<u>APPENDAGE TO SECURITY AGREEMENT WITH DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE</u>: An appendage to the Security Agreement has been signed by the President and by the Department of the Navy, representing the Government, providing that the list of cleared facilities shall further include the Structural Mechanics Research Laboratory at the Main University and the Schellenger Research Laboratories at Texas Western College, effective July 17, 1957. This action was necessitated because the research staffs of these two projects require access to classified information.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS: I recommend ratification of your approval by "no-protest" of Mail Dockets Nos. 6-8, attached as part of this docket

UNIVERSITY PRESS SUPPORT: Director Frank Wardlaw of The University of Texas Press will devote a major portion of his time during this year to a search for private funds to underwrite publication projects for the Press. He believes it possible to find several donors who will be attracted by special publications such as the Blaffer art series or by the opportunity to give general support to scholarly publications.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR CLERK-OF-THE-WORKS FOR CLINICAL SCIENCE BUILDING: Because the General Contractor is behind schedule on the Clinical Science Building at Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, the initial appropriation of \$12,000 to take care of the salary of the Clerk-of-the Works is insufficient. On recommendation of Mr. C. H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, an additional \$5,000 has been transferred from the Allotment Account to the account for Architectural Supervision for this purpose. I recommend ratification and approval.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE - TRANSFER OF OWNERSHIP OF PEAK COLLECTION: In 1948 Mr. J. W. Peak and Miss Grace Peak appointed the El Paso Chamber of Commerce as trustee for the Peak Collection (consisting of skins, mounted heads and mounted bodies of animals and other items) for the use and benefit of Texas Western College. The collection has been housed in the Museum at the College, and the El Paso Chamber of Commerce is desirous of terminating its status as trustee. With the consent of the sole heir of the donors, Dr. Dysart Holcomb has executed a deed transferring the ownership of the collection. I recommend ratification and approval.

RATIFICATION OF APPOINTMENT OF DR. H. H. RANSOM: I recommend ratification of your approval by mail of the appointment of Dr. H. H. Ransom as Vice-President and Provost, Main University, effective September 1, 1957 at the salary provided in the budget.

SALE AND REMOVAL OF HOUSES AT 203 EAST 23RD AND 2213 TOM GREEN STREET: The Board of Regents gave authority to sell and remove houses at 203 East 23rd, 2209 Tom Green, and 2213 Tom Green. The bids on 203 East 23rd and 2213 Tom Green were rejected and the two houses were readvertised. Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager, recommends, and I concur, that the following bids, opened on August 20, 1957, be accepted: for 203 East 23rd, \$437.00, and for 2213 Tom Green \$363.00. Proceeds were deposited to Real Estate Rental - Sale of Houses.

SALE AND REMOVAL OF HUTMENTS, LITTLE CAMPUS SITE, 19TH AND RED RIVER STREETS: Approval has been given to take out of service the Little Campus Hutments after the close of the 1956-57 year. Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager, advertised for bids in the San Antonio, Dallas, Houston and Austin papers for the sale and removal of the hutments. There was a wide variation in bids, but the high bidder was Mr. Edward Joseph who offered \$160 for the double and \$155 each for fourteen of the single hutments. Other bids for the double ranged from \$21.00 to \$75.00 and for twenty-nine singles from \$10.50 to \$37.00 each. I concur in Mr. Landrum's recommendation that Mr. Joseph's bid be accepted and that the remaining fifteen single hutments be readvertised for sale in the Austin papers.

SALE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY TO STAFF MEMBER: The organ parts that have been stored in Little Campus have been considered of no further use to the University and were offered for sale. Of the three bids received, the highest was \$77.00 (more than double other bids), made by Mr. Edwin M. Lansford, Research Scientist, Biochemical Institute. I recommend that permission be given to sell the material to Mr. Lansford at the amount indicated.

