Development Board: Mr. Hulon Black has tendered his resignation as Executive Director of the University Development Board and as Director of Private Fund Development in the Office of the President, effective October 15, 1959, or as soon thereafter as the Development Board finds it practicable to release him. I recommend acceptance of the resignation and transmission by the Secretary of the Board of Regents to Mr. Black an expression of appreciation for his long and devoted service to the University.

GRADUATE FACULTY MEMBERSHIP: On recommendation of the Graduate Council, // concurred in by the officers of the Graduate School, I recommend that the following be approved for Graduate Faculty Membership:

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GRADUATE FACULTY LEGISLATION: At its meeting of February 23, 1959, the Graduate Legislative Council considered a revision of the requirements for the Degree of Master of Arts (General) (D. and P. 189-190). Through some error the legislation failed to be reported to the Regents for approval at that time. The legislation has now been approved by the Executive Committee of the Board and is submitted herewith for your ratification:

In the Graduate Catalogue, No. 5809, on page 43, after the statement

Requirements. - For the degree of Master of Arts the equivalent of thirty semester hours of senior or graduate instruction is required; the master's degree program shall include at least twenty-one semester hours of graduate work including the thesis.

DELETE the remainder of this section, namely:

Three-fifths of this work, eighteen semester hours, including a thesis, constitutes the major and must be done in one department. Such time as the instructor in charge and the Dean may approve must be devoted to the preparation of the thesis, usually regarded as six semester hours, and this thesis must be approved by the instructor in charge, by a committee appointed by the Dean, and by the Dean.

The remaining two fifths, twelve semester hours, constitutes the minor, or minors, and must be selected outside the department in which the major is to be done, except that any foreign language may be taken as a minor to another foreign language. With the appr approval of the Dean, the candidate may take one minor outside the College of Arts and Sciences. With the consent of the department in which the major is taken, students majoring in the experimental sciences may take both minors in the College of Engineering. The correlation of the major and minor subjects must be approved by the Dean. If the minor work is divided, it must be in no more than two departments, except by special permission of the graduate advisor and the supervising professor.

SUBSTITUTE the following statements:

Of the required thirty semester hours of senior or graduate rank, eighteen to twenty-four semester hours, inclusive of the thesis, shall be in the major area of instruction (either in the field of concentration or in supporting courses within the major department); the thesis usually accounts for six semester hours, but with special approval may be expanded to nine semester hours. The thesis, and its evaluation as six or nine semester hours, must be approved by the instructor in charge and by a supervisory committee appointed by the Dean; the thesis is subject also to final approval by the Dean. By the specific approval of the Graduate Council the work of the major may be divided between more than one area approved for graduate instruction. remaining six to twelve semester hours of the total master's degree program shall be in a supporting subject or subjects outside the major area and designated as the minor. The relative number of hours in the major and minor field, as well as the nature of the supporting work must be approved by the Committee on Graduate Studies within whose jurisdiction the major work of the student falls, and be subject to the approval of the Graduate Dean.

In certain instances, substitutions for the formal thesis may be recommended to the Graduate Council by the appropriate Committee on Graduate Studies. Such substitutions may include internship reports (where the internship is approved as an essential part of the graduate program by the Graduate Council), or reports prepared in certain graduate seminar-or conference-type courses. In every instance, however, an internship or seminar course or conference course, from which substitutions for the thesis are to be submitted, must be approved for this purpose by the Graduate Council. Further, all reports, or other types of exposition, submitted as substitutes for the thesis, are subject to the approval of the Supervisory Committee appointed by the Graduate Dean.

#### Graduate Faculty Legislation (continued)

The net effect of these recommended changes is as follows:

- 1. Permit somewhat greater concentration of work in one area (usually within one of the largest departments in which a strong graduate faculty offer regularly a substantial number of courses of graduate rank.)
- 2. Permit recognition of really creditable theses (by granting a maximum credit of nine rather than six semester hours, if the quality and quantity of thesis material justify.)
- 3. Permit substitution of expository material, equivalent to a thesis but differing in form, in certain areas in which this form of report can be justified.

GIFTS: The Ex-Students' Association has sent a check in the amount of \$1,250 representing a gift from the same donor who gave a like amount in January, 1959, to be used to pay the monthly dues or charges of the Westwood Country Club of Austin required to maintain a continuing and active membership for the use of the President of the University, to pay expenses incurred either at the Westwood Country Club or elsewhere by the President for official entertainment, and to reimburse the President for expenses incurred in his official capacity for which he cannot be reimbursed from state funds.

TRANSFER IN GIFT FUNDS: In 1957 the Ex-Students' Association donated \$2,000 representing accumulated unrestricted gifts from University of Texas alumni. The money was set aside for meeting obligations incurred in connection with the constitutional amendment program. After all expenses of this nature were paid, a balance of \$390.66 remainted in the fund. Inasmuch as the funds were not designated for any special purpose, approval of the Board is requested to transfer the unspent balance to the President's Gift Book Account.

NATIONAL DEFENSE STUDENT LOAN FUND: The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has reported that The University of Texas allotment for the Federal Capital Contribution to the National Defense Student Loan Fund for 1959-60 is \$174,600, which, added to a Supplemental Allocation for 1958-59 of \$2,335, makes \$176,935 available. Of this amount \$149,914 will be available for Main University, \$12,321 for Medical Branch, \$7,500 for Dental Branch, and \$7,200 for Southwestern Medical School. The money will be paid in two installments, one in September, 1959, and the other in January, 1960.

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OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS: I recommend approval of the following out-of-state trips, with expenses paid as indicated:

- 1. Mr. Hulon W. Black, Executive Director, University Development Board, September 9-18, 1959 (approximately), to Boston, Massachusetts, New York, New York, and possibly Washington, D. C., to confer with officials of leading educational institutions regarding development programs, expenses to be paid from Office and Traveling Expense account of the Development Board, and partially from current restricted funds. This trip is at the request of the Development Board and of the Joint Committee of the Board and of the Board of Regents.
- 2. Dr. L. D. Haskew, Vice-President for Developmental Services, September 29-October 1, 1959, to Chicago, Illinois, for conferences on plans for fund development; and October 5-8, 1959, to Ann Arbor, Michigan, for same purpose, expenses for both trips to be paid from Maintenance, Operation and Travel account of the Office of the President.

