The budgetary dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents in Austin on October 5-6, 1962.

The following changes affecting Central Administration budgetary operations are recommended for approval by the Board of Regents:

#### RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS TO THE 1961-62 BUDGET

#### Office of the Comptroller

- 1. Effective May 31, 1962, accept the resignation of Mr. Thomas Edward Wilder as Clerk-of-the-Works on the Addition to Law School Building (Main University). Mr. Wilder was employed on a month-to-month basis at a monthly salary of \$600. (RBC 116)
- 2. Effective June 15, 1962, appoint Mr. Nolan Edward Wilder on a month-to-month basis as Clerk-of-the-Works on the Addition to Law School Building (Main University). The monthly salary is \$600, and employment will continue until further notice. (RBC 122)
- 3. Effective August 27, 1962, appoint Mr. William Joseph Martin as Architect I at an annual salary rate of \$6,780; source of funds is unused salary in the Clerk-of-the-Works position. (RBC 141)

Auditing Oil and Gas Production

4. Effective August 14, 1962, accept the resignation of Mr. W. R. Cavett, Assistant Auditor, at an annual rate of \$7,104. (RBC 139)

#### RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS TO THE 1962-63 BUDGET

Office of the Comptroller

1. Effective September 1, 1962, reappoint Mr. William Joseph Martin as Architect I at an annual rate of \$6,780; source of funds is the unfilled position of Architect I. (RBC 17)

2. Effective September 1, 1962, change the status of Mr. Frank Morris Midkiff from Assistant Director and Editor at an annual salary rate of \$6,468 to Informational Writer II at an annual salary rate of \$5,520. (RBC 9)

Auditing Oil and Gas Production

3. Effective September 1, 1962, accept the resignation of Mr. W. R. Cavett, Assistant Auditor, at an annual salary rate of \$7,104. (RBC 14)

Endowment Office

4. Effective September 1, 1962, reappoint Mr. Wallace J. Gorski as Assistant Maintenance Engineer (3/20 time) at an annual salary rate of \$7,104; source of funds is the Mitchell Building Expense Account of the Varner Properties, W. C. Hogg Fund. Mr. Gorski was employed in 1961-62 at the same salary rate. (RBC 12)

South Texas Medical School

5. Change the twelve month salary of Dr. Robert C. Berson, Dean, to \$15,600 from General Budget funds plus \$5,233 from the San Antonio Medical Foundation Grant, for a total salary of \$20,833. In addition, an annuity of \$4,167 for Dr. Berson is to be purchased directly from T.I.A.A., funds to come from the San Antonio Medical Foundation Grant -- total from the San Antonio Medical Foundation Grant amounts to \$9,400 per annum. Dr. Berson was originally budgeted at an annual salary of \$15,600 from General Budget funds plus \$9,400 from the San Antonio Medical Foundation Grant. This change is to restate the conditions of employment of Dr. Berson; total compensation remains unchanged and the source of funds remains the same.



DEBT SERVICE REQUIREMENTS ON PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND BONDS, SERIES 1962 At the time of the preparation of the budget for 1962-63, estimates were given for the appropriations needed for interest and principal payments and paying agency fees for the subject issue for 1962-63, based on an assumed rate of interest of 3 1/4%, and were so included in the budget. This is the procedure that has been followed in past years.

Endowment Office Stewart, with the approval of Vice-Chancellor Dolley, recommends that the appropriations for the 1962 Series (\$5,000,000), as shown on page 25 of the Central Administration budget, be changed to reflect actual debt service costs resulting from the sale of the bonds, as shown below.

## ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FROM THE AVAILABLE UNIVERSITY FUND FOR HURRICANE CARLA DAMAGE

At the September 30, 1961 meeting, the Board appropriated \$150,000 from the Available University Fund to cover damage from Hurricane Carla at Medical Branch, Institute of Marine Science, and M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute. At the April 28, 1962 meeting of the Board, an additional \$150,000 was appropriated from the Available Fund for this purpose. It has now been found that in order to complete the repairs and replacements needed at the Institute of Marine Science, approximately \$3,500 additional money will be needed, and it is, therefore, recommended that an appropriation in this amount be made to this account from the Available University Fund Unappropriated Balance. It is believed that this additional appropriation will take care of all repairs and replacements justified at the Institute of Marine Science, although no reimbursement will have been made to M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute for repairs and replacements made there.



The transfers that are requested are necessary due to increases in costs of materials and supplies as well as increases in the patient load both in the hospital and the clinic over that estimated at the time the 1961-62 Regents Budget was prepared. Due to increased patient load the requirements for sterile supplies, operating room supplies, pharmaceuticals, radiological supplies, and other miscellaneous hospital supplies is greater than was anticipated in the original 1961-62 budget. It has been necessary during the year to purchase a new sonic cleaner for the Central Sterile Supply Section at a cost of \$10,080.00, a new operating table at \$4,020.00, as well as the normal replacement of other hospital equipment at a rate greater than had been anticipated. Adequate funds were not included in the original budget for the addition of books and periodicals to the library at the rate required to maintain a first class medical library, which it is felt is required.

It has been necessary to purchase additional equipment for the paging system as well as addressograph equipment for a central mailing service, resulting in the requirement for additional funds in the budget for the Section of Communications. The increase in the housekeeping budget is required for the replacement of draperles in the hospital which are no longer serviceable. Revised estimates of revenue for the year indicate an increase in revenue over that shown in the original budget of approximately \$400,000.00, due to the increased activity. (REC 178)

PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND INVESTMENT PROGRAM - RECOMMENDED ADDITIONS TO APPROVED LIST OF DEALERS. -- It is recommended by the University investment staff and concurred in by the Land and Investment Committee that the following dealers be added to the approved list for security transactions, the reasons for each addition being explained by each recommendation:

- Middendorf, Colgate & Company (51 Broad Street, New York 4, N. Y.) -For trading in unlisted insurance stocks. Mr. Harry S. Middendorf, and his son
  J. William, were formerly in the firm of Wood, Struthers & Company (a Texas branch
  of this New York firm being on the approved list for listed stock trading as well
  as for unlisted insurance stocks). The Middendorfs were responsible for the very
  excellent and extensive research work on the insurance industry. With the formation of the new firm by the Middendorfs, Mr. William Mueller, the Wood, Struthers
  trader for insurance stocks, became a partner of the new firm. The Middendorfs
  have rendered valuable research services to the University investment staff,
  particularly at the beginning of the revised investment program. They are now
  in a position to maintain a trading inventory of insurance stocks and particularly
  of those stocks on the approved list for the Permanent University Fund. Trading
  of insurance shares with the Wood, Struthers firm would be discontinued with the
  addition of the above-recommended firm. However, as a Texas branch of a New York
  firm, trading of listed stocks with Wood, Struthers would be continued.
- 2. Keefe, Bruyette & Woods, Inc. (One Chase Manhattan Plaza, New York 5, N. Y.) -For trading in unlisted bank stocks. Mr. Harry Keefe, Jr., was formerly a
  specialist in research and marketing of bank stocks with the firm of Tucker
  Anthony & R. L. Day, a New York firm on the dealer approved list for both listed
  and unlisted stock trading for the Permanent University Fund. Mr. Keefe has just
  recently formed an investment banking firm of his own and taken with him as
  partners from the Tucker Anthony firm Mr. Gene F. Bruyette, co-manager of the
  Hartford branch of Tucker Anthony, and Mr. Norbert D. Wood, bank stock trader for
  fifteen years with the Tucker Anthony firm. Also going with the new firm are two
  top bank analysts from the Tucker Anthony firm. Mr. Keefe has made a number of
  trips to Austin for research conferences on banks with the University investment
  staff and the staff finds him to be a very qualified bank analyst and trader.
  Trading of bank shares with the Tucker Anthony firm would be discontinued with
  the addition of the above-recommended firm. However, trading of listed stocks
  with the Tucker Anthony and R. L. Day firm would be continued.

LEASES AND EASEMENTS.—The lard and Investment Committee has given consideration to the following applications for various leases and easements on University Lands. All are at the standard rates, unless otherwise stated, are on the University's standard forms, with grazing leases carrying provision for renewal for an additional five years at negotiated terms. Payments for easements and caliche permits have been received in advance. All have been approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer. Approval of the applications and execution of the instruments involved by the Chariman of the Board or the Endowment Officer is recommended.

#### PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND - LAND MATTERS .--

OIL, GAS AND WATER PIPE LINES EASEMENT FORM - UL-2 - REVISION OF PARAGRAPH 4.--Paragraph 4 of this easement form, which was approved by the Board of Regents on December 2, 1961, reads as follows:

4. It is further agreed and understood that this agreement is made subject to any and all oil, gas and mineral permits and leases, agricultural, grazing and other surface leases heretofore issued or that may hereafter be issued covering the premises described herein, and the rights and privileges herein granted to Second Party shall be exercised in such a manner as will not unduly interfere with the use of said land by such permittees and lessees. Such pipe line is to be buried at sufficient depth not to interfere with the use of the land.

