The Budget Dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents on February 15-16, 1963.

The following changes affecting Central Administration budgetary operations are recommended for approval by the Board of Regents.

## RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS TO THE 1962-63 BUDGET

## Office of the Chancellor

1. Change the status of Lanier Cox, Vice-Chancellor, from two-thirds time to full-time in the Chancellor's Office for the Spring Semester, 1962-63. He is being granted a leave of absence for this semester from his one-third time teaching assignment in the Department of General Business, College of Business Administration. The additional duties resulting from the Legislative session necessitate his full-time assignment in the Chancellor's Office. Since this position is a line item in the appropriation bill, it requires a transfer of \$1,750 from Etter Estate funds to finance Mr. Cox's administrative assignment on a full-time basis for the Spring Semester. (RBC 55 and 56)

Office of the Comptroller 2. Increase the annual salary rate of Ernest A. Hoffman, Jr., Branch College Auditor, from \$7,440 to \$7,800 effective December 1, 1962, source of funds from unused salary items in Office of the Comptroller. (RBC 47)

## Auditing Oil and Gas Production

3. Appoint Alexander P. Simpson to the position of Assistant Auditor, Oil and Gas Production, effective October 29, 1962, at an annual salary rate of \$6,468; source of funds is the unfilled position formerly held by Mr. Cavett. (RBC 44)

## OUTH TEXAS MEDICAL SCHOOL

Reallocate the total compensation for Dean Robert C. Berson to reflect a hange in the amount of the annuity purchased directly from T.I.A.A. from \$4,167 t. \$1,800 per year. The source of funds for purchase of this annuity is from the San Antonio Medical Foundation Grant. The total compensation for Dr. Berson remains unchanged: \$15,600 from General Budget and \$9,400 (including the annuity) from the San Antonio Medical Foundation. (STMS 6)

## WTH TEXAS MEDICAL SCHOOL (continued)

Transfer \$12,500 from the Unallocated Account, General Budget, for buth Texas Medical School and increase the account number 53-0896-0098 for schitectural, Engineering, and Planning Services. The transfer is to cover he half of the cost of the Master Plan for South Texas Medical Center, as uthorized by the Board of Regents on September 30, 1961, Meeting No. 602, ages 21-24. (STMS 7)

## RANSFERS BETWEEN ACCOUNTS FOR WEST MALL OFFICE BUILDING

In completing the West Mall Office Building at the Main University, there rere several items which were considered desirable which would involve a net increase in the contract price of the General Contract of \$1,144.38 over and above the balance in the Contingency Allowance and the deductive change orders ilready processed. There is a saving in the Electrical Contract of over 33,500.00, which would be available for this additive change order to the General iontract. It is, therefore, recommended that a transfer of \$1,144.38 be made from the Electrical Contract to the General Contract of the West Mall Office Building and that Comptroller Sparenberg be given authority to sign a change order to the Beneral Contract effecting the changes referred to above.

Dear Chancellor Ransom:

The following changes in the Main University Budget are submitted for your approval and submission to the Board of Regents at its meeting in Austin on February 15 and 16, 1963.

## Recommended Amendments to the 1962-63 Budget

The term "rate" for academic personnel is the full-time nine-month base rate; for classified personnel it is the full-time twelve-month rate, the appointee receiving a proportionate amount depending upon the fraction of time for which he is appointed and the period of his appointment. Terminal date of appointments are May 31 for academic and August 31 for classified personnel unless otherwise indicated. Source of funds, unless otherwise shown is the Unallocated Salaries account. For docket purposes, dollar figures are used, cents omitted.

#### UNAPPROPRIATED BALANCE

1. Transfer from Main University Unappropriated Balance the sum of \$1,000 to Legal Fees account, this money to be used for the purpose of reimbursing the legal counsel in the suit of Saunders, et al., v. Ransom, et al. (1033)

2. Transfer from Main University Unappropriated Balance the sum of \$3,000 to Miscellaneous General Institutional Expenses - Official Entertainment. EMERITUS STATUS: Professor Robert H. Montgomery of the Department of Economics is retiring from teaching as of the end of the First Semester of the 1962-63 Long Session. Professor Montgomery came to the University in 1922 as an Instructor and except for brief leaves has been here since. Chairman Thompson writes, in part, as follows:

Professor Montgomery has had a long and distinguished career of service at the University of Texas and its Department of Economics, and it is the unanimous conviction of other members of the Budget Council and of all his colleagues in the Department of Economics that he merits the designation of Professor Emeritus.