BANK DEPOSITORY AGREEMENTS FOR THE BIENNIUM 1959-61: Mr. C. H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, has submitted the following report for ratification and approval:

Pursuant to authorization given at the Regents' Meeting of August 1, 1959, and with the assistance of the Executive Heads and Business Managers of the Branches outside of Austin, I have negotiated bank depository agreements as listed below. All of these agreements are renewals and all are for a two-year period beginning September 1, 1959 and ending August 31, 1961. The tabulation given below shows some of the terms of the agreements which have just expired and of the new agreements. In the 1959-1961 agreements which require interest on time deposits, the interest rate on time deposits in each case is the maximum allowed, at any given time, by the Federal Reserve Board, according to the time required for notice of withdrawal of money from the Time Deposit.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR REMODELING PRESS BUILDING, Z HALL AND ROCG AUDITORIUM

FOR DEPARTMENT OF DRAMA: These areas are being remodeled for the use of the Drama Department, as follows: Press Building to provide space for shops: Hogg Auditorium, for Costume Department; and Z Hall for additional work space and offices for the staff. The total amount of these repairs is \$14,500 and I recommend that they be provided as follows: \$12,000 from - "Improvements, Remodeling and Major Repairs Allotment Account," and \$2,500 from - "Main University General Funds Unappropriated Balance."

Houghton Memorial Fund, transfer all cash on hand except \$500.00 (approximately \$2,536.18) to "Reserve Matching Funds National Defense Student Loan Funds", and upon maturity of U.S. Savings Bonds, Series F (Registered), dated November 1, 1948, held by the Houghton Memorial Fund, transfer bond redemption funds (\$16,000) to the same account. Maturity date of the bonds is October 31, 1960.
- 3. From the Frederick McAllister Student Loan Fund, transfer \$2,500.00 to "Reserve Matching Funds National Defense Student Loan Funds."

The funds transferred from the Houghton Fund and the McAllister Fund are to be returned to those Funds with interest earned upon liquidation of the National Defense Student Loan Program, and recipients of loans will be informed that local matching funds were provided by the funds named.

Explanations. Over-all purpose is to multiply the dollar value of these funds by ten, since NDEA funds provide nine dollars of each ten loaned under that program.

Cancellation of the Allen Fund is recommended because it has never been activated. It was established in 1914 by a promissory note for \$5,000 from Wilbur P. Allen. Repeated efforts were made to collect the note without success; a little interest was collected and that furnished the cash now appearing in the fund. No loans have ever been made.

The John H. Houghton Memorial Fund was created by Mrs. Josephine Houghton Allen, wife of Wilbur P. Allen, with a promissory note secured by an insurance policy. Upon her death the proceeds of the insurance policy were used to pay the amount of the note. No trust agreement can be found, but acceptance carries notation that preference was to be given to students from Jim Hogg and adjoining counties. The Fund has been dormant for 20 years. By leaving \$500.00 in cash in it, any special needs of students from the preferred counties can certainly be taken care of.

The Frederick McAllister Loan Fund is being established in the current docket. Its use is left to the discretion of the Regents and donor has stated that its use for matching funds is quite satisfactory.

The President's Office has on file a letter from Mr. Burnell Waldrep stating that it is his opinion that Allen and Houghton funds may be used for the purposes set forth above, and that the Regents have authority to so order.

OFFICE OF LOANS AND SCHOLARSHIPS - LINE OF AUTHORITY: When this office was established in 1958-59, the Director was to report through the Dean of Student Life. The 1959-60 Budget, as adopted, provides that he report through the Dean of Student Services. I recommend that this latter line of authority be approved.

GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE - FACULTY AND STAFF: At the November, 1956, meeting of the Faculty Council, the Committee on Faculty Welfare recommended that steps be taken to obtain for the faculty upon a group basis both disability income replacement insurance and major medical expense insurance, and subsequently a committee was appointed to study the matter, Mr. G. W. Lendrum, Business Manager, serving as chairman. At the June 16, 1958, meeting the Faculty Council adopted the Report of the Special Committee on Insurance and submitted the report to the General Faculty for ratification. Protests were received from more than ten voting members of the General Faculty, and, accordingly, a meeting of the General Faculty was called on November 21, 1958, to discuss the plan. At this meeting the report was adopted by a vote of 87 to 74, and the matter was referred to the Administration for submission to the Regents. Because of the small number of faculty members present, and because of the small margin by which the plan was adopted, the Administration requested that a survey be made whereby each member of the faculty and staff could indicate whether or not he was interested in having health insurance, and if so, whether or not he favored the new plan. An estimated 78% of the faculty answered the questionnaire, and of the 69% expressing a preference between the present plan and the expanded coverage, 64% were in favor of the proposed new plan. Fifty-three percent replied in the non-faculty area, and of the 35% indicating an interest in having insurance, 68% favored the new plan. Separate plans were submitted for faculty and non-faculty because Blue Cross-Blue Shield would not offer the faculty plan to those earning less than \$404 per month.

Attached to the docket as APPENDIX D are copies of the General Faculty minutes setting forth the Committee report (7203-09), the protests (7259-60), and the discussions at the meeting of the General Faculty resulting from the protest (7263-66).

I recommend that the Regents be requested to approve these plans.

according to which a certain number failed regardless of the absolute grade they made.

Dean Hagerty objected to the recommendation that all departmental examinations be eliminated. He saw to reason why they could not be made entirely fair. Also as to No. 6, it was his view that it was more important that the professor be available to students for conference before the examination than afterwards.

Dr. Ransom spoke of the importance from the public relations point of view of the faculty's availability at the end of the term to correct errors in reported grades. He stated that in a number of cases difficulty had arisen because the instructor had left the state and no one could be reached who could correct an erroneous grade. He also stressed the fact it was folklore that grades once given could not be changed. This most certainly was not true, for an error in the record could and should be corrected.

The Burdine motion was then approved. The revised report of the Scholastic Integrity Committee, as adopted, read as follows:

In Section I of the report, the part entitled "Code of Scholastic Honesty" was not originally intended for inclusion in the General Information Bulletin; the committee, therefore, has not revised it but has offered a condensation of it to serve as a preamble to the present section on Scholastic Dishonesty in the Bulletin.