The wording, substantially that of previous easement forms, has been questioned by the General Counsel of one of the major pipe line companies since he feels it might hinder unnecessarily the financing of pipe lines and related facilities by the requirement that all bonds be made subject to "any and all oil, gas and mineral permits and leases, agricultural and other surface leases heretofore issued or that may hereafter be issued covering the premises described herein."

After further study and poll of the Board Members by the Chairman, paragraph 4 has been changed to read as follows:

4. It is further agreed and understood that this agreement is made subject to any and all oil, gas and mineral permits and leases, agricultural, grazing and other like leases which would not unreasonably interfere with the exercise of the rights granted hereunder, heretofore issued, or that may hereafter be issued covering the premises described herein, and the rights and privileges herein granted to Second Party shall be exercised in such a manner as will not unduly interfere with the use of said land by such permittees and lessees. Such pipe line is to be buried at sufficient depth not materially to interfere with the use of land for ordinary agricultural and grazing purposes. (Changes and/or additions underscored.)

It is recommended that such action of the Board be, and the same is hereby, in all things ratified and approved.

REPORT ON BURIED TREASURE PERMIT TO M. H. CHENNAULT, SR.--Approval was given at the June, 1962, meeting of the Board of Regents for a permit to M. H. Chennault, Sr., to hunt for buried treasure in Upton County on University Lands. The permit was executed by the Chairman of the Board for a five-day period. Mr. Chennault made his search on the morning of August 14 accompanied by Messrs. Compton and Haigh and found nothing. This report is submitted for information.

SURFACE LEASE NO. 1640, ANDREWS COUNTY - ASSIGNMENT FROM NE-VILLE G. PENROSE, INC. TO SOHIO PETROLEUM COMPANY -- Surface Lease No. 1640 covering 10 acres in Block 10, Andrews County, was granted by the Board at its meeting of June 30, 1962, to Neville G. Penrose, Inc. for the period May 1, 1962, through April 30, 1963, for \$100 per year, renewable from year to year, not to exceed a total of 10-years. Permission has been requested for the assignment of the lease to Sohio Petroleum Company for the same period and terms as outlined above, and the University's assignment charge of \$25 has been received. It is recommended that the assignment be granted.

#### PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND - LAND MATTERS .--

GRAZING LEASE NO. 820, HUDSPETH COUNTY - ASSIGNMENT FROM ESTATE OF LEE MOOR, DOING BUSINESS AS WACO CATTLE COMPANY, TO GENE O'DELL & B. A. RANDALL.--Grazing Lease No. 820 covering 117,491.4 acres of land in Blocks D, E, F, and H, Hudspeth County was granted by the Board at its meeting of December 12, 1960, for a five-year period, January 1, 1961, through December 31, 1965, at rental of 15¢ per acre per year, payable in semiannual installments of \$8,811.86 by January 1 and July 1 during the term of the lease. The assignment of this lease to Gene O'Dell & B. A. Randall of Mesa, Arizona has been requested. A bonus of \$117,491.40 is being paid by Messrs. O'Dell and Randall, one half of which, \$58,745.70, will be paid to the University upon consummation of the deal. Rental has been paid through December 31, 1962, by Waco Cattle Company. Approval of such assignment is recommended.

EASEMENT NO. 1421, WARD COUNTY, STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT - RIGHT OF ENTRY.--In connection with construction of Interstate Highway No. 20 on a portion of University Lands in Ward County, to which Easement No. 1421 was assigned in 1959, the Texas Highway Department requests right of entry to make utility adjustments prior to the letting of construction contracts. A similar right of entry was granted for relocating water lines at the February, 1962, meeting of the Board of Regents. There are eight parcels of land involved in Sections 1, 11, 12, 19, 34 and 35, Block 16 covering approximately 224.85 acres.

Approval of the right of entry is recommended with the Chairman authorized to execute the appropriate instrument when approved as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

EASEMENT NO. 165 - WINKLER COUNTY - ADDITIONAL ACREAGE FOR AIR-PORT.--Easement No. 165, issued to the City of Wink, covers approximately 1,000 acres of land in Block 21, Winkler County for a fifty-year period, May 1, 1942, through April 30, 1992, with full consideration of \$5,000 paid in advance. In September, 1961, the Board of Regents approved the assignment of the easement from the City of Wink to Winkler County. Winkler County has requested an additional 16.831 acres of land, also in Block 21, for the remainder of the term of the easement for a consideration of \$75. The additional acreage is needed as an avigation easement for the airport currently operated by the County. The County advises that this additional acreage will not be fenced, and that the easement is necessary only to prevent obstructions that would interfere with the use of the airport. It is recommended that the request be granted and the Chairman be authorized to execute an appropriate instrument upon approval as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

BUSINESS SITE EASEMENT NO. 1186, WARD COUNTY, TO DAVID KER (ASSIGNED TO THREE KERS, LTD., AND SUBLET TO TEXAS INTERIOR WAREHOUSES, INC.) - REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING INSURANCE MATTERS. -- Part of the Pyote Air Force Base facilities on University Lands in Ward County turned back to the University were leased to David Ker for 10 years beginning October 20, 1958, with amendments and assignment thereafter so that all of the hangars and frame warehouses are now covered by a lease to 1968 for a cotton warehouse operated by Texas Interior Warehouses, Inc., which is controlled by Mr. Ker. Rental to the University is \$4,200 annually. When the lease was made to Mr. Ker, he assumed the responsibility for putting the water system in shape. The amount and types of insurance coverage that could be obtained and the premium cost were uncertain. Salvage value of the buildings leased was estimated at \$33,000, and the lease provides that the Lessee would carry fire and extended coverage insurance in that amount at his own cost with all policies written in the name of the Board of Regents. Mr. Ker has carried \$50,000 coverage until the cancellation mentioned below.

Windstorm and hail damage, principally to the roofs of course, in February, 1960, amounted to an adjusted loss of \$25,613 paid by the insurance companies, and this was paid to Philip Stroud for repair of the damage. Then in May, 1962, there was another loss from windstorm and hail. The adjusters determined the loss payable to the Board of Regents as \$28,148.50, and a contract for repair of the damage for that amount was signed with Mr. Stroud. While this work was in progress, there was another hailstorm in June, resulting in an adjusted loss of \$17,959.50. Since a good portion of this was work in progress and Mr. Stroud carried builder's risk coverage, he and his agents presented a claim under that coverage, but the claim was denied, apparently on certain technical grounds. It appears that settlement of this last loss will be made, after extended delays, under our coverage and/or the builder's risk coverage.

Mr. Stroud was paid \$11,671.50 from the insurance settlement of \$28,148.50, and the remainder of the money is still in the hands of the University. If the second loss is not paid, part or all of this will have to be paid to Mr. Stroud on his contract, but this is not expected.

The University staff and Mr. Ker agreed that no contract for repair of all of the damage from the second loss should be negotiated, and that only patching and immediate repairs would be done. This was due to continued unsettled weather in the area, the age and condition of the buildings, and the cancellation by the insurance companies of the coverage that had been carried for the Board of Regents. One of the questions raised by the insurance companies has been inadequate coverage to value of improvements, and it was decided with Mr. Ker that the remainder of the insurance proceeds after necessary repairs might be used to pay premiums, as long as the money lasts, on a total of \$200,000 coverage, onefourth of which will be paid for by Mr. Ker and the remainder by the University from remaining insurance money, after repairs. This coverage has been obtained through Munger & Moore of Dallas with Fireman's Fund Insurance Company. The cost of \$150,000, or 3/4 of the coverage, is \$3,462.98 for 3 years. It is recommended that the Board of Regents approve actions by the staff reported above; authorize further repairs deemed necessary by the staff to be paid for from insurance money on hand; authorize payment of the \$3,462.98 from the insurance money for the coverage in the amount of \$150,000; and authorize this coverage to be continued for another 3 years, but not beyond the expiration of the lease, so long as any of the insurance money is left for the payment of premiums.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - GIFT, REQUEST AND ESTATE MATTERS .--

MAIN UNIVERSITY - BELLE CLAYTON ATKEISSON SCHOLARSHIP - RE-PORT OF BEQUEST AND ESTABLISHMENT OF FUND. -- The sum of \$5,000 has been received from the Executor of the Estate of Mrs. Belle H. Atkeisson, who died in Shreveport, Louisiana on January 11, 1962. Mrs. Atkeisson was a graduate student for one summer term in 1945 at The University of Texas and for many years a resident of Texas. The provision of the Will covering the scholarship is as follows:

"FOURTH; to the University of Texas at Austin, Texas, the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars for the purpose of endowing in the University a scholarship to be known as the Belle Clayton Atkeisson Scholarship. The principal fund to be invested in sound securities and administered by board of trustees of said university in accordance with their charter and by-laws or regulations and the income therefrom to be used and awarded to a student (Preferably one having completed at least one year in college) for high standing in scholarship, taking also into account general intelligence, physical fitness, character, personality, spirit of service and financial need."

It is recommended that the bequest be accepted and that the funds be added to Funds Grouped for Investment as of September 1, 1962.