Professor J. Lloyd Mecham of the Department of Government is retiring at the end of the 1962-63 academic year. Professor Mecham came to the University in 1925 as Associate Professor Latin American History. Chairman Macdonald writes as follows:

In view of Professor Mecham's long and distinguished service at The University of Texas, the Budget Council of the Department requests that the University Administration designate Professor Mecham as Emeritus Professor with all the rights and privileges appertaining thereto.

The Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and the administration concur in the recommendations of the departments that Professor Montgomery be designated Professor Emeritus as of February 1, 1963, and Professor Mecham with the 1963-64 Long Session.

PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND INVESTMENT PROGRAM - REPORT ON RESULTS OF MUNICIPAL 30ND SALE HELD DECEMBER 4, 1962, AND RATIFICATION AND APPROVAL THEREOF.--Pursuant to uthorization granted at the April 27, 1962, meeting of the Board of Regents, a total of 36,540,000 par value various Texas Municipal Bonds held in the portfolio of the Permanent Iniversity Fund, consisting of thirty-one separate lots, was offered for sale on the basis of competitive bids to be received on December 4, 1962. Detailed materials on the lots iffered were mailed to over 400 dealers, banks, and insurance companies some ten days write to the date of the sale. In addition, news items were carried in the <u>Texas Bond</u> <u>eporter</u>, <u>The Wall Street Journal</u>, and <u>The Bond Buyer</u>. A total of twenty-nine different idders sent in bids by the 10:30 A. M. deadline on December 4, some individual bidders or yndicates bidding on all thirty-one of the lots offered. Two bids were received too late o be opened and considered. A tabulation of the bids received and considered follows on ages L-10 through L-21.

he high bid received on each of the thirty-one lots offered was accepted. The net proseds from the sale in the total amount of 6,507,687.29 provided an overall profit of L17,715.82 over the book value of the bonds sold in the total amount of 6,389,971.47. summary tabulation of the lots sold follows on pages L-22 and L-23. It is the recomendation of the Land and Investment Committee that the Board of Regents ratify and prove the sale as outlined.

Ster consultation with the Lionel D. Edie advisory firm and with various government and prporate bond analysts, the sales proceeds were reinvested in \$6,500,000 par value U. S. seasury 4% Bonds of August 15, 1972, reported under purchases on page L-1 above, at a sinvestment yield of 3.89% to maturity. The current yield on the municipal bonds sold as 3.35%, the reinvestment producing an improvement in yield of 0.54%. The amortized inual income on the bonds purchased amounts to \$254,114.68 which provides an increase of 40,301.30 in annual income over the annual income of \$213,813.38 on the bonds sold.

PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND INVESTMENT PROGRAM - ANNUAL REVIEW OF INVESTMENT ACTICES AS REQUIRED BY SENATE RESOLUTION. -- Pursuant to Senate Resolution No. 29, 3rd S., 57th Legislature, Mr. Knute E. #### PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND - LAND MATTERS .---

POWER, TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH EASEMENT NO. 1049, UPTON AND CROCKETT COUNTIES - ASSIGNMENT FROM HUMBLE PIPE LINE COMPANY TO TEXAS-NEW MEXICO PIPE LINE COMPANY.--This easement covers 1,486 rods of line in Block 14, Crockett and Upton Counties for the period January 1, 1958, through December 31, 1967. Full consideration of \$743 for the 10-year period was paid when the easement was approved. The University assignment fee of \$25 has been received. Approval of the assignment is recommended.

GRAZING LEASE NO. 825, PECOS COUNTY, ASSIGNMENT FROM NEWNHAM AND WHITTENBURG, A PARTNERSHIP, TO E. L. HAWKINS.--This lease covers 4,512.2 acres in Blocks 27 and 28, Pecos County and was issued for the 5-year period July 1, 1962, through June 30, 1967. Annual rental is \$1,353.66, payable semi-annually. One-half of the bonus received by Newnham and Whittenburg, in the amount of \$125, has been received by the University and approval of the assignment is recommended.

GRAZING LEASE NO. 850, PECOS COUNTY, ASSIGNMENT FROM NEWNHAM AND WHITTENBURG, A PARTNERSHIP, TO E. L. HAWKINS.--This lease covers 5,874 acres in Blocks 27 and 28, James Campbell Survey #1, Pecos County and was issued for the 5-year period July 1, 1962, through June 30, 1967. Annual rental is \$1,762.26, payable semi-annually. One-half of the bonus received by Newnham and Whittenburg, in the amount of \$125 has been received by the University and approval of the assignment is recommended.

