GRADUATE SCHOOL -- RECOMMENDED CHANGES IN ADMISSION PROCEDURES:

M- 163

Certain changes in the procedures for admission to the Graduate School were given approval by the Graduate Legislative Council at its meeting on November 30, 1959, and by the Board of Regents at its meeting on January 23, 1960. These changes have proved to be difficult to administer. Presumably, the majority of students applying for admission to the Graduate School are

quickly found to be eligible for admission; the remainder actually require a greater total amount of time for adequate study and evaluation of their scholastic records. In such cases, the judgment of faculty of an appropriate area, as well as that of the Director of Admissions, must be sought. The recommended changes represent the joint opinions of all involved in the task of admitting students to the Graduate School, and have proved to be satisfactory during a trial period preliminary to this recommendation. The Graduate Council, therefore, with concurrence of the Director of Admissions, recommends the following changes in the Graduate Catalogue; the changes have been approved by the Graduate Legislative Council, by the President, Main University, and the Chancellor:

Changes in Graduate Catalogue 6004, page 41.

A. As heading to second paragraph

Present heading:

REGULAR ADMISSION

Retain all except last sentence. Present last sentence of this paragraph:
Certain conditions may, however, be imposed if the applicant's preparation fails to conform to general University of Texas requirements.

B. Delete the following paragraph:

Provisional admission - In some instances, an applicant may be admitted as a provisional student with the approval of the Committee on Graduate Studies of the proposed major area and the Dean. The provisional student is usually one who holds a bachelor's degree or the equivalent but proposes a major field of study for which the undergraduate or other preparation is seriously deficient, either with respect to scope (as defined by the academic area) or quality. During the period of study as a provisional student, which may not in any event exceed two semesters or the equivalent, the student will confer at appropriate times with the graduate adviser of the proposed major area for advice and assistance in planning a program of work designed to achieve eligibility for regular admission to the Graduate School. During this period the student may take additional work that may be counted later for graduate credit subject to approval in advance by the graduate adviser of the proProposed heading:

ADMISSION

Retain all except last sentence.

delete this sentence

ADD the following:

Consideration of Applicants not accepted or rejected.

The Director of Admissions will refer the record of any applicant to the Graduate Adviser of the student's intended major department and to the Dean of the Graduate School for their recommendation for acceptance or rejection if

- (1) the applicant has at least a 1.8 grade point average on all work of junior and senior level previously taken and a satisfactory score on the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test, or
- (2) the applicant has at least a 2.0 grade point average on all work of junior or senior level previously taken but does not have a satisfactory score on the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test, or

posed major area and the Dean. When all conditions have been absolved, the student may be recommended for regular admission to the Graduate School, subject to the regulations outlined above.

(3) the applicant's subject preparation does not conform to general University policy.

Furthermore, upon request from either the appropriate graduate adviser or the Dean of the Graduate School the record of any applicant will be referred for their consideration. In conformance with the recommendation of the graduate adviser and the Dean of the Graduate School, the Director of Admissions will accept the applicant, with or without conditions, or reject the applicant.

Permit to Register in Graduate School .- The Director of Admissions will issue a permit to register in the Graduate School to any applicant who holds a Bachelor's degree from The University of Texas or other institution approved by the appropriate accrediting agency if the applicant has at least a 2.0 grade point average on all work of junior and senior level previously taken but who has not had the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test. This permit is valid for one semester of the Long Session or one Summer Session only. It requires that the applicant take the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test during the semester or Summer Session for which he is issued a permit to register. Note: if the applicant applies for admission prior to the last scheduled administration of the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test before his indicated admission date, he will not be admitted under the above provisions.

The following gifts have been received and accepted for the purposes noted:

- 1. Payments of \$64.31 and \$89.88, representing distributable income from the Estate of Hattie E. Gaines for the John Q. Gaines Foundation for Cancer 🕟 Research. This account was authorized by the Regents' approval of the 11-8053 Central Administration Docket in January of 1960.
- 2. Unrestricted gift of \$1,000 from Mr. L. L. Colbert, %Chrysler Corporation, 77-3/14 Detroit, Michigan. The funds have been deposited to Account 81643, "Various M-31044. Donors, Various Purposes," Office of the Chancellor.
- 3. Ratification of gift of Mrs. Olga Keith Wiess of \$10,000 to provide further support for the Department of Oto-Rhino-Laryngology at the Medical Branch, Galveston. The gift was accepted by Chairman Merton M. Minter on behalf of the Board of Regents on December 30, 1960. The agreement stipulates that the donation is not intended to be a substitute for the present support which The University of Texas provides for the Department of Oto-Rhino-Laryngology; instead it is given to supplement and expedite 1 7 7 275 the activities of that Department.
- 4. Donation of debentures in the amount of the par value of \$103,000 for the benefit of Texas Western College, accepted by the Chancellor on December 21, 1960. The donor of this unrestricted gift has requested that his name not be made public in connection with the gift. The Chancellor will therefore report on the matter orally during the Board meeting. The income from the debentures and the principal to be derived from any sale of the debentures will be deposited into a current restricted account entitled, "Excellence Fund" of Texas Western College.


