Items concerning Central Administration are presented below:

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE SECURITY AGREEMENT: Department of Defense Security Agreement, dated November 4, 1954, negotiated by the Office of Government Sponsored Research, by which the University accepts responsibility for proper handling of classified material furnished in connection with Department of Defense contracts conducted by the University, has been signed on behalf of the University by President Logan Wilson. The Agreement is effective so long as the University is in possession of classified matter connected with any Department of Defense contracts.

I recommend approval of this action and ratification of signature.

RESULTS OF THIRTY-FOURTH SALE OF OIL AND GAS LEASES ON UNIVERSITY LANDS: At the December 3 sale, oil and gas leases were offered on 33,478.14 acres of University lands, and the total bonus received at this sale was \$4,760,000.

SHORT LEAVES: I recommend approval of the following short leave of absence without loss of salary:

Mr. W. E. Keys, Director, News and Information Service, to attend as the institutional representative the District X annual conference of the American College Public Relations Association at Texas Western College, El Paso, Texas, February 18 and 19, 1955, expenses to be paid from the Maintenance, Equipment and Travel account of the News and Information Service.

HOGG FOUNDATION: VARNER PROPERTIES - ACCEPTANCE OF COMMISSION BY FACULTY MEMBER: In connection with the acquisition and settlement of the Varner Properties, it was necessary to work out an annuity plan for Mrs. Marie Willett Howard. Dr. Henry T. Owen, Professor of Insurance in the College of Business Administration, was requested to make an insurance survey and to recommend the best plan under which purchase could be made. Eventually purchases were made from three companies at a savings to the University of about \$7,000, and it has now developed that Dr. Owen can receive approximately 2% in commissions as a licensed broker, the total being in the neighborhood of \$4,200 (about \$200 of which has been expended for travel and incidental expenses). If this sum is not paid by the insurance companies to Dr. Owen, it will go to other agents; in no event would nonpayment of the commission result in a lesser cost for the annuities. Most of this work was done by Dr. Owen during the summer when he was not on the University payroll and during vacation periods. None of the work was done during regular school hours. Judge Scott Gaines has indicated that there is nothing illegal about the procedure, but it is a matter of University policy. I recommend, and Dr. Dolley concurs, that Dr. Owen be permitted to accept the commission.

CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION PLANS FOR BRANCHES: I recommend that the Job Classification Studies for non-teaching personnel for Southwestern Medical School, the Dental Branch, and Texas Western College, enclosed to you with dockets, be approved and adopted; with the further recommendation that consideration be given to finding financial means for implementing these recommendations.

I am submitting herewith a docket for the Main University and Extramural Divisions for the meeting of the Board of Regents to be held in Dallas on January 28 and 29, 1955.

#### 1954-55 Budget

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS: I recommend ratification of your approval by "no-objection-within-five-days" procedure of Mail Dockets XXVIII, XXIX and XXX, copies of which are attached hereto.

OFFER OF COLUMBIA-SOUTHERN CHEMICAL COMPANY: The Columbia-Southern Chemical Company of Corpus Christi will contribute \$10,000 to the University toward the purchase of an infrared spectrophotometer, provided the University will put up the additional \$5,000 required for the total price of \$15,000. The Chemistry Department has space for the equipment and has much need for it in its teaching. I recommend that the \$5,000 be provided from the Main University Unappropriated Balance.

VACATION SCHEDULE FOR CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL: At the September 17 and 18, 1954, meeting of the Board of Regents, the vacation schedule for classified employees, shown on page M-32 of the Main University docket, was approved. I recommend the following addition to that schedule:

In compliance with Articles 4591 and 4591 (d) Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes and Article V, Section 5 (b) of the Appropriations Bill, Fifty-Third Legislature, Regular Session, which provide for a holiday for state employees on state-wide election days, add one holiday to the Vacation schedule for Classified Employees in lieu of November 2, 1954, a state-wide election day.