The committee propose the incorporation into the Bulletin of Section I of the report as follows:

In General Information Main University 1959-60 (Catalogue Number: Part V) page 84, delete the statements under Scholastic Dishonesty and substitute the following:

Since the value of the university's degree depends on the absolute integrity of the work done by each student for that degree, it is imperative that a student maintain a high standard of individual honor in his scholastic work.

Scholastic dishonesty is the submission as one's own work of material that is not one's own. As a general rule, it involves one of the following acts:

- Cheating on an examination or a quiz: Giving or receiving, offering or soliciting information on any quiz or examination. This includes the following classes of dishonesty:
  - a. Copying from another student's paper.
  - Use during the examination of prepared materials, notes or text other than those specifically permitted by the instructor.
  - c. Collaboration with another student during the examination.
  - d. Buying, selling, stealing, soliciting, or transmitting an examination or any material purported to be the unreleased contents of a coming examination, or the use of any such material.
  - Substituting for another person during an examination or allowing such substitution for oneself.
  - Bribery of any person to obtain examination information.

## Plagiarism:

The appropriation of passages, either word for word or in substance, from the writings of another and the incorporation of those passages as one's own in written work offered for credit. It is always assumed that the written work offered for credit is the student's own unless proper credit is given the original author by the use of quotation marks and footnotes or other explanatory inserts.

This includes the copying of laboratory reports and homework, or the unchanged use of the essential ideas or conclusions of such work, as well as the unfootnoted use of other themes, theses, books, or pamphlets.

#### Collusion:

Collaboration with another person in the preparation or editing of notes, themes, reports, or other written work offered for credit unless such collaboration is specifically approved in advance by the instructor.

Examples of collusion include extensive use of another's ideas for preparing a creative assignment and undue assistance in the preparation or editing of written materials.

The committee recommends that the General Information Bulletin, page 85, under the heading <u>Disciplinary Procedures</u>, be revised to read as follows:

- 1. Faculty members are appointed to serve on the Faculty Committee on Discipline for a length of time not to exceed five years, the terms to be staggered so that there may always be some members with experience serving on the committee. A thorough orientation for all members of the Faculty Committee on Discipline, both faculty and participating students, must be held prior to their sitting on the committee.
- 2. Student representatives (junior, senior, or graduate students), nominated by the President of the Students' Association and appointed annually by the Dean of Student Life, are privileged and invited to sit, in the actual trial of cases, with any faculty committee concerned with discipline, a man to sit when a man student is being tried, a woman when a woman student is being tried, and both a man and a woman in the trial of mixed groups. They have the right to participate as voting members of the committee. The absence of student representatives, after due notice, does not invalidate a trial.
- 3. /Present subhead 1, renumbered 37.
- 4. /Present subhead 2, renumbered 47.
- 5. /Present subhead 4, renumbered 57.
- 6. /Present subhead 5, renumbered 67.
- 7. Special Procedures for Cases of Alleged Scholastic Dishonesty.
  - a. All cases of scholastic dishonesty must be reported to the Student Life Office by the instructor in whose class the breach of ethics occurs.
  - b. All cases of scholastic dishonesty reported to the Student Life Office must be brought before the Faculty Committee on Discipline.

The committee recommends an addition to the section on <u>Penalties</u>, <u>General Information Bulletin</u>, pages 85-87, as follows:

On page 87, add subhead

Penalties for Scholastic Dishonesty. The scale of penalties for scholastic dishonesty ranges from disciplinary probation to suspension, to be applied as the Faculty Committee on Discipline deems the circumstances warrant. Disciplinary probation in such cases must include automatic "F" in the course.

The Dean of Student Life will maintain a file of past cases and penalties as a source of reference for the committee and the defendant.

Because the present committee feel that Section II of the Cabinet Report, while not intended for official publication, nevertheless contains several valuable suggestions that should be put to use if possible, they recommend that Section II be revised to read as follows:

- 1. Courses that deal with principles should be tested on principles rather than on specific details. An impressive majority of students interviewed agreed that essay-type quizzes in general provided the most effective testing. For this reason and also because objective quizzes lend the greatest encouragement to cheating, the Cabinet urges that objective quizzes be eliminated whenever possible.
- 2. Departmental examinations have, in the past, been the occasion of notable outbreaks of organized cheating, partly because of the number involved but partly also because of a feeling of unfairness in such examinations. Therefore the Cabinet, though recognizing the convenience of departmental examinations in certain courses, nevertheless recommends that they be eliminated.

- Each department should be encouraged to make available to students, in some convenient place and form, copies of former examination questions.
- 4. Prior to quizzing, each professor should explain to his classes his examination methods and his grading system. The use of the arbitrary curve should be eliminated.
- 5. After quizzes the professor should, in some form, make available to his students the correct answers to questions asked.
- 6. Professors should, insofar as possible, be available to students after final examinations for conference.

In order that the record be clear, Mr. Cox moved that on all points where any difference existed between the report of the committee as adopted and the current Regents' Rules and Regulations, it be understood that the Regents' Rules and Regulations should be changed according to the committee's recommendations. This motion was unanimously adopted.

# MOTION TO APPOINT A SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO PREPARE RULES OF PROCEDURE TO BE USED BY ADMINISTRATIVE TRIBUNALS IN DISCIPLINARY MATTERS (APPROVED).

