#### APPROVAL TO CONTINUE EMPLOYMENT AFTER AGE 65

Mr. J. L. Andrews, Oil Gauger in the Department of Oil Field Supervision and Geophysical Exploration -- Office of Investments Trusts and Lands, was 65 on November 6, 1971. Normal retirement would be August 31, 1972. Mr. Andrews is in good health and is thoroughly able to continue the discharge of his duties. System Administration recommends his continued employment during the fiscal year 1972-73.

### AMENDMENTS TO U. T. SYSTEM GROUP INSURANCE POLICIES

1. It is recommended that The University of Texas System Group Term Life Contract #G-2302 with Aetna Life and Casualty Company be amended effective April 1, 1972 to provide an option for each employee participating under the group term life policy to purchase as a payroll deduction excess paid up at age 65 life insurance with cash value benefits. Such employees could choose an amount of up to one times annual earnings in multiples of \$5,000, not to exceed a maximum of \$15,000.

Employees who are eligible to purchase this coverage are:

- 1. New employees who are eligible for, and elect to participate in, group term life, and
- 2. Current employees who are participating under the group term life policy, and
- 3. Current employees who are eligible for, and did not elect to participate in group term life but have not been denied coverage due to failure to pass evidence of insurability requirements, and now do elect to participate in group term life.

Current employees who have been denied coverage due to failure to pass evidence of insurability requirements will <u>not</u> be eligible to purchase either group term life or the excess coverage.

The University of Texas System will be able to offer this excess paid up life insurance with cash value as an option to eligible employees at competitive rates.

## AMENDMENTS TO U. T. SYSTEM GROUP INSURANCE POLICIES (Continued)

2. It is recommended that The University of Texas System Contract with Blue Cross-Blue Shield be amended to change the rate schedule applicable to all components effective February 1, 1972, to provide adequate premiums to meet the actual costs of medical claims, which now exceed premium income. For the contract period January 1, 1972 through December 31, 1972, rates will be increased by approximately 13.7%. However, due to the fact that the actual rate change will not be applicable until February 1, 1972, and must provide for increases necessary for an annual period, the monthly premiums paid average about 15.5%. Since increased hospital and medical costs are reflected in significantly increased claims against The University of Texas System group medical insurance program, it is necessary to protect the financial soundness of the group by increasing the rates, which have been carefully worked out with Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

### CONTRACTS AND GRANTS (FEDERAL)

Amendment No. 2 to National Science Foundation Institutional Grant for Science No. GU 3764 has been awarded to System Administration of The University of Texas System. This amendment awards \$38,577 effective December 3, 1971 and continuing until the funds are expended. Funds awarded under Grant No. GU 3764 now total \$109,127. The additional funds will be allocated at a subsequent date to projects complying with the scientific purposes permitted by the grant.

#### CONTRACTS AND GRANTS (OTHER)

The following contracts and agreements have been executed by the appropriate University of Texas officials on behalf of The University of Texas at San Antonio:

- 1. Lease Agreement between The University of Texas at San Antonio and the City of San Antonio. This lease is for 3,112 square feet of space located in the Eager Building at 600 HemisFair Plaza. The period of the lease is September 1, 1971 through August 31, 1973. The rate is 16 cents per square foot per month, making the monthly rental \$500.
- 2. Contract between The University of Texas at San Antonio and Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The telephone service is to consist of Centrex II Communications Service Package with console operation and 400 station lines at the campus located at FM 1604 and Babcock Road, San Antonio, Texas. Payment will be based on the Telephone Company's published tariffs and this supplemental contract. The service period is to begin on or about September 1, 1973 and end at 6 P.M. on August 31, 1975. The contract includes a termination charge of \$81,000 for removal and discontinuance of the service, less a credit of 1/36 of this amount for each month service has been retained and paid.

\$21,240.00 at the meetings in March and April, 1971, for relocation of a sanitary sewer line for site of Fine Arts Complex.

\$15,000.00 at the meeting in June, 1971, to cover the installation of the isolation valves, relocation of the gas line, Engineer's fees and other miscellaneous items related to the Fine Arts Complex.

Sources of both the above appropriations were from Combined Fee Revenue Bonds, Series 1970.

3. The University of Texas at Austin Appropriation for the Expansion of Memorial Stadium and for the Physical Education Building --

Appropriate \$1,250,000.00 to the allotment account for the Memorial Stadium and Physical Education Building project which has been allocated to this project from Permanent University Fund Bond Proceeds. This amount will include funds for furniture and furnishings in the building for which an appropriation has not heretofore been made.

RESEARCH AND OTHER ACADEMIC CONTRACTS: The following contracts, grants and amendments have been signed by the appropriate official upon recommendation of the respective technical directors, fiscal officers, and the Office of Sponsored Projects.

Expenditures from these contracts and grants will be made in accordance with regular University operating procedures and contractual limitations. Personnel appointments and changes will be in accordance with University salary rates and approvals. Travel and purchasing will conform to established procedures.

 Modification AFOSR-71-1998B to Grant AFOSR-71-1998, by which the United States Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, adds \$37,584 to the grant funds and extends the period of the grant through November 30, 1972. The research entitled, "Aeroelastic Stability of Thin Shell Structures at Subsonic Mach Numbers and the Active Suppression of Flutter Phenomena," continues under the direction of Dr. Ronald O. Stearman, Associate Professor of Aerospace Engineering and Engineering Mechanics.

 Modification AFOSR 71-2021A to Grant AFOSR 71-2021, by which the United States Air Force, Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, adds \$15,241 to the grant funds and extends the period of the grant through January 14, 1973. The research entitled, "The Effect of Wave Length on the Degradation of Certain Polymers," continues under the direction of Dr. W. Albert Noyes, Jr., Ashbel Smith Professor of Chemistry.

3. Air Force Office of Scientific Research, Arlington, Virginia, provides \$27,787 in additional funds, extends the period of the contract through October 31, 1972, incorporates the Price Stabilization Clause, and makes certain changes in the reports section and updates the Government Property and Transfer of Title clauses. The research on high intensity sound continues in the Applied Research Laboratories under the direction of Dr. Chester M. McKinney, Jr., Director.

D. C., sets a fixed overhead rate of 46% of salaries and wages for the period September 1, 1969 through May 31, 1970. The research entitled, "Novel 4-Quinolinemethanol Antimalarials," was under the direction of Dr. Royston M. Roberts, Professor of Chemistry.

 Contract DAAB07-72-C-0086, by which the Department of the Army, U.S. Army Electronics Command, Fort Monmouth Procurement Branch, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, provides \$83, 862 for support of research entitled, "Advanced Optical Jamming Study." The contract is effective for the period December 15, 1971, through December 14, 1972, and the research will be performed in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. Alfred H. LaGrone, Professor of Electrical Engineering.

9. Modification P207, Supplemental Agreement to Contract DADA17-69-C-9073, by which the Department of the Army,
U. S. Army Medical Research and Development Command, Washington, D. C., sets a fixed overhead rate of 46% of salaries and wages for the period September 1, 1969 through January 31, 1972. The research entitled, "Process of Modeling of Biological Waste Treatment," continues under the direction of Dr. David M. Himmelblau, Professor of Chemical Engineering.

10. The grant is effective for the period January 1, 1972 through August 31, 1972, and the research will be under the direction of Dr. Robert T. Gregory, Professor of Mathematics and of Computer Sciences, and Dr. David M. Young, Professor of Mathematics and of Computer Sciences.

 Modification P207, Supplemental Agreement to Contract DADA17-69-C-9067, by which the Department of the Army,
 U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command, Washington, D. C., sets a fixed overhead rate of 46% of salaries and wages for the period September 1, 1969 through December 31, 1971. The studies on prophylactic and curative treatment of malaria continues under the direction of Dr. Karl Folkers, Professor of Chemistry and of Pharmacy.

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Purchase Order DACW63-72-M-0343, by which the Department of the Army, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army
Engineer District, Fort Worth, Texas, provides \$1,500 for support of a project to design a public archeological display for the Lavon
Lake project office. The purchase order is effective for a period
beginning October 6, 1971, and the project will be under the direction of Dr. David S. Dibble, Acting Director, Texas Archeological Salvage
Project.

Modification P00007, Supplemental Agreement to Basic Contract N00014-67-A-0126, by which the Department of the Navy,
 Office of Naval Research, Arlington, Virginia, adds Clause 46 concerning Stabilization of Prices, Rents, Wages and Salaries (August 1971) to the General Provisions of the contract between the Navy and

Naval Ship Systems Command, Washington, D. C., extends the period of the contract through May 31, 1972, provides \$30,000 additional funds and increases the total estimated cost to \$1,868,232.

 The University Council adopted this recommendation by circularization November 4, 1971 (D&P 4948).

> "Students are admitted as majors in the degree programs of the School of Communication when they have attained junior standing (60 hours) and have completed at least 36 credit hours in the basic requirements in American government, American history, English, foreign language and mathematics-science.

"Lower-division students planning School of Communication majors will be advised in the Office of the Dean of the School. Students should apply for a Degree Card at the Registrar's Office at some time between the completion of 45 and 60 semester hours of credit. Students cannot be admitted to degree programs in the School until they have declared a major and have received a preliminary degree check."

Until a student files a degree card he will be advised and his records kept in the Dean's Office. After declaring his major, he will thereafter be advised in one of the departments of the School.

The following docket is submitted for your approval and presentation to the Board of Regents at the meeting in Austin on February 4, 1972:

#### BUSINESS CONTRACT ITEMS

Mr. Demetrio Vasquez, Jr. had a five-year contract beginning October 15, 1968, to operate a barber shop in the Union. The rent he was to pay to the University was \$100.00 per month. At October 31, 1971, Mr. Vasquez owed the University \$300.00 unpaid rent and the lease was cancelled and the shop closed. The shop furniture and fixtures belonging to Mr. Vasquez are being held by the University until the rent due is paid.

#### GIFTS

I recommend acceptance of the following benefaction and that expressions of thanks and appreciation of the Board be sent the donor by the Secretary:

Dr. Patrick Romanell, H. Y. Benedict Professor of Philosophy, proposes to establish an endowed professorship in philosophy through lifetime contributions and through his estate, if the professorship is not fully funded at the time of his and his wife's death. Dr. Romanell has made a \$2,500.00 contribution as the first step in funding the professorship. The professorship is to be a visiting professorship in philosophy at The University of Texas at El Paso. Recipients are to be nominated by senior faculty members of the Philosophy Department with the assistance of the Ashbel Smith Professor of Philosophy at The University of Texas at Austin. A new recipient is to be selected each year. Provisions of the Board of Regents policies as set out September 18-19, 1964, on endowed academic positions will be complied with.

#### GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS AND GRANTS

The following contracts, grants, and amendments have been negotiated and have been signed by me upon the recommendation of the directors of the projects. I recommend your approval and ratification of the signatures.

1. DO-6, dated November 10, 1971, to Basic Agreement DAAD07-67-C-0362, whereby the Contracting Officer, Procurement, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico 88002, authorizes the enrollment of three students for an estimated 13 credit hours during the Spring and First Summer session (1972) at a total estimated obligation of \$200.

2. Modification No. A017, dated October 12, 1971, to Contract No. DA-29-040-ORD-1930, whereby the Contracting Officer, Procurement Division, STEWS-LG-PA, Building 1830, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico 88002, by mutual agreement extends the term of the contract through June 30, 1972. No funding is involved in this equipment contract.

3. Modification No. A018, dated October 26, 1971, to Contract No. DA-29-040-ORD-1930, whereby the Contracting Officer, Procurement Division, STEWS-LG-PA, Building 1830, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico 88002, incorporates the terms and conditions of ASPR Appendix C, Part 6, which are applicable to utilization of government property in possession of the University.

4. Modification No. A019, dated December 7, 1971, to Contract No. DA-29-040-ORD-1930, whereby the Contracting Officer, Procurement Division, STEWS-LG-PA, Building 1830, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico 88002, updates the General Provision clauses in accordance with Armed Services Procurement Regulations dated January 1, 1969, through 1969 Edition Revision No. 9, dated April 30, 1971, and deletes General Provision clauses amended and set forth in Mod. A016 and substitutes certain other clauses.

5. Educational Service Agreement No. DABE34-72-A-0371, dated September 1, 1971, whereby the Contracting Officer, Procurement Division, DIO, Building No. 4004, Fort Sam Houston, Texas 78234, enters into an agreement with the University for educational services to designated government personnel at the University for an estimated annual cost of \$5,654. The agreement shall be effective on September 1, 1971 and continue until terminated.

6. Delivery Order No. 0277 (ROTC-1), dated November 16, 1971, to Educational Services Agreement No. DABE34-72-A-0371, whereby the Contracting Officer, Procurement Division, DIO, Fort Sam Houston, Texas 78234, authorizes enrollment of 30 students during the Fall 1971 and/or Spring 1972 Semester at an estimated total cost of \$8,998.

7. Order No. DABE32-72D1734, dated October 28, 1971, to Basic Agreement No. DABD07-71-A0002, whereby the Contracting Officer, Ft. Bliss, Texas 79916, undertakes a total obligation of \$1,689.75 for the enrollment of 48 students and 256 credit hours during the Fall Semester, 1971.



# INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

# Introduction

The Graduate School is a body of professors and scholars designed as Members or Associates of the Graduate Faculty and of students duly admitted to pursue their studies toward the Master of Arts or Doctor of Philosophy degree. The administrative head of the Graduate School is the Graduate Dean. In every academic area offering graduate level courses, the Graduate Faculty attached to the area constitute an individual Committee on Graduate Studies. In each graduate area there is a graduate adviser who advises students taking graduate work in that area.

The Committees on Graduate Studies and ultimately the Graduate Dean supervise all graduate course offerings, the programs of individual graduate students and the research projects (theses and dissertations) of the degree candidates. The graduate advisers assume immediate responsibility for the advance to candidacy. Subsequently this responsibility is transferred to the supervisory committee appointed for the candidate by the dean.

# The Nature and Purpose of Graduate Work

There are three component parts of graduate study: course work, independent study and independent scholarly research leading to a thesis or dissertation. No

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expected to have done supporting work of advanced level in one or more associated areas. The objective of the doctoral program is to train qualified persons to serve as faculty and investigators in the health sciences. The master's programs represent a stage on the road to this goal; but they also provide in themselves the possibility of a complete and useful accomplishment in advanced work.

GRADUATE SCHOOL GENERAL INFORMATION

### Historical Statement and Facilities

The University of Texas Medical Branch, situated on the Gulf of Mexico two miles from the Texas mainland, boasts a heritage as rich and colorful as historic Galveston Island on which it is located.