DISPOSAL OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY VALUED IN EXCESS OF \$500: The Bureau of Business Research has offered for sale a multilith 1250 machine and the Smykal Business Machine Company has offered \$555. I recommend that such sale be approved. (156)

PURCHASE OF AIR CONDITIONERS: I recommend approval of the purchase of the following air conditioners: For the Department of Art, two one ton air conditioners for two rooms of their offices, now located in a temporary wooden structure, the cost to be borne by the Department. For Institute of Marine Science, one conditioner for the bacteriology laboratory, payment to be made from the Maintenance and Equipment account, which has been increased by \$175 from Unallocated Maintenance and Equipment. (432)

DIRECTORSHIP OF MCDONALD OBSERVATORY: Dr. Bengt Strongren has resigned from the University of Chicago and the directorship of McDonald Observatory, effective August 31, 1957, to accept a professorship at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University. The University of Chicago has appointed Dr. Gerard P. Kuiper as Director of the McDonald and Yerkes Observatories and as Chairman of its Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics, effective September 1, 1957. Dr. Kuiper served some years ago as director of the McDonald Observatory and is therefore experienced in its research operations and management. The salary for this position is borne entirely by The University of Chicago.

CHARGES FOR GUESTS IN MEN'S AND WOMEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS: I concur in the recommendation of Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager, that the room charge per night for over-night guests in residence halls be increased from \$0.75 to \$1.00, the meal charges remaining the same, namely: Breakfast - \$0.50; Noon meal, Monday-Friday, inclusive - \$0.75; Noon meal, Saturday and Sunday - \$1.00; Evening meal, Monday-Friday, inclusive - \$1.00; Evening meal, Saturday - \$0.75.

CHANGE IN PAY SCALE OF STUDENT ASSISTANTS: I recommend that the maximum hourly rate for Student Assistants be advanced from \$1.50 to \$2.00, effective with the 1957-58 Long Session. This is the rate for Graduate Assistant with Master's degree or its equivalent.

NON-ATHLETIC BLANKET TAX FOR STUDENT WIVES OR HUSBANDS: The Student Assembly has passed a resolution that there be made available to non-student wives and husbands of student Blanket Tax holders only, a non-athletic Blanket Tax entitling the holder to the following benefits: (1) Admission to Cultural Entertainment Committee productions at a reduced cost; (2) Admission to Drama Department productions at a reduced cost; (3) Admission to Great Issues Program at a reduced cost. The price is to be \$3.00 apportioned as follows: For Student Government, \$0.40; for Great Issues, \$0.07; for Cultural Entertainment Committee, \$2.32; for Band, \$0.06; for Curtain Club, \$0.15. I concur in the recommendation of the Deans of Student Services and Student Life that this be approved.

FACULTY LEGISLATION: The following legislation which has been passed by the General Faculty and/or Faculty Council, is recommended for approval:

1. The General Faculty approved on June 24, 1957, by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the Faculty Council to name the Main Heating and Power Plant the Hal C. Weaver Heating and Power Station (G. F. Minutes 6966). Professor Weaver died in 1929. The Faculty Council recommendation includes the following statement: "For twenty years Professor Weaver rendered a loyal service and set high standards of accomplishment as a teacher. He was a progressive and energetic leader - the developer of the Department of Mechanical Engineering of which he was the chairman . . . He conceived the plan for constructing the Main Heating and Power Plant in 1925 and later the original section of the Engineering Building."

2. The Faculty Council on July 9, 1957, approved by the circularization procedure the changes in the degree plans for the Bachelor of Music Degree for students majoring in Music Education (D&P 2468-70), copy of which legislation is attached hereto as Appendix A.

3. The Faculty Council at its meeting of July 15, 1957, approved the motion to suspend the 10:00 and 11:00 a.m. classes on January 10, 1958, the time set for the official launching of the 75th Year Observance. (D&P 2473).

4. The Faculty Council on September 13, 1957, approved by the circularization procedure the proposal to amend the requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan III, Schemes I and II (D&P 2482-85), copy of which is attached as Appendix B.

OUTSIDE AND ADDITIONAL DUTIES: I recommend that the staff members listed be permitted to undertake the outside and additional duties outlined during 1957-58, unless other dates shown, the time to so arranged as not to interfere with university assignments:

1. Mr. Robert F. Peck, Associate Professor of Educational Psychology, to help launch an organization known as Management Development Services, the time to be approximately 30-35 hours per month.

2. Mr. John J. McKetta, Professor of Chemical Engineering, to continue as consultant for Gulf Publishing Company. Mr. McKetta acts as Chairman of the Editorial Board and as Consultant to the Chairman of the Board of Directors, and maximum absence from the campus averages one day a week.