WATER EXPLORATION PERMIT NO. 99 WITH OPTION TO LEASE TO THE TOWN OF PECOS CITY (PECOS), PART OF BLOCK 16, WARD COUNTY....This permit was approved by the Board of Regents at its meeting of December 1, 1962, with the following statement concerning royalty if a lease is consummated:

"The water lease will carry a royalty to the University of not less than 2-1/2 cents per 1,000 gallons of gross water produced or 12-1/2% of the commercial rate charged by Pecos, whichever is the greater."

It has now been requested by the officials of the City of Pecos and approved by the University staff that this part of the authorization be changed to read:

"The water lease will carry a royalty to the University of three cents  $(3\not)$  per thousand gallons or 12-1/2% of the lowest city rate whichever is the larger."

It is the opinion of the staff that this is the more desirable way to state the royalty provision and the change is recommended.

WATER CONTRACT NO. 100, PHILLIPS PETROLEUM COMPANY, ANDREWS COUNTY. --This contract covers water used by Phillips Petroleum Company in the W/2 of Section 44, Block 9, Andrews County for drilling a well off University Lands. The sum of \$500 has been received for the water. No more water will be covered by this contract. Approval is recommended.

TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT - RIGHT-OF-WAY (1421) FOR CONTROLLED ACCESS INTERSTATE HIGHWAY 20, WARD COUNTY .-- Approximately 375 acres of Block 16, University Lands, Ward County, is involved in right-of-way for the construction of the Monahans-Pyote section of Interstate Highway 20, and it is expected that a determinable fee as to this acreage, with all minerals reserved, will be conveyed to the State Highway Department. The Department is authorized to pay fair value for State Lands acquired for the right-of-way, and current appraisals obtained by the Highway Department indicate a total of \$29,000 to \$30,000 for the University's part of the right-of-way, which does not include settlement which the Highway De-partment has made or will make with the University's tenants. One of the principal problems as to right-of-way across University Lands has been that of access to the T&P Railroad from the cotton warehouse facilities, formerly part of the Pyote Air Base, under lease to Texas Interior Warehouses (Mr. David Ker). The Highway Department maintains that circuity of travel is not compensable as damages and further has maintained that it cannot build an underpass or culverts for direct access to the railroad, estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$60,000, unless the University and/or its tenant will pay the cost.

The Highway Department offered Mr. Ker \$1,250 as damages to his leasehold. Mr. Ker refused to accept this settlement, and condemnation proceedings were filed. At a hearing in January, the Commissioners in Ward County found \$1,250 as the amount of damages to the leasehold, though a much higher figure was indicated in testimony by an independent appraiser retained by Mr. Ker.

In November, 1959, when it appeared that this section of the Highway would be ready for contract letting within the next month or two, the Board of Regents authorized a right of entry for the Highway Department for this construction if plans proceeded so that the contract letting occurred before the next meeting of the Board of Regents. Due to various matters, including allocation of funds for such Interstate Highway Projects, the project was delayed, though the Highway Department has been proceeding with right-of-way matters. The University staff has been in touch with the Department from time to time, and the Highway Department has now notified the University that this project will be included, if possible, in March, 1963, lettings. The Department has agreed with the University staff that final settlement with the Board of Regents for the rightof-way should be deferred until all of the University tenants have been cleared either by negotiation or by condemnation. Therefore, the Department requests that the Board of Regents authorize at this time right of entry for the construction.

After some further discussion with the Highway Department, the University staff will submit to the Land and Investment Committee at its February meeting a recommendation regarding the right of entry and the matter of access to the railroad.

RECOMMENDED EXCEPTIONS TO INCREASED EASEMENT RATES.--It is recommended that the following exceptions be granted as to the increase in easement rates approved by the Board of Regents at its meeting of December 1, 1962. All of these easements had been received, fully executed with payment attached, prior to the date of the meeting but after the date on which the docket material for the December 1, 1962 meeting had been turned over to the Secretary. In all cases, the companies concerned have requested that consideration be given to allowing the easements at the rates current when the instruments were submitted. These are the only ones which will be so recommended:

1. Power Line Easement No. 1690, Community Public Service Company, (Renewal of No. 544) covering 4,815.5 rods in Blocks 18 and 20, Ward County, Block 20, Ward and Winkler Counties, and Blocks 20 and 21, Winkler County for the 10-year perior December 1, 1962, through November 30, 1972, at \$.50 per rod - Total consideration \$2,407.75.