MEDICAL BRANCH - DR. WILLIAM H. McCOACH LOAN FUND - INFORMA-TION REPORT .-- The bequest under the Will of Dr. William H. McCoach of San Antonio, after termination of a trust established under the Will, to the University as a loan fund "to assist only worthy senior class students of the Medical Department" was reported to the Board of Regents and accepted on April 28, 1962. The National Bank of Commerce of San Antonio, Trustee of the Estate, now has practically completed liquidation of the Estate, and the University has received a total of \$43,387.49 in cash and its undivided interest in a few mineral and royalty interests, one of which may involve undivided ownership in the surface as well as the minerals. The cash has been sent to the Medical Branch, and a recommendation for the establishment of the loan fund program will be presented through the Medical Branch docket. There is small production from some of the mineral interests, apparently amounting to around \$16 per month for the University's share, and these will be handled by Central Administration and the receipts sent periodically to the Medical Branch to be added to the loan fund. SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL - GIFT BY MR. AND MRS. D. K. WOODWARD, JR., FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL SPECIAL PROJECTS FUND .-- The University has received from Republic National Bank of Dallas an executed copy of a trust agreement executed by Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Woodward, Jr., dated August 15, 1962, and Republic National Bank as Trustee establishing The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School Special Projects Fund with an initial gift of 1,200 shares of National Tank Company Common Stock worth approximately \$24,000. Mr. Woodward is a former Chairman of the Board of Regents. The agreement provides for all net income to be paid to a sister of Mr. Woodward, who is now 83 years of age, during her life and then to a niece, who is 60, during her life, and then to the Southwestern Medical School for research and teaching projects, special lectureships and/or other special purposes for which State of Texas appropriations are not available or are not sufficient to cover. This is an irrevocable, perpetual trust, with Republic National Bank continuing as Trustee when the income becomes available to Southwestern Medical School, and additional gifts to

the Fund by Mr. and Mrs. Woodward and by others is permitted. Republic National Bank has requested that the Board of Regents officially recognize and accept the benefits to Southwestern Medical School under the Trust, and it is so recommended, with the Endowment Officer to notify the Bank of this action.

#### TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - REAL ESTATE MATTERS --

HOGG FOUNDATION: W. C. HOGG MEMORIAL FUND - PROPOSED MINERAL LEASE TO RUFUS F. MARSHALL, OLD HUMBLE FIELD (SCRANTON HANSZEN FEE, TEXAS MP #19) HARRIS COUNTY .-- The proposed oil, gas, and mineral lease from Mrs. Alice N. Hanszen et al., as Lessors, to Mr. Rufus F. Marshall, as Lessee, covers the undivided interest in certain lots out of the J. R. Wost Subdivision of the J. D. Bourgeois 39.304 acres in the James Strange Survey, Harris County. The University's interest is 108/1728ths. No bonus is being paid. The primary term is 120 days commencing with the date of the last certificate of acknowledgment by any of the Lessor parties. The lease has been executed by all other Lessor parties. Royalty is 1/4 on oil and gas, including casinghead and all other gas, and 1/10on all other minerals mined and marketed, except that on sulphur mined and marketed the royalty shall be \$3 per long ton. This property was previously leased for the American Sulphur Company by J. Linton Robertson, Jr., and later assigned to Houston Gulf Sulphur Company, but the lease expired under its own terms as of December 27, 1959.

It is recommended that the joinder by the University in the proposed lease be approved and the Chairman authorized to execute the instrument upon approval as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

HOGG FOUNDATION: W. C. HOGG MEMORIAL FUND - RETIREMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS, PAPPAS COMPANY, INC., ON VARNER BUILDING.--Among the properties acquired by the University from Varner Company in 1952 was the Varner Building, 401 Louisiana, Houston, Texas. This building was sold to the Pappas Company by deed dated July 8, 1954, for the sum of \$450,000 with interest at 4% per annum for the period January 15, 1955, through January 14, 1960, with monthly payments of \$2,376 and at  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  per annum from January 15, 1960, until fully paid with monthly payments of \$2,478.67. The Vendor's Lien Note, also dated July 8, 1954, provided for prepayment under certain conditions, the one obtaining at the present time being penalty of 1% of the unpaid balance.

We were advised on July 13, 1962, of the desire of Pappas Company to pay off the note completely. Payment was made on July 25, 1962, as follows:

A release was executed by the Endowment Officer under authority of Section 1.23, Page 54, Chapter IX, Part II, RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY and delivered to Home Title Company of Houston for delivery upon payment of the funds outlined above.

HOGG FOUNDATION: VARNER PROPERTIES - UNRELATED BUSINESS INCOME TAX FOR FISCAL YEAR 1962. Internal Revenue Service Form 990-T for Unrelated Business Income for Varner Properties during the fiscal year ended July 31, 1962, is being prepared, as in recent years, by the Branch College Auditor. The tax will amount to approximately \$15,000 this year as against \$23,412.24 in 1961, \$22,868.80 in 1960, and \$26,704.36 in 1959. The decrease is due in part to the expiration of the lease to T. J. Bettes Company on June 30, 1962. It is recommended that the Board of Regents authorize the filing of this return, to be signed by the Comptroller and Endowment Officer upon approval of the Vice Chancellor (Fiscal Affairs), together with payment of tax reflected by the return.

ARCHER M. HUNTINGTON MUSEUM FUND - PROPOSED POWER LINE EASE-MENT TO HOUSTON LIGHTING & POWER COMPANY TO SERVE CAMP SITES.—Houston Lighting & Power Company has proposed that the Board of Regents grant it, free of charge, an easement approximately 10 feet wide and 370 feet in length to extend its power line, which serves the camp sites at Virginia Point, to furnish better service to the University's lessees at the camp sites. The easement is for so long as the lines are used for electrical distribution and has no other purpose than to serve the camp sites. The camp site leases carry reasonable cancellation provisions, as already approved by the Board of Regents, and the Board had previously approved the lines of which this is an extension. It is recommended that the easement be granted and the Chairman authorized to execute the instrument when approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE - FRANK B. COTTON TRUST - ASSIGNMENT OF GRAZING LEASE IN HUDSPETH COUNTY FROM J. C. WILLIAMSON TO J. M. HUBER CORPCRATION. -- At the meeting of May 14, 1960, the Board of Regents approved a grazing lease to J. C. Williamson of Midland on 10,829.4 acres of Cotton Estate Lands in Hudspeth County for a period of 10 years beginning June 1, 1960, at annual rental of \$.06 per acre, payable in advance. It is now requested that this lease be assigned to the J. M. Huber Corporation of Denver, Colorado. We understand Mr. Williamson has recently sold land adjoining the leased acreage, which he owned, to this corporation. No bonus is involved in the assignment. It is recommended the assignment be approved and the Chairman be authorized to execute such instruments as may be necessary concerning the assignment after approval as to form by the University Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE - FRANK B. CCTTON TRUST - GRAZING LEASE IN HUDSPETH COUNTY TO W. B. EVANS.--The Board of Regents, at its meeting of September 30, 1961, approved assignment of grazing lease on 16,911.75 acres of Cotton Trust Lands in Hudspeth County from L. M. Bennett to W. B. Evans for the remainder of the one-year lease period, through July 31, 1962. Mr. Evans has requested an extension of the lease, plus additional acreage in Sections 21 and 35, Block 3, GC&SF Ry. Grant, making a total of 18,191 acres, for a 5-year period at \$.05 per acre, the previous rate. On recommendation of President Ray of Texas Western College, it is recommended the lease with Mr. Evans be approved for one-year only, August 1, 1962, through July 31, 1963, at \$.05 per acre, total rental of \$909.55 payable in advance, with the instrument to be executed by the Chairman upon approval as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL AND TUMOR INSTITUTE - ROSALIE B. HITE FUND - PROPOSED PURCHASE BY YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION OF HOUSTON OF CAPITOL AND LABRANCH PROPERTY ..- At the June 30 meeting, the Board of Regents considered a proposal submitted by Mr. M. A. Rowe, a Houston realtor, for purchase of the Hite property at Capitol and LaBranch in Houston by Young Women's Christian Association of Houston, and the Board made a counter-offer to sell the property at \$10 per square foot, or \$55,000 cash based on ownership of 5,500 square feet, and this was reported to Mr. Rowe as being subject to acceptance by YWCA on or before September 14. Mr. Rowe has now reported that, due to vacations and the like, the YWCA Board had been unable to have a meeting to reach a decision, though this is expected some time in September, or early October. It is recommended that the time for acceptance of this counter-offer be extended to October 31, 1962. If accepted by YWCA, an appropriate resolution for the sale will be presented at the December meeting of the Board of Regents. It is understood that the YWCA practically has committed itself to purchase property adjoining the Hite property at \$10 per square foot. If our property is sold, a commission of five per cent will be paid Mr. Rowe by the University from the proceeds of the sale.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - ARCHER M. HUNTINGTON MUSEUM FUND - TEXAS CITY STORM PROTECTION PLANS .-- Information regarding the possibility of including part of the Huntington Lands at Texas City within the Texas City sea wall and levee extension project now under way, at an ostimated cost of approximately \$100,000 to the University was reported to the Board of Regents at the February 2, 1962, meeting, and the Board authorized the staff to pursue the matter further and report in due course for a decision by the Board. The University has now received from the County Judge of Calveston County correspondence setting out than an estimate made by the Corps of Engineers as to the additional cost that would have to be horne by the University for including approximately would have to be borne by the University for including approximately 380 acres of the Huntington Lands lying north and west of State Highway 146, or Loop 197, would be approximately \$400,000. Further, County Judge LaValle states that this work would have to be on the basis of a firm commitment to be made by the Board of Regents not later than February, 1963, according to present estimates as to plans and construction work, and that this would have to be a commitment, without any limit, as to amount of money or time of construction, to pay whatever additional cost develops from the actual construction contracts. If this particular part of the Huntington Lands should be included in the protected area, some other acreage privately owned would be included also; and these owners indicate that they would not be interested in incurring such an obligation, on a per acre basis, as to their acreage. There is some possibility that the Corps of Engineers and the County still may work out some revised plans before all of the contracts are Let that might result in protection for part of the University's acreage at some lower cost or possibly without any cost to the University. Regardless of any expectations along this line, it is recommended that the Board of Regents authorize the Endowment Officer to notify Galveston County that the work that has been done on the possibilities of including part of the University's acreage is appreciated, but that the Board of Regents is not in a position to commit itself to the extent required. This will make it possible for the storm protection plans to proceed without any delay as to a decision from the Board of Regents.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - BEQUEST UNDER THE WILL OF MRS. MARY HEARD (A. CASWELL) EILIS FOR THE ALEXANDER CASWELL EILIS FELLOWSHIP IN EDU- ) CATION - RECOMMENDATION REGARDING SALE OF SOMERVELL COUNTY FARM PROPERTY.--The bequest under the Will of Mrs. Mary Heard Ellis of her rest-due estate, including a three-fourths interest in her farm property in Somervell County, to the University for the Alexander Caswell Ellis Fellowship in Education was reported to and accepted by the Board of Regents on April 28, 1962.