RESEARCH CONTRACTS: The following contracts and amendments have been negotiated by the Office of Government Sponsored Research and have been signed by the President or Vice-President upon the recommendation of the appropriate Technical Director, the Director of the Office of Government Sponsored Research and the Comptroller. I recommend your approval and ratification of signatures:

- 1. Supplemental Agreement No. 2 to Contract AF 33(516)-2290, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, adds the sum of \$100,000.00, extends the period of the contract through 15 November 1955, and amends the scope of the work. The research continues in the Defense Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 2. Supplemental Agreement No. 7 to Contract AF 33(616)-313, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, adds \$115,000.00 to the contract funds, extends the period of the contract through 17 September 1955, and amends the scope of the work. The research continues in the Defense Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 3. Change Order No. 10 to Contract AF 18(600)-87, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, removes the restriction in Supplemental Agreement No. 9 to the contract which requires that the Secretary or Under Secretary of the Air Force has to sign Agreement No. 9 in order to contractually bind the Department of the Air Force. The research and development of fire control mechanisms continues in the Military Physics Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. N. Y. Colby, Professor of Physics.
- 4. Supplemental Agreement No. 9 to Contract AF 18(600)-87, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, adds \$731,730.46 to the operating funds, extends the ending date to 30 November 1955, and amends the scope of the work. The research and development of fire control mechanisms continues in the Military Physics Research Laboratory, directed by Dr. M. Y. Colby, Professor of Physics.
- 5. Supplemental Agreement No. 6 to Contract AF 33(600)-22582, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Materiel Command, adds the sum of \$60,000.00 to the contract funds, extends the contract period through 30 June 1955, and amends the scope of the work. The research continues at the Defense Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 6. Change Order No. 7 to Contract AF 33(600)-22582, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Materiel Command, adds \$2,215.80 to the operating funds. The research continues at the Defense Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 7. Contract AF 33(616)-2673, by which the Department of the Air Force, Wright Air Development Center, provides \$23,957.02 to continue the research work on supersonic wind tunnels, originally initiated under Contract AF 33(038)-10112. The contract is effective for the period 1 September 1954 through 28 February 1955. The program is to be conducted in the Defense Research Laboratory, directed by Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.



- 8. Supplemental Agreement No. 3 to Contract DA-23-072-0RD-685, by which the U. S. Army, Ordnance Corps, adds \$8,000.00 to the contract funds, extends the period of performance through 31 August 1955, and amends the scope of the work. The research on pressure volume temperature relationships and thermodynamic properties of hydrocarbons and other compounds continues under the direction of Dr. K. A. Kobe, Professor of Chemical Engineering, in the Bureau of Industrial Chemistry.
- 9. Modification No. 1 to Contract DA 19-129-QM-150, by which the Department of the Army, Quartermaster Research and Development Command, incorporates the fixed overhead rate of 43.54% into the contract for the calendar year 1954, and corrects certain contractual deficiencies in the original contract. The investigation of packaging materials and techniques in aerial delivery of supplies continues in the Structural Mechanics Research Laboratory under the direction of J. Neils Thompson, Professor of Civil Engineering.
- 10. Amendment No. 1 to Contract Nonr-375(03), by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, adds \$980.00 to the contract funds, and extends the period of performance through 28 February 1955. The geographical survey of the Bahama Islands continues under the direction of Dr. Edwin Doran, Assistant Professor of Geography.
- 11. Amendment No. 5 to Basic Contract Nonr-375(00), by which the Department of the Navy, Office of Naval Research, incorporates the "Disputes" article into the Basic Contract, and revises certain contractual clauses in accordance with statutory requirements. Five task orders are currently in effect at the Main University under this contract.
- 12. Amendment No. 2 to Contract NObsr-64126, by which the Department of the Navy, Bureau of Ships, incorporates the fixed overhead rate of 43.54% of salaries into the contract for the calendar year 1954. The research continues in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering.
- 13. Amendment No. 28 to Contract NObsr-52267, by which the Department of the Navy, Bureau of Ships, incorporates the Defense Research Laboratory fixed overhead rate of 37.85% of salaries into the contract for the calendar year 1954. The research continues at the Defense Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 14. Amendment No. 27 to Contract NObsr-52267, by which the Department of the Navy, Bureau of Ships, adds \$200,000.00 to the contract funds and extends the period of performance through 31 July 1955. The research on underwater sound continues in the Defense Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 15. Amendment No. 7 to Contract NObsr-63052, by which the Department of the Navy, Bureau of Ships, incorporates the fixed overhead rate of 43.54% of salaries into the contract for the calendar year 1954. The research continues at the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering.