REVISED SCHEDULE OF RATES ON VARIOUS EASEMENTS, LEASES, PERMITS, ETC. ON PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND LANDS.--Pursuant to action by the Board of Regents at its meeting of December 1, 1962, the schedule of rates, effective as of that date, has been revised to read as follows:

#### SCHEDULE OF RATES ON VARIOUS EASEMENTS, LEASES, PERMITS, ETC. ON PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND LANDS

#### PIPE LINE EASEMENTS

A. Standard rate for all sizes of pipe line is \$1.50 per rod for a 10-year period, payable in advance for the 10-year period.

B. MINIMUM for a 10-year pipe line easement is 50.00, payable in advance for the 10-year period.

#### POWER, TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH LINE EASEMENTS

A. Standard rate is \$1.50 per rod for a 10-year period, payable in advance for the 10-year period.

B. <u>MINIMUM</u> for a 10-year power line easement is \$50.00, payable in advance for the 10-year period.

SURFACE LEASES (other than grazing leases)

A. Standard rate is \$10.00 per acre per year, payable annually in advance for PUMP STATIONS, BOOSTER STATIONS AND CAMP SITES.

B. BUSINESS SITES, RESIDENCE SITES, MICROWAVE TOWERS AND OTHER MISCELLANEOUS LEASES will be at negotiated rates.

C. MINIMUM for each such lease is \$50.00 per year payable in advance.

#### GRAZING LEASES

Leases shall not exceed a 5-year period, with option to renew at negotiated rates.

#### MATERIAL SOURCE (CALICHE) PERMITS

A. Standard rate is \$0.25 per cubic yard, payable in advance.

B. MINIMUM rate is \$50.00 per permit.

#### CHARGES FOR ASSIGNMENTS OR TRANSFERS OF EASEMENTS, LEASES, ETC.

A charge of \$25.00 will be collected for transfers or assignments of leases or easements, including grazing leases, where the instrument provides for approval by the Board of Regents of such assignment or transfer, except in cases where there is other cash consideration paid to the University in connection with the assignment or transfer.

The required filing fees for the General Land Office will be paid by the lessee.

#### MAXIMUM DAMAGES TO BE PAID SURFACE LESSEES FROM OIL AND GAS DEVELOPMENT OPERATIONS

Continuation of schedule previously adopted by the Board of Regents and the Board for Lease of University Lands.

BAKER AND THELMA KELLY BAKER. --At the December 1, 1962, meeting of the Board of Regents the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Baker for the establishment of a Professorship in Law was accepted by the Board of Regents, (Minutes, page 3) with information on the Trust to be reported at a later date.

The Trust Indenture was signed in December with an initial gift of 270 shares of the capital stock of Standard Oil Company  $(N_{\circ}J_{\circ})$  worth \$15,390 on December 7. Then on January 4, 1963, Mr. Baker forwarded 300 shares of the same stock with a market value as of that date of \$17,812, making total contributions to date for the professorship of \$33,202. Mr. Baker also attached to the Trust Indenture a copy of the first codicil to his Will providing that if, at the time of his death, he and Mrs. Baker had not contributed \$100,000 to the Trust, the difference between the amount theretofore contributed and \$100,000 would be paid into the Trust from his estate. The Trust is open to donations or contributions by other persons but such gifts will in no way modify the purpose of the Trust.

Income from the Trust is to be used toward "the establishment, support and maintenance of a Professorship in Law at The University of Texas in the field of Jurisprudence" with the hope expressed that, "if found feasible the professor occupying this post may likewise teach an adapted course of similar import in the College of Arts and Sciences to selected undergraduates, perhaps in the field of Government."

MAIN UNIVERSITY - REX G. BAKER AND EDNA HEFLIN BAKER PROFESSORSHIP IN LAW.--At the December 1, 1962, meeting of the Board of Regents the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Baker for the establishment of a Professorship in Law was accepted by the Board of Regents, (Minutes, page 3) with information on the Trust to be reported at a later meeting.