The initial actions which established Galveston as a leading center of formal medical education came early in the history of the State of Texas. In 1860, the first medical college in the state was authorized in Galveston as the Medical Department of Soule University. These were troubled war years, however, and there is no recorded evidence that the college ever functioned.

Immediately after the war, the Galveston Medical College was organized, again under the auspices of Soule University. After eight years this school closed and, under the leadership of Ashbel Smith, M.D., the Texas Medical College was established. Doctor Smith served as President of the Board of Trustees and was instrumental in establishing The University of Texas a few years later.

The University of Texas and the School of Medicine were authorized by the Legislature in 1881 and their respective locations in Austin and Galveston were decided by popular vote of the people. No immediate action was taken on this authorization, and it was not until 1890 that the first medical college building was finally completed. This Romanesque-styled red brick building still stands as a landmark on the campus and, although officially named Ashbel Smith Building, it is affectionately known to all as "Old Red."

From its humble and uncertain beginnings in pre-Civil War times, The University of Texas Medical Branch has grown steadily in size and stature to emerge today as one of the giants in medical education. The campus has expanded from one building to an impressive complex of sixty buildings. The state's largest and oldest medical school, and the eighth largest medical school in the nation, covers eighty acres. Ever continuing to expand, this multi-million dollar complex is presently experiencing its greatest period of growth. This has been due in a large measure to those benefactors who, through their generous contributions, have helped make possible the Medical Branch as it is today. The names Sealy, Smith, Ziegler, Kempner and Moody abound throughout the campus and related facilities as evidence of their support.

The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston is one of the components of The University of Texas System and consists of the Graduate School, School of Medicine, School of Allied Health Sciences and clinical training for student nurses. Graduate work was formally established at the Medical Branch in 1952 with Donald Duncan, Ph.D. appointed as Associate Dean. In 1969, the Graduate School at the Medical Branch was established and in 1970, the first dean was named. Currently, there are seven programs approved for the Ph.D. degree and eight for the M.A. degree. The Master of Science in Nursing was awarded on this campus until August, 1967, at which time 61 degrees had been conferred. As of August 31, 1971, 89 Ph.D. degrees and 135 M.A. degrees have been awarded. Sixty Ph.D. degrees have been awarded since 1963.

### Physical Facilities

The programs offering graduate work are supported with up-to-date instrumentation and laboratories necessary for biomedical research, and graduate students have a wide variety of opportunities for study of basic biological phenomena. Graduate programs are primarily housed in three adjacent buildings (William Keiller, Gail Borden and Libbie Moody Thompson) on the Medical Branch campus, although additional research space is included in others.

The Medical Branch Hospitals are owned by the University and are under the direct administrative control of the Medical Branch itself; thereby providing, in one closely integrated unit, a training ground for physicians, scientists, nurses and technologists, plus a complete program of hospitalization and diagnostic treatment.

John Sealy Hospital is the principal clinical service and teaching facility of the seven hospitals and two out-patient clinics that make up the hospital complex. Other facilities include Jennie Sealy Hospital, R. Waverley Smith Pavilion, Children's Hospital, Ziegler Hospital, Graves Psychiatric Hospital, Randall Pavilion, Rebecca Sealy Out-Patient Hospital and the John W. McCullough Out-Patient Clinic. These units offer facilities for twelve hundred patients.

Besides the University-owned hospitals, the Medical Branch works in close association with many other fine institutions. The Shriners Burns Institute, internationally famous for offering the ultimate in patient care for burned children, is located on the campus. Other close affiliations include St. Mary's Hospital, located to the immediate south of the Medical Branch; The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, Hermann Hospital, Memorial Baptist Hospital, St. Joseph's Hospital, all of Houston, and Brackenridge Hospital in Austin. Each facility offers educational and research opportunities for Medical Branch faculty and students.

# New Buildings

The Moody Medical Library with approximately 69, 610 square feet of space is presently under construction and scheduled for opening early in 1972. Modern facilities for information retrieval, photo-duplication, microfilm reading and printing and audio-visual facilities are included. Study space for students and faculty will be greatly increased in the form of individual carrels, group study rooms and open reading areas.

The Libbie Moody Thompson Basic Science Building is completed and houses the facili ties for the Department of Human Biological Chemistry and Genetics; Department of Physiology, and teaching laboratories for other departments.

The Clinical Science Building, now under construction, will house the Medical Brance. Post Office, out-patient admitting offices, clinics, offices and laboratories for the clinical departments and a three hundred seat auditorium.

The Animal Care Center provides facilities for housing animals for education and research, and laboratories for special research involving animals. The

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Care Center was completed in the fall of 1969 at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000.

The Alumni Field House, built with funds contributed by the graduates and friends of the Medical Branch, contains recreational facilities for the students, staff, faculty, patients and visiting alumni. There are two handball courts, an exercise room, a lounge equipped with game tables, a snack bar and a conference room for general campus use in the building. The Alumni Offices are located in the Field House.

# Planned Construction

In the planning stages today, for completion in the near future, is a series of building programs made possible by a very generous gift of the Sealy and Smith Foundation. This gift will pave the way for much of the immediate growth in the complex. The money will be used for many projects, including a substantial addition to John Sealy Hospital which will permit the consolidation of the now separate locations of children's care activities into a more efficient centralized facility, a new building to bring together the offices of the Medical Branch administrative activities, and a high rise apartment for students, staff and personnel.

# Library

Library facilities for the School of Medicine, the School of Nursing and the School of Allied Health Sciences are provided on the main floor of the Gali Borden Building. Bound volumes in the stacks total about 128,000. Currently, 3,000 biomedical periodical titles are received, of which 1,900 titles are available as complete files. The reading room accommodates 230 students. The monograph collection has been greatly enriched by generous gifts from Dr. Allen J. Smith (1836-1926), first professor of pathology, and Dr. James Edwin Thompson (1863-1927), first professor of surgery. The library contains special collections of pictures and archival material. Microfilm readers and printers are available as well as photoduplication equipment. Small working libraries are maintained in the School of Medicine, the School of Nursing and the School of Allied Health Sciences.

A special reading and research room is provided for the History and Bibliography of Medicine on the seventh floor of the Sealy-Smith Professional Building. This room contains the historical and rare book collections. Its usefulness has been greatly increased by gifts from interested members of the faculty.

# Book Store

In February, 1961, the book store was moved into its present quarters in the Ashbel Smith Building. Facilities in the book store include a comfortable student lounge and an attractive display for all the books, equipment and other items necessary to the pursuit of satisfactory academic work.

On March 29, 1967, the book store was reorganized as "The University Medical Branch Student Book Store, Inc." It is operated under the direction of a Board of Directors composed of nine members --four from the voting members of the general faculty and administrative staff, four bona fide members of the student body and the President of The University of Texas Medical Branch.

# University Health Service

Each student is required to pay a student health fee as authorized by the State Legislature and approved by the Board of Regents. As part of the University

Health Service program, the student is eligible for medical care throughout his period of enrollment in the School of Medicine. The University Health Service is staffed by Medical Branch physicians and services provided are physical examinations, immunizations other than those required prior to admission, tuberculin testing and routine studies, as well as roentgen rays examinations at the time of entry and at periodic intervals thereafter. Students who may be ill or desire consultation may make appointments to be seen as necessary. Diagnostic studies, medications and other therapeutic modalities are available, and a physician is on call twenty-four hours a day for emergency care.

Each student is also covered by hospitalization insurance under a policy purchased by The University of Texas in the name of each student. Each new student must fill out an enrollment card at the time of registration and coverage will extend for a full calendar year from the effective date of the policy (except in the case of withdrawal from school). The present insurance coverage is provided by Blue Cross and includes a room allowance of \$10 per day for a maximum of 365 days of hospital confinement and all other usual hospital services ordered by the attending physician (except blood and plasma) and used while in the hospital. Coverage does not include surgical fees normally provided under the Blue Shield program.

The benefits outlined above do not apply to students' families but, as a courtesy, wives or husbands of students will be seen at the University Health Service, and arrangements have been made for children's care through the cooperation of the Pediatric Department in their out-patient clinic. Hospitalization may be extended to cover dependents by payment of a small additional premium. Maternity benefits are available under this program.

# Research

Research programs are a vital part of the Medical Branch. Although research cannot be judged in monetary terms, it is interesting to note that during the fiscal year 1969-1970, gifts and grants in excess of \$6,960,000 were received by the Medical Branch for research.

# Special Programs

Although the list of specialty programs given in this section is incomplete, these projects are excellent examples of the diversity of areas being developed at The University of Texas Medical Branch.

# THE MARINE BIOMEDICAL INSTITUTE

The Marine Biomedical Institute, established at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston in 1969, focuses on the solution of medical problems involved in man's developing relationship to the sea, as well as on ascertaining what the sea can contribute to medical knowledge. Studies will be directed wherever the environment of the sea or the life forms within it can contribute to an understanding of man, his health and his potential for adaptation.

One major aim is to enhance, insofar as possible, man's capability to enter and to function safely and efficiently in the depths of the sea. The hazards of the deep sea to well being or survival stem from man's interaction with several aspects of the environment: pressure, both the high pressure at depth and the effects of decompression on ascending to the surface, the cold, the isolation, the darkness, and the loneliness, as well as poisocous and predatory sea life. The aim of the Institute is to study the effects of these various forces and to learn the mechanisms that allow for adaptation to them. Studies will focus on the effects of compression, decompression, sensory deprivation and psychological stress on the rate and rhythm of the heart, with special reference to sudden death.

The most fully developed program at present is directed toward the study of electrical and chemical mechanisms that regulate synaptic transmission and thereby control visceral function and general behavior. An approach is being made through a sequence of primitive marine forms in the expectation that a phylogenetic perspective on neuronal arrangements, relating neural function to behavior, may help unravel some of the complexities of the highly organized control mechanisms of humans. Such information would be expected to contribute substantially to the understanding of human systems and the treatment of disease, as manifest in disturbed functioning of an organ system.

The evolution of the structure and function of the nervous system, including the brain, offers a particularly attractive subject for study by the comparative approach. Expert investigators in neurophysiology (electrophysiology), electronmicroscopy, neurochemistry and pharmacology, visceral function and animal behavior are being brought together in a closely intercommunicating relationship but free, each one, to apply his own creative imagination and expertise to the problems.

The various projects converge on an enquiry into what regulates synaptic transmission as an individual organism selects one among several possible effector functions in response to a variety of inputs and conditions.

# REGIONAL POISON CONTROL CENTER

At the Medical Branch Regional Poison Control Center, open 24 hours a day, a pharmacist or physician is on duty to answer urgent calls on the toxicity of various commercial products. Armed with files containing information on over 10,000 commercial products, the Center's staff helps physicians throughout the states of Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas by giving out the desired information and suggesting treatment when needed. Since busy physicians cannot possibly keep up on the chemical constituents of the approximately 250,000 toxic and potentially toxic substances commercially available each year, this Center performs this unique task for them.

# CLINICAL STUDY AREA

Every patient admitted to the Medical Branch's Clinical Study Center not only receives the best possible care, but also becomes a partner in a research team. The Center, which opened its doors during the summer of 1963, is designed to provide patient care facilities in a completely controlled environment. Here, doctors are able to conduct research studies with a maximum amount of control over hospital, nursing and dietary conditions. This independent 12-bed unit is located within the John Sealy Hospital and makes use of all the facilities which the hospital has to offer.

# BURNS CENTER

The Medical Branch is recognized as one of the top ten burn centers in use world. Working with both children and adults, the Medical Branch hospitals have made numerous discoveries important in the treatment of burned patients.

Especially significant in adult burns is the treatment of patients suffering from industrial burns from the Gulf Coast Area.

This progress made by the Medical Branch resulted in the selection of Galveston as the site for the Shriners Burns Institute, the first such hospital totally devoted to the treatment of burned children. Located on the Medical Branch campus and staffed largely by faculty members from the Medical Branch, this Institute provides the ultimate in care for burned youngsters.

# FAMILY MEDICINE PROGRAM

Recognizing the need to train doctors for this role as personal physicians, the Medical Branch has established a program of Family Medicine under the direction of Dr. M. L. Ross. Begun last year, the program is a division of the Department of Preventive Medicine and Community Health. This program will be prominent in community oriented research and studies of alternate methods for delivery of health care.

# BIRTH DEFECTS CENTER

The Birth Defects Center at the Medical Branch, sponsored by the National Foundation, is involved in studies of prevention and programs of help for children now suffering from defects.

# Texas Reports

Texas Reports on Biology and Medicine is a quarterly journal which is open to general and technical articles on biology in relation to medicine and to critical evaluations of clinical medicine from research workers anywhere. Annual volumes contain 780 or more pages. Volume 29 was published in 1971. Distribution of this journal is world wide. Research work from various divisions of The University of Texas is given priority, but the published manuscripts are from many countries. The editor and the editorial board are members of the Medical Branch staff. The library uses the journal as a medium of exchange for other periodicals and many hundreds of journals are received on this basis.

# General Statistics

During the fiscal year, 1970-1971, The University of Texas Medical Branch Hospitals operated an average of 1,076 beds and 45 bassinets. There were 21,941 inpatients admitted to the various hospitals and a total of 318,544 patient census days in the hospitals. Two thousand and sixty-four babies were born in John Sealy Hospital. The University of Texas out-patient clinics had 37,125 emergency visits and a total of 102,995 visits. The out-patient clinics operated five days each week throughout the year, excluding official holidays. In addition to the regular clinic visits, there were 16,240 visits to The University Health Service; there were 81 children admitted to the Moody State School for Cerebral Palsied Children; and 116 patients admitted to the Dialysis Center.

The several schools in the Medical Branch had enrollments as follows at the beginning of the academic year, 1971-1972:

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### FOUNDATIONS AND BEQUESTS

The Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Sealy Hospital. --In 1922 a charter was obtained by Mr. John Sealy and bis sister, Mrs. Waverley Smith, for the establishment of the Sealy and Smith Foundation for the John Sealy Hospital. The greater portion of the estates of these two generous benefactors has been incorporated in the foundation. It is administered by a self-perpetuating Board of Directors and provides relatively large sums annually for the care of the indigent sick of Galveston and for the improvement of hospital facilities and equipment.

"Thrasher Bequest. --Dr. O. B. Thrasher, a graduate of the Medical Branch of the University, bequeathed to the University in 1927 the sum of \$10,000. This money is to be used for the Medical Branch "for such purposes, and upon such conditions as the Board of Regents of the University may deem proper." Dr. Thrasher expressed a preference that the money be used in connection with the Chair or Chairs of the Medical Branch having to do with diseases of the mind.