Mr. Macdonald said that he spoke from a background on the Discipline Committee. He had found that one of the matters which adversely affected public relations was the lack of formal procedures for the use of the committee. There were no rules as to who was to prosecute, who was to be present, or who was to notify the individual's departments, his parents, etc. He thought that while we had proceeded in good faith and had tried to do the best we could, much confusion had resulted from a want of correct procedure. He, therefore, moved that the Dean of Student Services be requested to set up a special committee to study and to recommend rules of procedures to be used by administrative tribunals in disciplinary matters and that these be incorporated in a manual. This motion was unanimously accepted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PROBLEMS OF TEXTBOOK SUPPLIES (D&P 2612-15) (ADOFTED). Mr. Jones, Chairman of the Special Committee on Problems of Textbook Supply, reviewed the report and recommendations of the Committee on Problems of Textbook Supplies. He pointed out that the report did not seek to fix the blame on any one for the current conditions and that it was hoped that by direct, proper attention to the facts presented, some improvement might be undertaken by everyone concerned. He reviewed the replies that had been given to the questionnaire which had been circularized among 100 members of the faculty and departmental heads. These replies showed that there had been a significant frequency of textbook shortages, which were rather bothersome. One area in which an improvement could be made was in communication between the faculty and the bookstores. Also, it appeared desirable to distinguish between required and recommended books in filling out the textbook requisition. Mr. Jones moved that the report of the committee be received and that the following recommendations be adopted:

Since the problem of shortages is, or has been up to now, "a question we have to meet from year to year as best we can," what does the present committee have to recommend? The bookstores, it would appear, cannot fairly be asked to change their current methods in the direction of stocking very much more heavily. Neither can the faculty be assumed to be clairvoyant. If there is to be improvement—and we do not concede that improvement is utterly impossible—it is to be sought chiefly in tightening communication between the faculty and the bookstores. In this connection we would stress the following points:

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

The Faculty Council recommends the following:

1. General Information Bulletin: Page 61:

Under Grades Scores add:

See p. 63, Scholastic Probation, for effect of X, P, and R, on scholastic probation.

2. General Information Bulletin: Page 63:

Under Probation and Dismissal, 2. Scholastic probation, add the following paragraph:

If at the end of any long-session semester the required minimum cannot be met because the student has received an X, P, or R grade in one or more courses, and if the student is averaging c in all of his other courses, the student shall be placed temporarily on scholastic probation; however, his grades shall be re-evaluated before the beginning of Dead Week. If his grades have been satisfactorily raised through completion of the X or taking the postponed examination, he shall be removed from scholastic probation. Otherwise, his scholastic probation status shall be fixed for the semester and become a part of his permanent record.

General Information Bulletin: Page 62:

Under No. 3, delete the second paragraph.

Substitute for the second paragraph, the following:

A third-year student or above, taking twelve to fourteen semester hours must (1) pass all of his courses and (2) make as many points as semester hours undertaken.

A third-year student or above, taking less than twelve semester hours by special approval of his dean must (1) pass all hours taken and (2) make as many points as semester hours undertaken.

If the third-year student or above is on scholastic probation when he drops below 12 hours, then he must make a score of 12 points to be removed from scholastic probation. If he passes all of his courses and makes as many points as semester hours undertaken, but does not make 12 points, then he will continue on scholastic probation.

4. General Information Bulletin: Page 63:

At the end of Item 6 under "Probation and Dismissal" add:

(See also "Grades Scores", p. 61.)

Insert between Items 7 and 8 the item listed below:

8. Withdrawal while making failing grades. If a student with-draws from The University in the last month of the semester and is failing to pass in the minimum hours required for his rank, he will be placed on scholastic probation for the first semester after he re-enrolls.

#### REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SPECIAL FACULTY COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

The Faculty Council has filed with the Secretary of the General Faculty the recommendations published below adopted by the Faculty Council at its meeting of June 16, 1958. The legislation was classified as major and as such is being submitted to the General Faculty for ratification.

Notice is hereby given that these recommendations will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption unless signed protests in writing, with reasons, have been received by the Secretary of the General Faculty from ten voting members of the General Faculty within ten days of the date of this publication, in which case the recommendations will be presented to the General Faculty in formal session for decision.

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

- 1. Hospitalization, surgical and medical insurance, offered as a group plan to faculty and staff, should be continued with Texas Blue Cross-Blue Shield
- 2. The comprehensive Blue Cross-Blue Shield plan now offered should be discontinued.
- 3. The "300" Service offered by Texas Blue Cross-Blue Shield covering hospital, surgical, and medical services should be adopted for faculty and administrative personnel.
- 4. The Extended Benefit Endorsement (major medical) should be offered, on an optional basis, to the members of the group securing the "300" Service.
- 5. Faculty and other staff members employed at a full-time monthly rate of \$404 per month or more should be eligible for this insurance on a group basis, provided the faculty or staff member is employed for a minimum of one-half time.
- 6. Present retirees will be continued in the group under the plan they now have in effect.
- 7. Future retirees may continue in the group under the plan they have in effect at the time of retirement, except that the Extended Benefit Endorsement may not be continued for a retiree.
- 8. A payroll deduction plan should be adopted for the collection of premiums.
- 9. Pre-existing conditions at time of enrollment should be covered.
- 10. A fixed percentage of enrollment should not be required to secure the plan recommended.
- II. The appropriate administrative officers should be authorized to negotiate with Texas Blue Cross-Blue Shield for a contract to provide the services recommended.
- 12. The Faculty and the Administration should be asked to consider favorably the adoption of these recommendations and to have the recommended insurance plans available for the next enrollment period or as soon thereafter as possible.

You will find attached a copy of the plan recommended.

These recommendations are made after giving consideration to plans offered by several companies, including the plan presented by T.I.A.A. and an alternate plan offered by Blue Cross-Blue Shield. Some of the major disadvantages of other plans studied are:

- 1. 75 per cent enrollment of eligible members required.
- 2. Benefits provided on a reimbursement basis after member has incurred and paid for such covered expenses.
- 3. No local agent to handle claims and service.
- Administrative costs would be required to service the members' enrollment and claims.
- 5. Since Blue Cross-Blue Shield is the faculty-approved plan for hospital and surgical benefits, any additional plan with another company would create problems for the personnel as well as for the administration in handling claims.

6. Failure to provide continued coverage for present retirees and future retirees.

Some of the major advantages of the plan recommended:

- 1. Fixed percentage enrollment not required.
- Pre-existing conditions are covered.
- Adequate protection for retirees.
- 4. No age limit for enrollment.
- 5. Service features offered to members of the group, such as (a) ease of admission to the hospital, (b) provision of the actual care needed, and (c) no payment of covered expenses required; therefore, completion of forms and filing of claim for reimbursement is unnecessary.
- 6. Advantages of dealing with one company through local office representatives minimizes duplication of effort and speeds up the handling of claims for the members of the group.
- 7. Provides broader base benefits to replace the inadequate base plan now in effect.
- Makes available a major medical plan to those who have the base plan, but is on an optional basis.
- 9. No penalty in premium rate for waiving the 75 per cent enrollment feature.
- 10. Once enrolled in the group, the insured member is assured of continuous coverage on a direct pay basis should his employment be terminated. Dependents may continue to be covered after the death of the insured employee provided payments are made on a direct pay basis.

