Mrs. Devall and Gentlemen:

The dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents in Austin on November 13 and 14, 1959:

Main University Texas Western College Medical Branch Dental Branch M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute Southwestern Medical School Postgraduate School of Medicine

Listed below are Central Administration items which I recommend be approved.

#### 1959-60 Budget

Development Board

1. Accept the resignation of Mr. Hulon W. Black, Executive Director, effective at close of business, November 15, 1959. (5014)

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE - INCREASE IN PHYSICIAN'S FEE: The rate of \$3.00 to the physician giving a Workmen's Compensation Insurance physical examination to University employees was set by the Regents at the December meeting in 1951. During recent years it has been increasingly difficult to find doctors who are willing to give physical examinations according to University standards for this amount. It has been learned that the Texas Highway Department and A. and M. College are increasing their fee from \$3.00 to \$5.00 on or about November 1, 1959. In line with this trend, Mr. Joseph C. Culver, Director of Workmen's Compensation Insurance Office, recommends, and Vice-President Dolley and Comptroller Sparenberg concur, that the University fee to examining physicians be increased from \$3.00 to \$5.00, effective November 1, 1959.

Based on the 3072 physicals given during the 1958-59 fiscal year, this proposed change in the fee would have meant an additional expenditure of \$6,144. The physical examination account in the budget for 1959-60 is based on an estimated 3,200 physicals to be given. Accordingly, if the above increase is approved, it is further recommended that an additional \$5,400 to cover this increase in rate be transferred from Account No. 9980, Unallotted Balance, to Account No. 99020, Physical Examinations, both in the budget for the Office of Workmen's Compensation Insurance. RENTAL OF SFACE FOR UNIVERSITY LANDS, GEOLOGY: Mr. C. H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, has submitted the following:

"On the basis of appropriate requisition and approval by Dr. Dolley, Mr. Stewart, and the undersigned, the State Board of Control has made an award of lease for space and drawn up a rental agreement as follows:

Rental agreement between The University of Texas and Patio Building, Inc., covering approximately 2,203.8 square feet of floor space located at 308 North Colorado Street, Midland, Texas, to be used as the offices of University Lands, Geology, for the two-year period beginning September 1, 1959, at a monthly rental rate of \$877.77.

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<u>Rental of Space for University Lands, Geology</u> (continued) In accordance with delegation of authority to me by the Board of Regents for signature of lease agreements, this lease has been signed and returned to the State Board of Control for final approval. It is recommended that my action in executing this lease agreement be ratified by the Board of Regents."

EMPLOYMENT OF FAY E. POWELL AS CLERK-OF-THE-WORKS FOR THE ADDITION TO THE CHEMISTRY BUILDING, MAIN UNIVERSITY: Under the provisions of the Appropriation Bill and also in accordance with the University's contract with Preston Green, Associate Architect for the Addition to the Chemistry Building at the Main University, it is provided that "when continuous full-time field supervision is deemed necessary by the Owner, such supervisory personnel shall be furnished by the Owner subject to approval by the Associate Architect and the Consulting Architect. The cost of such supervisory personnel shall be paid for by the Owner." It is agreed by all concerned that a clerk-of-the-works is necessary throughout the course of construction of the Addition to the Chemistry Building, the employment and payment to be paid directly by the University.

In order to provide funds for payment of a salary, Social Security thereon, and Workmen's Compensation Insurance for this position, an account for Architectural Supervision for the Addition to the Chemistry Building has been set up on the books in the amount of 1% of the total construction contracts. This account was set up on the basis of the contract with the Associate Architect which calls for a fee of 4%, with the understanding that 1% will be spent for the salary, etc., of a clerk-of-the-works, and that if this full 1% is not used for this purpose, the balance will be paid to the Associate Architect.

