for training and experience under this program will be in the administrative offices of the component institutions. However, the Center for Higher Education Management at U. T. Austin may be able to assist in arranging seminars and in providing suggested reading lists for the interns, addressed to the level of the position in which the individual is working.

Extension Outside the U. T. System: Since many smaller institutions, public and private as well as those enrolling predominantly minority students, face serious problems in identifying experienced persons for administrative positions, it may be desirable in future years to open the program to schools outside the U. T. System. Exchange programs might be arranged assuming that protections could be developed to ensure to the smaller schools that our institutions will not be pirating their staffs.

Probable Costs: The stipends for persons in these positions should be equal to the salaries they currently receive. Such stipends should probably range from \$7,500 to \$15,000 a year, or higher in some cases, depending on the nature of the position of the individual. Travel costs would also be required in a number of cases when temporary relocation is desirable. Using an average of \$10,500 and assuming the program would include fifteen interns the first year, the salary costs would be approximately \$157,500. Adding travel and program expenses cost of \$20,000 would bring the total to approximately \$180,000. This might be partially reduced by some institutions absorbing a part of the costs of the program.

2. U. T. System: Personnel Matters Relating to Long-range Academic Development. --

Chancellor LeMaistre requests permission to discuss with the Board the initiation of a planning and evaluation study patterned after the Report of the Committee of 75 (published in December, 1958) which would be developed in concert with the component institutions and focus upon the long-range academic development of The University of Texas System to the year 2000.

3. U. T. Austin: Nominations to Development Board. --

Chancellor LeMaistre concurs in the recommendation of President Spurr that the nominees set forth below to the Development Board of The University of Texas at Austin be approved.

The list includes five alternates who would be utilized in case one of the primary nominees elects not to serve, or to fill vacancies which may occur during the year.

In accordance with routine procedures, following acceptance of the nomination, the complete membership of this advisory board will be reported for the record.

6. U. T. Dallas: Legal Matters re Acceptance of Land. --

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 70, Texas Education Code (Chapter 758, Acts 61st Legislature, Regular Session, 1969), the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System is authorized and directed to establish and to maintain a general academic institution to be known as The University of Texas at Dallas as a state-supported institution of higher education at a site to be located in Dallas County, Texas, or any county adjacent thereto, and to accept donations and gifts of real estate, buildings, libraries, laboratories, apparatus, equipment, records, or money for the use and benefit of such institution; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 55.17, Texas Education Code (Chapter 30, Acts of the 62nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1971), the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System is granted full and final authority and responsibility to acquire, purchase, construct, improve, enlarge, and/or equip property, buildings, structures, and/or facilities for The University of Texas at Dallas; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 65.31(e), Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System is authorized upon terms and conditions acceptable to it to accept and administer gifts, grants, or donations of any kind from any source for use by the System or any of the component institutions of the System; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Texas Research Foundation, a Texas nonprofit corporation, has offered to donate to the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System (as a part of said Foundation's plan of dissolution and winding up of its affairs), for the use and benefit of The University of Texas at Dallas, approximately 270 acres of land contiguous to the present campus of the University; the Foundation's Science Library; its inventory of botanical publications; and certain other items of personalty; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation has offered to donate to the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, for the use and benefit of The University of Texas at Austin, certain tracts of land located in Collin County, Texas; a collection of rare books known as the Lundell Rare Books Collection; a herbarium known as the Lundell Herbarium; and certain other items of personalty with the provisions that the income from and the proceeds of the sale of said lands will be used for the maintenance, upkeep, and preservation of the Lundell Rare Books Library and the Lundell Herbarium; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System to accept such gifts, donations, and transfers from the Board of Trustees of Texas Research Foundation, and to take all essential steps to insure effective and immediate transfer thereof to The University of Texas System; now, therefore,

7. Galveston Medical Branch: Legal Aspects re Financing of John Sealy Hospital. --

At the Board of Regents' meeting on April 29, 1972, the Board discussed the financing of the new John Sealy Hospital at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston and the legal aspects of the acceptance of certain land from the Sealy & Smith Foundation of Galveston in the disposition of certain specific obligations connected therewith. Since the April 29 meeting, the appraisal of the subject land of 7,584.85 acres located in Montgomery County has been received. The total appraised value of the surface and one/half of the minerals amounts to \$10,262,700.

