INVOCATION .-- Regent Bauer offered the invocation.

** Chancellor Ransom reported that Doctor Dolley, Vice-Chancellor for Fiscal Affairs, was excused from the meeting to attend a finance meeting being held on the campus in his honor.

The Institutional Heads out of Austin, except for Doctor Blocker, were excused from the meeting on Saturday morning but did attend the meeting of the Committee of the Whole on Friday. At the meeting of the Committee of the Whole, Doctor Blocker was represented by Mr. Warren Harding, Executive Director of the Medical Branch.

Regents Ikard, Johnson and Olan were absent (excused) from the meeting on Saturday morning because of important business.
 Regents Ikard and Olan were present for the entire meeting of the Committee of the Whole on Friday and Regent Johnson was present for the meeting of the Committee of the Whole on Friday morning.

Chairman Heath recognized Chancellor Ransom who announced that the next meeting of the Development Board would be on May 4, and that the reports of the Board's activities would be sent to the Regents prior to the session in El Paso on May 27-28.

At the same time Chancellor Ransom took the opportunity to present John Orr, retiring President of the Students' Association. Mr. Orr expressed appreciation for the opportunity of working with the Regents and thanked the members of the Board of Regents for the cooperation he had received throughout the year. 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ARLINGTON STATE COLLEGE: STUDENT FEE REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1966, (SKILES ACT) \$1,100,000: SALE OF BONDS THROUGH RUSS AND COMPANY. Regent Bauer moved that the proposal sub mitted by Russ and Company for direct placement of the Arlington State College Student Fee Revenue Bonds, Series 1966 (Skiles Act) in the amount of \$1,100,000 at a coupon rate of 4% on all of the bonds plus a premium of \$100 payable to the Board of Regents be approved and that the Chairman be authorized to execute an appropriate agreement with Russ and Company when it has been approved by the University Attorney, the Vice-Chancellor (Fiscal Affairs) and the Endowment Officer. MAIN UNIVERSITY, NEW DORMITORY ACADEMIC COMPLEX REC. OMMENDATION REQUESTED RE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND PRE QUALIFICATION OF BIDDERS THEREON. Vice Chairman Erwin moved that Vice Chancellor Dolley and Endowment Officer Stewart be requested to present a recommendation at the May meeting of the Board of Regents relating to the issuance of bonds to construct the New Dormitory Academic Complex. Regent Brenan seconded the motion which was unanimously adopted.

Whereupon, Regent Bauer moved that contractors who have the capital and the ability to handle a job of the size of the New Dormitory-Academic Complex be pre-qualified and that Mr. Walker present at the May meeting the procedure to be followed in this connection. Regent Brenan seconded the motion which was unanimously adopted.

SYSTEM WIDE: MODIFICATIONS OF CONSULTING ARCHITECTS: CONTRACT. At the Regents' meeting held April 1 and 2, 1966, recommendations were made to modify the existing Consulting Architects contract. Included in these recommendations was a provision that the memorandum dated March 27, 1966, from Mr. Max Brocks and approved by E. D. Walker be approved by the Board.

Paragraph No. 2 of that memorandum names four buildings which should be placed under proposed new arrangements between the University and the Consulting Architects. The four buildings involved were specifically named by Mr. Walker in his oral report to the Board, however, they were not included in the written recommendations. In order to clarify the recommendation as to the specific buildings in volved, upon motion of Vice-Chairman Erwin, seconded by Regent Josey. the Board unanimously adopted the recommendation by Mr. Walker that the Humanities Research Center and Engineering Center at the Main University, the Student Union Addition at Texas Western College, and the Dental Science Institute at the Dental Branch be placed under the new arrangement and further that the request con tained in a footnote to Paragraph No. 2 of the subject memorandum not be approved.

