

Establishment of Lora Lee Pederson Scholarship Fund: The Alumni Association of the School of Social Work in observance of the School's tenth anniversary voted at the April 1960 meeting "that the Alumni Association would raise \$1,000 by October, as a recognition gift for Miss Pederson, half to be designated for current needs and half as a nucleus for a scholarship trust fund bearing M. 66356 Miss Pederson's name." The research and development of a prototype model of an acoustic attenuator continues at the Defense Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.
- 13. Contract NBy-32192, by which the United States Naval Civil Engineering Laboratory, Port Hueneme, California, provides \$26,000.00 for support of a study entitled "Analysis of Data Concerning Lateral Thrust on Piles." The contract is effective for the period June 30, 1960 through June 29, 1961, and the study will be performed under the direction of Hudson Matlock and Lymon C. Reese, Associate Professors, Department of Civil Engineering.
- 14. Modification No. 9, Supplemental Agreement to Contract AT(29-2)-621, by which the United States Atomic Energy Commission, Albuquerque, New Mexico, adds \$28,000.00 to the contract funds, expands the scope of the Work, and extends the period of the contract through September 15, 1961. Pursuant to the authorization given to the Business Manager of the Main University at the September Board meeting, I am proceeding to execute contracts with the successful bidders. I feel that the bids received are very favorable to the University.

4-16 FACULTY LEGISLATION: I recommend approval of the following legislation passed by the General Faculty and/or Faculty Council:

- 1. The Faculty Council at its meeting of September 19, 1960, approved delegation of authority to approve 1960-61 degree candidates to the respective deans. (D&P 2847)
- 2. The Faculty Council on November 4, 1960, approved by the circularization M 40procedure the recommendations of the College of Fine Arts to make changes in M the history of art requirements and in the church music curriculum. (D&P 2858-59).

The history of art legislation mainly increases the number of semester hours of advanced art history, and the reasons given for the changes are as follows:

- (a) A reduced emphasis on survey instruction in that area, and a one year concentration with maximum content.
- (b) An increased emphasis on upper division instruction in which greater depth of information may be presented.
- (c) An attempt to assist in the transfer of students from other approved curricula either here or elsewhere.

The church music change increases the semester hours required in church music courses from thirteen to seventeen and is recommended in accordance with the requirements of the National Association of Schools of Music.

ACADEMIC TITLES FOR RADIO-TELEVISION STAFF: Since the academic portion of Radio-Television has now been moved to the Department of Speech in the College of Arts and Sciences, the academic titles of Radio-Television staff will be identified with the Department of Speech as Professor of Speech, Associate or Assistant Professor of Speech, Instructor or Lecturer in Speech as the case may be, with no reference to Radio-Television as part of the academic title.

MEZES COMMITTEE DONATIONS: The Mezes Faculty Donation Committee has made two \$300 awards to staff members whose names may be reported in executive session of the Board meeting.

CHARLES DONNELL RICE SCHOLARSHIP IN MATHEMATICS: In 1945 the late Professor Albert E. Cooper made a gift of a \$1,000 Pennsylvania Railroad Company bond to establish a scholarship fund in honor of Frofessor C. D. Rice, which the Board of Regents accepted at its April 27, 1945 meeting. The scholarship was to be paid from interest on bond, any unused interest to be added to the endowment. Dr. Cooper gave additional funds from time to time to be added to the interest to make the awards. Before his death, Dr. Cooper talked with Mr. W. W. Stewart, Endowment Officer, about some changes in the terms of the scholarship and in the procedures for handling. Mr. Cooper suggested the following changes:

- Change the name to "The Charles Donnell Rice Scholarship in Mathematics" to conform to present course and department terminology. (The original title was "in Applied Mathematics." The Loans and Scholarship Bulletin has been using the recommended title since the combination of the two mathematics departments into one, but other records should be changed.)
- 2. Change the preference for qualification for the scholarship to a student who has "completed in residence at The University of Texas at least six semester hours of Mathematics with a minimum grade average of "B", thus removing "Applied" and "above the freshman level."

Mr. Stewart suggests the following changes in addition to those above:

- 1. Change the provision for the appointment of a fiscal agent to a provision that the Board of Regents as Trustee of the fund will handle it according to its policies and procedures for similar trust funds.
- 2. Change the Committee of Award to the Chairman of the Department of Mathematics and two other faculty members of the department, or as Dr. Guy (Chairman) may recommend.

Mr. Stewart states that he has served without authority on the Committee, due to the fact that his predecessor had so served. Dr. Cooper had told him that he had provided for the Comptroller to be a member of the Committee so as to have someone connected with the investment of the fund, but Mr. Stewart believes that Dr. Cooper agreed that it is not necessary under our present organization. Mr. Stewart suggested that the scholarships be administered through the University Loans and Scholarships Office, but Dr. Cooper preferred that the committee for this scholarship be continued with some, if not all, membership from the Department of Mathematics.

I recommend approval of the changes set out above.

#### EXPLANATION OF CHANGES IN CLASSIFICATION AND PAY PLAN:

Humanities Research Associate group. When the Humanities research series was created, there was a need only for two classes for undergraduates (Humanities Research Assistants I and II), and one for graduates at the BA and MA level (Humanities Research Associate). There is now need to appoint a graduate student in the last year of his doctoral work, at which level he should be paid at a rate comparable to the top level of Teaching Assistant. This conforms to the research group classifications in other areas -- social sciences and physical sciences and engineering.