3. Mr. Earnest F. Gloyna, Associate Professor of Civil Engineering, to do consulting work for the Magnolia Petroleum Company at the rate of \$80.00 per day, June 8-10 and July 1 and 2, 1957.

4. Mr. E. W. Doty, Dean of the College of Fine Arts, to play as a substitute organist at All Saints Episcopal Chapel Sunday, July 21 and 28, and August 4 and 11, 1957, total compensation to be \$30.00

5. Mr. Charles W. Laughton, Associate Professor of Social Work, to serve as consultant to a committee of citizens in Austin appointed by the Executive Committee of the United Fund to organize and develop a local community council, compensation to be at the rate of \$4.50 per hour.

6. Mr. Frank W. McBee, Jr., Systems Development Specialist, Defense Research Laboratory, to engage in outside consulting services, such employment not to be on a continuing basis. Outside and Additional Duties (continued)

7. The following staff of the Department of Petroleum Engineering to do consulting work during 1957-58: Professor S. J. Pirson, Professor H. H. Power, Professor G. H. Fancher, Professor F. W. Jessen, Professor E. W. Hough, Assistant Professor G. W. Crawford, Assistant Professor W. W. Dingle, Assistant Professor Norman Lamont, Assistant Professor Paul J. Root, Assistant Professor Kermit E. Brown.

8. Mr. S. E. Lehmberg, Instructor in History, to serve as organist and choirmaster of the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd at an annual salary of \$2,200.

9. Mr. James R. Holmes, Assistant Professor of Drawing, to do art and drafting work.

10. Mr. William M. Wilcox, Refrigerating and Heating Engineer, to continue in the capacity of Director of the Naval Reserve Officers' School in Austin, the time to be about six hours per week and compensation approximately \$1,000 per year.

# RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

On pages 45-46 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1957-1959 under the "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan III, Degree Preparatory to Law"

SUBSTITUTE the following for the material printed in the Catalogue:

- Degree preparatory to law: Bachelor of Arts: Students contemplatinga career in law who plan to take a Bachelor of Arts degree are advised to obtain the degree before applying for entrance at the school of Law. Although alternative programs are possible by which the student may enter The University of Texas School of Law without a degree the general tendency throughout the country in major schools of law is to require a Bachelors degree before admission. Students intending to enter the School of Law are advised to pursue a course of study concentrated around the following subjects: (1) Humanities and social sciences; (2) Courses dealing with mathematics and scientific method. While specific courses are not designated students are advised to take a junior English course in written communication. In general students under the fouryear program are advised to follow the scheme of courses laid down below in the Bachelor of Arts Plan III, Scheme I, or Plan II, or the Honors Program in Social Sciences. In the development of specific majors and the choosing of specific courses the student is advised to consult with the pre-legal advisory committee. The student is reminded of the necessity of taking the Law Aptitude Test prior to application for admission to the School of Law. These tests are administered by the University Testing and Guidance Bureau.
- 2. For students desiring to enter The University of Texas School of Law without a Bachelors degree two combined degree programs are available. To be eligible to receive the degree of Bachelor of Arts under Plan III, Scheme I or II a student before registering in the School of Law must have completed the program of work prescribed under Scheme I or II below. Students having the required total number of hours, but deficient in prescribed courses not in excess of six hours, may be admitted into the School of Law at the discretion and with the permission of the Registrar and the Dean of the School of Law. Any deficiency in the prescribed work under Scheme I or II below which a student may have upon admission to the School of Law by special permission of the Registrar and the Dean must be absolved by appropriate course work prior to commencing the third year in the School of Law.

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## Degree preparatory to Law: Bachelor of Arts Plan III, Scheme I

- 1. Twelve semester hours of English including English 601 or 601Q, three hours of Sophomore English and one three semester hour course in written communication taken in 2nd or 3rd year.
- 2. Six semester hours of mathematics, or Greek 406 and 407, or six semester hours of Latin other than Latin 406. A student who offers courses in one of the classical languages in satisfaction of this requirement may not offer the same courses toward satisfaction of Requirement 3.
- 3. Courses 406 and 407 in a foreign language and three semester hours of a sophomore course in the same foreign language (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test). Students offering Latin as the foreign language must take at least six semester hours of Latin beyond 406, regardless of the score on the placement test. For transfer students the substantial equivalent of the above requirement will be accepted.