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REPORT OF INTERIM ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. -Executive Committee Chairman Brenan reported that since the last report of the Executive Committee on April 1, 1966, the Committee has unanimously approved the following items and they are submitted for the Board's ratification:

a. Permission to Travel: Main University and Medical Branch:

- (1) <u>Main University: Permission to Leonard Broom</u> <u>for Travel (2T-5).-- Permission was granted to</u> Leonard Broom, Ashbel Smith Professor of Sociology, to go to Evian, France; Canberra, Australia; Tokyo, Japan from September 1 to October 8, 1966 to attend and deliver a paper at the Sixth World Congress of Sociology at Evian; to confer with research associates at the Australian National University and the Tokyo Kyoiku University. - (2) Medical Branch: Permission to A. E. Rodin, M.D. for Travel (4T-5). -- Permission was granted to A. E. Rodin, M. D., Associate Professor of Pathology, to go to Chicago, Illinois from June 19 to July 30, 1966 to attend the "Educational Science for Medical Teachers." Doctor Rodin is to be reimbursed for expenses in the amount of \$1,000 covering a period of 42 days. This amount includes transportation, and the source of funds is Pathology Current Restricted Account No. 9-19311-644643-70.
- (3) Medical Branch: Permission to Melvyn H. Schreiber, M. D. for Travel (4T-6). -- Permission was granted to Melvyn H. Schreiber, M. D., Associate Professor of Radiology, to go to Sweden, England, Denmark, Holland, France and Italy from May 29 to July 20, 1966 to visit centers of educational, medical and general learning where arrangements have been made to visit distinguished radiologists in their university departments, and to discuss mutual interests in research, teaching and practice. Doctor Schreiber's expense to be reimbursed is \$5,500 for a period of 40 to 50 days with the cost of transportation for self and family included. The source of funds for the trip will come from the John and Mary R. Markle Scholarship, Account No. 8-19927-685440-70.

MAIN UNIVERSITY: DEED TO ARTHUR POPE WATSON, JR. COVERING 2,344 SQUARE FEET OF LAND. -- Whereupon, the Chair man was authorized to execute a warranty deed to Arthur Pope Watson, Jr., and a contract for a retaining wall which was incidental to the deed, and any other necessary papers necessary to consummate this exchange as outlined. The warranty deed so authorized covers 2,344 square feet of land, being a strip of land off the south end of the east one-half of Outlot 63, Division E, in the City of Austin, Texas. This land is a part of the tract of land now owned by the Board of Regents adjacent to Red River Street between 18th and 19th Streets, and it is being exchanged for an equal amount of land owned by Arthur Pope Watson in order to acquire the necessary site of the Collections Deposit Library. This deed and any other papers in connection therewith are to be approved as to content by E. D. Walker and as to form by University Attorney Waldrep prior to execution by the Chairman.

1966-67 OPERATING BUDGETS, THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM. --After due consideration of the 1966-67 Operating Budgets for The University of Texas, the Committee of the Whole amended the proposed budgets and approved same in the form as in the Official Record, Volume XXI of Annual Budgets:

- b. Main University
- c. Texas Western College
- d. Arlington State College
- e. Medical Branch
- f. Southwestern Medical School
- g. South Texas Medical School
- h. Dental Branch

- j. Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences

1966-67 PHYSICIANS' REFERRAL SERVICE BUDGET, M. D. ANDER-SON HOSPITAL AND TUMOR INSTITUTE.--The Physicians' Referral Service Budget of the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute for 1966-67 was approved as presented.

ARLINGTON STATE COLLEGE: APPROVAL OF FINAL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR NEW MATHEMATICS-LANGUAGE BUILDING .--Doctor Woolf reported that he had received a telegraphic communication informing him that the United States Office of Education has approved the Arlington State College's application for a grant of \$458, 291.00 under the Academic Facilities Act for the New Mathematics-Language Building. Thereafter the working drawings

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and specifications for the New Mathematics-Language Building at Arlington State College were approved and Mr. Walker was authorized to advertise for bids to be presented to the Board of Regents for consideration at a later meeting.

MAIN UNIVERSITY: REQUEST FOR RECOMMENDATION RE COUNSELING. --Following a report by Regent Olan, Chairman of the Academic and Developmental Affairs Committee, relating to the various discussions on counseling for incoming students, the Administration was asked to make recommendations concerning counseling and submit them to the Board of Regents within six months.

APPROPRIATION TO MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT ACCOUNT, OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS. -- An appropriation of \$2,000 was authorized from the Available University Fund to the Maintenance and Equipment Account of the Office of the Secretary of the Board of Regents.