The provisions of the Will regarding the farm property are as follows:

"I give and bequeath to my niece, Kathrin Heard Leigh, an undivided one-fourth (1/4) interest in my Brazos River farm property; said farm property consisting of a total of 300 acres, more or less. I direct that my Executors celiver the possession, management and control of said farm property to the trustees, (their agents and employees), of the trust hereinafter created for the establishment of certain fellowships at The University of Texas. Said property to be sold by my said trustees, above mentioned, when in their judgment an advantageous sale can be made. I make this provision regarding the sale not because of any lack of confidence in my Executors, but for the specific purpose of relieving them of the worry and time necessary to the handling of it."

This property has now been surveyed as 315.8 acres, and an independent appraisal dated June 11 has been obtained from Mr. 0. B. Craddock of Fort Worth showing fair market value of this property, including the improvements, at \$175.00 per acre, or a total of \$55,265.00.

Mrs. Kathrin Heard Leigh who has under the Will the one-fourth interest in the farm property is the niece of Mrs. Ellio, and she and her husband, Mr. R. E. Leigh, are independent executors of the estate. They reside in Austin. Mr. Leigh is very familiar with the property, which is near Glen Rose, the county seat of Somervell County, has had good experience in real estate negotiations, and has sufficient time to devote to a sale of the property. Mr. Leigh has suggested that the Board of Regents give him the exclusive right as agent to run for one year from October 1, 1962, to sell this property for not less than \$200 per acre with a reservation by the sellers of not less than one-half of a non-participating royalty interest as to all oil, gas, and other minerals, such reserve royalty to amount to not less than one-sixteenth under any lease that is made, and, if sold on terms, not less than onethird down and the balance to be paid over a period of not more than ten-years with interest of not less than six per cent per annum. Commission to be paid to Mr. Leigh from the University's share of the proceeds will be six per cent of the University's three-fourths share of gross sales price. Any expenses incurred by Mr. Leigh in efforts to sell the property, such as travel and advertising, will be borne by Mr. Leigh whether or not a sale is made. It is recommended that the Board of Regents authorize the execution by its Chairman of a listing contract with Mr. Leigh under the terms proposed above; and further that the Chairman be authorized to execute a Contract of Sale with a purchaser meeting the minimum requirements set out above, when approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer, in the event the purchaser is unwilling to await action on a Contract of Sale until the Board of Regents has another meeting.

#### TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS - REVENUE SOND MATTERS .--

MAIN UNIVERSITY - MARRIED STUDENT HOUSING PROJECT (BRACKEN-RIDGE TRACT) (HHEA PROJECT CH-TEX-121 (D)) - REPORT ON INDEFINITE POST-PONEMENT OF PROJECT DUE TO LEGAL PROBLEMS. -- On June 30, 1962, the board of Regents approved final plans and specifications for 200 apartment units for married students to be constructed on the Erackenridge Tract and authorized Comptroller Sparerberg to advertise for construction bils to be presented to the Board at a later meeting. These plans for construction have been based on a loan agreement in the amount of \$1,800,000 from Housing and Home Finance Agency duly authorized by the Board of Regents and dated July 1, 1961.

In connection with a complete review of the matter preparatory to a recommendation to the Board of Regents for authority to advertise the sale of the bonds later this year, our bond counsel, McCall, Parkhurst, Crowe, McCall & Horton, reviewed matters pertaining to the Issuance of the bonds, including the deed to the Brackenridge Tract, and on September 7, 1962, advised the University that they could not furnish an unqualified opinion on the bond issue, due principally to what they regard as a serious problem resulting from the use of the expression "permanent fund" in the deed and the right of the Board of Regents to pledge the revenues from the project to secure the bond issue. (See copies of their two letters attached as Supplemental Material.) The Doard of Regents appointed the firm of McCall, Parkhurst, Crowe, McCall, and Horton of Dallas as bond counsel for this project on July 22, 1961. In planning for the sale of the revenue bonds in November, a copy of the deed and other documents were mailed to bond counsel July 13, 1962. The Comptroller's Office started advertising on this project August 19, 1962. Bond counsel has conferred with counsel for Housing and Home Finance Agency and reports that without further clarification the Agency cannot carry through with its commitment to purchase the bonds under the type of opinion the firm would be willing to furnish.

After recent conferences with bond counsel, and with full concurrence of Vice Chancellor Dolley, Land and Trust Attorney Waldrep, and Endowment Officer Stewart, Comptroller Sparenberg on September 11, 1962, directed the Associate Architects to notify all contractors and others who had obtained copies of plans and specifications that the project had been indefinitely postponed. It is recommended that this action be ratified and approved by the Board of Regents and that the amount of 865,500 be appropriated from Main University.

Division of Rousing and Food Service - Major Repairs, Remodeling and Replacement, and Operating Reserve to cover charges incurred to date for Architects' fees and other expenses. This amount includes \$18,282 which has already been approved by the Board as an "advance" from this same account. The loan agreement with Housing and Home Finance Agency will remain in effect for at least sufficient time for further consideration of this matter at a later meeting if the Board of Regents so desires.

This is a joint recommendation of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Lawi and Investment Committee.

ESTABLISHMENT OF GIFT FUNDS: I recommend approval of the establishment of the following funds:

- 1. The Robert H. Williams Fund to be established within the Department had of Romance Languages for unrestricted use of the Department at the discretion of the chairman and a committee to be appointed by him. Contributions to this fund total approximately \$300. Dr. Williams was Professor of Romance Languages at the University from 1940 until his death on June 10, 1962.
- 2. An endowment fund set up at the request of the Department of the History and Philosophy of Education, the income from which will provide the Frederick Eby Research Prize in Humanistic Studies in Education.

  Initial contributions total \$100. When the endowment has built up sufficiently, an award will be made annually to the graduate student writing the best accepted doctoral dissertation in the field of humanistic studies in Education, selection to be by the Budget Council of the Department of the History and Philosophy of Education. If no dissertation is judged adequate for the award in any one year, the money will be held in trust for succeeding years. Dr. Eby has served on the staff of the University since 1909 and is at present Professor Emeritus in the Department of the History and Philosophy of Education

TRAVEL PAID FROM NON-TRAVEL ACCOUNTS: The following travel has been approved with costs paid from accounts not specifically allocated to travel:

- 1. President J. R. Smiley, July 20-24, 1962, to Dallas, Texas, to attend and speak at the Henry M. Burlage Appreciation Dinner and the Pharmacy Alumni Association annual breakfast meeting, expenses paid from the Development Expense account.
- 2. Mr. Glenn E. Barnett, Dean of Students, August 4-15, 1962, to Nashville, Tennessee, to attend the Southern Regional Education Board's Conference on Research Related to College Admissions as representative of the University, expenses paid from the account Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses.
- 3. Mr. Orville Wyss, Professor of Microbiology, May 5-12, 1962, to Kansas City, Missouri, and Chicago, Illinois, to present papers at meeting of professional societies, part of his expenses paid from a travel account and the balance from Maintenance and Operation account of Research in Bacteriology.

UNIVERSITY APARTMENTS GARBAGE FEE: An ordinance of the City of Austin, effective July 1, 1962, levied a charge (\$1.25 per month) for garbage pick-up service which affects University-owned apartments and Trailer Park, whether these facilities are occupied or not. Estimated annual cost to the University is \$9,333.00.

Director McConnell and his staff, after a careful survey, estimate that the University can perform this service for approximately \$5,000 per year, at a cost to each tenant of \$0.75 per month. The Business Manager therefore recommends, and I concur, that, effective November 1, 1962, a charge of \$0.75 per month be added to the rent of each University-owned apartment or trailer space, to provide garbage pick-up service and that the charge by the City of Austin be discontinued.