The Howard Rush Dudgeon Surgery Lectureship. --was established by Dr. Howard Rush Dudgeon, Jr., in honor of his father, who served as a member of the staff of the department of Surgery from 1900 to 1913. It was approved by the University System Board of Regents in January, 1968. A graduate of this institution, Dr. Dudgeon served his internship here during the great storm of 1900, after which he was appointed Demonstrator of Surgery. He is best remembered for his pioneering work in cardiovascular surgery. Dr. Dudgeon died in 1953. This lectureship will bring to the Medical Branch campus outstanding men in the field who will share cheir knowledge and understanding of surgery with medical students, the resident staff and faculty.

Sam G. Dunn Lectureship on Medicine and the Humanities. --Relatives and friends have established the Sam G. Dunn Lectureship on Medicine and the Humanities to bring to the Medical Branch campus each year an outstanding physician to speak to the graduating class on the importance of the humanities in the practice of medicine. The son of a Methodist minister, Dr. Dunn believed there was more to being a doctor than receiving an M.D. degree. To him, the human aspect of medicine was second in importance only to the technical knowledge necessary for treating patients properly. He died on October 20, 1967. This lectureship was approved by the Board of Regents for the Medical Branch in October, 1967.

Lester D. King, Senior Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association and Professional Lecturer in History of Medicine, University of Chicago, gave the Sam G. Dunn Lecture in 1970.

The Hogg Foundation for Mental Hygiene. --The Hogg Foundation of The University of Texas provides special extension facilities for mental hygiene. It cooperates with the School of Medicine in bringing distinguished neuropsychiatrists at frequent intervals for special lectures at Galveston and throughout the state.

The M. D. Anderson Foundation. -- Through many generous grants from the M. D. Anderson Foundation of Houston, there has occurred broad extension of the general

health program of The University of Texas, particularly in support of cancer research and tissue metabolism.

James Greenwood Lectureship. --After his graduation from the Medical Branch in 1901, James Greenwood, Sr. began practice in his hometown of Seguin. He returned to Galveston in 1908 as a member of the faculty in the Department of Medicine. Dr. Greenwood was a pioneer in neurology and psychiatry in the Southwest, and served as the first chairman of the Department of Neuropsychiatry at Baylor University School of Medicine after its removal from Dallas to Houston.

Dr. James Greenwood, Jr., a 1931 graduate of the Medical Branch and practicing neurosurgeon, established the lectureship in 1944 in honor of his father.

Dr. Eben Alexander, Jr., Professor of Neurosurgery, Bowman-Gray School of Medicine, gave the 1970 lecture.

<u>Arnold Surman Memorial Lectureship Fund.</u> --For a number of years, The University of Texas Medical Branch chapter of Phi Beta Pi Medical Fraternity has provided funds annually for the maintenance of a yearly lecture given by some outstanding medical contributor. The fund was named the Arnold Surman Memorial Lectureship Fund in honor of Arnold Charles Surman, Jr., a former medical student and member of the fraternity, who died in August, 1946. The lecture is open to the public and is usually given in March.

Warmoth Professorship in Neurology in the Department of Neurology and Psychiatry. --This professorship was made possible through a bequest by the late Miss Charlotte Warmoth of Austin who stipulated her gift be used for the study of Parkinson's disease and leukemia.

The Frances Eastland Connally Lectureship in Obstetrics and Gynecology. --This was the first endowed lectureship in obstetrics-gynecology in the Southwest and one of the first in the nation. The annual lectureship, begun in 1964, is a gift by Dr. H. Frank Connally, Waco obstetrician, a 1937 graduate of the Medical Branch, and a past member of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas.

In 1969, the lecture was given by Dr. Samuel Jan Behsman, Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology, University of Michigan Medical School.

Harry Carothers Wiess Chair in Otolaryngology. --This Chair was established July 22, 1961, by Mrs. Olga Keith Wiess in memory of her husband. In 1917, Harry C. Wiess, then in his early thirties, was the youngest of the nine founders and original directors of Humble Oil and Refining Co., and served as president of that company from 1937 to 1948. The first Wiess Professor of Otolaryngology was appointed in 1961.

I. H. Kempner Professorship of Human Genetics. --This professorship was established in 1964 by the Kempner Foundation in honor of Mr. I. H. Kempner, oldest son of Harris and Eliza Kempner. On his 88th birthday in 1961, Mr. Kempner was honored at a testimonial dinner and proclaimed by civic leaders as "Galveston's Most Distinguished Citizen."

Ashbel Smith Professorships. -- The Ashbel Smith Professorships were approved by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas for the Medical Branch in 1965. The designation "Ashbel Smith Professor" is awarded by the Board of Regents to an outstanding member of the Faculty of the School of Medicine upon recommendation of the Faculty and the Dean of the School of Medicine, with endorsement by the President of the Medical Branch and the Chancellor of The University of Texas System.

The Meyer Bodansky Lectureship. - This lectureship is sponsored by Phi Delta Epsilon in memory of Dr. Meyer Bodansky, who was a member of the faculty at the Medical Branch from 1919 until his death in 1941. Dr. Bodansky was internationally known for his contributions in the fields of clinical physiology and biochemistry. Funds are available for an annual lectureship.

In 1970, the Meyer Bodansky Lecture was given by Dr. Kurt W. Deuschle, Chairman, Department of Medicine, Mt. Sinai School of Medicine, New York City.

Gaynelle Robertson and Edgar J. Poth Forum Fund. --A gift from Dr. Gaynelle Robertson and Dr. Edgar J. Poth in 1967 makes possible forums, seminars and visiting professorships in conjunction with these forums, in Ophthalmology and General Surgery.

Dr. Robertson (Mrs. Poth), is Professor Emeritus of Ophthalmology and Dr. Poth is Ashbel Smith Professor of Surgery.

The Arild E. Hansen Lectureship and Visiting Professorship. --Former residents and colleagues have established a visiting professorship in honor of Dr. Arild E. Hansen, chairman of the Department of Pediatrics at The University of Texas Medical Branch from 1943-1959, for the purpose of bringing outstanding visitors for two to three days to meet with the staff, residents, interns and students of the Medical Branch and present the annual Arild E. Hansen Lecture. The first lecture was given by Dr. Hansen in November, 1961.

The 1969 lecture was given by Dr. John A. Anderson, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Pediatrics, University of Minnesota Medical School, Rochester, Minnesota.

Texas Radiological Society Lectureship. - The Texas Radiological Society has established this lectureship in order to bring outstanding investigators concerned with problems in diagnostic radiology or in radiation therapy of malignant diseases to the medical schools of Texas. At the Medical Branch, a lecture to the students and faculty will be given annually and suitable seminars may be arranged during the visit of the lecturer.

Dr. F. Frank Zboralske, Associate Professor of Radiology, Chairman, Division of Diagnostic Radiology, Stanford University School of Medicine, gave the 1970 lecture.

Westell F. Windmeyer Endowment Fund. --in 1951, Mrs. Westell F. Windmeyer bequeathed to The University of Texas Medical Branch \$9,270.77, for the sole purpose of carrying on research in cancer, hypertension, polio and/or other maladies.

The William Orville Bullington Memorial Fund. --Mr. Orville Bullington and wife, Sadie Kell Bullington, donated \$20,000 to establish The William Orville Bullington Memorial Fund. The income from this fund is to be used for research to ascertain the cause and cure of pancreatitis. If and when said discovery has been made of the cause and cure of pancreatitis, then the income from this fund may be used to ascertain the cause and cure of any other disease which is largely fatal in its effects as is pancreatitis.

Daniel W. Kempner Visiting Professorships. -- This fund was established in memory

of Daniel W. Kempner, the second son of Harris and Eliza Kempner, a prominent pioneer Galveston family. Daniel Kempner had a life-long interest in the success of the medical school and in its role of preparing graduates of the school for useful and well-trained medical careers. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the H. Kempner Firm from 1889 until his death in 1956. This fund is used to bring, for a period of several days each year, one or more outstanding visitors to address and meet with the staff, residents and students of the Medical Branch. The selection of these visitors is made by the dean and faculty of the Medical Branch.

Two distinguished scientists gave lectures in 1970: Dr. Marcel Bessis, Director, Institute of Cellular Pathology and of Cancer Research, Paris, France and Dr. Don Fawcett, Hershey Professor of Anatomy, Harvard University.

James Wade Rockwell Professorship in Library Science and Medical History. --This professorship was established in 1966 by the Rockwell Fund, Incorporated. James W. Rockwell served as a member of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas from 1947 to 1953.

Charles Marc Pomerat Memorial Lectureship. --This lectureship was established in 1965 by former students and friends of Dr. Charles Marc Pomerat. A graduate of Harvard, Dr. Pomerat became professor of anatomy at the Medical Branch in 1943 and two years later was named professor of cytology and director of the Tissue Culture Laboratory. His most important scientific contribution was the recording of cellular activity in tissue culture by means of a time-lapse photograph. Dr. Pomerat died in 1964. Funds are used to bring an outstanding lecturer in anatomy to the Medical Branch campus each year.

In 1970, Dr. Leonard Hayflick, Professor, Department of Medical Microbiology, Stanford University School of Medicine, California, gave the Charles Marc Pomerat Memorial Lectureship.

The Longview Foundation, --Dr. V. R. Hurst and his associates in Longview, Texas, have established the Longview Foundation for the support of research in otolaryngology. Generous grants from the Longview Foundation assist in maintaining research efforts in the Division of Otorhinolaryngology at The University of Texas Medical Branch.

H. H. Weinert Endowment for Cardiovascular Research. --The family of Mr. H. H. Weinert of Seguin, a member of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas from November, 1933 to November, 1944, has donated considerable sums for the establishment of an endowment to support cardiovascular research at the Medical Branch. Income is used for studies in the Cardiovascular Research Laboratory, under the direction of Dr. George H. Herrmann, the first Ashbel Smith Professor of Medicine.

The Wunderman Trust. --Dr. D. C. Wunderman of Corpus Christi set up The Wunderman Trust which became effective at Dr. Wunderman's death in 1965. Income from the fund benefits The University of Texas Medical Branch's Department of Neurology and Psychiatry.

H. H. Weinert Professorship in Internal Medicine. --The family of Mr. H. H. Weinert of Seguin, a member of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas from November, 1933 to November, 1944, has donated considerable sums for the establishment of this Professorship. Dr. Benedict E. Abreu Memorial Fund, --This fund was established in 1965 by former students and friends in memory of Dr. Benedict E. Abreu. The fund is used to support some of the expenses of the Annual Student Research Forum, a function which Dr. Abreu sponsored while serving as Chairman of the Department of Pharmacology.

# ORGANIZATIONS

<u>Graduate Student Organization</u>. --The Graduate Student Organization, consisting of the student body of the Graduate School at The University of Texas Medical Branch, was established in 1952. Its purpose is to provide opportunities for students from the various disciplines to meet for social and professional activities.

Officers for 1971-1972 include: Martin A. Wasserman, President and Senator to the Student Government; John A. Reinhart, Vice-President; John M. Brady, Secretary-Treasurer and Gordon D. Schrank, Senator to the Student Government.

The proposed plans for the organization are:

- 1. inviting guests to address the student body on scientific and medical advances in research and/or education;
- 2. honoring excellence in graduate students;
- 3. an orientation program for new graduate students and also local visits to nearby schools to enlighten prospective students; and
- 4. a social program for meeting incoming students and greeting old friends.

The Graduate Student Organization will strive to foster the ideas set forth in its Constitution for the best interests (professional, educational and social) of all graduate students.

Alumni Association. --It is the object and purpose of the Alumni Association to advance the cause of medical education and to promote the interest of The University of Texas for the mutual benefit of the Medical Branch, its alumni and students. The Association is self-supporting through annual membership dues, which are minimal. Life memberships are available, and Golden T Certificates are awarded those alumni who have been in practice for 50 years. Graduating seniors are given membership gratis for eighteen months. Activities and operations of the organization are, in the main, supported by annual dues. A publication, <u>The Alumni</u> <u>Bulletin</u>, is issued four times a year, and a list of graduates with current addresses is maintained in the Alumni Office. Membership in the Alumni Association is encouraged and currently, fifty percent of the 6,000 alumni are active members. Further information regarding the Alumni Association may be obtained by contacting the Alumni Director, Miss Mildred Robertson, Alumni House, The University of Texas Medical Branch, 402 Mechanic Street, Galveston, Texas 77550.

Student American Medical Association. --The University of Texas Medical Branch Chapter of The Student American Medical Association was established at the Medical Branch by student vote in 1951 and has subsequently been enthusiastically supported by the student body. Active membership is granted to any student of the School of Medicine who is in good academic standing and has paid the prescribed dues of the organization. The objects of this organization are in accord with those of the national organization; namely, to advance the profession of medicine, to contribute to the welfare and education of medical students, interns and residents, to familiarize its members with the purposes and ideals of organized medicine, and to prepare its members to meet the social, moral and ethical obligations of the profession of medicine. In addition, it is the object of this organization to represent the student body of the School of Medicine of The University of Texas Medical Branch as the official organ in the conduct of all student affairs. The Student American Medical Association sponsors many important student functions including the SAMA-UTMB National Student Research Forum.

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Syndrome. --A student publications organization operates under the auspices of the council of the Student American Medical Association. In 1953, the first yearbook of the Medical Branch was published. The annual is a campus enterprise carried out by all Medical Branch students.

Alpha Omega Alpha is a national, non-secret medical honor society, election to which is based entirely on scholarship, moral qualifications being satisfactory. Its purpose is to encourage high ideals in medical schools, to promote high professional practice, and to encourage research. The Texas chapter was organized in 1920.

The Mu Delta Honorary Medical Service Society is composed of students, alumni and faculty members whose selection is based upon moral character, individuality, originality and attitude toward the study and practice of medicine. The object of the society is the promotion of honesty, sincerity and iraternity among members of the medical and its related professions. It aims to encourage the highest ideals in scholarship, professional practice and scientific research, and strives constantly to ennoble and exalt the medical profession. This is a local society which was organized in 1948.

The Medical Christian Fellowship is an interdenominational organization of Christian students.

Society of Sigma Xi. --The University of Texas (Galveston) Chapter was installed in June, 1954 for the purpose of encouraging original investigations in pure and applied science. It is composed of faculty and staff members, students and investigators in neighboring industrial laboratories who have made significant contributions as original investigators. A symposium by graduate students is presented twice each year.

<u>Cultural and Religious Opportunities</u>. --Broad cultural and religious opportunities are available for students and faculty on the Galveston campus. There are several music groups, including a concert series, symphony orchestra group, chamber music group and other membership organizations. Most of these are available to students at a reduced student rate. The Rosenberg Library, Historical Society and other groups of a similar nature are available to all who are interested.