An alternate base plan presented by Blue Cross-Blue Shield was also considered by the Special Faculty Committee on Insurance. Although the alternate plan would have permitted a faculty member to enroll for hospitalization insurance only, the Extended Benefit Endorsement would be available to only those enrolling for hospitalization and surgical benefits. Since 93 per cent of the faculty and staff now enrolled in the group carry the surgical benefits, the committee majority felt the faculty would favor the broader base plan offered in the "300" Service.

Other insurance companies' plans studied require a 75 per cent enrollment of eligible members, and the committee was of the opinion that 75 per cent of the eligible group would not voluntarily enroll so long as the entire premium was to be paid by the staff member. Since, at the present time, it was not legally possible for the University, or any other State Agency, to participate in payment of premiums for insurance on faculty and staff, it was the belief of the Special Committee on Insurance the plan recommended was the best plan available under the circumstances that prevail.

This special committee further recommended that the filing of this report and recommendations would constitute the final action of the committee. If requested, additional or further studies on insurance should be referred to the Standing Committee on Faculty Welfare. In the event such studies were conducted and additional members were needed to insure representation of the faculty, the committee chairman requested the appointment of additional members to the committee for the purpose of study and recommendations

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The following proposal was prepared for The University of Texas, Main University and Central Administration, Faculty and Administrative Personnel, Hospitalization-Surgical-Medical and Professional Services, by the Texas Blue Cross and Blue Shield, June, 1958:

#### FUNDAMENTAL ADVANTAGES OF BLUE CROSS - BLUE SHIELD

FASE OF ADMISSION TO HOSPITAL: No deposit - No financial arrangements - No legal assignment of your insurance.

SERVICE BENEFITS: Provide the actual CARE needed, delivering actual hospital services rather than dollars of indemnity.

MATERNITY CARE: This is the greatest single cause of hospital care.

EQUAL BENEFITS FOR ALL MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY: Dependents require three times as much care as the employee.

CONTINUED BASIC PLAN PROTECTION UPON RETIREMENT, RESIGNATION OR TERMINATION: Discontinuance of employment often means inability to secure protection when protection is needed most. Privilege of continuance of membership is one of the most important features.

LOW OPERATING COST: Anything over 10 to 12 per cent can only be at the expense of the enrolled group.

## BENEFITS FOR HOSPITAL SERVICES

MEMBER HOSPITAL BENEFITS: When ordered by the attending physician, patient benefits listed below are available when provided by any hospital which is a member of the Texas Blue Cross Plan. Payment will be made for these services when supplied outside the State of Texas by any hospital that is a member of another Blue Cross Plan or that is listed by the American Hospital Association.

## BED-PATIENT CARE:

BENEFIT PERIOD: 120 days each period of hospital confinement ("Period of hospital confinement" means one or more hospital stays not separated by 90 days; if separated by 90 days, 120 days new benefits become available.)

ROOM AND BOARD: Up to \$10.00 a day allowance on room accommodations, including meals, special diets and general nursing service.

HOSPITAL SERVICES: All OTHER usual hospital services necessary to the treatment of the patient for use while in the hospital--except blood and plasma.

MATERNITY BENEFITS: Care for conditions arising from pregnancy (including any complications) shall be available provided the Membership Agreement includes the husband and wife for nine months.

DEDUCTIBLE: The patient pays the first \$25.00 on all medical cases, but not for surgical, obstetrical, or accident cases.

#### OUT-PATIENT CARE:

HOSPITAL SERVICES: All usual hospital services except blood and plasma will be provided for minor surgery and for services rendered within twenty-four hours in accident cases - no deductible.

## NON-MEMBER HOSPITAL BENEFITS:

#### LOCATED IN TEXAS

BED-PATIENT BENEFITS: If bed-patient care is received by any participant in a non-member hospital in the State of Texas, the Plan will pay an allowance of 75% of the charges for services rendered which are included in the benefits of member hospitals. The \$25.00 Deductible does not apply.

OUT-PATIENT BENEFITS: All usual hospital services except blood and plasma will be provided for minor surgery, on the day of such surgery only and for emergency care rendered within twenty-four hours after an accident. The \$25.00 Deductible does not apply.

NOT LOCATED IN TEXAS: When care is received in a non-member hospital located outside the State of Texas, benefits shall be provided equivalent to those available in member hospitals.

## BENEFITS FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

SURGICAL BENEFITS: Surgery may be performed in a hospital or in a doctor's office. When two or more operations are performed at the same time or during the same period of hospitalization, in different operative areas, the allowance for the procedure carrying the highest amount will be paid in full, plus 50% of the allowance for the next highest procedure, but not to exceed the maximum payment of \$300.00.

\$6.00 per day for the first five days; \$5.00 per day for the next five days

\$4.00 per day for the balance, up to a maximum payment of \$300.00.

RADIATION THERAPY BENEFITS: Payments for radium, radio-active isotopes, and X-ray treatments will be made on the basis of the following schedule (partial list shown). In no event will the maximum payment exceed \$300.00 per contract year.

From the first day an illness commences or injury is incurred while covered, the subscriber has the extra protection needed because of an especially serious, lengthy or costly sickness or accident.

Covered medical expense includes services rendered in a hospital which are not provided by basic coverage as well as expenses incurred before or after hospitalization, or even when hospital care is not required at all.

## BENEFITS PROVIDED

#### Benefit Period

12 consecutive months commencing on the first day on which the Subscriber is under the care of a physician. Should an illness continue beyond the benefit period of twelve full months, the current benefit period ends, and a new benefit period, with a new Deductible Amount and a new maximum of \$5,000 begins. If, on the other hand, recovery is in less than a year; for example, in two months, then the benefit period ends after a period of 90 consecutive days during which no medical expense is incurred. After this 90 days, a new benefit period with a new deductible amount and another maximum of \$5,000 begins.