RESEARCH CONTRACTS: The following contracts and amendments have been negotiated by the Office of Government Sponsored Research and have been signed by the Vice-President and/or President upon the recommendation of the appropriate Technical Director, the Director of the Office of Government Sponsored Research, and the Business Manager. I recommend your approval and ratification of signatures.

1. Modification No. 4, Supplemental Agreement to Contract AF 08(635)-1243, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Systems Command, Air Proving Ground Center, Eglin Air Force Base, Florida, extends the period of the contract through January 4, 1963, without additional funds. The investigations of problems concerning ballistics and bombing tables continue in the Military Physics Research Laboratory under the direction of A. E. Lockenvitz, Professor of Physics.

LAUNDRY FEE, COLLEGE OF PHARMACY: At present a laundry fee of \$1.35 is charged for all laboratory courses. The fact that the account has been M-400 % overdrawn at the end of the semester indicates that this fee is insufficient. Accordingly, I concur in the recommendation of the College of Pharmacy that the fee be raised to \$1.75 a semester (\$1.20 for a 12-week summer session and \$0.90 for a 9-week summer term) on the following senior courses, leaving the \$1.35 fee in effect for all other pharmacy courses: Pharmacy 666a and b; Pharmacy 673a and b; Pharmacy 467, and Pharmacy 266K.

Class Teaching

From \$200 to \$250 per semester hour.

These increases will not only enable Extension Division to recruit better instructors, but will be in keeping with its effort to become self-supporting.

In the Degree Plans in Music, two semester hours are added to the degree requirements for Plan I for majors in violin, viola, etc.; for Degree Plan II for music literature majors, the catalogue is corrected changing from fifty-two to forty-nine the semester hours required outside the Department of Music; and Plan I for students majoring in applied music (voice) specifies two new drama courses.

Revision of requirements for Degree Plans in Art, Drama, and Music Education to satisfy the Professional Development, Specialization, and Academic Foundation requirements for the degrees of Bachelor of Fine Arts and Bachelor of Music (Instrumental and Vocal Principal) with provisions for Secondary Certification as set forth in the latest revision by the Texas Education Agency.

For the Degree of Bachelor of Science in History of Art with a Major in the History of Art the number of semester hours in art is reduced from thirty to twenty-four, thereby increasing the elective courses from ten to sixteen semester hours. This will give a more flexible program to students majoring in the History of Art.

2. The Faculty Council on June 9 approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences (D&P 3057, 3058). Mr 4c  $\frac{1}{5}$ 

This legislation changes the requirements in the Department of Classical Languages for a major in Greek by adding a two hour Greek Composition course to make the Greek major parallel to the Latin major; in the Latin major it changes the composition course from elementary to advanced level since the elementary course has been abolished.

The legislation also clarifies the wording for a major in Speech under Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I.

The Chairman introduced a resolution which was read in

#### RESOLUTION

OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF "BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENT HOUSING REVENUE BONDS OF 1961" IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$1,000,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION ON THE CAMPUS OF TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE, EL PASO, TEXAS, OF A NEW DORMITORY FOR MEN STUDENTS AND OF EIGHT NEW STUDENT FAMILY APARTMENT BUILDINGS; MAKING PLEDGES OF REVENUES AND COVENANTS TO ASSURE THE AVAILABILITY AND USE OF SAID REVE-NUES FOR OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE PURPOSES AND TO PAY THE INTEREST ON AND PRINCIPAL OF SAID BONDS; AWARDING THE SALE OF SUCH BONDS; AND CON-TAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE SUBJECT

WHEREAS, the Board of Regents of The University of
Texas is authorized and empowered under the Constitution and
laws of the State of Texas, particularly Article 2909c, Vernon's
Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, to construct, improve, operate
and maintain such buildings and other structures as may be deemed
appropriate by said Board of Regents (hereinafter sometimes referred
to as the "Board"), at Texas Western College, El Paso, Texas, and
to authorize, issue, and sell its bonds for the purpose of paying
the cost of the construction thereof, payable from the net revenues
to be derived from the operation and/or ownership of said buildings
and structures and of other revenue producing buildings and
structures; and

WHEREAS, subject only to the restrictions contained in said Article 2909c, as amended, said Board is given complete discretion in fixing the form, conditions, and details of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed appropriate by the Board and for the good of said Texas Western College that there be constructed on the campus of said College at El Paso, Texas, (A) a new dormitory

for approximately 180 men students and a supervisor, and (B) eight new student family apartment buildings for a total of 60 families, all together with the necessary appurtenant facilities (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Board has approved the total cost, capacity, type, and plans and specifications for the construction of the Project; and

hereby affirmatively determine, as hereinafter provided in this resolution, to issue its single fully registered bond and/or serial coupon bonds registrable as to principal only (hereinafter cometimes referred to as the "Bonds" whether in the form of a single fully registered bond or definitive coupon bearer bonds) in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of paying the cost of the construction of the Project; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and necessary for the good of said Texas Western College that provision be made immediately for the construction of the Project; Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS:

#### Section 1:

APPROVAL OF COST, CAPACITY, ETC., OF PROJECT: That the total cost, capacity, type, and plans and specifications for the construction of the Project have been, and are hereby affirmatively, approved by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas.

#### Section 2:

PURPOSE, AUTHORIZATION, AMOUNT, NAME, AND DATE OF BONDS: That for the purpose of paying the cost of the construction on the campus of Texas Western College, El Paso, Texas, of: UNIT A, a new dormitory for approximately 180 men students and a supervisor, and UNIT B, eight new student family apartment buildings for a total of 60 families, together with necessary appurtenant facilities, there is hereby authorized to be issued the revenue bonds of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,000,000, to be known and designated as "BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENT HOUSING REVENUE BONDS OF 1961", to be dated October 1, 1961, under and in strict conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and particularly Article 2909c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended.

#### Section 3:

REGISTERED BOND AND COUPON BONDS: That said Bonds shall be in the form of a fully registered bond (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Registered Bond") and/or definitive serial coupon bonds registrable as to principal only (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Coupon Bonds"), with the characteristics hereinafter set forth in this Resolution.

# Section 4:

BOND NUMBERS, DENOMINATION, INTEREST, AND MATURITIES OF COUPON BONDS: That the Coupon Bonds issued under the provisions of this Resolution shall be numbered consecutively from 1 to 1000, both inclusive, and shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 each, registrable as to principal only. They shall bear interest per annum from date until paid at the following rates, respectively:

Coupon Bonds Nos. 1 to 45, both incl., 3-1/2%, Coupon Bonds Nos. 46 to 120, both incl., 3%, Coupon Bonds Nos. 121 to 1000, both incl., 3-1/2%,

and such interest shall be evidenced by proper coupons attached to each of such bonds, and shall be payable April 1, 1962, and semi-annually thereafter on the 1st day of October and the 1st day of

April in each year. Said Coupon Bonds shall mature and become due and payable serially on October 1st in each of the years and in the amounts, respectively, as shown in the following schedule, towit:

# Section 5:

PLACES AND MEDIUM OF PAYMENT OF COUPON BONDS: That both principal of and interest on said Coupon Bonds shall be payable, without exchange or collection charges to the owners or holders of said

Coupon Bonds and the interest coupons appurtenant thereto, at the El Paso National Bank, El Paso, Texas, or, at the option of the holder, at The Chase Manhattan Bank, New York, New York (hereinafter sometimer collectively referred to as the "Bank of Payment"), in any coin or currency which, on the respective dates of payment of such principal and interest, is legal tender for the payment of debts due the United States of America. The principal of said Coupon Bonds shall be payable only upon presentation and surrender of said Coupon Bonds as they respectively become due, and interest falling due on and prior to the respective maturity dates of such Coupon Bonds shall be payable only upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons attached to said Coupon Bonds as such interest coupons severally become due.

# Section 6:

OPTION OF PRIOR REDEMPTION OF COUPON BONDS: That Coupon Bonds numbered from 1 to 120, both inclusive, maturing October 1, 1964, to October 1, 1971, both inclusive, shall be non-callable prior to their stated maturities.

Coupon Bonds numbered 788 to 1000, both inclusive, maturing October 1, 1997 to October 1, 2001, both inclusive, shall be callable at the option of the Board prior to the stated maturities thereof, in whole or in part and in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date during the entire life of the Coupon Bond issue, at the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

After, but not until, the Board has exercised its option to redeem all of said Coupons Bonds numbered 788 to 1000, both inclusive, or after all of said Bonds have been retired in any manner, then Coupon Bonds numbered 121 to 787, both inclusive, maturing October 1, 1972 to October 1, 1996, both inclusive, shall be callable

at the option of the Board prior to the stated maturities thereof, in whole or in part and in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date after October 1, 1971, at the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the date of redemption and a premium on each such Bond as follows:

- if redeemed April 1, 1972 to October 1, 1975, both inclusive,
- 2-1/2% if redeemed April 1, 1977 to October 1, 1981, both inclusive,
- 2% if redcemed April 1, 1982 to October 1, 1986, both inclusive,

After, but not until, the Board has exercised its option to call all of said Bonds numbered 788 to 1000, both inclusive, or after all of said Bonds have been retired in any manner, then THE BOARD SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT AND OPTION TO CALL BONDS NUMBERED 121 TO 787, both inclusive, of this issue, maturing October 1, 1972 to October 1, 1996, both inclusive, for redemption prior to maturity, in whole or in part and in inverse numerical order, ON ANY INTEREST PAYMENT DATE AFTER OCTOBER 1, 1971, at the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest to the date of

# Section 3:

The term <u>Coupon Bonds</u> shall mean the serial coupon bonds, registrable as to principal only, of the denomination of \$1,000 each, authorized by this Resolution.