Galveston churches have displayed sincere interest in the student body and faculty membership. Within a short distance of the campus, student centers are available throughout the day and evening for all comers, and churches of Galveston extend an open welcome to the student body, staff and faculty to participate in all their activities.

Student Research Forum. - As a result of student interest in basic and clinical research, a student sponsored research forum was inaugurated in 1960. The initial success of the forum led students to extend invitations to regional medical campuses and, more recently, to all medical campuses in the United States. Participants include graduate students in the health sciences, medical students, interns and residents.

In 1971, the Eleventh Annual Student Research Forum was co-sponsored by the National Student American Medical Association and designated the SAMA-UTMB National Student Research Forum. Representatives from fifty-three medical schools and hospitals (100 participants) attended the Forum and "Excellence of Research Awards" were given to persons who presented outstanding papers. Lectures at the opening and closing general sessions were presented by well-known medical men.

Student Government, --In 1970, the Constitution of the Student Government at The University of Texas Medical Branch was accepted by the Faculty of the Medical Branch. The purpose of the Student Government is to represent and unite all students at the Medical Branch under one government, and to provide a source of communication between the student body and faculty.

The role of this government will be in policy making and decisions concerning the students of all schools represented under The University of Texas Medical Branch.

# FELLOWSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

James W. McLaughlin Fellowship Program. - Through the generous bequest of the late Mr. A. C. McLaughlin of California, the James W. McLaughlin Fellowship Program has been established at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston. The program honors the late Dr. James W. McLaughlin, professor and chairman of Internal Medicine at The University of Texas Medical Branch from 1897 to 1905, and member of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas from 1907 to 1909. The James W. McLaughlin Fellowships are awarded for investigation in the fields of infectious diseases and immunity. Funds are available to support predoctoral and postdoctoral fellowships as well as senior and faculty fellowships. Fellows may be appointed for one year with opportunities for renewal in certain instances. Appoint ments are made on the recommendation of a special advisory committee. Applications for consideration for appointment may be made to the President of The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

The University of Texas Medical Branch Chapter of Sigma Xi Research Award. --An annual award of \$100 is made to the graduate student who has demonstrated the highest excellence in original research at the doctoral level and \$50 at the master's level.

Jeane B. Kempner Scholarship. --The Jeane B. Kempner Scholarship Fund was created under the will of her husband, Daniel W. Kempner, to be used and expended for the purpose of giving financial aid to exceptionally brilliant students attending the Medical Branch of The University of Texas at Galveston, to assist and encourage them in pursuing advanced studies in the fields of internal medicine and surgery, such assistance to be given following the student's normal and undergraduate years of study, through the grant to each recipient of a Jeane B. Kempner Scholarship. The purpose of this scholarship is to improve the academic standards at this institution, and recommendation of special consideration is given those applicants who may be expected to continue in academic work and, particularly, those who give promise of eventually returning to The University of Texas Medical Branch in a teaching and research capacity.

The Johanna Blumel Memorial Scholarship. --This award was established in 1963 by the American Association of University Women at the Medical Branch to honor the memory of Dr. Johanna Blumel, former president of the Association and research assistant professor in genetics in the Division of Orthopedic Surgery. It is given to a woman medical student or woman graduate student above the first year of enrollment at the Medical Branch and is based on scholarship, financial need and good citizenship.

Jimmy D. Dickens Memorial Fund. --The Jimmy D. Dickens Memorial Fund was established in 1970 at the death of Jimmy Dickens who was a third year student at the Medical Branch. Income from the fund provides for the purchase of books to be awarded annually to the outstanding graduate student in anatomy. Gifts establishing the award have been contributed by both friends and family.

Nicholas and Katherine Leone Award for Administrative Excellence. --Dr. and Mrs. Leone have established an award for administrative excellence. The award is given annually to an individual at the department chairman or equivalent administrative level for service to the scientific and teaching community of The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

The Elizabeth and Chauncey Leake Award. --This award was established by Dr. Chauncey Leake in 1970. A prize of \$250 is given to the student who has written the best essay in the history and philosophy of the health sciences and professions.

#### LOAN FUNDS

The National Defense Student Loan Program. --This program was authorized by the enactment of Public Law 85-864, the National Defense Education Act of 1958 and provides for the creation of a loan fund from which students (graduate and allied health science degree program) may borrow for the purpose of completing their education. Recipients of loans must be at least half-time students in good standing and must substantiate their need for this loan.

The Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation. -- Loans are available from the funds of the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation to assist worthy and needy students at the college or graduate level.

The Texas Opportunity Plan. --The Legislature of the State of Texas has established a loan program to assist needy college or professional students who are legal residents of the State of Texas. Medical, graduate and allied health science students are eligible to apply.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION AND CONTINUATION IN THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

#### Requirements for Admission

Application forms may be obtained from the Director, Office of Admissions, The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, Galveston, Texas 77550. There are five basic requirements for admission: (1) a Bachelor's degree from an accredited institution in the United States or proof of equivalent training; (2) a satisfactory grade point average; (3) a combined score of 1,000 on the verbal and quantitative sections of the Graduate Record Examinations Aptitude Test; (4) adequate subject preparation for the proposed major area; and (5) acceptance by the Committee on Graduate Studies of the proposed major area. When there are more qualified applicants than can be adequately instructed by the available faculty or accommodated in the available facilities, the Committee on Graduate Studies in the proposed area may deny admission to students, even though they have met all other requirements. All admissions must be approved by the Dean of the Graduate School.

Grade Point Average. An applicant with a B average on all work of upper states on

(junior and senior) and grade level previously taken has satisfied the minimum require - ments of the Graduate School in this regard.

The Graduate Record Examinations Aptitude Test. The Aptitude Test of the Graduate Record Examinations is designed to test preparation and aptitude for graduate study, and it must be passed with a combined score of 1,000 on the verbal and quantitative sections by everyone seeking admission to the Graduate School of The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

Admission on Probation. In the evaluation of a student's application, consideration will also be given to overall grade point average, performance on science courses and other factors. Consequently, some applications showing less than a B average in advanced work may be accepted upon special recommendation of the Committee on Graduate Studies in the proposed area of study. However, when a student with less than minimum requirements (including grade point average, subject matter preparation and/or GRE test score) is admitted on the recommendation of a Committee on Graduate Study, then that Committee will assign special conditions regarding the number of semester hours to be taken and specific grade point average to be maintained. If these conditions are not met, the student may be barred from subsequent registration in the Graduate School.

Permit to Register. A permit to register in the Graduate School may be granted a student who, for some valid reason, applies after the last scheduled date for the Graduate Record Examinations prior to the semester in which he plans to register. A student permitted to register on this basis is required to take and earn a combined score of 1,000 on the verbal and quantitative sections of the Graduate Record Examina-tions Aptitude Test the first time it is given after his initial registration.

Enrollment in Graduate Courses without Admission to Graduate School. Individuals holding the Baccalaureate degree or an equivalent degree may, by an arrangement with the Dean of the Graduate School, enroll in graduate courses (with permission of the instructor) even though they do not wish to enter the Graduate School or have been denied admission to it. However, students who have completed a Baccalaureate degree and have subsequently registered as special students will not be permitted to list any of the work taken prior to admission to the Graduate School in degree programs at either the Master's or Doctoral level without specific approval of the Committee on Graduate Studies and the Dean of the Graduate School.

Procedure after Admission. The successful applicant will be informed by mail about his admission and any conditions imposed on it. The student should then, at his earliest opportunity, get in touch with the adviser of the area in which he proposes to earn an advanced degree. Either through personal interview or, if necessary, through correspondence with the graduate adviser, the new graduate student should acquaint himself promptly with specific area regulations and requirements; for example, in some areas special entrance examinations are required. The student must have his course program approved each semester by the graduate adviser of his major area before he can register for courses.

#### General Graduate School Regulations

Student Responsibility. The student is held responsible for knowing degree requirements and enrolling for courses that fit into his degree program. He is likewise held responsible for knowing the University regulations in regard to the standard of work required for continuance in the Graduate School. If he needs additional information, he should consult the Office of the Graduate School. For a complete list of requirements for a particular degree, the student should combine the General Requirements and Special Requirements listed under the specific degree for which he is applying.

<u>Grades</u>. Credit is given in the Graduate School for the grades <u>A</u>, <u>B</u>, and <u>C</u>. In the student's major, every semester hour of <u>C</u> must, as a minimum requirement, be balanced by a semester hour of <u>A</u>. Only graduate level courses taken in graduate status at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston are counted in the average.

In some courses, the standard grading system is not practicable and, in these, the symbol <u>CR</u> is given; such courses are not counted in the average and are not counted in the number of semester hours specifically required in Master's degree programs. They are taken into account in Doctoral degree programs which do not have specific semester hour requirements.

The symbol X, reported in cases where the student has not completed all the assignments in a course before its conclusion, is valid for a period not to exceed twelve months. Before the end of this time, the student must turn in the required work for a regular grade. Otherwise, the X is changed automatically to an F.

Maximum Course Load. The normal maximum course load for a graduate student is fifteen semester hours; registration in excess of these maxima must have the special consent of the Dean of the Graduate School and will be permitted only under exceptional circumstances. If the student is employed by the University as a teaching assistant, research assistant or student assistant, his course load may be correspondingly reduced. The student should consult his graduate adviser about his combined course and work load. For exact information and regulations as to adding and dropping courses and withdrawal from the University, contact the Office of the Graduate School.

Minimum Course Load. The minimum course load for a graduate student is three semester hours.

Continuation in the Graduate School. Registration in the Graduate School beyond the first semester is dependent on the following factors: (1) satisfactory progress in absolving any admission conditions that were imposed; (2) maintenance of a B average in graduate courses taken in the major area; and (3) satisfactory progress in supporting graduate courses as determined by the Committee on Graduate Studies in the major area.

Should a graduate student's progress be unsatisfactory in a given semester, he will be warned by a letter from the Dean of the Graduate School that his continuance is in jeopardy. During the next semester in which he is registered, he must be able to maintain a <u>B</u> average, or he will be automatically dismissed at the end of it; and during this period the Dean of the Graduate School will not permit him to drop any courses or to withdraw.

The graduate student who has been dismissed may be re-admitted for further graduate study only by petition of the Committee on Graduate Studies of his proposed major area. This petition will be considered and approved or disapproved by the Dean of the Graduate School.

Requirements for Degrees

General Regulations

Residence. Each degree candidate must spend at least two semesters or the equivalent, in residence at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

No student may receive advice and assistance from a member of the Faculty in the preparation of his thesis or dissertation without being registered.

"In absentia" registration constitutes an arrangement for the candidate who has finished the last requirements, including submission of thesis or dissertation, for his degree too late for the semester deadline but before the first registration day of the following semester. Such a candidate may, for a nominal fee, register in the next following semester for the sole purpose of receiving his degree in that semester.

Extension. Work done in extension classes, up to a limit of six semester hours, upon recommendation of the Committee on Graduate Studies and approval by the Dean of the Graduate School, may be allowed for graduate credit provided: (1) the courses and instructors are approved by the Graduate School and the department in which the student would have otherwise taken the work on campus; and (2) the applicant before taking the extension course, be accepted for admission to the Graduate School and approved by the Dean of the Graduate School for the Courses desired.

<u>Correspondence Courses</u>. Courses done by correspondence are not accepted for graduate credit.

<u>Courses Counted for Another Degree</u>. A maximum of eight semester hours credit in graduate course work completed while enrolled in the School of Medicine may be counted toward a Master's degree, if it is equivalent to requirements for the Master's degree and if it is approved by the Committee on Graduate Studies and the Dean of the Graduate School.

Work done for the Master's degree may be included in the work for the degree, Doctor of Philosophy, provided it is acceptable to the candidate's supervisory committee and the Dean of the Graduate School.

Transfer of Credit. Ordinarily all work for the Master's degree is done at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston. Under some circumstances, graduate course work may be transferred from another institution but only on the basis of a petition by the Committee on Graduate Studies in the student's major area and approval by the Dean of the Graduate School. In cases where such transfer is approved, the student must still meet the residence requirement of two full semesters or the equivalent.

<u>Credit for Teaching</u>. Up to three semester hours of credit toward the Master's degree or Doctoral degree may be granted to a candidate who completes at least two semesters of teaching in his major area (with special permission of the Dean of the Graduate School, the teaching may be in a supporting or minor area) at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, under the close supervision of a regular faculty member. To obtain this credit, the student teacher must enroll in a special graduate course in supervised teaching in his

area and receive the grade of  $\underline{B}$  or higher; however, a grade of  $\underline{A}$  will not offset C's made in course work. The Doctoral candidate may list this course in his official program of work.

English Language Requirement. Students admitted to the Graduate School are expected to write papers and examinations in English in a good, expository style, and to speak well and grammatically. For admission to some areas of graduate study, the student is required to pass an examination in the English language; in other areas his proficiency in written and spoken English will be evaluated in his courses and in his contacts with faculty members.

<u>Time Limits</u>. No official time limit has been imposed on acquiring the Doctoral degree; however, all doctoral work is subject to review by the dean. All requirements for the Master's degree, however, must be completed within one six year period. Work over six years old is lost and can be reinstated only by special permission of the Dean of the Graduate School, upon recommendation of the Committee on Graduate Studies.

Graduation Under a Particular Catalogue. General and specific requirements for degrees in Graduate School may be altered in successive catalogues, but the student is bound only by the requirements of the catalogue in force at the time of his admission, within a six-year limit. At his discretion he may choose to fulfill the requirements of a subsequent catalogue.

Graduation. Degrees are awarded at the end of the fall semester, the spring semester and the summer semester, but formal, public ceremonies are held only at the spring commencement. All candidates, including those actually awarded their degrees in the preceding fall and summer, are urged to attend commencement exercises. Since Doctoral degrees are conferred individually, it is particularly desired that Doctoral candidates be present for the ceremony of investiture at commencement at the end of the spring semester.

Fields of Graduate Study. The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston is authorized to offer graduate work in the fields of study listed below. Each field of study indicates the degree or degrees available in that field:

Doctor of Philosophy degree programs may be developed, with the consent of the Dean of the Graduate School, in areas extending beyond those listed above, in areas in which those listed above overlap, and in specialized subfields.

Supporting work for the Ph.D. degree may be done in any of the areas listed above or in any other unit of The University of Texas System offering sufficiently advanced work that correlates with the major field.

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# DOCTORAL DEGREE

The Graduate School of The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston offers the degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

The basis for award of the degree. Doctor of Philosophy, is the candidate's demonstration of his mastery of a selected field and of his ability to do independent scholarship in it. The Committee on Graduate Studies is responsible for recommending students as candidates for this degree upon their demonstration of their mastery of the field. The supervisory committee is responsible for certifying the candidate's ability to accomplish independent scholarship.