Slide Librarian and Film Analyst: These two titles were added to describe the duties to be performed by the appointees, the former in the Department of Art, the latter in Defense Research Laboratory. When requests for appointments were made, the Personnel Office made thorough audits and felt that new classifications were necessary to cover more adequately the work to be undertaken.

Explanation of Changes in Classification and Pay Flan (continued)

Accounting Group Supervisor, Furniture Upholsterer, and Furniture Repairman and Refinisher. In auditing the positions in the Classified Pay Plan, it was felt that an additional supervisory classification was needed in the Accounting Division, and in auditing the position of Maintenance Man (Furniture) it was decided that the two new titles in regard to furniture work were required.

Radio-Television positions. In order that Radio-Television might compete with what appears to be a salary pattern based on experience and longevity, and to reduce turnover resulting from technicians trained by Radio-TV being able to command salaries in outside employment in excess of those paid here, an "In-Training" pay schedule has been developed. In this connection it appears that the duties performed in management of radio facilities and in management of television facilities should be designated and clarified by the use of the above titles to indicate the job content in each position. The adjustments in duties, requirements, and responsibilities of these two jobs necessitated a change in salary range for each of them.

Cartographer. A survey was made of comparable positions off the campus, and the increase in rates is desirable to meet competition.

APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTOR FOR BUREAU OF ECONOMIC GEOLOGY: I recommend that Dr. Peter T. Flawn, Research Scientist V, Bureau of Economic Geology, at \$10,020 for twelve months, be made Director (vice Dr. Lonsdale, deceased) at an annual salary of \$12,500, effective December 1, 1960, additional funds to come from unused salary of Dr. Lonsdale. (RBC 330)

Dr. Flawn has a Ph.D. from Yale University and has been on the staff of the Bureau since July 1, 1949. He has been serving as Acting Director of the Bureau since the death of Dr. Lonsdale on October 5, 1960. This recommendation is made after a series of conferences with the men in the Bureau, the members of the Budget Council of the Department of Geology, and representative men in the field of Geology outside the academic area.

The Board of Regents at the September meeting authorized Business Manager St. Clair to call for bids and award a contract to the low bidder, but all bids exceeded the \$16,000 allocated by the Appropriation Bill for this work. After revision of specifications, it is believed that an additional \$3,800 will take care of the necessary repairs and replacements. (91)

15. Appropriate \$1,200.11 from the National Defense Student Loan Fund - Frank B. Cotton Trust as Texas Western College's matching contribution. A second contribution of \$10,801.00 has been received from the Federal Government and Texas Western College's contribution is one-minth of this amount. (86)

Suspension of the Nepotism Rule

16. Mr. Jim H. Powell is the Manager of the Snack Bar and Recreation Room, Auxiliary Enterprise Activities carried on in the Student Union Building. He draws an annual salary of \$7,056.00. His wife, Mrs. Jannie P. Powell, is a clerk in the



Snack Bar and draws an annual salary of \$3,072.00. They both were initially appointed on September 1, 1959. Mrs. Powell works at least 54 hours a week and Mr. Powell works many more hours than that. Mrs. Powell receives no compensatory time or additional compensation for overtime. In sum, these two people serve as proprietors of the Snack Bar, in effect. They do an excellent job and the administration at Texas Western College believe that the interest of the College will be best served by the suspension of the Nepotism Rule in this situation. I would like, therefore, to recommend to you that the Nepotism Rule be suspended in the case of Mr. and Mrs. Powell.

#### Business Contract Items

- 1. Contract with Border Electric Company to furnish necessary materials and labor for the extension of utility lines (underground electrical ducts) to the site of the new Classroom-Office Building. Three companies were invited to bid and all submitted bids. A purchase order in the amount of \$3,596.00 was issued to Border, the low bidder.
- 2. Invitations to bid were issued to five electrical contractors for the furnishing of necessary equipment, materials, and labor required in revamping and rebuilding the wiring and the lighting control panels in Magoffin Auditorium. Bids were received from three companies and opened and tabulated on November 1, 1960. The money appropriated by the 56th Legislature for this project was \$16,000.00. The lowest bid was \$21,222.00. All bids were rejected. Additional funds have been requested and, if approved, another call for bids will be made.

#### SALARY RANGES COVERING CLASSES OF POSITIONS IN THE CLASSIFIED SERVICE

The University of Texas Medical Branch

EXPLANATION: Below are listed the monthly salary ranges for classes of positions in the Classified Service of The Medical Branch. The first column indicates the index number of the class as it appears in the book of class descriptions; the second column, the class title; the third column, the monthly salary range for the class, i.e. the minimum and maximum rates to be paid to incumbents of positions of the class; the fourth column, the annual salary range for the class; the last column the salary step number, which refers to the Basic Salary Schedule (Table 2). The "intermediate steps" are those rates which fall between the indicated minimum and maximum rates and can be found in Table 2.

The salary ranges are intended to provide an equitable level of compensation for each class of employment. Ranges were determined through study and analysis of the following factors: prevailing rates of pay for comparable classes in private and public employment, present economic conditions, present labor market conditions, past Medical Branch pay policies, and the relationship of the different classes of employment as determined through evaluation of duties and responsibilities of each position.