The Sealy & Smith Foundation proposes to transfer this land to the Board of Regents in settlement of the specific obligation of \$9,913,800.23 which is the balance of the distribution of income required by the Internal Revenue Service audit per Resolution of October 31, 1969.

It is recommended that a conveyance of this property, a legal description of which is set out below, be accepted, conditioned however, that such acceptance shall not in any way prejudice the position of Sealy & Smith Foundation should the Internal Revenue Service not approve the adequacy of the discharge of the obligation arising out of the 1969 Audit.

Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute and Public Law 92-218. --Chancellor LeMaistre requests permission for President Clark to discuss with the Board certain legal and organizational changes related to the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute which could facilitate that unit's involvement, both programmatically and financially, in The National Cancer Act of 1971 (Public Law 92-218). These are described in the materials set forth below and Board approval is specifically requested for The University Cancer Center of The University of Texas System as an administrative mechanism (1) to direct and coordinate programs related to The National Cancer Act of 1971. The designation of Dr. Clark as President of the University Cancer Center, in addition to his present responsibilities as President of the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, effective July 1, 1972. The designation of Dr. Robert Hickey as President-Elect of the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor (3) Institute, effective July 1, 1972. LeMaistre Chancellor The University of Texas System 601 Colorado Austin, Texas 78701 Dear Doctor LeMaistre: Reference is made to discussions with you, Mr. E. D. Walker, and Dr. William H. Knisely on February 9, 1972 and with you and Mr. Arthur Dilly on May 5, 1972 concerning our proposed change in the organizational structure as it relates to The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute and its associated facilities and programs. I have discussed at some length the role of M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute with the Director of the National Cancer Institute, and with the Associate Director for Extramural Activities, who is in charge of the expansion of old and establishment of new cancer centers in the United - 13 -

States. Preliminary discussions with the latter official assure us of his enthusiastic support of our presentation to the National Cancer Institute of a program which would serve as a model in depicting the role of a cancer institute such as M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in its affiliation with various kinds of educational units, and with cancer care activities in a given region. They believe that we could form as complete an arrangement for the maximal use of a cancer center as is organized to date because The University of Texas has, in Houston, the opportunity to demonstrate the active affiliation of a cancer hospital and research institute with a medical school, a school of public health, a dental school, and a graduate school, and has additional postgraduate training activities. Also, there are certain affiliated programs which we have, or could have, with the other medical units of the System.

I am enclosing a copy of that portion of the Cancer Act which graphically outlines what is considered a multidisciplinary cancer center (408(a), and the provision for support of those centers (408(b)) and for cancer control programs (409(b)).

We believe that it is very important and timely for us to reorient our organization to a more comprehensive pattern which would distinctly show our relationship to the Southwest region, and that it be designated to express a more comprehensive program than implied by our present title -- generally referred to as simply a "hospital".

We therefore propose the organization depicted by the enclosed chart, with the present M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute and its facilities being the core, but with the extramural activities as an added organizational structure, for the extensions of programs in education, basic and clinical research, and patient care to other institutions and groups. A number of collaborative programs emanating from M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute are in progress. With the availability of 408(b) funding, however, the scope of extramural collaboration will be markedly broadened by initiation of new extramural programs and expansion of those which are ongoing. We further propose that the organization, comprising these two major facets, be designated "The University Cancer Center of The University of Texas," with addition of the words "at Houston" to depend upon whether the Center is to have System connotation. With approval of the Center, we shall work toward a cooperative effort with the other biomedical units in the System in which there would be a Council composed of representatives whose main interest is oncology.

We believe that that proposed organization and designation would achieve these purposes:

- More clearly define the magnitude and scope of our program than does our present title, yet not cause us to lose our identity.
- 2. Match the national nomenclature and immediately qualify us as a model center as described in 408(a) of the National Cancer Act, with capability of bringing 408(b) funds to The University of Texas, for which no other unit in the System is eligible.
- 3. Provide opportunity to make our facilities maximally available to the other units of the System and to other institutions of Texas and the Southwest region on a cooperative and non-competitive basis,

thereby enhancing the opportunity of the other institutions in the System to obtain cancer funds under the new Act, and the opportunity to coordinate the University's program in a categorical field.

4. Most importantly, these organizational changes which will facilitate funding through the National Cancer Act of 1971, will enhance the quality and quantity of cancer research, treatment, professional education, and manpower training available to the citizens of Texas and the Southwest.