# Outline of Routine for all Doctoral Students

- 1. Meeting foreign language requirement.
- 2. Admission to candidacy by the Committee on Graduate Studies of the student's major area, after appropriate examination is stipulated by the Committee on Graduate Studies.
- 3. Selection of a supervising professor.
- 4. Securing of an application for candidacy form from the Graduate School Office.
- 5. Submission of the application for candidacy form, including the program of work, to the Graduate School Office. Upon receipt of these forms, correctly filled out, the Graduate Dean will appoint the supervisory committee.
- 6. Filing a diploma name card in the Graduate School Office.
- 7. Submission of the dissertation to the supervisory committee.
- 8. Submission of the dissertation data sheet.
- 9. Formal request for the final oral examination, accompanied by dissertation abstract and the candidate's vita.
- 10. Submission of the Report of Final Oral form, signed by the supervisory committee, to the Graduate School Office immediately following completion of the final oral examination. This form certifies that the student has completed the work assigned by the committee; passed all examinations required by the department, including the final oral; completed a dissertation which gives evidence of ability to do independent investigation in the major field, and itself constitutes a contribution to knowledge; and submitted for publication in "American Dissertation Abstracts" an abstract which meets the approval of the committee.
- 11. Submission of the following items to the Graduate School Office not later than the published deadline for the semester in which the degree is to be awarded: (a) original copy of the dissertation, signed by the committee (all candidates should determine, in advance of typing the final draft, whether there are special requirements in their major area for additional copies of the dissertation); (b) payment of fee for microfilm reproduction, in addition to any other costs; (c) official transcript of all graduate work; (d) copyright disclaimer; (e) survey of earned doctorate; and (f) microfilm agreement.

Foreign Language Requirement. All Doctoral programs in the Graduate School have a minimum requirement of proficiency in one foreign language for admission to candidacy. Selection of a specific language will be made by the student's Committee on Graduate Studies. If the committee decides on a language other than French, German, Russian or Spanish, its choice is subject to the approval of the Graduate Dean.

The minimum requirement in foreign languages can be satisfied: (1) by an examination approved by the Dean of the Graduate School or (2) by completion of two academic years of study of the language at an accredited college with a grade of at least B either before or after entering Graduate School.

The minimum requirement may be waived by the Graduate Dean upon special petition of the appropriate Graduate Studies Committee on behalf of the candidate. This action shall in no way affect the right of the Committee on Graduate Studies to require demonstration of a higher level of proficiency if needed in relation to specific programs. In some areas a higher degree of mastery of the selected language or proficiency in one or more additional languages may be required.

Admission to Candidacy. A student should not apply for admission to candidacy until he has met the minimum foreign language requirement of the Graduate School. Until the student has a supervisory committee appointed, he shall be under the direction of the Committee on Graduate Studies in his major area. Every student who seeks the degree of Doctor of Philosophy must be admitted to candidacy on the recommendation of the Committee on Graduate Studies in his major area or of a special committee appointed by the Dean of the Graduate School in consultation with the Committee on Graduate Studies, on the basis of a qualifying examination, written or oral, or both. The application for candidacy must be approved by the Dean of the Graduate School.

Supervising Professor. Before a student is admitted to candidacy and has a supervisory committee appointed by the Dean of the Graduate School, he will plan his program with the assistance of the Committee on Graduate Studies or an advisory committee appointed by them and the graduate adviser. A supervisory committee will normally consist of five members, four from the candidate's major area (including one member from another institution), and one from a supporting field. After the student has been admitted to candidacy, he should select a supervising professor. This supervising professor will be in charge of the candidate's Doctoral dissertation and will act as chairman of the supervisory committee. It will be the responsibility of this supervisory committee to see that he satisfies all requirements. In every instance, final approval of the candidate's program shall be the responsibility of the Dean of the Graduate School.

Course Requirements. Although advanced course work is an integral part of the Doctoral candidate's preparation, no minimum number of semester hours (corresponding to the thirty hours requisite for the Master's degree) has been set for attainment of the Doctor of Philosophy degree; however, all doctoral work is subject to review by the Dean of the Graduate School. The real basis on which the degree is awarded, is the candidate's demonstration of his mastery of a selected field and of his ability to do independent scholarship in it.

A candidate is expected to have a major area which represents his most intensive field of study. Moreover, the candidate will undertake all appropriate work needed to broaden or supplement his field of specialization. Officially termed supporting work, this may consist of course work in one department or in several; it may be conference, laboratory or problems work; or it may be some special and supervised activity off campus relevant to the candidate's major interest. Some portion (not necessarily all) of the supporting work will normally be outside of the major area, unless that area covers more than one department. The Graduate School does not insist on a comprehensive examination in the supporting work, but either the appropriate Committee on Graduate Studies or the candidate's supervisory committee may impose one at its own discretion. Doctoral Dissertation. No student will be permitted to register for a dissertation course until he has been admitted to candidacy. The dissertation is required of every candidate and must be, as a result of independent investigation in the candidate's major area, an original contribution to scholarship. It must be accepted by the candidate's supervisory committee, though at the request of this committee the Dean of the Graduate School may appoint a subcommittee to pass on the dissertation.

Before the prospective date for the awarding of the degree, the supervising professor will receive a complete copy of the dissertation (unbound) from the candidate. The supervising professor will make the necessary arrangements for supplying the other members of the committee with a copy of the dissertation and will insure that sufficient time for reading it will be provided. After the whole committee has familiarized itself with the dissertation, the members sign a notice of acceptance by which they state their willingness to examine the candidate on his dissertation.

Final Oral Examination (Defense of Dissertation). Until the final oral examination has been successfully passed, the dissertation is not actually regarded as approved. The examination will cover the dissertation and the general field of the dissertation, and such other parts of the student's program as the committee may determine. If the examiners are satisfied that the candidate has: (1) completed the work assigned by the committee; (2) passed all examinations required by the department, including the final oral; (3) completed a dissertation which gives evidence of ability to do independent investigation in the major field and itself constitutes a contribution to knowledge; (4) submitted for publication in "American Dissertation Abstracts" an abstract which meets the approval of the committee, they then sign the approval sheets for the Doctoral dissertation and an official recommendation of the candidate to the Dean of the Graduate School.

Submission and Publication of Dissertation. The successful candidate is required to pay the cost of microfilm reproduction of his complete dissertation by University Microfilms, Inc., Ann Arbor, Michigan.

With the dissertation, the student must also submit to the Dean of the Graduate School two copies of an abstract, not to exceed two pages in length (double-spaced), which has been approved in final form by the supervisory committee. This will be published in "American Dissertation Abstracts."

Publication by University Microfilms, Inc. does not preclude subsequent publication of the dissertation, in whole or in part, as a monograph or in a journal. Copyright, at the author's expense, may be arranged if desired. In order to protect patent or other rights, the Dean of the Graduate School may be requested to delay publication by University Microfilms, Inc. for a period of one year. This request must be supported by a written recommendation from the supervising professor.

# MASTER'S DEGREE

The Graduate School of The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston offers the Master of Arts degree with majors in the areas indicated.

#### Outline of Routine for all Candidates for Master's Degrees

- Filing in the Graduate School Office: (a) a diploma name card;
   (b) an application for candidacy; (c) a program of work; and
   (d) an official transcript of all work done at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.
- 2. Submitting the thesis to the supervisory committee.

3. Submitting to the Graduate School Office for final approval of the Graduate Dean two bound final copies of the thesis.

#### General Requirements for all Master's Degrees

Entering Examination. The Committee on Graduate Studies in the student's major area may, at its discretion, examine the student on his undergraduate preparation before his application to enter the program is approved.

Requirements. For any Master's degree, thirty semester hours of graduate instruction are required. Eighteen to twenty-four semester hours, including the thesis, must be in the major area of instruction. An obligatory part of every Master's degree program consists of a minimum of six hours in a supporting subject or subjects outside the major area. The relative number of hours in the major and supporting fields, as well as the nature of the supporting work, will be determined in consultation with the student's graduate adviser. Until the student has a supervisory committee appointed, he shall be under the direction of the Committee on Graduate Studies in his major area. Every proposed program of work needs the approval of the Dean of the Graduate School.

Thesis. The candidate for the Master's degree writes his thesis under the direction of a supervising instructor who is chairman of a supervisory committee appointed by the Dean of the Graduate School. The thesis is subject to the approval of the committee and ultimately to the approval of the Dean of the Graduate School. The researching and writing of the thesis involves six semester hours of credit but, with special persmission of the supervisory committee and the Dean of the Graduate School, nine semester hours of credit may be given to it.

Final Examination. In many areas a candidate may, in addition to preparing a thesis, be required to pass an oral or written examination (or both) conducted by his supervisory committee.

# Health Requirements

A medical data form to be filled out by the applicant and a licensed Doctor of Medicine, must be submitted as part of the formal application. Forms to be used for this purpose will be furnished with the application blank.

Entering students will be given a physical examination by members of the staff. Physical examinations may be required subsequently at the beginning of each academic session or when requested.

Prior to entering Graduate School and in order to avoid inconvenience and possible loss of time from classes, students must receive immunizations as listed below at their own expense. A form to be used for this certification from a licensed physician will be furnished to each applicant granted admission. A military service immunization record will satisfy these requirements:

- (1) Smallpox vaccination: a successful immunization giving at least an immune reaction, within the past year.
- (2) Tetanus: a full course of tetanus toxoid or a booster within the past year.
- (3) Diphtheria: a negative Shick test. A full course of diphtheria toxoid if "Shick positive," with retesting six weeks later.

### (4) Poliomyelitis immunization.

## Registration

The applicant will receive complete details concerning the time and place of registration from the Office of Admissions at the Medical Branch. Registration must be completed within the first week of each session and, if possible, on the day set for that purpose.

# Legal Residence

Following are the nonresident regulations defined by the Texas Legislature. Under these regulations, the term "residence" means "domiciled" and the term "resided in" means "domiciled in." The Commission on Higher Education provides uniform interpretations of the statutes and interested students should consult the Director of Admissions and Student Personnel Services for such interpretations.

- 1. An individual under twenty-one (21) years of age, living away from his family, and whose family resides in another state or has not resided in Texas for the 12-month period immediately preceding the date of registration shall be classified as a nonresident student.
- 2. An individual twenty-one (21) years of age or under, whose family has not resided in Texas for the 12-month period immediately preceding the date of registration, shall be classified as a nonresident student regardless of whether he has become the legal ward of residents of Texas or has been adopted by residents of Texas while he is attending an educational institution in Texas, or within a 12-month period before his attendance, or under circumstances indicating that the guardianship or adoption was for the purpose of obtaining status as a resident student.
- 3. An individual twenty one (21) years of age or under whose parents were formerly residents of lexas is entitled to pay the resident tuition fee for the 12-month period immediately following the parents' change of legal residence to another state.
- 4. An individual twenty-one (21) years of age or over who has come from outside Texas and who is gainfully employed in Texas for a 12-month period immediately preceding registration in an educational institution shall be classified as resident student as long as he continues to maintain a legal residence in Texas.
- 5. An individual twenty one (21) years of age or over who resides out of the state or who has come from outside Texas and who registers in an educational institution before having resided in Texas for a 12-month period shall be classified as a nonresident student.
- 6. A nonresident student classification is presumed to be correct as long as the residence of the individual in the state is primarily for the purpose of attending an educational institution. After residing in Texas for at least twelve (12) months, a nonresident student may be reclassified as a resident student as provided the the rules and regulations adopted by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. Any individual reclassified as a

resident student is entitled to pay the tuition fee for a resident of 1240Texas at any subsequent registration as long as he continues to maintain his legal residence in Texas.

- 7. A nonresident who marries and remains married to a resident of Texas, classified as such under this Act at the time of the marriage and at the time the nonresident registers, is entitled to pay the resident tuition fee regardless of the length of time he has lived in Texas, and any student who is a resident of Texas who marries a nonresident is entitled to pay the resident tuition fee as long as he does not accept the legal residence of the spouse in another state.
- (1) An officer, enlisted man or woman, selectee or draftee of 8. the Army, Army Reserve, Army National Guard, Air National Guard, Texas State Guard, Air Force, Air Force Reserve, Navy, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps, Marine Corps Reserve, Coast Guard or Coast Guard Reserve of the United States, who is assigned to duty in Texas is entitled to register himself, his spouse, and their children in a state institution of higher education by paying the tuition fee and other fees or charges required of Texas residents, without regard to the length of time he has been assigned to duty or resided within the state; provided, however, that out-of-state Army National Guard or Air National Guard members attending training with Texas Army or Air National Guard units under National Guard Bureau regulations shall not be exempted from nonresident tuition by virtue of such training status nor shall out-of-state Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard Reserves training with units in Texas under similar regulations be exempted from nonresident tuition by virtue of such training status. It is the intent of the legislature that only those members of the Army or Air National Guard, Texas State Guard, or other reserve forces mentioned above, be exempted from the nonresident tuition fees and other fees and charges only when they become members of Texas units of military organizations mentioned above.

(2) As long as they reside continuously in Texas, the spouse and children of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States who has been assigned to duty elsewhere immediately following assignment to duty in Texas are entitled to pay the tuition fees and other fees or charges provided for Texas residents.

(3) If nonresident military personnel are attending an institution of higher education under a contract between the institution and any branch of the Armed Forces of the United States, in which the tuition of the member of the military is paid in full by the United States Government, the student will pay the nonresident tuition fee,

(4) A Texas institution of higher education may charge to the United States Government the nonresident tuition fee for a veteran enrolled under the provisions of a Federal law or regulation authorizing educational or training benefits for veterans.

(5) The spouse and children of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States who dies or is killed are entitled to pay the resident tuition fee, if the wife and children become

residents of Texas within sixty (60) days of the date of death. (6) If a member of the Armed Forces of the United States is stationed outside Texas and his spouse and children establish residence in Texas by residing in Texas and by filing with the Texas institution of higher education at which they plan to register, a letter of intent to establish residence in Texas, the institution of higher education shall permit the spouse and children to pay the tuition, fees, and other charges provided for Texas residents without regard to length of time that they have resided within the State.