The Trust Indenture was signed in December with an initial gift of 480 shares of the capital stock of Standard Oil Company (N.J.) worth \$27,840 on December 7, 1962. Mr. Baker also attached to the Trust Indenture a copy of the first codicil to his Will providing that if, at the time of his death, he and Mrs. Baker had not contributed \$100,000 to the Trust, the difference between the amount theretofore contributed and \$100,000 would be paid into the Trust from his estate. The Trust is also open to donations or contributions by other persons but such gifts will in no way modify or vary the purpose and operation of the Trust. The desire and intent of the donors is that the professorship be filled by a law professor of recognized distinction who shall teach courses "involving a treatment of fundamental principles underlying the notion of the rule of law in a free society including such courses as Constitutional law, one dealing with the nature and function of law, and the like, although it is likewise the Donors' desired intent that the teacher who fills this Professorship from time to time shall also teach one or more courses of a like nature for undergraduate college students enrolled in The University of Texas who do not necessarily expect to become Income from the Trust is to be used "exclusively, singly, or in lawyers.' any appropriate combination, for the installation, establishment, support and maintenance of the Professorship named above and accordingly will be used for the purpose of supplementing the funds made available by legislative appropriations or otherwise for payment of the normal salary of the professor who, from time to time, fills the Professorship hereby created."

MAIN UNIVERSITY - ESTATE OF LOUIS J. SNYDER, AUSTIN, TEXAS.--We have been advised by the attorney for the estate of Mr. Louis J. Snyder of Austin that his Will provides the sum of \$2,000 to the University to be used as a loan fund to aid worthy students, preferably of the Jewish faith, said 771

fund to be administered in the sole discretion of the Board of Regents. Mr. Snyder died on October 30, 1962, and the funds will be received at a later date. It is recommended, however, that the Board accept the bequest at this time with the fund to be administered in accordance with the provisions of the Will. (The following is as submitted to the November 30-December 1, 1962, meeting of the Land and Investment Committee and the Board of Regents. Action was deferred.)

MAIN UNIVERSITY - BRACKENRIDGE TRACT - RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING USE OF THE BRACKENRIDGE TRACT AND STEPS TO BE TAKEN ON TITLE QUESTIONS.--At the October, 1962, meeting of the Board of Regents, the Land and Investment Committee instructed the staff to submit recommendations regarding the Brackenridge Tract.

It is recommended that the Board of Regents adopt a policy to hold all of this tract indefinitely for future development of the University so that none of the land will be sold or developed commercially, beyond the three commercial leases now in effect, and any renewal of those leases as may be determined by the Board, and the municipal golf course lease now in effect, by adopting the following resolution:

WHEREAS, on June 17, 1910, George W. Brackenridge conveyed in trust for the benefit of The University of Texas until the death of certain named persons with remainder over in fee simple to the State of Texas for the benefit of The University of Texas, in trust, approximately 500 acres in the Daniel J. Gilbert League, George W. Speer League, and Henry P. Hill League in Travis County, Texas, recorded in Book 244, pages 77-78 of the Deed Records of Travis County, Texas, which is commonly referred to as the "Brackenridge Tract"; and

WHEREAS, On October 22, 1910, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, pursuant to resolution recorded in Volume D, page 69 of the minutes of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, accepted said land for the purpose of promoting University education; and

WHEREAS, the present and prospective expansion needs of The University of Texas require additional acreage to facilitate and carry forward its programs; and

WHEREAS, the Brackenridge Tract is ideally situated for the location of University buildings and utilization for other University projects:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, that the Brackenridge Tract be reserved and set apart for University needs in its building program and for projects connected with the University, and that said tract be used exclusively for the orderly development of The University of Texas.

It is further recommended that the Board of Regents request the Attorney General to take appropriate action, after consultation with attorneys to be selected and retained by the Board of Regents, to accomplish the following:

(1) Obtain a release of the reversionary interest from the appropriate authorities of Jackson County for the sum of \$1,000 to be paid by the Board of Regents.

(2) If the Jackson County release is not obtained, file a condemnation suit or other appropriate legal action against the reversionary interest in a District Court of Travis County and pursue such suit to judgment.

(3) At the appropriate time, file a declaratory judgment suit in a District Court in Travis County to construe the deed from Geo. W. Brackenridge dated June 17, 1910, and determine that this tract is not a part of the Permanent University Fund. MAIN UNIVERSITY - MURRAY CASE SELLS ESTATE - RATIFICATION OF SALE OF MINERAL INTERESTS IN THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI...The Board of Regents adopted on July 22, 1961, a resolution authorizing execution by the Chancellor on behalf of the University of certain instruments presented from time to time in relation to the interest of the University in the Estate of Murray Case Sells, with a provision that all of these actions would be reported to the Board of Regents for ratification.