POLICY STATEMENT RELATING TO RESEARCH INVESTIGATION INVOLVING HUMAN BEINGS. -- The following statement of policy relating to research investigation involving human beings as recommended by the Medical Affairs Council and Chancellor Ransom was approved:

I. GENERAL APPROACH

A. The voluntary consent of the human subject is absolutely essential. This means that the person involved, except as indicated below, should have legal capacity to give consent, should be so situated as to be able to exercise free power of choice without the intervention of any element of force, fraud, deceit, duress, overreaching, or other ulterior form of constraint or coercion; and should have sufficient knowledge and comprehension of the elements of the subject matter involved as to enable him to make an understanding and enlightened decision. This latter element requires that before the acceptance of an affirmative decision by the experimental subject, the nature, duration, and purpose of the experiment should be made known to him; the method and means by which it is to be conducted; all inconveniences and hazards to be expected within reason; and the effects upon his health or person which may come from his participation in the experiment.

1. The "Consent to Investigational Procedure or Treatment" form is to be signed by all patients who are to undergo investigational procedures or treatments. If the subject is not competent, the person responsible shall be the legally appointed guardian or next of kin. If the subject is a minor under 21 years of age, the person responsible shall be the mother and father (both should sign) or legally appointed guardian.

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2. The duty and responsibility for ascertaining the quality of the consent rests upon each individual who initiates, directs, or engages in the experiment. It is a personal duty and responsibility which may not be delegated to another with impunity.

B. The experiment should be such as to yield fruitful results for the good of society, unprocurable by other methods or means of study, and not random and unnecessary in nature.

C. The experiment should be so designed and based on the results of nonhuman experimentation and on a knowledge of the natural history of the disease or other problem under study that the anticipated results will justify the performance of the experiment.

D. The experiment should be so conducted as to avoid all unnecessary physical and mental suffering and injury.

E. No experiment should be conducted where there is an <u>a priori</u> reason to believe that death or disabling injury will occur; except, perhaps where the investigating physician himself is the subject of the experiment.

F. The degree of risk to be taken should never exceed the humanitarian importance of the problem to be solved by the experiment.

G. Proper preparations should be made and adequate facilities should be provided to protect the experimental subject against even remote possibilities of injury, disability, or death.

H. The experiment should be conducted only by scientifically qualified persons. The highest degree of skill and care should be required of those who conduct or engage in the experiment throughout all stages of the experiment.

I. During the course of the experiment, the human subject should be at liberty to bring the experiment to an end if he has reached the physical or mental state where continuation of the experiment seems to him to be impossible.

J. During the course of the experiment, the scientist in charge must be prepared to terminate the experiment at any stage, if he has probable cause to believe, in the exercise of the good faith, superior skill, and careful judgment required of him that continuation of the experiment is likely to result in injury, disability, or death to the experimental subject.

II. METHODS OF PROCEDURE

A. All proposed research programs and projects involving numan beings must be approved by the responsible department chairman, and a copy of the protocol submitted to the Research Review Committee (or the equivalent institutional committee) prior to the start of the project. That committee will review

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those research investigations in which, in the opinion of the committee chairman and the department chairman, there are unusual risks involved for study patients. In addition, all proposed projects in which isotopes are administered to humans must be reviewed by the Isotope Committee (or the equivalent institutional committee). In unusual cases, it may be necessary to appoint special committees of scientists from within the institution or prominent scientists from outside to assist the established committees.

B. In reviewing proposed experimental projects, the committees will determine whether:

- 1. the purpose of the research is well defined;
- the principles outlined in Research Investigations Involving Human Beings, section I, articles A through J, have been followed;
- 3. there are any risks involved to the study patient;
- 4. proper consideration has been given to biometrical design which should be observed in accordance with statistical principles wherever applicable in order to reduce the sample size, thus limiting the exposure of human subjects to investigational risks.

C. When the investigation is completed and reports are prepared for publication, they must be written so as to leave no doubt in the mind of the reader that the investigation was justified and that all ethical requirements were fully met.