- 9. A teacher, professor, or other employees of a Texas institution of higher education is entitled to register himself, his spouse and their children in a state institution of higher education by paying the tuition fee and other fees or charges required for Texas residents, without regard to the length of time he has resided in Texas. A teacher, professor, or other employee of a Texas institution of higher education is any person employed at least one-half time on a regular monthly salary basis by a state institution of higher education.
- 10. An alien student is classified as a nonresident student; however, an alien who is living in this country under a visa permitting permanent residence or who has filed with the proper Federal immigration authorities a declaration of intention to become a citizen has the same privilege of qualifying for resident status for fee purposes under this Act as has a citizen of the United States. A resident alien residing in a junior college district located immediately adjacent to Texas boundary lines shall be charged the resident tuition by that junior college.
- 11. The nonresident tuition fee prescribed in this Act does not apply to a nonresident student who is a resident of a state situated adjacent to Texas and who registers in any Texas public junior college situated immediately adjacent to the state in which the resident resides. The nonresident student described in this Subsection shall pay an amount equivalent to the amount charged a Texas student registered at a similar school in the state in which the nonresident student resides.
- 12. The Governing Board of each institution required by this Act to charge a nonresident tuition or registration fee is subject to the rules, regulations, and interpretations issued by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, for the administration of the nonresident tuition provisions of this Act. The rules, regulations and interpretations promulgated by the Coordinating Board shall be furnished to the presidents or administrative heads of all Texas public senior and junior colleges and universities.
- 13. The Governing Board of state-supported institutions of higher education are authorized to assess and collect from each nonresident student failing to comply with the rules and regulations of the Governing Boards concerning nonresident fees a penalty not to exceed Ten Dollars (\$10) a semester.

# Selective Service Requirements

Upon request of student, the Director of Admissions will send Selective Service System Form SSS (Graduate or Professional College Student Certificate) to the student's local draft board.

#### Prepayments

<u>Registration Deposit.</u> --On acceptance by the Graduate School and in order to reserve a place in class, a \$10 fee is required. Upon matriculation, the \$10 fee will serve as library-laboratory-property deposit. This deposit covers library fines and breakage of laboratory equipment and other charges resulting from damage to or loss of University property. If at any time the deposit falls below \$5, the student will be notified and will be required to restore the deposit to its original amount. Whatever remains will be refunded to the student after graduation or withdrawal from school upon written request.

# Tuition and Fees<sup>1</sup>

Tuition and fees for each academic year are due and payable in full at the time of registration and a student is not registered until his fees are paid in full. Students should be prepared to pay tuition at the time of registration.

Tuition. In accordance with the provisions of House Bill 43, passed by the Sixtysecond Legislature, tuition for students in the Graduate School will be as follows:

TEXAS RESIDENTS Tuition is \$4 per semester hour with a \$50 minimum charge per semester. If a student is registered for thesis or dissertation only, the charge will be \$12 (3 hours) or \$24 (6 hours). NONRESIDENTS Tuition is \$40 per semester hour. ALIENS Students who are not citizens of the United States will pay at the rate of \$14 per semester hour with a minimum charge of \$200 per semester.

Definitions of "Resident" and "Nonresident" students are in this catalogue under "Legal Residence" for fee purposes.

Nonresident and alien students may enroll for thesis or dissertation credit only for a charge of \$50.

Furthermore, if the student is employed at least half-time by a Texas State Institution of Higher Education in a position which relates to his degree program, or if the student's spouse is employed at least half-time by a Texas State Institution of Higher Education, the student's tuition will be computed according to the schedule for Texas residents.

<sup>1</sup>The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston reserves the right to change tuition and fees in keeping with the action of the Texas State Legislature or the Board of Regents. Laboratory Fee. -- Laboratory fees (for each laboratory course):

Student Health Fee. -- To cover the cost of hospitalization and medical care by the University Health Service, a fee of \$20 a semester is charged. For a nominal fee, dependents may be added to Blue Cross coverage.

Graduation Fee. --A fee of \$24 will be assessed all degree students to cover the cost of diplomas, caps and gowns, and other incidental costs of graduation. This fee must be paid at the time of filing the diploma name card.

Refund of Fees. --Refund of tuition because of withdrawal from school is made under the following conditions: any student withdrawing officially (1) during the first week of classwork of a semester will receive a refund of 70 per cent of the applicable portion of the fee; (2) during the second week, 60 per cent; (3) during the third week, 40 per cent; (4) during the fourth week, 20 per cent; (5) during the fifth week and thereafter, nothing.

In no case shall the refund provided for above exceed 70 per cent of the tuition fees. An immediate refund will not be made to a student who withdraws, but within approximately 30 days, a check covering all refunds will be mailed to the address left with the Office of Admissions.

#### Living Arrangements

Housing is an individual matter and each student must make his own arrangements. Air-conditioned dormitory rooms for women are available on campus. Students are housed two to a room in units made up of two bedrooms with adjoining bath. A cafeteria is available in the John Sealy Hospital.

Inquiries concerning dormitory rooms should be sent to:

All fraternities have houses within easy walking distance of the medical school, and room and board is available to their members at reasonable cost.

Married students should make arrangements for living accommodations well in . advance of matriculation and prior to bringing their families to Galveston. There will be little time available for this purpose after entering school.

Exemption from Fees. --Exemption of Texas ex-servicemen. --The State Legislature has directed that a legal resident of Texas is to be exempted from certain required fees but not from deposits when he meets all of the following criteria:

- 1. He has resided in Texas for a period of not less than twelve (12) months prior to the date of registration.
- 2. He was a "bona fide" legal resident of the state at the time of entering such service.
- 3. He served in the armed forces or in certain auxiliary services in World War I, World War II, the Korean conflict or the Cold War.

- 4. He was honorably discharged therefrom (except those who were discharged because of being over the age of thirty-eight or because of a personal request).
- 5. He is not eligible for education benefits provided for veterans by the United States Government.

To obtain this exemption, the veteran should apply to the Office of Student Personnel Services for instructions well in advance of the date on which he expects to utilize this benefit for registration. Every applicant claiming the benefit of this exemption must submit satisfactory evidence that he is a legal resident of Texas (see page\_\_\_\_) and was a "bona fide" legal resident of Texas at the time of entering such service and is otherwise entitled to the exemption. Until such proof has been accepted by the Office of Student Personnel Services and the entitlement established, the student will pay the regular fees from his own funds.

Benefits for children of Texas veterans. --Exemptions from payment of certain fees also extends to children of members of the armed forces who were killed in action or died while in the service in World War II or in the Korean conflict or in the Cold War, and to orphans of members of the Texas National Guard and The Texas Air National Guard killed since January 1, 1946, while on active duty. For procedure to follow under this provision, contact the Office of Student Personnel Services.

Exemption of children of certain disabled public employees. --By an act of the Fiftyninth Legislature, children of certain firemen, peace officers, employees of the Texas Department of Corrections, and game wardens who have suffered injury resulting in death or disability sustained in the line of duty are exempt from payment of all tuition and laboratory fees. For procedure to follow under this provision, contact the Commissioner of Higher Education.

Exemption of certain deaf and blind students. --By an act of the Fifty-ninth Legislature, blind or deaf persons who are Texas residents are exempt from payment of tuition fees. For procedure to follow under this provision, contact the Commissioner of Higher Education.

Exemption of high school graduates of state orphanages of Texas. --By an act of the Fifty-first Legislature, citizens of Texas who are high school graduates of the state orphanages of Texas are exempt from certain required fees, including fees for correspondence courses, but not from deposits. After his application for admission has been approved, the applicant should request a scholarship card from the Office of Student Personnel Services.

Payment of fees for handicapped students. --Texas Education Agency, through its Vocational Rehabilitation Office, offers payment of tuition and other fees and services to civilian students (normally nonveterans) who have certain physical handicaps, provided the vocational objective selected by the student has been approved by a representative of the division. Application for vocational rehabilitation should be made to the Austin Rehabilitation District Office, 100 1/2 West Tenth Street, or to the District Rehabilitation Office nearest the student's home.

#### STUDENT AFFAIRS

#### Honor System

The Honor System is the means by which the protection of the examination system and a greater responsibility for the general conduct of student affairs is assumed by the student body. Its purpose is to allow maximum freedom for students during the examinations and, at the same time, to insure the validity of the examinations.

When the student accepts this freedom, he is placed on his honor by the group neither to cheat on an examination, nor to violate the trust placed in him in any way. The only limitations placed on this freedom are those rules made through the Honor Council for the best interest of the group. The student body is directly responsible for the effective working of the Honor System. In order to uphold the validity of degrees obtained under the Honor System, such steps must be taken as are necessary to protect the student body from those who violate the trust placed in them. These measures will be carried out by an elected body known as the Honor Council. The Honor Council shall be responsible to the Faculty of The University of Texas Medical Branch through the appropriate dean. The faculty gives recognition to this Constitution by means of which it confers upon the student body the privileges and responsibilities of the Honor System. The Faculty Committee on Student Affairs shall act as an advisory board for the Honor Council and shall review the report of all hearings. Graduate students who are taking courses in the School of Medicine at Galveston shall be bound by the same pledge as medical students and shall be subject to the provisions of this Constitution.

Membership in this Honor System shall include all students enrolled in The University of Texas Medical Branch.

The student formally enters this organization on entering The University of Texas Medical Branch when, in the normal course of matriculation, he shall be required to sign a pledge stating that he will support the Honor System. Duties of each member shall include:

- a. The signing of the following pledge at the time of matriculation:
  "I hereby agree to support and to be governed by the Honor System of The University of Texas Medical Branch, throughout my present or subsequent enrollment period.
  "I will neither give nor receive aid concerning any examination.
  "I will report any violation of the Honor System as provided for in the Constitution of the Honor System.
  "I understand that the penalty for violation of the Honor System may be dismissal from The University of Texas Medical Branch.
  Signed.
- b. Becoming thoroughly informed concerning the Constitution and Standing Rules of the Honor System.
- c. Reporting any violation in the manner prescribed under Article V of this Constitution.

Privileges of each member shall include the following:

- a. There shall be no deliberate proctoring on any examination.
- b. He shall enjoy the general freedom of conduct which is associated with assuming a wider and more mature level of personal responsibility in student affairs.

Upon registration in the Graduate School, each student must signify in writing that he has read the provisions of the Honor System and that he subscribes to the Honor System.

#### Student Conduct and Discipline

The University of Texas System and its component institutions have rules and regulations for the orderly and efficient conduct of their business, and each student is charged with notice and knowledge of the contents and provisions thereof. All students are expected and required to obey the law, to show respect for properly constituted authority and to observe correct standards of conduct.

Gambling, immoral conduct, dishonesty, the illegal use, possession or sale of a drug or narcotic, or the excessive use of intoxicating liquors renders the student subject to discipline. Any student placed on probation for or finally convicted of illegal use, possession or sale of a drug or narcotic shall be automatically expelled from school, regardless of whether or not the illegal act that gave rise to the conviction was committed on the campus of one of the component institutions of The University of Texas System.

Hazing in state educational institutions is prohibited by state law. (Texas Penal Code 1925, Articles 1152, 1153, 1154 and 1155). Hazing with or without the consent of a student is prohibited by The University of Texas System, and a violation of that prohibition renders both the person inflicting the hazing and the person submitting to the hazing subject to discipline.

Initiations by organizations may include no feature which is dangerous, harmful or degrading to the student, and a violation of this prohibition renders the organization subject to discipline.

Any student who acting either singly or in concert with others, obstructs or disrupts, by force or violence, any teaching, research, administrative, disciplinary, public service, or other activity authorized to be held or conducted on the campus of a component institution of The University of Texas System, shall be subject to discipline, including expulsion. As used in this subsection, the words "force or violence" include such acts as "stand-ins," "sit-ins" and "lie-ins," when such acts are in fact obstructive or disruptive of any of the authorized activities listed above.

The component institutions of The University of Texas System shall administer student discipline within the procedure of recognized and established due process. Accordingly, reasonable notice should be given the student of the specific charge of misconduct against him, which, if proved, would be a violation of some rule or regulation of The University of Texas System or of the institution of which he is a student.

### Student Debts

The University is not responsible for debts contracted by individual students or by student organizations. On the other hand, the University expects all students and student organizations to conduct themselves honorably in all commercial transactions. The University will not assume the role of a collection agency except for monies owed to the University, nor will the University adjudicate disputes between students and creditors over the existence or the amount of debts.

In the event of nonpayment to the University, one or more of the following actions may be taken: (a) a bar against readmission for the student, (b) withholding of the student's grades and official transcript, (c) withholding of a degree to which the student otherwise would be entitled.

#### Student Organizations

An organization in which membership is limited to students (recognizing faculty and staff may also be members) may become a registered student organization at the University by complying with the registration procedures and with approval of the dean.

A registered student organization may state that its membership is composed of students or students and staff of the University, but shall not suggest or imply that it is acting with the authority of the University.

The dean, with the approval of the institutional head, may issue regulations governing the eligibility of students for participation in organized activities. Any student organization is subject to disciplinary action or revocation of registration as a student organization for violation of University policies or regulations.

# Use of University-owned Facilities

Use of Physical Facilities of the University by Outside Groups; a Registered Student Organization as Joint Sponsor. --Registered student organizations may use University physical facilities in compliance with institutional regulations. Groups of students which are not registered may not use University physical facilities. Registered student organizations may not enter into joint sponsorship of any on-campus project or program with individuals, groups of students which are not registered, or non-University groups, except as provided in Part Two, Chapter VI, Sec. 6 of the "Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents for the Government of The University of Texas."

# Speech and Assembly

Freedom of inquiry and discussion are basic and essential to intellectual development. Students have the right therefore, to freedom of speech and assembly, subject to the following:

(1) "It shall be unlawful for any person knowingly or willfully to...advocate, abet, advise, or teach by any means...under such circumstances as to constitute a clear and present danger to the security of the United States, or of the State of Texas, or of any political subdivision of either of them...." (Texas Civil Statutes, Article 6889-3A, Sec. 5)

(2) The time, place, and manner of exercising speech and assembly on the campuses shall be subject to regulations adopted by the University. Such regulations require orderly conduct, noninterference with University functions and/or activities, and identification of sponsoring individuals or groups.

# Off-Campus Speakers

The University of Texas Medical Branch reserves the right to regulate the presentation of guest speakers on the campus who are not affiliated with the University. Off-campus speakers must be registered in advance by the sponsoring group with the Office of Admissions and Student Personnel Services. Forms for this purpose are available in the Office of Admissions and Student Personnel Services.

#### Anonymous Publications

Anonymous publications are prohibited. Any student publishing or aiding in publishing, or circulating or aiding in circulating, any anonymous publication will be subject to suspension.

<u>Programs of Study</u>: The department offers programs leading to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees. Preference is given to applicants interested in the Ph.D. degree.

The programs include course work, teaching assistantship duties and original research. A thesis is required for the M.A. degree and a dissertation for the Ph.D. degree. At least two years of study are required to complete the master's program and four years for the doctoral program.