#### PROTESTS OF CHANGE IN MEDICAL AND HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE PLAN

We, the undersigned, wish to protest the adoption by circulation of the REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE. We understand that this protest will necessitate the calling of a meeting of the faculty to discuss this proposal and that the proposal will not then go into effect without an affirmative vote of the faculty.

We cite some of the reasons in support of our position below:

- 1) The Proposal of the Faculty Insurance Committee has serious financial implications—it can cost faculty members an additional \$100 per year for health insurance—that should be carefully examined and discussed by members of the faculty who will be affected by them. Such attention is not given to items that are merely circularized.
- 2) No evidence has been submitted to show that a majority of those faculty members now insured by Blue Cross want to abandon the present health policies in favor of the new and more expensive policies.
- 3) But as a matter of fact, the adoption of this new program will necessitate the abandonment of the present system. As a result the full coverage under the present program which is available for an entire family at about \$84.50 per year will no longer be available. Faculty members will have to insure themselves individually or take the new coverage which will cost approximately \$182.00 per year. For some members of the faculty, the cost of the new program may be too great. This factor should be carefully considered before the new plan is adopted. Perhaps we should find out how much it would cost members of the faculty to buy the new additional insurance on an individual basis. It would seem more reasonable, perhaps, to have the minimal policy available to all members of the faculty on a group basis and allow those members who can afford it to buy the luxury policy on an individual basis.
- 4) We think that the advantages to be gained from association with TIAA are so great that further exploration is in order there. If the comparative cost of the TIAA program were pointed out to the faculty, they might be willing to go into it with the 75% participation. Or perhaps TIAA could be introduced with a lesser percentage and a medical examination. Until this investigation is made, the present proposal seems to be hasty as well as expensive.

#### 2. Protest of Ira Iscoe

I feel that the changes advocated by the Faculty Welfare Committee regarding hospitalization and medical insurance deserve a fuller discussion than they have received. I therefore request that this matter be brought to the attention of the General Faculty.

My specific protests are that I am not quite clear how much added protection and other advantages I and my family will receive for roughly a \$100 more per year expenditure. In addition, although other plans have been considered it would be valuable to know how much is saved by adopting the proposed plan rather than the plans offered by other agencies.

# 3. Protest of Horace E. Staph

I wish to register my protest to the proposed change in the Medical and Hospitalization insurance plan now in effect. Basically I can see no major differences between the "300" service and the present plan, except one of somewhat more extensive coverage, and that not for more different coverages, but a slightly more generous share of the presently available coverage. This is at a cost of more than twice what a comparable membership now costs.

It forces those who wish to carry a minimum coverage to in effect help pay for the chronically sick. Why should those families with a good health history, for example, pay for 120 days of hospitalization when the odds are they won't need the present 30 days (plus 90 more at half benefits). The "300" service by no manner of means will pay all costs incident to a serious illness, and no insurance is expected to do so.

I have no objection to the "300" service for those who want it, but I do feel that the present minimum coverage should remain available without prejudice.

# MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE GENERAL FACULTY

THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS

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NOVEMBER 21, 1958

The First Special Meeting of the General Faculty for the academic year, 1958-59, was held in Batts Hall Auditorium, Batts Hall, Friday, November 21, 1958, at 4 p.m.

ATTENDANCE. Present: Dean L. D. Haskew, presiding, Secretary E. W. Nelson, 201 voting members, 10 non-voting members; total 213. Excused absences: 7 voting members, 0 non-voting members; total 7.

MOTION TO EXTEND PERMISSION TO VISITORS TO AUDIT MEETING AND PARTICIPATE IN DISCUSSION (ADOPTED). The Secretary stated that a number of visitors were present who had requested the privilege of auditing the meeting and participating in the discussion. He moved that this permission be granted. The motion was seconded and adopted.

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT BY VICE-PRESIDENT HASKEW. Vice-President Haskew stated that this was a special meeting of the General Faculty with the single purpose of acting upon legislation relating to hospital and medical insurance which had been approved by the Faculty Council and proposed by the Faculty Council to the General Faculty. Under the procedures and rules of the General Faculty this legislation had been protested by a sufficient number of faculty members to require a meeting of the General Faculty. The procedure for the faculty was to consider the motion to adopt the legislation of the Faculty Council. The motion could be adopted, rejected, amended or referred back to the Faculty Council. He then read the names of the members of the Special Committee on Insurance who were: James E. Boggs, Charles T. Clark, Archie Jones, Joseph J. Jones, Daniel Kading, Keith E. Morrison, Theodore W. Munch, Bugene Nelson, Lora Lee Pederson, Carey C. Thompson, John R. Watt, Charles O. Wilson, Graves W. Landrum, chairman. Vice-President Haskew then recognized Mr. Landrum for the purpose of explaining the proposal which had been adopted by the Faculty Council.

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL ON INSURANCE (G.F. MINUTES 7203-09)(ADOPTED). Mr. Landrum stated that an assignment to prepare a program of insurance that would fit the needs of all the faculty could be compared to an assignment to a tailor to make a suit of clothes which would be a perfect fit for Dean Nowotny and himself. He pointed out first that group insurance was not made available to the committee by most companies contacted except upon 75% participation of the faculty. The committee was aware that some members of the faculty wanted major medical insurance, others wanted a better base plan, and others preferred to make personal arrangements for insurance. Some preferred insurance through professional groups and some wanted to retain the present plan. The committee early realized that the premium for added benefits was necessarily going to cost more. The committee was of the opinion that the eligible group should consist of members of the General Faculty serving one-half time or more and persons of the administrative group making a salary of \$404 per month or more. The committee recognized the present inadequacy of the plan adopted in The present program was no longer available from the Blue Cross-Blue Shield except at the University. One thing was certain; hospital costs had gone up; and the committee realized that if the present plan was continued, the premiums would be increased. The committee realized too that a change in the program would be necessary if present and future retirces were to have continued coverage. Under the present plan insurance must be discontinued upon retirement. The committee also wanted to make it possible for every individual faculty member to decide whether he wanted the coverage offered and to enable him to make his decision without affecting his colleagues. Where 75% participation was required, there might be those who would not want to carry the insurance but who would hesitate in doing so because of the effect upon his colleagues. Under the proposed program each person was free to carry insurance or not without affecting others. He pointed out that the committee thought that it had presented a good program and that it had not made a hasty decision. The matter had been before the committee for a year and many hours of study had been devoted to it. He then undertook to answer some of the objections that had been made to the plan. While the proposed program would cost more, there was no question but that the cost of the old plan would also be greater. For example, the premium for a married person with one dependent would increase from \$53 to \$74 per year. Mr. Landrum also made the point that some members of the committee had been contacted by faculty members