Among the assets of the Estate were mineral interests in the State of Mississippi. Under the laws of that State, educational institutions may not hold interests in land for a period in excess of ten years after any devise becomes effective. The last day of the ten-year period would have been February 8, 1963.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Estate was held in Dallas on November 30, 1962, at which bids were considered on the Mississippi interests. The producing mineral interests, held by the Trustees of the Estate, were sold to Sun Oil Company for a total of 74,000. The non-producing mineral interests, held by Sells Petroleum Inc., were sold to Robert Thompson on behalf of a syndicate in Shreveport for \$235,750.

It was required that the beneficiary institutions join the Trustees in the conveyance of the producing interests to Sun Oil Company. These instruments were signed by Chancellor Ransom on behalf of the University on December 12, 1962, and it is recommended that this action be ratified by the Board of Regents.

The University has now received a check for \$15,898.61 apparently representing, with some adjustments, its share of proceeds from both sales.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - PROPOSED POWER LINE EASEMENT TO COMMUNITY PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY ON HUNTINGTON LANDS, GALVESTON COUNTY.--Community Public Service Company has requested a power line easement on part of the Huntington Lands in the H. B. Littlefield Survey, Galveston County, for a total distance of approximately 3,951 feet or 239.5 rods. The location runs along the edge of the land, next to a State highway for part of the distance and next to the Texas City Terminal Railway Company line for most of the remaining distance. The easement will be for so long as used for this purpose and involves 20 poles and 12 guys on the Huntington land. Community Public Service Company proposed to pay \$50 per pole or guy but has agreed to pay \$2,000 for the easement. The easement will carry a provision that when and if the line interferes with the use of the land, the Company will move structures or raise the line upon request by the University, provided the line can remain on the same center line. It is recommended that the Board of Regents accept this proposal and authorize the Chairman to execute the instrument when approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - ARCHER M. HUNTINGTON MUSEUM FUND - PROPOSED LEASE TO GULF BITULITHIC COMPANY, GALVESTON COUNTY.--Gulf Bitulithic Company has a contract for highway work in the Texas City area and proposes to lease a strip 182 feet wide and 1,200 feet long, comprising 5 acres, along the Southern Pacific Railroad track in the H. B. Littlefield Survey for handling material for the highway work for one year from March 1, 1963, at rental of \$600 for the year paid in advance and the right to use the land up to 6 months thereafter at \$50 per month. The Board of Regents will reserve the right to cancel the lease on 90-days notice in the event of sale or long-term lease, and the tenant will be responsible for fencing the ground and restoring it upon termination of the lease, along with liability for any damage remaining after restoration of the ground. Permission of the grazing tenant will be obtained. It is recommended that the Board of Regents accept this proposal and authorize the execution of the lease by the Chairman when approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer. HOGG FOUNDATION: WILL C. HOGG MEMORIAL FUND - REPORT RE PROSPECTS FOR SALE OF MAIN AND CLAY PROPERTY IN HOUSTON. -- On January 14, the Board of Regents authorized the staff to notify Mr. John I. Hill, a Houston realtor, that it would sell its property at Main and Clay in Houston for \$50 per square foot and pay 5% commission with the understanding that it is not an exclusive listing and that such commitment does not extend beyond February 14. Mr. Hill has reported on negotiations with two separate prospects, whose names have been furnished the University, and it is possible that a firm proposal will be in hand for action at the February meeting of the Board. If not, the staff will discuss with the Land and Investment Committee developments to date and may recommend that the price commitment be extended for some reasonable time.

HOGG FOUNDATION: WILL C. HOGG MEMORIAL FUND - PROPOSED SALE OF INTEREST IN 30 ACRES AT DAMON, BRAZORIA COUNTY.--Ever since the Will C. Hogg Estate came to the University in 1939, the Board of Regents as Trustee has owned an undivided 29.87% interest in approximately 30 acres of land made up of about 10 tracts not contiguous and varying in size from 1/2 acre to 5 acres on the edge of the town of Damon in Brazoria County. The remaining undivided interests are now scattered among some 10 estates or individuals. In efforts to work out some kind of sale of the surface, which brings no income, an offer of \$100 per acre, with all minerals to be retained by the sellers, has been received from Mr. J. D. Yelderman of Damon. Sale of course is contingent upon all owners joining. All have not been contacted, but it appears they will wish to sell. It is recommended that the Board of Regents authorize this sale of its interest with the deed to be executed by the Chairman of the Board when approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