If the Board of Regents considers this recommendation favorably, it is proposed that I be appointed President of the new Center in addition to my present responsibilities. Dr. Robert C. Hickey and I will reorient our respective duties as defined in the accompanying letter.

Public Law 92-218 92nd Congress, S. 1828 December 23, 1971

An Act

To amend the Public Health Service Act so as to strengthen the National Cancer Institute and the National Institutes of Health in order more effectively to carry out the national effort against cancer.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the The National United States of America in Congress assembled,

1971.

EXCERPTS

"NATIONAL CANCER RESEARCH AND DEMONSTRATION CENTERS

"Sec. 408. (a) The Director of the National Cancer Institute is authorized to provide for the establishment of fifteen new centers for clinical research, training, and demonstration of advanced diagnostic and treatment methods relating to cancer. Such centers may be supported under subsection (b) or under any other applicable provision

of law.

"(b) The Director of the National Cancer Institute, under policies established by the Director of the National Institutes of Health and after consultation with the National Cancer Advisory Board, is authorized to enter into cooperative agreements with public or private nonprofit agencies or institutions to pay all or part of the cost of planning, establishing, or strengthening, and providing basic operating support for existing or new centers (including, but not limited to, centers established under subsection (a)) for clinical research, training, and demonstration of advanced diagnostic and treatment methods relating to cancer. Federal payments under this subsection in training, and demonstration of advanced diagnostic and treatment methods relating to cancer. Federrl payments under this subsection in support of such cooperative agreements may be used for (1) construction (notwithstanding any limitation under section 405), (2) staffing and other basic operating costs, including such patient care costs as are required for research, (3) training (including training for allied health professions personnel), and (4) demonstration purposes; but support under this subsection (other than support for construction) shall not exceed \$5,000,000 per year per center. Support of a center under this section may be for a period of not to exceed three years and may be extended by the Director of the National Cancer Institute for additional periods of not more than three years each, after review of additional periods of not more than three years each, after review of the operations of such center by an appropriate scientific review group established by the Director of the National Cancer Institute.

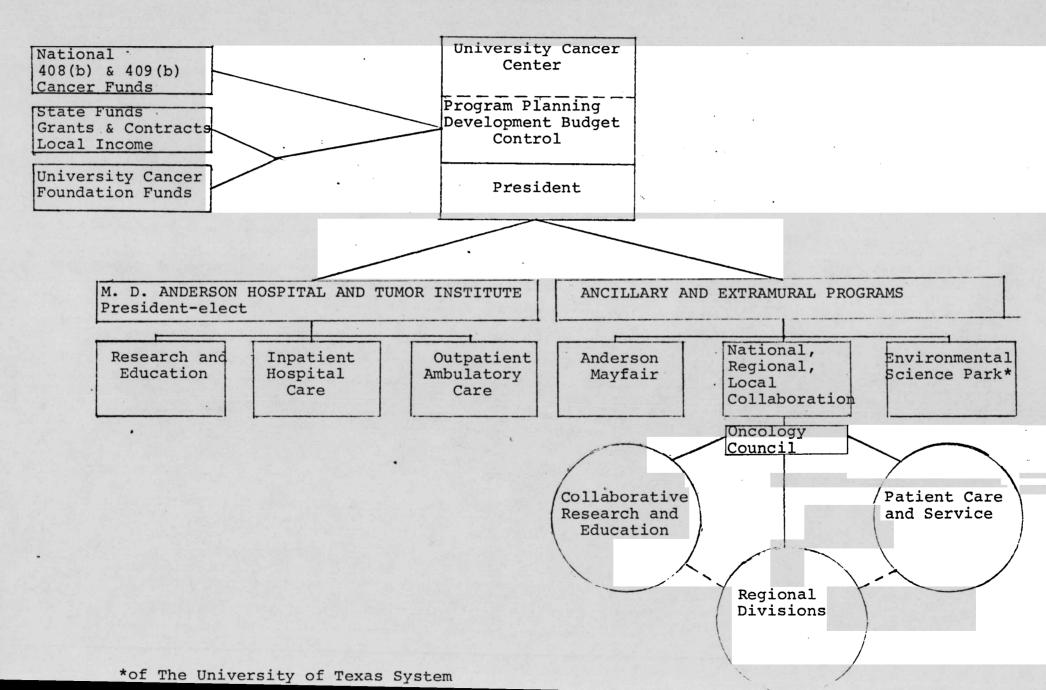
"Sec. 409. (a) The Director of the National Cancer Institute shall establish programs as necessary for cooperation with State and other health agencies in the diagnosis, prevention, and treatment of cancer.