- 16. Amendment No. 6 to Contract NObsr-63052, by which the Department of the Navy, Bureau of Ships, adds \$10,300.00 to the operating funds, extends the ending date of the contract through 31 August 1955, and revises certain contractual clauses in accordance with statutory requirements. The research on radar is conducted in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory, directed by Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering.
- 17. Extension of Grant G-259 through 31 August 1955, by the National Science Foundation, without additional funds. The research on the physiology of blue-green algae continues in the Laboratory of Algal Physiology under the direction of Dr. Jack Myers, Professor of Zoology.
- 18. Memorandum of agreement dated 29 November 1954, by which Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Division of Defense Laboratories, Lincoln Laboratory, through Purchase Order No. DDL-A-2006, provides \$7,500.00 for the development and assembly of a microwave atmospheric refractometer. The work will be conducted in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory, directed by Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering.
- 19. Confirmatory Agreement by which the University gives title to the Government of an invention entitled, "Testing Machine for Fire Control Systems" developed under OSRD Contract ORMsr-732. This contract was conducted in the War Research Laboratory, directed by Dr. M. Y. Colby, Professor of Physics.

LABORATORY FEE FOR ELEMENTARY ACCOUNTING: I recommend that a laboratory fee of \$1.00 per semester in Elementary Accounting be authorized, effective September 1, 1955, the funds to become general University funds. The number of students taking accounting has so increased that an increase of approximately 20% in Maintenance and Equipment is needed to provide adequate funds for purchasing badly needed equipment.

PROCEDURAL CHANGE IN ADMISSION TO GRADUATE SCHOOL: The present Regents Rules provide that all material pertaining to admission of graduate students is to be handled exclusively by the Registrar and Dean of Admissions (now Director of Admissions). In many of the better graduate schools, the admission of graduate students is handled exclusively by the Office of the Dean of the Graduate School. On recommendation of the Graduate Dean, I recommend approval of changing the procedure so as to have a dual system by which the Director of Admissions will handle completely all admission problems of students who are eligible for admission according to set standards objectively stated in the University Catalogue. Students who are not admitted by the Director of Admissions under the above rules will be told that they are ineligible for admission under the regular Catalogue rules but that they may apply to the Dean of the Graduate School for special consideration. The students will be required to send to the Graduate Dean official transcripts of all their previous college or university work and must arrange to take such examinations as their proposed major department requests. On the basis of the student's course grades and scores made in the required examinations, the Dean of the Graduate School will confer with the applicant's proposed major department and will send to the Director of Admissions the recommendations of the major department and the Dean of the Graduate School. In accordance with these recommendations the Director of Admissions will notify the applicant that he will not be admitted to the Graduate School or that he will be admitted with or without certain stated conditions.

PURCHASE FROM A STAFF MEMBER: Dr. C. P. Patterson, Professor of Government, has volumes 1-316 of United States Reports which he is willing to sell to the Law Library at the price of \$1.50 per volume, or a total of \$474.00. Mr. Moffit, Librarian, advises that it is difficult to find a full set of these reports as the early volumes are very scarce, and that a comparable set was recently offered by a Baton Rouge dealer at \$1,000. In view of the reasonable price asked and the value of the volumes to the Law Library, I concur in Mr. Moffit's recommendation that these books be purchased from Dr. Patterson at the indicated price.