During the first year, students take courses in gross anatomy, medical embryology, microscopic anatomy and neurobiology. In the second year the student becomes familiar with the different areas of research, starts his teaching experiences and continues the required and elective course work. A master's degree candidate completes his thesis and takes a final comprehensive examination covering his research at the end of the second year or at the completion of his research project. A qualifying examination is given to students in the doctoral program at the end of the second year. During the last two years of the doctoral program a student, under the guidance of an adviser and his doctoral committee, concentrates on research in the area in which he is particularly interested and writes a doctoral dissertation that is acceptable to the department and to the Graduate School. Frequently, he will also take additional course work in his area of interest. All doctoral students must demonstrate a reading knowledge of one foreign language.

Areas of specialization include gross anatomy, microanatomy, neuroanatomy, neurophysiology, experimental embryology and teratology, endocrinology, ultrastructural cytology and tissue culture. Graduate students will have ample opportunities to familiarize themselves with the numerous techniques and research tools now in use in the biological sciences.

Students usually begin their studies in the fall semester.

<u>Facilities</u>: The department is housed in the Keiller Building. There is ample space and equipment available for research in all phases of anatomy. The department is particularly well equipped with electron microscopic facilities, a tissue culture laboratory equipped with micromanipulation and time-lapse instrumentation and equipment for electrophysiology especially adapted to work on the spinal cord, brain stem and cerebral cortex. Facilities and equipment to work in endocrinology and experimental embryology are excellent.

<u>Specific Admission Requirements</u>: Applicants should have an undergraduate major in a life science, together with a suitable background in physical science and mathematics. An average of <u>B</u> in advanced work (senior college and graduate-level) and a combined score of 1100 on the verbal and quantitative portions of the Graduate Record Examination are minimum nonprobationary admission requirements.

# Graduate Courses:

6701. <u>Gross and Developmental Anatomy</u>. --Lectures, conferences and laboratory work covering the gross anatomy of the entire body. Four students are assigned to a cadaver, and each student is loaned a disarticulated skeleton. Laboratory study is aided by a large number of permanent glass mounted dissections, an extensive collection of roentgenograms, fluoroscopic demonstrations and clinical case presentations. Lecture, five hours a week; laboratory, eight hours a week; first semester. Seven semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6302. <u>Microscopic Anatomy</u>. --Lectures, conferences, demonstrations and laboratory work on the microscopic anatomy of the human body. The course starts with consideration of the cell in the living and fixed state and proceeds to study of the tissues and systematic organology. Presentation of the subject includes motion pictures of living cells, microscopic slide demonstrations and use of a large number of models and charts. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, two hours a week; first and portion of second semesters. \$4 laboratory fee.

6304. Advanced Gross Morphology. --Lectures, assigned reading and conferences on the comparative, functional and the clinical aspects of human gross anatomy. Prerequisite: Anatomy 6701. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; first semester. Three semester hours.

6205. Advanced Neuroanatomy. --Conferences, demonstrations, and assigned reading on details on neural organization and their functional significance. The course includes attendance at a weekly conference on gross pathology of the brain. Lecture and conference, three hours a week; second semester. Two semester hours.

6206. <u>Advanced Developmental Anatomy</u>. -- Conferences, reading, study of the local collection of human embryos. Prerequisite: Anatomy 6302. Lecture and conferences, three hours a week; second semester. Two semester hours.

6207. Advanced Histology. -- Analysis of tissues and organs by microscopic methods including histochemistry. Prerequisite: Anatomy 6302. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, six hours a week; second semester. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6108. Special Cytology. --Lectures and demonstrations on the special techniques that are used for the study of living cells and tissues. Lecture or conference, two hours a week; second semester. One semester hour.

6209. Advanced Endocrinology. -- A lecture course reviewing present knowledge on structure and function of the endocrine glands. Lecture and conference, three hours a week; second semester. Two semester hours.

6210. Experimental Endocrinology. -- A study of methods and preparations commonly

used in endocrinology with practical experience. Lecture and conference, two hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; second semester. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6312. <u>Biological Electron Microscopy</u>. --Lectures, conference and laboratory work on the methodology and interpretation of electron microscope pictures of biological materials. Prerequisite: Anatomy 6302. Lecture and conference, two hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; second semester. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6113. <u>History of Anatomy. --Conferences and assigned readings on the great anato-</u> mists and their discoveries. Lecture, one hour a week; second semester. One semester hour.

6114. Anatomy Seminar. Reports and discussion of staff research, reviews of the literature, lectures by visitors. Credit for seminar granted on the basis of attendance, participation and an examination. Lecture, one hour a week; offered throughout the year and may be repeated for credit. One semester hour.

6215. Anatomy of the Kidney.--Lectures, conferences and demonstrations on the normal gross and microscopic structure of the kidney in man and the lower animals. Prerequisite: Anatomy 6302. Lecture and conference, three hours a week; second semester. Two semester hours.

6916. <u>Research in Anatomy</u>. --Semester hour credit is granted on the usual basis to student doing independent or contributing to group research. Not to exceed nine semester hours credit.

6417. <u>Basic Neuroscience. - A lecture and laboratory course stressing the basic</u> principles of neuroanatomy and neurophysiology as they relate to the normal and diseased human nervous system. Subject matter from neuropharmacology, neurochemistry and related disciplines is included where pertinent. Also listed as Physiology 6424. Lecture and conference, five hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; second semester. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6318. <u>Cell Biology</u>.--Lectures and conferences which correlate cell structure and function. The course includes aspects of cellular organelles, genetics, energy production and reproduction. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Also listed as Physiology 6325. Lectures and conferences, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6419. <u>Endocrinology</u>.--Lectures and conferences designed to correlate structure and function of organs of the endocrine system. The course stresses basic and . integrated aspects of the anatomy, physiology, biochemistry and pathology of this organ system. Also listed as Physiology 6426. Lectures, four hours a week; conferences, two hours a week. Four semester hours.

6698. Thesis. -- Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6699. <u>Dissertation</u>. --Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

<u>Programs of Study</u>: This is a non-degree course sequence designed to offer course work and other experiences to graduate students in degree programs as a basis for integration of the behavioral sciences into their careers in research and education.

The courses offer instruction in human psychological growth and development, social organization and its contributions to behavior and an introduction to the objective assessment of human and animal behavior.

The courses are available to any student admitted to one of the approved graduate degree programs.

# Graduate Courses:

6301. Personality Growth and Development Through the Life Cycle, --This course considers the normal growth and development of the individual from birth to death. The emphasis throughout is on the wide range of adjustive techniques employed by the individual in his dynamic relationship with his culture. The various stages of the life cycle with their unique demands on the individual are considered. Each student will prepare a paper based on a review of the literature on a specific aspect of human development. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6302. Human Society: Problems and Principles. --An introduction to the study of social systems as wholes with primary emphasis on the characteristic and range of variation of human society. Secondary emphasis is upon how individuals may be shaped and transformed through participation in human interactional contexts. Pre-requisite: Behavioral Science 6301. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6303. Seminar in Behavioral and Social Research Techniques. --Seminars designed to present theoretical and practical aspects of research techniques in behavioral and social research. Behavioral and psychological testing plus observational evaluation are included. Seminars, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6904. <u>Directed Reading and Research in Behavioral Science.--Laboratory and</u> library research performed by the student under the direction of the faculty. Projects are designed so as to lead to augmentation of the student's major research interest. Credit varies according to the work performed. Maximum credit, nine semester hours.

Programs of Study: Programs leading to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees are offered. The objectives of graduate education in blochemistry are to prepare the graduate student for a professional career in research and in teaching wherein the principles and methods of biochemistry are applied to the study of biological and medical problems. Courses of formal study and research experience are provided in several areas of fundamental biochemistry. The programs endeavor to establish initially in the student a broad general knowledge of modern biochemistry, followed by a development of a program designed for the individual student, Opportunities for training and experience in teaching are available.

For the M.A. degree, in addition to the biochemistry school requirements, a final oral examination, including defense of thesis, is required.

The biochemistry course requirements for the M.A. degree include the general biochemistry course and a course in enzymology. Additional courses should be planned with the graduate adviser.

For the Ph.D. degree, the written and oral qualifying examinations take place after the candidate has completed most of his formal courses of study and after meeting satisfactorily the foreign language requirement of the University.

The Ph.D. candidate must prepare and present a written dissertation on original experimental work in a suitable area of biochemistry. A final oral examination in defense of the dissertation completes requirements for the degree.

Facilities: The program in biochemistry occupies the sixth floor of the new Libble Moody Thompson Basic Science Building. Major areas of research and interests of the faculty include mechanisms of hormone action, steroid biochemistry, molecular biology, enzymology, bioenergetics, ion transport, intermediary metabolism and biochemical genetics. Excellent library facilities support research and training interests. Research and teaching assistantships and fellowships are available for gualified applicants.

Specific Admission Requirements: Applicants should have a strong background in chemistry and the biological sciences. Applicants with majors in other areas will be considered provided they have an appropriate background in chemistry, mathematics and physics, including courses in general, analytical, organic and physical chemistry, mathematics through the integral calculus and one year of college physics. A student may be accepted without one or two of these courses provided that he complete the deficiency prior to graduation.

# Graduate Courses:

6501. <u>General Biochemistry</u>. --A course dealing with physiochemical relations of living matter; chemistry of foodstuffs and tissues; analysis of body tissues and fluids; enzymes, digestion, absorption, metabolism and pH regulation. Lecture and conference, four hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. \$8 laboratory fee.

6302. Electronic Basis of Laboratory Instrumentation. -- A course dealing with electronics and instrumentation as confronted by biochemists. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, three to six hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6303. <u>Biochemical Methods</u>. --A course dealing with spectrophotometry and fluorimetry, chromatographic methods, isotopes, centrifugation and manometric techniques. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, one to three hours a week; laboratory, three to six hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6304. <u>Biochemical Methods</u>. --A course dealing with ultramicrotechniques, following methods of Lowry and Lindestrom-Lang. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 and consent of instructor. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, three to six hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6305. Biochemistry of Amino Acids and Proteins. --An advanced course covaring the chemistry, physical properties, biological activities and intermediacy metabolism of amino acids and proteins. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501or equivalent. Lecture,

three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6306. Special Topics in Biochemistry. --Lecture courses covering a variety of topics at an advanced level. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, three hours a week. May be repeated for credit when the topics vary. Three semester hours.

6407. Enzymology. --Properties of enzymes; kinetics and thermodynamics of enzymecatalyzed reactions. Techniques of preparations, isolation and assay of various enzymes. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, six hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6208. Biochemistry of Nucleotides and Nucleic Acids. --An advanced course in the chemistry and metabolism of these important substances. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6209. <u>Biochemistry of Carbohydrates</u>. --An advanced course dealing with the chemistry and metabolism of the carbohydrates in the light of recent investigations. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6210. <u>Biochemistry of the Lipids.</u> --An advanced course dealing with the chemistry and metabolism of lipids in the light of recent investigations. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6211. <u>Clinical Biochemistry. --A lecture course dealing with the application of</u> biochemistry to clinical manifestations. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6312. Physical Biochemistry. --Aspects of colloidal and physical chemistry pertaining to biological phenomena. Topics include acids and bases, thermodynamics, kinetics, viscosity, electrokinetics, sedimentation, diffusion, ionic solutions, spectroscopy, etc. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501, physical chemistry. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6113. Seminar. --Investigative work in progress and other selected topics. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, one hour a week. One semester hour.

6914. <u>Research.--Prerequisite</u>: Biochemistry 6501 and consent of instructor. Laboratory, twenty-seven hours a week. This course will vary in credit according to the work performed. May be repeated for credit. Not to exceed nine semester hours credit.

6215. <u>Biochemistry for the Steroids.</u> --An advanced course dealing with the chemistry and metabolism of steroids in light of recent investigations. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6316. <u>Molecular Biology</u>. --An advanced course dealing with molecular mechanisms of information transfer and its regulation in the cell. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6217. <u>Biochemical Methods in Molecular Biology</u>. --A course dealing with laboratory techniques of molecular biology, including isolation, fractionation and characterization procedures. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Laboratory, three to six hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee. 6318. <u>Neurochemistry</u>. --An advanced course dealing with the biochemical changes in the brain during development and function. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, four hours a week, with laboratory projects individually arranged. Three semester hours.

6219. <u>Principles of Modern Biology</u>. -- An advanced course dealing with the integration of biological and physical sciences in a unified concept of function and evolution of living systems. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6698. Thesis. --Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6699. <u>Dissertation</u>. --Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

Programs of Study: The program in human genetics offers work leading to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in human genetics and to combined M.D. -Ph.D. degree. There are also postdoctoral opportunities. The subspecialties of human genetics in which training in depth can be provided include biochemical genetics, cytogenetics (including somatic cell genetics), immunogenetics and clinical genetics. Training and basic research are offered within the framework of a large medical center with patient referrals from the entire state of Texas. Areas of genetic research emphasized in this program include: inborn errors of metabolism, transport studies using cystic fibrosis as a model, human protein polymorphisms and sequence determina tions, protein-protein interactions, genetic control of antibody synthesis, hyperand hypocoagulable states, organization and function of the mammalian genome, inherited defects of cellular organization in <u>Neurospora crassa</u>, characterization of chromosome structure and complement in tissue culture and development skills. Opportunities for interdisciplinary study and research exist with the Departments of Internal Medicine, Pediatrics and Physiology; the divisions of cell biology and biochemistry, and the Marine Biomedical Institute.

Facilities: Research areas in the Thompson Basic Science Building include facilities and apparatus for automatic protein sequencing and amino acid analysis in addition to specialized laboratories for biochemical, immunlogical and enzymological investigations. Tissue culture and microscopy facilities are also available. Individual study areas are available for graduate and postdoctoral trainees.

Specific Admission Requirements: Applicants should have a major in biological science or chemistry including three hours of genetics or equivalent, college chemistry through organic chemistry and mathematics through analytic geometry or equivalent.

# Graduate Courses:

6301. <u>Biochemical Genetics</u>. --Lectures in the molecular basis of inheritance, including the following topics: nucleic acids and protein synthesis, the genetic code, genetic mutation, suppressors of mutant gene expression, recombination, and the synthesis and repair of nucleic acids. Prerequisite: Three hours of genetics. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6402. Advanced Human Genetics. -- This course will cover problems peculiar to human heredity as studied in family groups or in populations. Methods of analyzing human genetics data will be included. Prerequisite: College algebra and consent of instructor. Lecture, four hours a week. Four semester hours.

6103. <u>Medical Genetics</u>. --Lectures in medical genetics including cytogenetics, chemical mechanisms in heredity, metabolic errors, modes of inheritance and probability. Lectures, one hour a week. One semester hour.

6404. <u>Cellular Genetics</u>. -- Autosomal and sex chromosome structure and behavior in humans. Cytogenetic techniques and an introduction to tissue culture will be included. One lecture and four laboratory hours a week. Prerequisite: Three semester hours and consent of lecturer. Four semester hours.