The term <u>Registered Bond</u> shall mean the tingle, fully registered bond, without interest coupons attached, to be initially issued, executed and delivered to the United States Government in lieu of serial coupon bonds, under the provisions of this Resolution.

The term <u>Bond</u> or <u>Bonds</u> shall, where appropriate, mean the Coupon Bonds, the Registered Bond, and/or the annual install-ments of principal due with respect to the Registered Bond.

The term <u>Coupon</u> or <u>Coupons</u> shall mean the interest coupons appurtenant to the Coupon Bonds, and, where appropriate, interest payments due on the Registered Bond.

The term <u>Project</u> shall mean, as heretofore defined in this Resolution, (A) a new dormitory for approximately 180 men students and a supervisor, and (B) eight new student family apartment buildings for a total of 60 families, together with the necessary appurtenant facilities, which dormitory and apartment

The term <u>Current Expenses</u> shall mean all necessary operating expenses, current maintenance charges, expenses of reasonable upkeep and repairs, properly allocated share of charges for insurance and all other expenses incident to the operation of the Project, but excluding depreciation, all general administrative expenses of the University, Board, and College, and the payments into the "Repair and Replacement Reserve" hereinafter provided for.

The term <u>Net Revenues</u> shall mean all gross revenues derived from the operation and/or ownership of the Project and all the services afforded by same, after deduction therefrom only of the Current Expenses.

The term <u>Bank of Payment</u> shall mean collectively the El Paso National Bank, El Paso, Texas, and The Chase Manhattan Bank, New York, New York.

### Section 14:

SECURITY FOR BONDS: That the principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the Net Revenues derived from the operation and/or ownership of the Project, and all the services afforded by the same, and said first lien and pledge are hereby irrevocably created.

### Section 15:

15.01 - BONDS ARE SPECIAL OBLIGATION: That the Bonds and the interest thereon shall constitute special obligations of the Board payable solely from the revenues herein pledged, and such obligations shall not constitute an indebtedness of the Board, the University, the College, or the State of Texas, and the owners or holders of the Bonds and the interest coupons appurtenant thereto

shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation.

15.02 - ADDITIONAL BONDS: That, so long as any of the Bonds or the interest thereon remain outstanding and unpaid, the Board coverants and agrees that it will not issue any additional bonds or obligations of equal or superior dignity payable from the Net Revenues, and that in no event while any of the Bonds are outstanding will the Board mortgage or otherwise encumber the Project, or any part thereof, or dispose of any substantial part thereof.

## Section 16:

16.01 - 1961 REVENUE FUND ACCOUNT: That there is hereby created and ordered to be established at an official depository of the Board (which must be a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation), a special fund and account to be known as the "1961 Revenue Fund Account" (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Revenue Fund"), to be held in the custody of the Board separate and apart from all other funds and accounts. As soon as the Project or any portion thereof becomes revenue-producing, all gross revenues derived from the operation and/or ownership of the Project, and all the services afforded by same, shall be deposited upon receipt by the University to the credit of the Revenue Fund. Current Expenses of the Project shall be payable, as a first charge from moneys in the Revenue Fund, as such Current Expen es become due and payable. After providing for the Current Expenses, moneys in the Revenue Fund shall be used as provided hereafter in this Resolution,

16.02 - 1961 BOND AND INTEREST SINKING FUND ACCOUNT: That there is hereby created and ordered to be established at an official depository of the Board (which must be a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation) a special fund and account to be

known as the "1961 Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account" (hereafter sometimes referred to as the "Bond Fund"), to be maintained separate and apart from all other funds and accounts, and into which Bond Fund there shall be deposited all accrued interest received from the sale of the Bonds. There shall also be deposited into the Bond Fund the payments hereafter provided in this Resolution. The money in the Bond Fund shall be held for the benefit of the owners or holders of the Bonds and the coupons thereto appertaining.

16.03 - REPAIR AND REPLACEMENT RESERVE ACCOUNT: That, as soon as the required reserve is accumulated in the Bond Fund, as hereafter provided in this Resolution, there shall be established at an official depository of the Board (which must be a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation) a special fund and account to be known as the "Repair and Replacement Reserve Account" (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Repair Account"), to be maintained separate and apart from all other funds and accounts. Deposits shall be made into said Repair Account and moneys on deposit in said Repair Account may be used as provided hereafter in this Resolution.

15.04 - SECURITY FOR ACCOUNTS: That moneys in all Funds and Accounts created by this Resolution shall be secured by the pledge of direct obligations of, or obligations unconditionally guaranteed by, the United States Government, in a principal amount at all times not less than the amount of money credited to such Funds and Accounts, respectively.

## Section 17:

FLOW OF FUNDS: (a) That there is hereby appropriated into the Bond Fund from the proceeds of the Bonds and the accrued interest

thereon, and concurrently with the delivery of the Bond to the purchaser, there is hereby ordered to be placed in the Bond Fund all accrued interest and a sum of money which together with such accrued interest shall equal the amount of interest on the Bonds which will accrue during the period of construction of the Project, said period of construction to be determined by the Board's Architect and to be so certified by said Architect. The Board further covenants and agrees that thereafter, as soon as any portion of the Project becomes revenue-producing, it will, after providing for the payment of the Current Expenses of the Project, transfer from the Revenue Fund and deposit to the credit of the Bond Fund, on or before each March 15 and September 15, such balance which, together with the interest for the current interest period chargeable as a project development cost, shall be sufficient to pay the interest on the Bonds as the same becomes due; provided, however, that beginning March 15, 1964, and on each September 15 and March 15 thereafter, the Board covenants and agrees that it will, after providing for the payment of the Current Expenses of the Project, transfer from the Revenue Fund and deposit to the credit of the Bond Fund a sum which is not less than \$32,250. Such sum shall be deposited to the credit of the Bond Fund on or before each March 15 and September 15 until the funds and/or investments accumulated in the Bond Fund are sufficient to meet the interest on the Bonds due on the next interest payment date and one-half of the orincipal due within the succeeding twelve months, plus a debt service reserve in the sum of \$95,500. Thereafter, the Board shall transfer from the Revenue Fund and deposit to the credit of the Bond Fund on or before each March 15 and September 15 only such sums as may be necessary to meet the interest on the Bonds due on the next interest payment date and one-half of the principal due within the succeeding twelve months

and maintain the debt service reserve in the sum of \$95,500. The funds and/or investments thus accumulated in the debt service reserve shall be used in finally retiring the last of the Bonds outstanding, or for paying the principal of and/or interest on the Bonds when and to the extent there are not otherwise sufficient funds in the Bond Fund for such purposes.

- (b) That as soon as the required debt service reserve is accumulated in the Bond Fund, the Board covenants and agrees that it will transfer from the Revenue Fund and deposit to the credit of the Repair Account, on or before the close of each fiscal year, the sum of \$6,000, or such portion thereof as is available for transfer from the Revenue Fund, and such transfers and deposits shall be made annually until the funds and/or investments in the Repair Account shall aggregate \$80,000, and thereafter such sums, but not more than \$8,000 annually, as may be required to restore and maintain the balance of \$80,000. Deposits into the Repair Account shall be subordinate to those to be made into the Bond Fund. The Board shall have the right to draw on and use the moneys in the Repair Account for the purpose of paying the cost of unusual or extraordinary maintenance or repairs, renewals and replacements, and the renovating or replacement of furniture and equipment not paid as part of the ordinary and normal expense of Project operations; provided, however, in the event that the funds and investments in the Bond Fund shall ever be reduced below the debt service reserve of \$95,500, funds on deposit in the Repair Account shall be transferred to the Bond Fund to the extent required to eliminate the deficiency in said Bond Fund.
- (c) That subject to the making of the maximum transfers and deposits, as outlined in (a) and (b) above, the Board may use the excess funds, if any, in the Revenue Fund at the close of each

school term to redeem outstanding Bonds on the next interest payment date, in inverse numerical order and in amounts not less than
\$5,000 par value at any one time, or for any lawful expenditures,
including the payment of debt service, in improving or restoring
any existing housing and dining facilities or providing any such
additional facilities.

(d) That so long as the United States of America,
Housing and Home Finance Administrator, is owner of the Registered
Bond, on or before March 20 and September 20 of each year, it shall
be the duty of the Endowment Officer of the University to cause to
be mailed to said United States of America, Housing and Home Finance
Administrator, at such address as shall be registered with the
Comptroller of the University for such purpose, a check or draft
payable to said United States of America, Housing and Home Finance
Administrator, and drawn on the Bond Fund in an amount sufficient
to pay the interest on and principal installments, if any, of the
Registered Bond as will accrue or mature on the April 1st or October
1st immediately following; provided, that if the Registered Bond is
assigned by the United States of America, then it shall be the duty
of said Endowment Officer to make such funds available at the Bank of
Payment.