SIDNEY E. MEZES FACULTY FUND: Under date of November 22, 1954, Judge Robert W. Stayton, Chairman, Sidney E. Mezes Faculty Donation Committee, advised that two awards from this fund have been made to faculty members, on the basis of need, one in the amount of \$150 and one in the amount of \$125. In accordance with rules of the Committee, payment has been made to the recipients (whose names will be reported in executive session) on authorization of the President. I recommend your approval and ratification of this action.

- 3. The Faculty Council has filed with the Secretary of the General Faculty the recommendation published below adopted by the Faculty Council at its meeting of November 15, 1954. The legislation was classified as major and as such is being submitted to the General Faculty for ratification.

Notice is hereby given that this recommendation will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption unless signed protests in writing, with reasons, have been received by the Secretary of the General Faculty from ten voting members of the General Faculty within ten days of the date of this publication, in which case the recommendation will be presented to the General Faculty in formal session for decision General Faculty in formal session for decision.

#### RECOMMENDATION OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

The Special Committee on Probation and Scholastic Penalties, reconstituted by action of the Faculty Council at its meeting of February 15, 1954, and appointed by President Wilson on March 29, 1954, kecommends that the following be substituted for the present rules governing "Standard of Work Required" and "Scholastic Discipline" which appear in the General Information Bulletin of the Main University (Number 5408, April 15, 1954) on pages 60-63 inclusive:

STANDARD OF WORK REQUIRED FOR CONTINUANCE IN THE UNIVERSITY

(Applies to all undergraduate students except those in the School of Law)

Classification .-- A first-year student is one who has resided less than two semesters at a university or college. A second-year student is one who has resided more than two and less than four semesters at a university or college. All other students are classified as third-year students and above. Attendance at a six-week term counts as one-third of a semester in this classification.

Grade Scores. -- Although a grade of D gives credit in a course, a minimum semester hour-grade average of C is necessary for progress toward a degree ter In computing this average the following scores are used: A, 3 points; B, hour 2 points; C, 1 point; and D or F, 0 points. The grade symbols P (postponed examination); R (re-examination permitted), and  $\underline{X}$  (incomplete) score 0 points.

Minimum standard required .-- To avoid scholastic probation or being dropped from the rolls of the University, the student must meet the following minimum standard of work at the end of each long-session semester:

1. First- and second-year students in all colleges except Fine Arts and Pharmacy. -- A student taking nine (by special approval of his dean) or more semester hours must, if a first-year student, (1) pass at least nine semester hours and (2) make a score of six points; if a second-year student, (1) pass at least nine semester hours and (2) make a score of nine points.

A student taking less than nine semester hours (by special approval of his dean) must (1) pass all work taken, and (2) make a score of six points if a first-year student, or as many points as hours undertaken if a second-year student. A first-year student taking less than six semester hours will satisfy requirement (2) if he makes many points as hours undertaken.

- 2. First- and second-year students in the Colleges of Fine Arts and Pharmacy. -- Students taking nine (by special approval of his dean) or more semester hours must (1) pass at least wine semester hours and (2) make a score of at least nine points. Students taking less than nine semester hours must (1) pass all hours taken and (2) make as many points as semester hours undertaken.
- 3. Third-year students and above in all colleges except Business Administration.
  --Students taking twelve or more semester hours must (1) pass at least twelve semester hours and (2) make a score of twelve points. Students taking less than twelve semester hours must (1) pass all work taken and (2) make as many points as semester hours undertaken.

4. Third-year students and above in the College of Business Administration. -- A third-year student or above must make an average grade of at least C (that is, as many points as hours undertaken).

Conferences. -- The deans of the various colleges are prepared to confer with all students in their respective colleges who are doing unsatisfactory work, particularly at the intrasemester dates and at the end of the semester, in order to advise with the student for his improvement and to offer him opportunity for renewed effort with such assistance as parents and instructors may be able to furnish.