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who wanted more comprehensive coverage and more liberal benefits. Some had had experience in the hospital under the existing plan and had been shocked to learn how little of the hospital expense had been covered. Some people had asked whether the present and proposed plans could be made optional. The answer was that they could not. The offer by Blue Cross-Blue Shield was for the continuance of the present plan or substitution of the new plan for the old. However, one could take the base plan without the Extended Benefit Endorsement (Major Medical Insurance). Insurance on an individual contract basis generally would be 20% higher than when carried on a group basis. He then considered the question of the availability of insurance through TIAA. This point had been carefully studied by the committee. He had made a trip to Houston to get the Vice-President of the TIAA to talk to the committee. While the committee was able to get some concessions from TIAA, it was not able to get a waiver of 75% participation nor would TIAA agree to extend coverage to retirees after age 70. One of the chief difficulties in securing an attractive program of group insurance at this time was the inability of the University to contribute to the payment of premiums. Consequently, the University was not as favorable a group as a company with employer participation because in the latter case there was usually from 90% to 100% enrollment of employees. He then compared the major medical insurance rates under the TIAA plan and those under the major medical plan of the Blue Cross-Blue Shield program. The difference in these rates was small. Mr. Landrum emphasized that the committee was not trying to sell insurance of any kind and that it had no brief for Blue Cross-Blue Shield. The committee had been asked to offer a program which was more acceptable than the current one and Blue Cross-Blue Shield offered what seemed to the committee the best program available. In addition Blue Cross-Blue Shield now carried about 50% of the hospital and surgical insurance in this country. Mr. Landrum then asked that Mr. West, a representative of the Blue Cross-Blue Shield, discuss the features of the proposed program and to compare these with those of the existing program.

Mr. West pointed out that Blue Cross-Blue Shield had for some time been concerned about the present program of hospital insurance in effect at the University. This program had long been out of date and it appeared that a change was required to make available increased benefits. Beginning in 1956 preferred benefits had been added at favorable rates because of the provious good experience of the University group. However, the good experience of the University group was not continuing as was reflected by the fact that during the past 6 months Blue Cross-Blue Shield had paid out in benefits \$106 for every \$100 taken in. Obviously, the price of insurance under such conditions would have to go up. The new base plan which was proposed provided increased benefits for everyone. It also offered adequate major medical benefits under the Extended Benefit Endorsement. It was important that the faculty could combine a good base plan with major medical insurance with one company. Blue Cross-Blue Shield would prefer to have neither program in place of just one. If major medical was carried with some other company, it would have to rely on the insured to get the forms filled out. One could not go to Blue Cross-Blue Shield. He then compared the increased benefits in the new program with those of the old. The former offered 120 days of hospital benefits as opposed to 30 days under the old. The period was renewed after a hospitalfree period of 90 days. The old policy paid \$6 per day for a room; the new plan paid \$10 per day. The present plan excluded but the new plan included transfusion service. There was to be a \$25 deductible for admission to the hospital for medical benefits only. This was deliberately included because there was a tendency of some people to go to the hospital for things that could be handled in the doctor's office. The new program offered \$000 surgical benefits, the old \$150. The new also provided for anesthesia. When rendered by someone other than the operating surgeon, payment for anesthesia services would be \$5 plus up to 15% of the applicable surgical benefits. This would provide up to \$50 for anesthesia. The new program also provided benefits for the doctor's visit after the first day. The new plan also provided radiation therapy benefits even when administered in the doctor's office. Mr. West pointed out that the program did not require 75% participation as was typically true in group insurance and it did not require proof of acceptable medical history. He also stressed the fact that the Austin District Office of Blue Cross-Blue Sheild was staffed by four or five persons and that one young lady had special charge of matters relating to insurance at the University. Claims could promptly be taken care of. He emphasized the advantage of the Extended Benefit Endorsements and the fact the benefits provided under the base plan would be adequate. The Extended Benefit Endorsement with a \$200 deductible paid benefits up to \$5,000 on a 80-20% co-insurance basis.

At the request of Mr. Brown, Mr. West compared the present and proposed premiums for the existing insurance program if continued. On a monthly basis cost of Blue Cross-Blue Shield for a single person would be increased from \$2.25 per month to \$2.92 per month. For the married faculty member, from \$5.20 to \$6.55, and for the family, \$5.60 to \$7.15, an increase of approximately 20%. Mr. Stewart asked for the rates for hospital, without medical, benefits. Mr. West gave the following comparative figures.

Mr. West pointed out that there would be no catastrophic illness endorsement under the new program because this would be taken care of by the major medical insurance.

Mr. Anderson asked if any money would be saved on semi-annual, rather than monthly, payments. Mr. Landrum stated that the savings would be greater in monthly payments. Mr. West concurred. This was due to the fact that the accounting on a monthly basis could be handled by machines. Mr. Calkins asked whether, in connection with EBE, the company would pay up to \$5,000.00 or only 80% of \$5,000.00. Mr. West answered that the company's 80% would equal \$5,000. While Mr. Silber acknowledged that the proposed program included a substantial increase in coverage, the premium would be increased from \$88 to \$180 for the family. He did not criticize the plan, but he opposed it because many faculty members could not afford so extensive a plan. The proposal overlooked the possibility of driving a large number out of the insurance market. He thought there was another possible alternative to the program. A great deal could be gained by continuing the present policy and by asking that the committee check with TIAA as to major medical insurance for a group made up of those already carrying Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance. If TIMA would cost \$24.08 for coverage of the entire family, on top of the present program, the total cost of insurance would be approximately \$109 per year for the employee and his family. He proposed as a substitute motion that the faculty go on record as favoring temporarily the continuance of the present plan and that the Faculty Council be requested to inquire into the possibility of an optional plan for extended coverage with other companies, including TIAA. Mr. Silber then stated that some members of the faculty had difficulty in securing coverage under the present Blue Cross-Blue Shield program. He referred to one case in which the faculty member had tried to get the Catastrophic Illness Endorsement but had been rejected because his wife had cancer. He had been willing to exclude his wife and insure only himself and children but the coverage was denied even then. He pointed out that the children in question were not the children of the present wife and that the factor of inherited susceptibility did not enter into the insurability of the children.