Mr. Sparenberg, Comptroller, recommends, with the approval of Dr. Dolley, Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs, that Mr. Fay E. Powell of Austin be employed on a month-to-month basis, effective October 12, 1959, at a monthly salary of \$541.67, to be paid from the account for Architectural Supervision for the Addition to the Chemistry Building, the employment to continue until further notice from the Office of the Comptroller.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - COMPUTATION CENTER: SALARY INCREASE OF OVER \$1,000 PEA YEAR: Mr. Loyd Dreher is presently classified (in the Computation Center) as Research Scientist II at \$4,584 for twelve months. Mr. Dreher has received an offer from the State Comptroller's Office for a position as a programmer at an annual salary of \$6,600. According to Mr. David M. Young, Jr., Director of the Computation Center, Mr. Dreher is the only full-time programmer on the staff, and is the only person who has had extensive programming experience with the I.B.M. 650 Computer. Mr. Clifton Lancaster, Acting Director of Classified Personnel, has found that other state departments pay Programmers in excess of \$500 per month, and plans to make a study of this classification in the near future. To meet the present situation, Dr. Ransom recommends, and I approve, that Mr. Loyd Dreher be reclassified as Computer Programmer II at \$6,168 for twelve months, effective October 1, 1959, additional amount to come from funds allocated to Computation Center. Since the increase is in excess of \$1,000 per year, the change cannot become effective until the Board has approved.

ABSENCES IN EXCESS OF TWO WEEKS: I recommend approval of the following absences in excess of two weeks:

1. M. J. Grove, Senior Security Analyst, to be away from the campus November 25 - December 15, 1959, to attend research conferences sponsored by Smith Barney & Company on Wednesday, December 2, 1959, and to have research conferences with other pension and trust funds managers and with other dealers in New York City, his expenses to be paid from Account 89171, Office Clerical Assistants and Traveling Expenses of the Endowment Office. 2. W. Gordon Whaley, Dean of the Graduate School, to Chicago, Illinois, to discuss staffing and equipment problems of the joint Department of Astronomy with the administrative officials of the University of Chicago; to Bloomington, Indiana, to consult with members of the National Academy of Science concerning graduate programs in science at The University of Texas; to New York City to pursue a part of The University of Texas research program at Columbia University; to Washington, D. C., to discuss the support of programs in science at The University of Texas with members of the National Science Foundation; to Louisville, Kentucky, to represent the Graduate School of The University of Texas at the meeting of Conference of Deans of Southern Graduate Schools, during the period November 15 - December 1, 1959, his expenses to be paid from Office & Traveling Expense of the Dean of the Graduate School.

3. Rex E. Gerald, Curator of Museum, Texas Western College, to Mexico City, Mexico, to present a paper at The American Anthropological Association Meeting and to visit museums and archaeological sites en route, during the period December 19, 1959 - January 3, 1960, his expenses to be paid from Maintenance & Equipment Account of the El Paso Centennial Museum.

<u>1959-60 Budget</u> <u>Texas Western College</u> <u>Office of the President</u> 1. Reinstate \$900.00 of Cotton Estate Funds as salary supplementation to Doctor Joseph R. Smiley, President of Texas Western College, to maintain the same annual total from current restricted funds paid in 1958-59.

Navy Purchasing Office, signed by Mr. Lanier Cox, Vice-President for Administrative Services, whereby the University will furnish educational instruction and such other services and materials as may be necessary to carry out the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps program, and to train commissioned officers of the regular Navy entitled to training under the so-called "Five-Term Program." The term of the contract is July 1, 1959 until June 30, 1960, and the total contract price is \$30,000.