If a Romance language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the Department of Romance Languages before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations.

- 4. Twelve semester hours in the natural sciences, including (a) six semester hours in a laboratory course in physical science (chemistry or physics), or Physics 609; and (b) Biology 607 or Geology 601 or Zoology 311K and 316K.
- 5. Thirty-six semester hours of social science, including Government 610, six semester hours of United States history (sophomore or advanced), and at least fifteen semester hours of advanced social science. Not more than twelve semester hours may be counted in freshman social science.
- 6. Fifteen hours of electives in the social sciences or humanities, six of which must be advanced. In satisfying this requirement nine hours of ROTC and/or six hours of accounting may be substituted.
- 7. (a) Credit for the first year of work (twenty-eight semester hours) completed in the School of Law at The University of Texas; and
  - (b) a weighted average of at least 65 on all law work completed at The University of Texas in which a final examination was taken.

The student must satisfy requirements B l(a) and 2 as laid down in the special requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I, page 33.

### EXPLANATION AND REASONS:

The above recommendations are the result of a study of the Arts and Sciences pre-legal program conducted by a joint committee of faculty members of the College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Law appointed by Dean Ransom, with the concurrence of Dean Keeton. The changes recommended are based on an over-all study and appraisal of the existing program and aimed at strengthening the program in the following specific areas:

- 1. An increased emphasis on training in English and written communication. The inability of law students to express themselves in written English was found by the committee to be a general criticism voiced by many law schools. It is believed that the proposed revision meets this criticism.
- 2. A creful study of other pre-legal programs outside of The University of Texas indicates that the majority of persons who have investigated the subject are in agreement that the prelegal program should be broadly based in the social sciences and humanities, in addition to scientific method, mathematics and the natural sciences. It is believed that the required courses proposed above when supplemented with the permitted electives will improve our present program in these fields.
- 3. Six hours of accounting are retained as an elective in Plan III, Scheme I. The University of Texas School of Law desires its students to have some knowledge of accounting procedures. With this in mind the School of Law has recently instituted its own accounting course. The present proposal enables the student either to fulfill this requirement in his pre-law work as an elective or to defer it until entrance to the School of Law. While in general it is the feeling of the committee that the latter alternative should be followed, it is considered desirable to allow accounting to remain as an elective in Plan III, Scheme I until the School of Law has had additional experience with its accounting course.

<sup>\*\*</sup> If math requirement is completed in the Freshman year then elective may be taken from the social sciences and humanities. (English excluded)

- 4. The foreign language requirements remain the same in all degree programs but a relaxation of rigidity in interpretation is introduced to deal with transfer students coming to the University from other Colleges where substantially the same amount of language is required although the method of computing and numbering such courses differs from the procedure followed at The University of Texas. The committee views this change as a technical one designed to handle more satisfactorily the problem of transfer students.
- 5. The number of ROTC hours which may be counted in any of the combined degree programs has been reduced. This is justified on the grounds that the combined degree programs are pre-professional in character and that to accomplish their aims it is essential that maximum emphasis be put on pre-professional subjects.
- 6. While proposing changes that affect basically the requirements of The University of Texas School of Law, the committee has also been mindful of the needs of a minority of our students planning to take their law work outside of Texas. We feel that the changes we propose will bring our pre-legal programs in line with the general requirements for admission to leading out-of-state law schools and will assure our students of adequate preparation to meet these requirements.

The committee wishes to emphasize the fact that in reaching its conclusions it has viewed the pre-legal program as a whole and believes that its recommendations, if adopted, will materially strengthen the program within the College of Arts and Sciences.

OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL IN NEW MEXICO.--Article 6, Paragraph 3, Section 33, of House Bill No. 133, as passed by the Fifty-fifth Legislature, authorizes either the President of the University System or the Executive Head of Tokas Western College, as the Loard of Regents may determine, to authorize travel for the faculty and staff for official purposes in the State of New Mexico within a radius of 200 miles from El Paso without approval by the Board of Regents. It is recommended that the Board of Regents grant authority to the President of Texas Western College to approve such travel and that the certificate of such authority be filed with the proper State offices concerned with the payment of official travel expenses.