HOGG FOUNDATION: WILL C. HOGG MEMORIAL FUND - PROPOSED SALE OF LAND IN FAULK AND TEAGARDEN SUBDIVISION, HARDIN COUNTY....One of the tracts of land which came to the University in 1939 in the Will C. Hogg Estate is approximately 23-1/3 acres in the Faulk and Teagarden 200-acre Subdivision in Hardin County north of Hull in what is known as the edge of the Big Thicket. Most of the lots in the Subdivision are of 5 acres and ownership is split up among several individuals and estates. The land is largely palmetto swamp and grows comparatively little timber, most of which is stolen by the time it is merchantable. The acreage is not near oil and gas production. Humble Oil & Refining Company took an oil and gas lease on the University's tract in 1956 but dropped it in 1958 which was around the time they drilled a dry hole to 10,025 feet about 1/2 mile north of the Subdivision.

Mr. Henry J. Gilfillian who has most of the surrounding country under grazing leases has offered to buy the University's tract and others in the Subdivision for \$65 per acre with the sellers to retain 1/2 of the minerals fully participating as to bonuses, rentals, and royalties but with leasing rights going to the purchaser. Three other owners contacted by the University report that they will accept this offer, and it is recommended that the Board of Regents accept the offer and authorize its Chairman to execute a deed when approved as to form by the Land and Trust Attorney and as to content by the Endowment Officer.

Interagency Cooperation Contract No. 4413-720 with the Department of Public Safety, signed by Vice-President Norman Hackerman, whereby during the period December 19, 1962 to August 31, 1963, the University will furnish television film announcements, radio tapes, and other materials of this nature for use in the statewide Traffic Safety Program, total payments for such services not to exceed \$2,000.

12. Amendment No. 1 to Grant SCC 29541 with United States Department of State, signed by President J. R. Smiley, which extends the contract for the U. S. Student Leader Seminar in Chile for 1962 for one month to December 31, 1962, increases program expenses by \$684 and decreases administrative expenses by a like amount.

13. Grant Agreement No. SCC-30017 with the United States Department of State, signed by President J. R. Smiley, whereby the University is granted the equivalent of \$4,000.00 in Yugoslav dinars for publication of the Bohinj Workshop papers, the agreement to be in effect from November 15, 1962 until May 15, 1963.

14. Contract with the Veterans' Testing Service of the American Council on Education, signed by President J. R. Smiley, whereby for the period January 1 through December 31, 1963, the University will operate through its Testing and Counseling Center an Official VTS Agency to administer restricted forms of the high school level Tests of General Educational Development under the policy direction and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.

# DEPARTMENT OF ROMANCE LANGUAGES - VARIOUS DONORS - VARIOUS PURPOSES FUND:

This fund has been set up in the Department and into it have been  $M_{-}$  Start placed contributions in memory of Miss Dorothy Schons to be used for supporting Spanish studies in the department, and the funds accumulated in the Robert H. Williams Memorial Fund, establishment of which was reported in the docket for the October 1962 meeting. The Williams account will then be discontinued. In this way the establishment of several small accounts on the books of the University will be avoided, and the Department will keep a record on gifts deposited in memory of specific persons.

C., to attend the annual meeting of the national Executive Council of the American Studies Association and Modern Language Association meeting, transportation expenses paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses.

4. Mr. George Walter Hoffman, Professor of Geography, November 15-21, 1962, to Chicago, Illinois, to represent the University at meeting of the Inter-University Committee on Travel Grants, transportation paid from Development Expense account.

5. Mr. Lorrin G. Kennamer, Associate Professor of Geography and Acting Chairman of the Department, November 21-24, 1962, to Chicago, Illinois, to represent the Department at the meeting of the National Council for Geographic Education, expenses paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses.

6. Mr. Thomas D. Smith, Technical Staff Assistant III, Department of Electrical Engineering, to Dallas, Texas, December 17, 1962, to attend a seminar on Hewlett-Packard counters which will cover maintenance and calibration of Hewlett-Packard electronic counters, expenses paid from the Maintenance, Operation and Equipment account of the Department.