Mr. Colvert requested a comparison of the existing premiums for Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance with those of the proposed "300" plan. Mr. West gave these figures: For a single person the present \$27 per year would become \$53.40 under the new program; for an employee and one dependent \$62.40 per year would become \$133.80; and for the family \$67.20 would become \$155.40. The optional catastrophic illness endorsement for a single person at the present time cost \$9 per year; the extended benefit endorsement will cost \$9.36 per year. The present cost of CIE for the employee and one dependent was \$18 per year; extended benefit endorsement will be \$21 per year. CIE for the family now cost \$18 per year; EBE, \$25.80 per year. Mr. Bowden asked if Blue Cross-Blue Shield offered any plan between the present plan and the proposed "300" plan. Mr. Landrum said in addition to the plans mentioned, there was a preferred policy now carried by approximately 85 members of the faculty. This plan had increased hospital room benefits to \$10. The committee had made a study of the number now carrying Blue Cross-Blue Shield and had determined that about 90% carried both. After considering all the plans, the committee felt that, despite the additional cost under the "300" plan, it was to be preferred over the others. Mr. Stewart said that he was not in favor of the substitute motion because he was one of those who did not carry both medical and hospitalization insurance. At the present time he paid \$79.20 per year for himself and his family for hospitalization. If he carried both Blue Cross and Bluc Shield under the proposed plan, he would pay a premium of \$155.40 per year. Mr. Livingston asked if Mr. Silber had suggested that TIAA insurance be added on top of the new plan or that we continue the present Blue Cross-Blue Shield program. Mr. Silber said that

he proposed to continue the present plan and to secure extended benefits to cover major medical expenses at a cost of roughly \$25.00 per year. Mr. Cotner stated that, according to his understanding, unless one was a member of both Blue Cross-Blue Shield, he was not entitled to carry the catastrophic illness endorsement. He wondered why this was true. Mr. West said that the reason was a practical one. Blue Cross, under CIE, paid the hospital expense and Blue Shield the expenses outside the hospital. Thus it was impractical to cover these without the initial expenses being paid by both Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

In answer to a question by Mr. Atwood, Mr. Landrum stated that if the present plan was continued, present retirees and future retirees would not be able to participate. Mr. Bowden contended that because of the \$25 deductible device in the proposed plan, the new insurance would in effect cost \$205 for the family. Mr. Boggs pointed out that the rate at which Extended Benefit Program had been offered to us by TIAA was determined according to the base plan that was considered. He assumed that the TIAA rate would not be the same if based on the "300" plan. Mr. Landrum stated that the TIAA rates were based on a preferred plan which the University did not have. Mr. Boggs asked if there was a possibility that the TIAA rates would be higher. Mr. Landrum said that this was probably so. Mr. Brace asked how the new and old plans compared as to sponsored dependents over the age of 18. Mr. West said that the current monthly rate for Blue Cross-Blue Shield was \$1.50, the revised rate, \$1.82, and the "300" plan, \$2.90. Mr. Iscoe asked when the new plan would go into effect if adopted. Mr. West answered that it would be desirable to put it into effect on the next enrollment date in May. Mr. Iscoe wondered about the possibility of applying to other companies, such as Prudential and TIAA, for insurance with fixed premiums that would not go up from year to year. He pointed out the possibility that the premiums which had been quoted for the proposed plan would be increased in the future. Mr. Landrum replied that Prudential Insurance Company had refused to present a program. As far as a fixed rate was concerned, it was clear that no company could afford to offer a fixed premium unless it was set at such a high figure that no one could afford it. Mr. Hoffman said that it was quite evident that the new plan offered some valuable advantages but at the same time the high premium would force a number of people out of Blue Cross-Blue Shield. He asked if it was possible for Blue Cross-Blue Shield to present some other alternative that would be better than the present plan but which would not cost as much as the proposed program. Mr. Landrum said that the committee had asked the same question of Blue Cross-Blue Shield. It offered the proposed plan as the only alternative choice available. The faculty now had the opportunity to decide whether it wanted to continue the old plan or to take the new plan even though the premium was high enough to induce some to withdraw from the program. was no opportunity to make both plans available at the option of the individual member of the faculty. Mr. Morrison said that the major difficulty was that the insurance companies were not accustomed to dealing with an organization whose employer did not bear the substantial part of the premium cost. Until the University was in the position to pay a portion of the cost, the faculty would have considerable difficulty with any new plan. Therefore, he was opposed to the substitute motion and thought that the faculty should vote to approve or reject the new plan on those merits.

Vice-President <u>Haskew</u> called for a vote on the Silber amendment to return the legislation to the Faculty Council for further consideration. This motion was defeated. The original motion to adopt the proposed program was then put to a vote and was adopted 87 to 74.

ADJOURNMENT. Adjournment was taken at 5:40 p.m.

# SALARY RANGES FOR POSITIONS IN THE CLASSIFIED SERVICE

EXPLANATION: Below are listed the salary ranges for classes of positions in the Classified Service of the Dental Branch of the University. This tabulation presents the recommended assignments of proposed classes of work to appropriate ranges of compensation as presented in Table I. The first column indicates the index number of the class; the second column, the class title; the third column, the monthly salary range for the class, i.e., the minimum and maximum rates to be paid to incumbents of positions of the class; the fourth column, the annual salary range for the class; the fifth column, the salary step number which refers to the basic salary schedule. The "intermediate steps" are those rates which fall between the indicated minimum and maximum rates and can be found in Table I. There are six exceptions, which are indicated with an asterisk.

The salary ranges are intended to provide an equitable level of compensation for each class of employment. Ranges are determined through study and analysis of the following factors: Prevailing rates of pay for comparable employment by private and other public employers, present economic conditions, present labor market conditions, past Dental Branch of the University pay policies, and the relationship of the different classes of employment as determined through evaluation of duties and responsibilities of each position.