Warning.--Each student is responsible for knowing whether he has passed the required minimum of work and whether he is eligible to continue in the University. An ineligible student who nevertheless registers in the University shall be dropped by his dean, and the student shall not receive special consideration on his plea of lack of knowledge of his scholastic status. A student dropped from one college of the University is not allowed to register in another college of the University until he is eligible to return to the college from which he was dropped.

#### PROBATION AND DISMISSAL

- 1. A student does not incur any scholastic penalty (probation or dismissal) by attending the Summer Session.
- 2. Scholastic probation.--Failure of a student to achieve the minimum standard required for his classification at the end of a long-session semester puts the student on scholastic probation for the next long-session semester.
- 3. Removal from scholastic probation. -- A student who is placed on scholastic probation may be removed from such probation by (1) making in his next long-session semester the minimum score required for his classification, or (2) attending the summer session at this University and passing in ten semester hours with a C average in courses which can be counted toward his degree.
- 4. Dismissal for failure to achieve minimum standard while on scholastic probation.--If at the end of any long-session semester during which the student has been on scholastic probation the student fails to achieve the minimum standard required for his classification, he shall be dismissed from the University for the following long-session semester and any intervening summer session.
- 5. Dismissal for failure to pass any work. -- A student who does not pass in any of his work in any long-session semester shall be dismissed from the University unless he is permitted to remain at the discretion of his dean.
- 6. If the required minimum of work in the case of any student who is on scholastic probation cannot be determined because of the symbols  $\underline{P}$ ,  $\underline{R}$ , or  $\underline{X}$ , such student is considered to have failed.
- 7. Limits on re-entrance. -- A student who is dismissed from the University for poor scholarship in accordance with the regulations above (or a student who withdraws while on scholastic probation) re-enters the University on scholastic probation. He shall again (as in 4 above) be dismissed from the University for failure to achieve the minimum standard required for his classification. A third dismissal from the University under these rules shall make the student ineligible to re-enter the University for a period of three years.
- 8. Effect of withdrawal while on scholastic probation. -- A student who withdraws from the University during a long-session semester while on scholastic probation is counted as having failed to satisfy the required minimum standard in the period concerned (as in 4 above) and re-entry is limited (as in 7 above).
- 9. Effect of intercollege transfers at Main University. -- A student who transfers from one college of the Main University to another carries his scholastic record to the new college, and the penalties incurred because of any subsequent scholastic deficiency are treated as a continuation of his record in the application of such penalties.
- 10. A student dropped under the above provisions may take courses by correspondence or in another institution. A student so dropped may not be readmitted to the University any earlier because of work completed in another institution.

11. Special regulations applicable to third-year students and above in the College of Business Administration.--Although a grade of D gives credit in a course, the student in order to graduate must have a minimum semester-grade average of C in the courses undertaken at this University toward the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration. In computing this average, see "Grade Scores," page 60.

A student whose average falls below  $\underline{\underline{C}}$  in the work of any semester is placed on probation.

In order to continue in the College a probationary student must either (1) achieve a C average in all his next semester's work or in twelve hours, whichever is less, or (2) earn enough credit to show this average on all the courses for his degree undertaken in the University since he completed his first sixty hours of C average work; otherwise, he is dismissed from the College. Any student admitted to the College on probation is also subject to this rule.

A student may remove either of the above-described penalties by earning in this University in the Summer Session, at least  $\epsilon$   $\underline{C}$  average in the courses (at least ten hours) undertaken or by making four semester hours of  $\underline{B}$  above a  $\underline{C}$  average in six or more hours.

A student dropped for poor scholarship, or a student who withdraws while on probation, may re-enter the College on probation after remaining out for one full semester; or he may re-enter with a clear record after remaining out for two full semesters.

12. Class Attendance. -- A student on scholastic probation who fails to attend class with unfailing regularity may be dropped from the course or from the rolls of the University by his dean.