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MAIN UNIVERSITY: REMODELING OF ROOM 201, MAIN BUILDING, FOR ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE SPACE ASSIGNMENTS... Remodeling of Room 201, Main Building, so as to be adequate for the use of the Endowment Office was authorized as follows:

- 1. The installation of a suspended (lift out) ceiling at a height approximating ten feet.
- 2. Modification of existing venetian blinds to make the section above the ten foot ceiling inoperable and to leave the section below the ceiling operable with the operating mechanisms below the ceiling.
- 3. Raise the existing partitions to the ceiling. There are to be no new partitions and no existing partition is to be removed.
- 4. No built-in existing cabinets or shelves are to be removed. Shelving and cabinets requested are to be constructed in the southeast room. Open shelves are to be constructed in the storeroom above an existing cabinet and that section of the cabinet now arranged for maps is to be remodeled to make the use of shelves possible.
- 5. Two chalkboards now installed in these spaces are to be removed.
- 6. All existing walls are to be refinished.
- 7. The present lighting system arranged for a high ceiling is to be removed and new lighting units are to be installed as a part of the new suspended ceiling to provide an appropriate illumination level.
- 8. The air conditioning system arranged for summer cooling and winter heating must be modified to compensate for the fact that the extension upward of the partitions makes necessary an entirely different air distribution and control system and to augment the amount of air previously provided.
- 9. The present carpets are to be removed in order that suitable under floor electrical and communications systems may be installed. The present carpets will then be reinstalled. Where additional wall outlets are required, they will be installed.
- A Dwyer kitchen unit is to be installed to replace the present refrigerator being used by this agency.
- All furniture required will be removed from spaces now occupied by the Endowment Office in Rooms 301, 303, and 305 Main Building.

For this project, \$11,075 was appropriated out of Main University General Funds Unappropriated Balance.

MAIN UNIVERSITY: NEW DORMITORY-ACADEMIC COMPLEX FINAL PLANS AUTHORIZED: APPROPRIATIONS FOR ASSOCIATE ARCHITECTS' FEES... The Associate Architects were authorized to proceed with working drawings and specifications on the New Dormitory Academic Complex at the Main University based on the approved revised preliminary plans at a cost not to exceed \$4.611.00 per student (3,000 students) or \$13,833,000.00 for the dormitory facilities and an additional \$1,250,000.00 for the Academic facilities. For Associate Architects' fees appropriations in the amount of \$490,000.00 from Main University Housing and Food Service for the dormitory facilities and \$45,000.00 from Permanent University Fund Bond Proceeds for the academic portion were approved.

MEDICAL BRANCH: RULES RELATING TO AUGMENTATION... The Chancellor was authorized to notify the Executive Director and Dean of the Medical Branch that the Board of Regents reconfirm the intent of the Rules which were passed in 1957 that required geographic full time faculty members to report fees paid by private patients, furthermore, to reconfirm the intent of the same rules which limited the amount of income from private patients over and above their University salaries. (This refers to the Augmentation Plan adopted June 28, 1957 Vol. IV, Page 986.)

REGENTS' RULES AND REGULATIONS, PART TWO: AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 10, SECTION 8.6 RELATING TO THE SUMMER TEXAN; BUDGETARY AMENDMENTS TO THE SUMMER TEXAN FOR 1966.-- The Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part Two, Chapter 10. Section 8.6 was amended by changing the period (.) at the end of the first sentence to a semi-colon (;) and adding "provided, however, that The Summer Texan shall be permitted to furnish one edition free of charge to persons who indicate that they intend to enter the University as freshmen the following September." Section 8.6 as amended will read as follows

> "In order to minimize sharply rising publishing costs, outside the campus of the Main University no copy or copies of any issue of the <u>Daily Texan</u> shall be given, delivered, or in anywise made available to any person or persons other than one copy for each paid subscription, no more than three copies to each advertiser in the issue in question, and one copy for each purchase price paid for an individual copy of the issue in question, provided however, that <u>The Summer Texan</u> shall be permitted to furnish one edition free of charge to persons who indicate that they intend to enter the University as freshmen the following September. No individual copies shall be sold at less than the published price of such issue and in no event shall any individual copies be sold at a price less than five cents each."

To conform to Section 8.6 as amended, the following proposed budgetary amendments to <u>The Summer Texan</u> for 1966 were so amended and adopted as set out below, and the following budgetary amendments to the other Texas Student Publications for 1965-66 were approved. (pages 23-25)