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7. Mr. Bassett Maguire, Assistant Professor of Zoology, December 17 - 20, 1962, to Ann Arbor, Michigan, to present a paper at International Arms Control Symposium, transportation only paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expense.

NEPOTISM: The following appointments are submitted in accordance with Section 5.34 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents which provides for such approval by the administrative officer and Chancellor, with subsequent report +0 the Board.

1. Mr. Ray D. Robertson, University Personnel Office, whose brother-inlaw, Mr. Billy B. Wylie is employed in College of Pharmacy and Extension Division at a rate in excess of \$450 per month. Mr. Robertson has been employed since September 1961 and at the time of the appointment of Mr. Wylie was at a rate below \$450, but because of his training and experience his salary has now been approved at a rate in excess of \$450, thus making it necessary to clear the question of nepotism.

2. Mr. Eddie Worth Parker, Defense Research Laboratory at a salary less than \$450 per month, but whose first cousin, Mr. Lewis Mabry Barber also works in the Laboratory at a salary in excess of \$450 per month. Mr. Parker has special skills that the Laboratory needs; his present assignment is only part time.

The following nepotism case is submitted in accordance with Sec. 5.44 which permits suspension of regulations in extraordinary cases: Mr. James Vernon Bailey and his wife, Mrs. Joan W. Bailey, have both been employed at the Radiobiological Laboratory since January 1961 and June 1955, respectively, both at salaries which would permit employment within nepotism regulations. In a recent classification study made by the Air Force, both were reclassified at a salary of \$482 per month. At no time does either this husband or wife supervise the work of the other. Although employed in the same Laboratory, each works in a separate section of the Laboratory -- Mr. Bailey in the Physics and Engineering Section and Mrs. Bailey in the Biology Section. I therefore concur in statement of Mr. Jack Holland, Director of University Personnel Office "that in this case the Laboratory would be handicapped were it to become necessary to lose either of these valuable employees . . and recommend your favorable consideration of Dr. Painter's (Director of the Laboratory) request for a waiver of the Nepotism Rule for Mr. and Mrs. Bailey . . ."

USE OF TEXTBOOKS WRITTEN BY MEMBERS OF THE FACULTY: I recommend the use of the following textbooks written by members of the faculty:

1. Active German, First Semester, by W. P. Lehmann, Helmut Rehder, and G. Shulz-Behrend, all of the Department of Germanic Languages, published by Holt, which sells for \$4.00 with 17% royalty to authors.

2. Focus on German I and Focus on German II, by Leroy Shaw, published by the University Co-Operative Society, which sell for \$7.00 and \$7.50, respectively, with no royalty to author in their present preliminary form.

3. The Nature of Price Theory, by H. H. Liebhafsky, Professor of Economics, published by the Dorsey Press, which sells for about \$7.00 with 15% royalty to author.

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OUTSIDE DUTIES: I recommend that the staff members listed be permitted to undertake the duties outlined below, the work to be done so as not to interfere with University assignments and otherwise to conform to Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents.

1. Mr. John S. Bickley, Professor of Insurance, to become a member of the board of directors of the Columbus Mutual Life Insurance Company.

2. Mr. Morris Kagan, Visiting Associate Professor, School of Social Work, to do consulting service for various social agencies during the school year.

3. Mr. John R. Stockton, Director of the Bureau of Business Research, to act as economic consultant and adviser to Continental Oil Company in connection with a merger with a small company in New Mexico.

4. Mr. David S. Huang, Assistant Professor of Economics, to engage in consulting work involving calculus of probabilities and methods of statistical inference as applied to business and legal problems.

5. Mr. J. Clifton Williams, Associate Professor of Music, to serve as guest conductor and horn player for the part of the San Antonio Symphony tour to California during the period January 7-14, 1963. His composition FESTIVAL will be performed.

An examination of the summary sheet shows Alamo Linen and Uniform Rental and Martin Linen Supply Company to be high bidders. Since the bids of Capitol Linen Service and Austin Linen Service appear to be close, it was necessary to run the bills for a typical month on the prices bid by each company. The month used was October, 1963, and included all items furnished to each Housing and Food Service unit which regularly uses this service. The total bill using Austin Linen prices would have been \$2,076.44. Using Capitol Linen prices, the total amounts to \$1,977.14, a saving of \$99.30 for the month of October.

Based on these figures it is our recommendation that the linen rental bid be awarded to Capitol Linen Service.

It is recommended that this be included in the next docket to be submitted to the Board of Regents and that I be authorized to sign a contract.