RESPONSE:

This agreement authorizes the initial lease of office space for the Regional Medical Program Regional Representative assigned to the Abilene-San Angelo area. Regional Medical Program of Texas Regional Representatives are assigned to geographical areas which coincide with the public health regions utilized by the State Health Department. This office will be staffed with one full-time professional employee and a one-half time secretary. The job description of the Regional Representative is attached.

REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVE

Summary:

The Regional Representative will be responsible for an overall awareness of Regional Medical Program of Texas activity and opportunity for service within his assigned area.

Duties:

The Regional Representative will have the authority to represent the Regional Medical Program of Texas on a day-to-day basis within an assigned geographic area. The Regional Representative will:

- ... Maintain a working knowledge of the health care system within the assigned region.
- ... Identify and maintain contact with the "key" health professionals in the assigned region.
- ... Provide identity for the Regional Medical Program of Texas and represent it with the highest level of cooperation and integrity.
- ... Suggest areas of real health care need, within the assigned region, and help develop programs to meet those needs.
- ... Keep the Coordinator informed of health care needs and activities within the assigned region.
- ... Provide regular reports of activity to the Deputy Director--Community Programs.
- ... Advise the Coordinator and staff on RMPT activities within, or overlapping into, the assigned region.
- ... Serve, when requested, as a focal point, or convener, for health activities and programs in the assigned region.

Relationships:

The Regional Representative will report to the Deputy Director--Community Programs, Professional and Community Programs Division.

The Regional Representative will be a liaison between the central office staff and the health care system of the assigned geographic region.

This lease agreement provides the first rental of space for the Regional Medical Program Regional Representative assigned to Tyler, Texas, which is Public Health Region VII. This office was initiated over one year ago and occupied office space provided by the Texas State Chest Hospital. The space involved in this lease is somewhat greater than that ordinarily required in subregional offices. The reason is that there is under negotiation a contract with the Tyler-Smith County Area Health Council (Fred Warren, M.D., Chairman), in cooperation with the East Texas Council of Governments, which would develop a plan through which local health care professionals could more effectively coordinate health care delivery services and better meet the health care needs of that area. Staff involved in this contract may occupy some of this office space.

The job description related to Item 2 is also applicable to this Regional Representative.

entitled, "Development of a Research Design to Assess

The agreement is effective for the period through
June 24, 1972, and it will be under the direction of
Dr. Vernon M. Briggs, Jr., Associate Professor of
Economics.

EXCEPTION COMMENT:

What benefit do we derive from participating with Georgia State University, which I assume is merely a fact-finding grant, but which might well lead to another TEDTAC operation.

RESPONSE:

The proposed effort under this program involves studying the effects of certain welfare and family assistance programs. The effort proposed by the University of Texas at Austin, as well as the other members of the consortium, involves only research and evaluation of programs and does not contain any element of social action or advocacy.

Nothing in the study contemplates any action on the part of the University of Texas at Austin to become involved in efforts to change any existing programs. The University effort is purely evaluative in nature and clearly comes under the University of Texas at Austin mission of research. The paragraphs below provide additional information on the program.

Three institutions of higher education in the south have entered into a consortium agreement in order to study

the impact of welfare reform legislation on economic and social conditions in the south. Georgia State University, representing Georgia, the University of Mississippi, representing Mississippi, and Southern University, representing Louisiana, are the three schools involved in the consortium.

Professor Briggs of the University of Texas at
Austin was asked to participate in the proposal planning
because of his extensive knowledge of the areas of
economics and labor in the south. Professor Briggs has
done extensive research and written several articles on
human resources and labor, particularly as applied to the
southern United States. Subsequently, The University of
Texas was invited and agreed to become a member of this
consortium.