3. Memorandum of Agreement with the Saudi Arabian Ministry of Education,  $M_{-5}L^{0C}$  signed by Vice-President and Provost H. H. Ransom, whereby the University  $M_{-5}L^{0C}$  will furnish a program for approximately twenty-one Saudi Arabian students in petroleum engineering and related fields, designed to familiarize them with the U. S. system of education, to offer intensive instruction in the English language, and to prepare them for degree programs in the specified fields, for which the University will receive \$600 per semester per student enrolled. SOUTHERN UNION GAS COMPANY - RATE INCREASE FOR FUEL PURCHASED: Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager, has submitted the following in regard to the agreement with Southern Union:  $M_{-}LOb$ 

"Since our Budget was prepared, we have signed our Gas Agreement with Southern Union Gas Company for the 1959-61 biennium. The new rate is 23¢ per mcf whereas our old rate was approximately 19¢ per mcf. On the basis of the 12 months' consumption for the period ending June 30, 1959, the University paid \$191,894.77 for fuel. For this same period applying the 23¢ rate, our fuel bill would amount to \$233,537.17. Therefore, during this period the rate now effective would have increased the amount paid by \$41,642.40.

"The budgeted figure of \$205,000 in the 1959-60 Budget for fuel anticipated an increased consumption of fuel over last year but did not include an allowance for the increased rate. It will, therefore, be necessary to have an additional appropriation of \$40,000 to this item in the Main University Budget to pay the fuel bills during 1959-60."

In accordance with the above, I recommend approval of his request to appropriate \$40,000 from the Available University Fund Unappropriated Balance to the Main University 1959-60 General Budget division of Physical Plant, Department of Utilities Account No. 26860 - Fuel.

MISCELLANEOUS POSTAGE EXPENSE ACCOUNT - MAIN UNIVERSITY - ESTABLISHMENT: From a survey of postage charges to departments by the Stenographic Bureau, it appears that by far the greatest number of monthly charges are for those from 1¢ to 25¢. Mr. Grady Starnes, Auditor, recommends, and I concur, that all daily postage expenses of twenty-five cents or less be charged directly to a Miscellaneous Postage Expense account instead of being charged to individual departments, thus eliminating a number of additional clerical operations. This procedure will not, of course, constitute additional postage expense, but simply collect in one area the minor charges that are now being distributed to departments. The amount estimated to be needed is \$1,500, and I recommend that this be appropriated from Main University Unallocated Maintenance and Equipment to establish a Miscellaneous Postage Expense Account. (5036)

#### Reasons for Changes

Change 1. For several years the course in Brief Writing and Oral Argument has been offered as an optional course for first year students. Because of the practical aspects of this training, the faculty feels that it should be required of all first year students.

<u>Change 2</u>. This change is necessary because of the addition of the Perspective Group.

<u>Change 3.</u> This change is made because the requirement is for one course only in the Perspective Group. The faculty feels that since courses in this group are designed to better prepare the student for all of his work in the Law School, the classroom procedure is best.

<u>Change 4</u>. One of the major aims underlying the addition of this group of courses (including the taking International Law out of the General Group and placing it here) is to enable the student to bring a broader, more sophisticated, and mature process of legal analysis to bear upon the study of law remaining to him in Law School. An additional aim is to provide the student with a broader background relative to all fields of the law.

<u>Change 5.</u> Although the subject matter of Damages and Remedies is not clearly all in the Procedural Field, nor all in the General Field, it is felt that they more properly belong in the Procedural Field. Since much of the material covered in these courses is the same, it is felt that the student should be allowed credit in only one of them.

Change 6. Water Law is more properly part of the Property Field than the General.

<u>Change 7.</u> Since Employees' Rights deals with the Texas Workmans' Compensation Act and the Federal Employers' Liability Act, it should be in the Public Law Field.

Change 8. International Law has been moved to the new Perspective Group. See the reason given in Change 4.

<u>Change 9.</u> Legal Accounting is required of all students who have not had six hours of Pre-Law Accounting. The faculty feels that Legal Accounting should not count toward fulfillment of the field requirements.

<u>Change 10</u>. With the addition of Perspective Group and its requirement of three hours, and since several courses have been taken out of the General Group, the requirements should be reduced.

The description of the new courses will be sent to the Registrar's office in the near future.