That on or before March 20th and September 20th of each year while any of the Coupon Bonds are outstanding and unpaid, it shall be the duty of said Endowment Officer of the University to make available at the Bank of Payment, but only from the Bond Fund, moneys sufficient to pay the interest on and principal, if any, of said Coupon Bonds as will accrue or mature on the April 1st or October 1st immediately following.

## Section 18:

18.01 - INVESTMENT OF MONEYS IN DEBT SERVICE RESERVE AND REPAIR

ACCOUNT: That moneys on deposit to the credit of the debt service

reserve in the Bond Fund and moneys on deposit to the credit of the Ropair Account may, at the option of the Board, be invested in direct obligations of, or obligations the principal of and interest on which are guaranteed by, the United States of America. The investments of such moneys shall be valued in terms of current market value as of June 30th and December 31st of each year. Such obligations shall be held subject to the same lien as the moneys with which they were purchased and shall be sold when so ordered by the Board, and the Board shall in all events order such sale when necessary to prevent default in connection with the Bonds. All moneys collected on such sales or at maturity shall be deposited in the Fund or Account for which such obligations were purchased. If a loss be incurred on any sale, the Board covenants to deposit immediately into the appropriate Fund or Account moneys available therefor sufficient to offset such loss.

18.02 - NO FURTHER PAYMENTS INTO BOND FUND: That whenever the total amount of funds and/or investments in the Bond Fund shall be equivalent to (1) the aggregate principal amount of Bonds then outstanding, plus (2) the aggregate amount of all unpaid coupons thereto appertaining, matured and unmatured, no further deposits or payments need be made into the Bond Fund. In determining, the amount of Bonds then outstanding, there shall be subtracted the amount of Bonds which shall have been duly called for redemption and for which funds shall have been deposited with the Bunk of Payment sufficient for such redemption.

### Section 19:

<u>SPECIFIC COVENANTS</u>: That the Board further covenants and agrees that:

(a) It will faithfully perform at all times any and all covenants, undertakings, stupulations, and provisions contained in

- (b) The Board is duly authorized under the laws of the State of Texas to create and issue the Bonds, that all action on its part for the creation and issuance of the Bonds has been duly, lawfully, and effectively taken, and that the Bonds in the hands of the owners and holders thereof will be valid and enforceable special obligations of the Board in accordance with the terms of such Bonds and in accordance with the terms of the Bonds and in accordance with the terms of
- (c) It lawfully owns and is lawfully possessed of the land upon which the Project is to be constructed, and has a good and indefeasible estate in such land in fee simple, that the Project will be constructed and completed in accordance with the plans heretofore approved and adopted, that it warrants that it has, and will defend, the title to the Project and every part thereof and the improvements thereon, for the benefit of the owners and holders of the Bonds against claims and demands of all persons whomscever; and that it is lawfully qualified to pledge the Net Revenues of the Project in the manner prescribed herein, and has lawfully exercised such right.
- (d) It will from time to time, and before the same become delinquent, pay and discharge all taxes, assessments, and governmental charges, if any, which shall lawfully be imposed upon it, or upon the Project, that it will pay all lawful claims for

rents, royalties, labor, materials, and supplies, which, if unpaid, might by law become a lien or charge upon the Project, or any part of it, the lien of which would be prior to or interfere with the lien hereof, so that priority of the lien granted hereunder shall be fully preserved in the manner provided herein, and that it will not create or suffer to be created any mechanic's, laborer's, materialman's, or other lien or charge which might or could be prior to the lien hereof, or do or suffer any matter or thing whereby the lien hereof might or could be impaired; provided, however, that no such tax, assessment, or charge, and that no such claim which might be used as the basis of a mechanic's, laborer's, materialman's, or other lien or charge, shall be required to be paid so long as the validity of the same shall be contested in good faith by the Board.

- (e) It will not do or suffer any act or thing whereby the Project, or any part thereof, might or could be impaired, and that it will at all times maintain, preserve, and keep the real and tangible property of the Project and the facilities and parts thereof in good condition, repair, and working order, and will maintain, preserve, and keep all the structures and equipment pertaining thereto and every part and parcel thereof in good condition, repair, and working order.
- (f) While any part of the principal of or interest on any of the Bonds is outstanding and unpaid, it will operate and maintain continuously the Project and all the services afforded by came.
- (g) It will establish and maintain so long as any of the Bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, rental rates and charges for the use of the Project as may be necessary to pay the Current Expenses thereof and to provide sufficient money for debt services.

and all other required payments, charges, and reserves. Reference is made to the resolution adopted by the Board concurrently with the adoption of this Resolution, establishing initially rental rates and charges. The Board will do all things necessary to enforce the provisions of such resolution, assuming the obligation to amend such resolution from tame to time to render it fully efficient.

(h) It will establish and maintain so long as any of the Bonds remain outstanding such parietal and other rules, for the use of the Project, as may be necessary to assure maximum occupancy and use of the same and all of the facilities and servaces afforded thereby. Reference is made to the resolution adopted by the Board concurrently with the adoption of this Resolution, establishing initially parietal rules. The Board will do all things necessary to enforce the provisions of such resolution, assuming the obligation to amend such resolution from time to time to render it fully effectave.

### (i) With respect to insurance:

(1) Upon acceptance of the Project from the contractor or occupancy thereof, whichever is the first to occur, the Board will procure boiler explosion insurance on all steam boilers servicing the Project in an amount not less than \$50,000 against loss suffered by reason of a boiler explosion. Upon such acceptance or occupany, the Board will, if such insurance is not already in force, procure fire and extended coverage insurance on the Project. The foregoing boiler explosion and fire and extended coverage insurance shall be maintained to long as any of the Bonds is outstanding. Such fire and extended coverage insurance shall be in amounts at least sufficient to provide for full recovery on

each building and the contents thereof whonever a loss from perils insured against does not exceed 30% of the full insurable value thereof. Such insurance shall be carried with a reliable insurance company or companies, and the premiums on such insurance shall be paid as an expense of operation of the respective buildings

- (2) Upon the happening of any loss or damage covered by any such policies from one or more of the causes to which reference is made in thit Section, the Board shall make due proof of loss and shall do all things necessary or desirable to cause the insurance companies to make payment in full directly to the Board.
- such property, shall be used forthwith by the Board for the purpose of repairing the property damaged or replacing the property destroyed, and any insurance proceeds remaining upon the completion of such repairs or replacements shall be deposited in the Bond Fund. If the funds received from said insurance policies on account of any loss shall be insufficient to make the building or buildings, or things insured, suffering such loss tenantable or useful, then the Board shall hold said funds for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds and coupons as their respective interests may appear.
- (4) Immediately upon occupancy of the Project, and at all times thereafter when the aggregate amount of funds and/or investments in the Bond Fund are not adequate for meeting the then year's debt service on the Bonds plus the debt service reserve of \$95,500, the Board shall procure and maintain use and occupancy insurance on the Project in an amount sufficient to enable the Board to deposit in the Bond Fund, out of the proceeds of such insurance, an amount equal to the sum that normally would have been available for deposit in the Bond Fund from the revenues

of the damaged building during the time that the damaged building is non-revenue-producing as a result of the loss of use or occupancy caused by the perils covered by fire and extended coverage insurance. Premiums on such insurance shall be paid as an expense of operation of the respective buildings.

- (5) It will, on or before September 1, 1963, and on or before September 1 of each year thereafter, file with the original purchaser or purchasers of the Bonds a certificate signed and verified by an official of the University stating that the Board has complied with the requirements of this Section 19 with respect to the maintenance of insurance, together with the name of each insurance company and the effective dates and numbers of the insurance policies concerned.
- (j) Proper books of records and accounts will be kept in which full, true, and correct entries will be made of all dealings or transactions in relation to the Project, and all books, documents, and vouchers relating to the properties, business, and affairs of the Project shall at all reasonable times be made available for inspection by the holders of the Bonds and their agents or representatives.
- (k) The Board shall furnish to any holder of any of the Bonds, on the written request of such holder and not later than ninety (90) days after the close of each fiscal year, complete operating and income statements of the Project in reasonable detail covering such period, the same certified by the proper State Auditing Official.

### Section 20:

PROJECT CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNT: That there is hereby created, and the Board shall establish with an official depository of the Board

(which must be a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation), a separate account (herein called the "Project Construction Account") into which shall be deposited all of the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds, exclusive of accrued interest received and the interest during construction appropriated pursuant to Section 17 of this Resolution. Moneys in the Project Construction Account shall be expended by the Board only for paying the cost of construction of the Project as shall have been previously specified in a signed certificate of purposes filed with and approved by a representative of the Administrator, Housing and Home Finance Agency. All moneys remaining in the Project Construction Account after final completion of the Project shall be promptly used for the redemption of Bonds; provided, however, any of such amounts less than \$1,000 shall be deposited in the Bond Fund.