Benefits to the University of Texas at Austin derived from membership in this consortium are two-fold. First, participation will allow continuation of a field of research and study involving human resources, particularly in the southern United States. The knowledge gained from this research project could very well lead to new thinking in the economic and social aspects of welfare legislation. Second, the involvement of the University of Texas at Austin faculty in such a research project will enable the University to stay abreast of current trends in Federal executive and legislative thinking with regard to U.S. Department of Labor and Manpower Administration interests. Out of such knowledge of current trends could come future support for other programs at the University of Texas at Austin.

Dear Dean Sprague:

Enclosed are three copies of the revised proposed Lease Agreement between the Medical School and the Dallas Independent School District (DISD) which, if approved by both parties, would provide an adequate clinic facility for one of the Children and Youth Project Neighborhood Health Teams.

The DISD has agreed in principle to the three changes requested by Mr. Burnell Waldrep of the University of Texas Law Office. A copy of the original Agreement and correspondence dealing with Mr. Waldrep's and Mr. Whiteside's recommendations are enclosed (see Attachments A and B).

In order to meet Mr. Waldrep's recommendations the DISD Legal Department has dropped the requirement that the Project purchase property damage insurance, has extended the period of time the Project would have to occupy the building from 10 to 60 days and has extended the period of time the Project would have to restore the building to good condition upon leaving from 7 to 60 days.

The Neighborhood Health Team that would use the clinic building proposed in the Leasing Agreement is currently housed in space borrowed from the Dallas Housing Authority, the Edgar Ward Place Community Center. We were permitted to use this space with the understanding that we would move as soon as space more suitable to our needs could be found. That was two and one-half years ago.

Our Neighborhood Health Team consists of:

1 Physician

2 Nurses

2 Social Workers

1 Psychologist

1 Nutritionist

1 Dental Hygienist

1 Secretary

2 Clerk-Receptionists

They currently provide comprehensive care to 3000 children. New registrants are admitted at a rate of 900 per year and the Team should be able to care for 5000 children by January 1974.

The working areas for the Medical Social Workers, Dental Hygienist and Clerk-Receptionists consist of areas in the auditorium partitioned with folding screens which children knock over and which provide no privacy or quiet for health professional or patient. The Clinical Psychologist is officed in a storage room behind the stage in the auditorium where we can not install a telephone because of building codes on running wires and where he can not do any psychological testing or evaluations. The Pediatrician, 2 Nurses, a Nutritionist and an Aide have three small rooms which are very confining and which do not provide enough storage for medicines and equipment. There is no space for the provision of speech and hearing services, physical and occupational therapy health services or dental restorative services.

The Health Team is unable to treat as many patients as this new facility would permit and the quality of care is difficult to maintain. It is not possible to air condition the auditorium area and the high summer temperatures and insects pose a significant problem. Many health professionals are dissatisfied and I know some will leave if we are unable to provide better facilities. Lack of appropriate space prevents the use of this facility for medical student, intern and resident rotations.

January 20, 1972

The proposed new facility which could be built if the Board of Regents approves this Lease Agreement would not only resolve these problems but also provide the following benefits:

- 1) A "laboratory" for community medicine can be developed in which new health care delivery systems for low income families could be studied for their effectiveness and their efficiency.
- 2) The Neighborhood Health Clinic, with its multidisciplinary health team, can make an important contribution to the education of medical students and the students of allied health professions.
- 3) The health professionals currently assigned to this Health Team will be able to use their time more effectively and efficiently.

The Project has tried to find a more adequate facility in this population center but none is available. This Health Team must remain in close proximity to its present location so that the patients will be able to walk to it. The proposed site for this new facility is on the campus of the G. W. Carver School.

The primary reasons why we have chosen to work closely with the DISD are that we have the mutual objectives to keep children healthy and in school, access to the children for registration, treatment, health education programs conducted in the classrooms, ability to utilize DISD school nurses in our programs, access to data on school absences due to health problems and the fact that the schools are located in the middle of population centers. Our working relationship with the DISD is excellent and we have developed a number of programs in cooperation with them (see Attachment C).

I object to the transfer of \$2,500.00 to the Office of Media and Community Information, on the basis that they have oversupplied media and community information.

RESPONSE:

This transfer of \$2,500.00 to the Maintenance and Operation account of the Office of Media and Community Information will enable this office to meet their operational requirements through the end of the fiscal year. On April 10, 1972 the balance in this account was \$443, and a transfer of funds was needed to allow the office to continue in operation. The original budget of \$8,000 was inadequate to meet the increased media and information programs of this office.