### Section 21:

21.01 - CHARGES OF BANK OF PAYMENT: That the Board further covenants and agrees that all charges made by the Bank of Payment for the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds will be paid by the Board as a maintenance and operation expense and will not be required to be paid by the helders of the Bonds and/or coupons.

21.02 - CANCELLED BONDS AND COUPONS: That all Bonds and coupons, when paid, shall be cancelled by the Bank of Payment and shall be delivered to or upon the order of the Board.

## Section 22:

SALE OF BONDS: (a) That the offer of First Southwest Company,
Dallas, Texas, to purchase the first maturing \$120,000 of the Bonds
at a price of par and accrued interest to the date of delivery,
plus a cash premium of \$48, constitutes the best and highest bid

received by the Board for such Bonds; that the sale of said \$120,000 of Bonds to said First Southwest Company, in accordance with the terms of the offer made and by this Board duly accepted, is hereby confirmed; and that the Chairman and Secretary of the Board are hereby authorized, directed, and instructed to do all things necessary to deliver Coupon Bonds numbered 1 to 120, both inclusive, in the total principal amount of \$120,000, to said First Southwest Company.

(b) That the offer of the United States of America to purchase the \$880,000 balance of Bonds at a price of par and accrued interest to date of delivery constitutes the highest and best bid received by the Board for such Bonds; that the sale of said \$880,000 of Bonds to the United States of America, in accordance with the terms of the offer and by this Board duly accepted, is hereby confirmed; and that the Chairman and Secretary of the Board are hereby authorized, directed, and instructed to do all things necessary to deliver to the United States of America initially, in lieu of Coupon Bonds numbered 121 to 1000, both inclusive, a single, fully Registered Bond in the principal amount or denomination of \$880,000, as provided in this Resolution.

### Section 23:

APPROVAL AND REGISTRATION OF BONDS BY STATE OFFICERS: That after said Bonds shall have been executed, it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the Board or some other officer of the Board acting under the authority of the Chairman to deliver said Bonds to the Attorney General of the State of Texas for examination and approval, and, after such approval, to deliver the same to the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas for registration. Upon the registration of said Bonds, the Comptroller of Public Accounts

of the State of Texas (or a deputy designated in writing to act for said Comptroller of Public Accounts) shall manually sign the Comptroller's certificate of registration prescribed herein to be printed on the back of each Bond, and the seal of said Comptroller of Public Accounts shall be affixed to each of said Bonds.

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas convened in regular session on the 5th day of October, 1962, in Austin, Texas, with the following members and officers of said Board present, to wit:

and the following member(s) absent, to-wit: none constituting a quorum of said Board of Regents, at which meeting the following, among other business, was transacted, to-wit:

The Chairman introduced a resolution which was read in full by the Secretary. Regent Robertson made a motion that the resolution be adopted as read. Regent Heath seconded the motion for adoption of the resolution. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution, prevailed by the following vote:

The Chairman thereupon announced that the motion had duly and lawfully carried, and that the resolution had been duly and lawfully adopted. The resolution thus adopted follows:

#### RESOLUTION

OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS COVENANTING AND AGREEING TO ESTABLISH AND ENFORCE SUCH PARIETAL RULES AND REGULATIONS AS WILL ASSURE MAXIMUM OCCUPANCY
OF THE FACILITIES AND SERVICES TO BE AFFORDED BY THE DORMITORY AND STUDENT FAMILY APARTMENT BUILDINGS TO BE CONSTRUCTED ON THE CAMPUS OF TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE, EL PASO,
TEXAS, WITH THE PROCEEDS OF THE \$1,000,000 "BOARD OF
REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE
OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENT HOUSING REVENUE BONDS
OF 1961"; AND CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING THERETO

WHEREAS, concurrently with the adoption of this Resolution. the Board of Regents of The University of Texas (said Board of Regents being hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Board") has adopted a Resolution authorizing the issuance of its single fully registered bond and/or serial coupon bonds (hereinafter referred to as the "Bonds") in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,000,000, for the purpose of constructing on the campus of Texas Western College. El Paso, Texas: UNIT A, a new dormitory for approximately 180 men students and a supervisor, and UNIT B, eight new student family apartment buildings for a total of 60 families, together with the necessary appurtenant facilities (hereinafter referred to as the "Project"), such Bonds being known and designated as "BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENT HOUSING REVENUE BONDS OF 1961", dated October 1, 1961, and secured by and payable from a first lien on and pledge of the net revenues to be derived from the operation and/or ownership of the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Board is authorized to enter into agreements relating to the maintenance of a maximum percentage of occupancy and use of the facilities of the Project, the net revenues of which have been pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on said Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board has covenanted and agreed that it will at all times while any part of the principal of or interest on said Bonds is outstanding and unpaid, establish and maintain such parietal rules and regulations for the aforesaid Project as are necessary to assure maximum occupancy and use of the facilities

and services of the Project; Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS:

Section 1: That the Board hereby establishes and covenants to enforce so long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Bonds is outstanding and unpaid, these parietal rules and regulations, which will assure maximum occupancy and use of the facilities and services afforded by the Project.

Section 2: That in the event more space should become available for dormitory and housing purposes than is required by the students applying for such space, the administrative officers of The University of Texas and of Texas Western College are hereby authorized and directed to give preference and priority to the use of the Project, even if such preference and priority results in the non-use of all or part of other space available at said Texas Western College for dormitory or housing purposes.

Section 3: That to the extent any surplus space shall become available in the Project while any part of the principal of or interest on the Bonds is outstanding and unpaid, it shall be the duty of the administrative officers of The University of Texas and of Texas Western College to enforce a rule requiring occupancy and use, to the extent practicable, of said Project by students attending said Texas Western College, and this provision shall be considered as a rule for the guidance of said administrative officers.

Section 4: That the administrative officers of The University of Texas and of Texas Western College are hereby directed to utilize and cause the utilization of the facilities and services afforded by the Project in such manner as will yield the maximum revenues of which it is reasonably capable to the end that the Bonds may be adequately serviced.

Section 5: That such rules shall be amended from time to time as the occasions arise so as to meet changing conditions, better to assure the fulfillment of this pledge.

Section 6: That notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Resolution, it is specifically provided that the parietal rules set forth herein shall be subordinate to all valid parietal rules heretofore adopted by the Board in connection with the issuance of any revenue bonds of the Board insofar as there may be any conflict, except that the parietal rules set forth herein shall confer a priority as to maximum use and occupancy of the facilities and services of the Project ahead of the use and occupancy of any similar facilities and services hereafter constructed or otherwise acquired by the Board at Texas Western College, whether financed through the issuance of additional parity bonds under any Bond Resolution heretomore adopted, or otherwise.

#### RESOLUTION

OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS FIXING REASONABLE AND ADEQUATE RATES TO BE CHARGED FOR THE FACILITIES AND SERVICES AFFORDED BY THE NEW DORMITORY AND STUDENT FAMILY APARTMENT BUILDINGS TO BE CONSTRUCTED ON THE CAMPUS OF THE TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE, EL PASO, TEXAS, WITH THE PROCEEDS OF THE \$1,000,000 "BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENT HOUSING REVENUE BONDS OF 1961"; AND CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING THERETO

WHEREAS, concurrently with the adoption of this Resolution, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas (said Board of Regents being here-inafter sometimes referred to as the "Board") has adopted a Resolution authorizing the issuance of its single fully registered bond and/or serial coupon bonds (hereinafter referred to as the "Bonds") in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,000,000, for the purpose of constructing on the campus of Texas Western College, El Paso, Texas. UNIT A, a new dormitory for approximately 180 men students and a supervisor, and UNIT B, eight new student family apartment buildings for a total of 60 families, together with the necessary appurtenant facilities (hereinafter referred to as the "Project"), such Bonds being known and designated as "BOARD OF RECENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENT HOUSING REVENUE BONDS OF 1961", dated October 1, 1961; and secured by and payable from a first lien on and pledge of the net revenues to be derived from the operation and/or ownership of the Project; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate and proper that before the actual issuance and delivery of the Bonds, the Board adopt a Resolution which fixes reasonable and adequate rates to be charged for the facilities and services to be afforded by the Project; Therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS:

Section 1: That the following rates to be charged for the facilities and services to be afforded by the Project are hereby fixed and established as follows, to-wit:

### PROJECT DORMITORY:

<sup>\$120.00</sup> per student per fall semester 120.00 per student per spring semester 45.00 per student per summer term

### PROJECT STUDENT FAMILY APARTMENT BUILDINGS:

\$75,00 per apartment per month

Section 2: That the rates thus fixed in Section 1 of this Resolution are in amounts deemed to be reasonable and adequate by the Board, taking into consideration the cost of providing said facilities and services, the use to be made of them, and the advantages to be derived therefrom by the users thereof and by The University of Texas and Texas Western College. Such rates shall remain in force and effect unless changed by order of the Board, which reserves the right and has covenanted to alter or revise such rates as and when considered by it to be necessary to make the payments that it has covenanted to make in the Resolution authorizing the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 3: That the administrative officers of The University of Texas and of Texas Western College, El Paso, Texas, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary and/or convenient to carry out and accomplish the purposes of this Resolution.