6205. <u>Recent Advances in Genetics</u>. --Lectures, assigned readings in recent advances in human heredity. May be repeated for credit with consent of instructor. Lecture, two hours a week; conference, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6406. <u>Current Concepts in Genetics</u>. --A survey of recent literature in genetics. Students will be responsible for class presentations. Lectures and conferences, four hours a week. Four semester hours.

6207. Inborn Errors of Metabolism. --This course will cover the inherited diseases whose basic metabolic disturbance is sufficiently understood to permit discussion. The greater emphasis will be on the mechanism of the enzymatic blocks. The primary aim of the course is to give an understanding of the basic defect and its effect on metabolism. There will be correlation of the topics with presentation of the clinical material in the hospital. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6408. Problems in Genetics. -- The student will participate in a tutorial under one faculty member in Human Genetics. He will conduct research on a topic in genetics

literature or will learn laboratory techniques utilized by the instructor. Credit hours will depend on the project and time expended, but up to the maximum of four hours will be allowed.

6309. Evolution and Protein Molecules. --Lectures and seminars covering current concepts of evolution and its effect in protein structure. The evolution of hemo-globins, cytochromes, protein hormones, immunoglobulins and fibrinogens is discussed in detail. Prerequisite: Three hours of blochemistry and consent of the instructor. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6310. Organization and Function of the Eucaryotic Genome. --A lecture course including physical properties and renaturation kinetics of nucleic acids. Structure and function of hetero- and euchromatin. Evolution of base sequences. Control of DNA synthesis. Information transfer in mammalian cells. Control of transcription. Prerequisite: Consent of instructor. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6311. Immunogenetics. --Lectures and seminars on the structural concepts governing antigen-antibody reactions and accompanying immunological phenomena. The course will cover the following topics: the concept of complementarity, theories of antibody formation, antigens and haptens, immunoglobulins, dynamics and quantitative aspects of antigen-antibody interaction, genetic basis of antibody variability, antibody biosynthesis, complement sequence and hypersensitivity. Prerequisite: Three hours of biochemistry. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6120. <u>Genetics Seminar.</u>--Reports and discussion of staff research, reviews of the literature, lectures by visitors. May be repeated for credit. Lecture, one hour a week. One semester hour.

6921. Research in Human Genetics. --Semester hour credit granted on basis of student's independent research.

6422. Special Topics in Genetics. --This is a course designed to offer subject matter of current interest from genetics and other related fields, such as the genetic control mechanisms relating to the synthesis and degradation of macromolecules, and the evolutionary dynamics contributing to human genotypic expression. Prerequisite: Consent of the instructor. Credit varies depending upon the specific material covered. Lecture, three or four hours a week. Three or four semester hours.

6698. Thesis, --Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6699. <u>Dissertation</u>. --Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

<u>Programs of Study</u>: The Department of Microbiology offers programs leading to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees. The subspecialties of microbiology in which training in depth can be provided include pathogenic bacteriology, virology, parasitology, mycology, immunology and microbial physiology.

At the conclusion of the first year of study, which usually consists principally of course work, the predoctoral student is given a comprehensive qualifying examination. Also during the first year, the Ph.D. candidate must demonstrate a reading knowledge of an approved foreign language. Thereafter, a student selects a supervising professor and a supervisory committee is appointed. He begins research and continues his training in microbiology and in other fields of science, as required by his needs and goals in biomedical sciences.

All students are required to have training and experience in teaching prior to receiving a degree in this department. Students with comparable previous experience are excused from this requirement.

Facilities: Since the institution is medically oriented, extensive opportunities exist for integrating microbiological training and research with an interest in human health and disease. The department is well equipped with modern equipment for research in microbiology. Approximately 14,000 feet of air -conditioned departmental space is available for teaching, research and animal care.

Financial Aid: The department has assistantships and other funds to support a number of students. Another source of support at this campus is the James W. McLaughlin Fellowship Fund, which awards several fellowships to predoctoral and postdoctoral students in the fields of infection and immunity. Departmental teaching and research assistants are exempt from out-of-state tuition fees. Some fellowships include payment of tuition.

Specific Admission Requirements: Applicants should have an undergraduate major in a life science and a suitable background in physical science and mathematics. Applicants with majors in other areas of science will be considered. An average of B in upper-division undergraduate courses and a combined score of 1000 on the verbal and quantitative portions of the Graduate Record Examination are minimum nonprobationary admission requirements.

#### Graduate Courses:

6601. Medical Microbiology. --An introduction to microbiology as related to the biomedical sphere of activity. This course includes introductory consideration of the medically significant bacteria, fungi, viruses, protozoa and helminths. Emphasis is placed upon factors important to the study of host-parasite relationship including the general biology of parasites, immunology, mechanisms of pathogenicity and chemotherapy. Conferences, six hours a week for two terms. Six semester hours.

6403. <u>General Virology</u>. --Principles and concepts of all fields of virology will be introduced, but the majority of the course will be devoted to study of viruses of medical importance. Throughout the course emphasis will be placed upon the chemical and physical characteristics of viruses, mechanisms of replication, immunology and pathogenesis. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601 or permission of instructor. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6305. <u>Pathogenic Bacteriology</u>, --A study of bacterial human pathogens and their roles in infectious diseases. This is an advanced level course. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601 or permission of instructor. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6306. <u>Mycology</u>.--Emphasis is placed upon the pathogenic fungi. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6307. Parasitology.--Host-parasite relationships of medically-important protozoa, helminths and arthropods. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601 or permission of instructor. Lecture, two hours a week; conference, one hour a week; laboratory, two hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6508. Immunology. --This is a general course in immunology but with some emphasis on those aspects that operate in the host-parasite relationships involved in infectious diseases. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601 or permission of instructor. Lecture, four hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Five semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6310. <u>Bacterial Chemistry and Physiology</u>. --The biochemical features peculiar to various bacterial species are described and are compared with those of the animal cell. Prerequisite: A course in biochemistry. (Microbiology 6601 or a course in general microbiology is recommended.) Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6312. Chemotherapy. -- The study of the basic principles of chemotherapy of infectious diseases. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601, or consent of instructor. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6614. Advanced Work. --Assigned studies in various fields of microbiology. Prerequisite: Microbiology 6601 or consent of instructor. This course will vary in credit according to the work performed. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6698. Thesis.--Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6699. <u>Dissertation</u>. -- Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

<u>Programs of Study</u>: The Department of Pathology offers programs leading to an  $\overline{M.A.}$  degree and M.D.-M.A. combined degree. The student must be enrolled in the medical school before entering the M.D.-M.A. program.

Included in both programs are course work, individual tutorials and supervised research. Preparation of a thesis is required based on that research. Course work includes microanatomy, cell biology, introduction to pathology and an additional basic medical science course relating to the student's research area. Research is supervised by a faculty member who also provides tutorials relating to specialized areas of knowledge. The purpose of the non-M.D. Master's degree program is to train research oriented medical personnel with a fundamental knowledge of pathobiology, experimental design and research techniques. The M.D.-Master's degree program is designed to provide an opportunity for medical students to obtain research skills and an in depth knowledge of a specialized area of pathology relevant to his career plans.

Areas of specialization include neuropathology, immunopathology, ultrastructural cytology, viral oncology, renal pathology, endocrine pathology and clinical bio-chemistry, microbiology and immunohematology.

<u>Facilities</u>: The department is located in the Keiller Building with additional facilities located in the McCullough Building and Jennie Sealy Hospital. Research areas include a radioisotope laboratory, tissue culture area, tissue typing and immunopathology, cytochemical and electron microscope areas.

In addition, the clinical laboratories are equipped with modern instruments available for research utilization. Also available is a departmental photography laboratory.

Financial Aid: Support is arranged on an individual basis. Part-time employment in the department is generally available.

Specific Admission Requirements: Applicants should have an undergraduate major in a life science, together with a suitable background in physical science and mathematics. An average of <u>B</u> in advance work (senior college and graduate-level) and a combined score of 1100 on the verbal and quantitative portions of the Graduate Record Examination are minimum nonprobationary admission requirements. The department will interview applicants before acceptance.

Graduate Courses:

6501. <u>General Pathology</u>. --Lectures, demonstrations, case presentations, 1261. conferences and laboratory work dealing with the principles of pathology. Emphasis is on processes of disease stressing pathogenesis. Prerequisite: Anatomy 6302, Biochemistry 6501. Lecture and conference, six hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; third term. Five semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6502. Systemic Pathology. --Lectures, demonstrations, case presentations, conferences, autopsy assignments and laboratory work. This is a systematic consideration of specific diseases including anatomic, functional and chemical alterations as well as "clinical pathology." Etiology and pathogenesis are stressed. The case method of presentation is followed in laboratory studies. Prerequisite: Pathology 6501. Lecture and conference, six hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; first semester. Five semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6904. <u>Course in Advanced Pathology</u>. --This deals with such subjects as neoplastic diseases, surgical pathology, cardiovascular-renal disorders, neuropathology, electron microscopy, etc. Prerequisite: Pathology 6501 and Pathology 6502. This course will vary in credit according to the work performed. Maximum credit, nine semester hours.

6905. Research in Pathology. -- This work will vary in credit according to the work performed. Maximum credit, nine semester hours.

6306. Introduction to Pathobiology. --Correlation of cell structure as related to function to provide a basis for study of cellular pathobiology. Initial consideration is given to pathologic states. Lecture and seminars, four hours a week. Three semester hours.

6307. Pathobiology. --This course is a continuation of Pathology 6306 and relates cellular pathobiology to human disease states. Lecture and seminar, four hours a week. Three semester hours.

6698. <u>Thesis.--Prerequisite</u>: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

Objectives: The aim of the graduate program is to educate promising candidates for scholarly careers in teaching and research in medical pharmacology and toxicology.

Research experience, an essential part of the program, is required in one or more of the several subdivisions of the discipline represented in the interests of the faculty of the department.

Programs of Study: The department offers programs leading to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees or combined M.A. -Ph.D. or M.D. -Ph.D. degrees. There are also opportunities for postdoctoral training. Although there is a considerable degree of flexibility to accommodate the individual student, the establishment of a broad base in pharmacology and allied sciences, such as neuroanatomy, histology, embryology, biochemistry, physiology, microbiology and pathology, is considered important.

The current areas under investigation are: the role of catecholamines in metabolism and function; adrenergic receptors; pharmacology of ganglia; smooth and striated muscle pharmacology; enzymology of cyclic AMP and ATPase systems; ion transport mechanisms; renal pharmacology; cardiac arrhythmias and drugs; chemotherapy for parasites; neuropsychopharmacology; and marine toxins and toxicology. There are excellent opportunities for collaboration with other departments in the fields of microanalytical techniques, genetics and pharmacology of burned patients.

Facilities: The department is equipped to carry on research with advanced instrumentation in most areas of biochemical and physiological pharmacology. All departmental facilities are available for the use of graduate students.

Specific Admission Requirements: The applicant should hold at least a bachelor's or the equivalent degree. A strong background in chemistry, physics, mathematics and biology is essential, and a knowledge of physical chemistry, psychology and foreign languages is desirable.

## Graduate Courses:

6701. Basic Pharmacology. -- Action of drugs used for diagnosis, prevention, cure and alleviation of symptoms of disease; pharmacodynamics; principles of toxicology and pharmacotherapy, Prerequisite: Physiology and Biochemistry, Lecture and conference, seven hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Seven semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6403. Toxicology. -- Advanced study of toxicological methods, signs and symptoms of poisoning and antidotes. Quantitative aspects of pharmacology. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory jee,

6404. <u>Biochemical Pharmacology</u>. --Pharmacodynamics of drug actions in cells studied at the molecular level. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. 58 laboratory fee.

6405. Biochemorphology. --Relation of chemical structure of drugs to their physiological action. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6406. <u>Principles of Drug Action</u>. --Seminars and laboratory assignments on the **1263** general principles of drug action, including molecular mechanisms; absorption, distribution and elimination; metabolism; time course of action; toxicity, idiosyncrasy and pharmacogenetics; allergy resistance; tolerance and physical dependence; mutagenesis; carcinogenesis; teratogenesis; development and selection for clinical use. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, two hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6407. <u>Chemotherapy</u>. - General principles of altering the host-parasite relation in treatment of infectious diseases with antibiotics, heavy metals, cinchona and other alkaloids, and miscellaneous agents. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6408. Advanced Autonomic Pharmacology. --Seminars and laboratory assignments dealing in depth with the actions of drugs on the autonomic nervous system (including the afferent and central components of its reflexes) and on the effector systems which it innervates. Prerequisite: Pharmacology 6701 or permission of instructor. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6409. <u>Cardiovascular Pharmacology</u>. --Mechanism of action of known cardiovascular drugs on the heart and circulation. Study of drug action on cardiovascular reflexes. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6410. <u>Renal Pharmacology</u>. --Demonstration of mechanism of action of diuretic agents in normal, salt-loaded and in animals in congestive failure. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6411. <u>Neuropharmacology</u>. --Study of mechanisms of drug action on transmission at selected synaptic areas in the central and peripheral nervous system. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6412. <u>Psychopharmacology</u>. --Study of methods for demonstrating action of drugs on normal and abnormal behavior in selected laboratory animals. Extrapolation to actions in normal and psychotic patients. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6913. <u>Research in Pharmacology</u>.--Laboratory, clinical and library investigation of drugs, largely initiated and carried through by the student. This course will vary in credit according to the work performed. Nine semester hours maximum credit.

6114. Seminar in Pharmacology. -- Presentation by staff and students of progress of their own research as well as review of recent advances in pharmacology. Lecture, one hour a week. May be repeated for credit. One semester hour.

6415. <u>Procedures for Pharmacologic Evaluation of Drugs.</u>--Review of procedures for pharmacologic evaluation of various classes of chemical compounds. Lecture, three hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6316. <u>Biometrics in Pharmacology</u>. --A study of the mathematical techniques useful in the collection, evaluation and interpretation of data collected from biological experiments. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6698. Thesis.--Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

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6699. <u>Dissertation</u>. -- Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

<u>Programs of Study</u>: Graduate programs leading to M.A. and Ph.D. degrees, as well as combined M.A. -M.D. or M.D. -Ph.D. degrees, are available to qualified students. Although 30 hours of credit are required for the M.A. degree, awarding of the Ph.D. degree is based not upon completion of a specified number of credit hours but rather upon attainment of an adequate level of knowledge and research competence. Four years in residence is the usual minimal time for individuals without previous graduate training to complete requirements for the Ph.D. degree. A comprehensive examination to test knowledge in physiology and related sciences is usually given after two years and satisfactory performance is required for formal admission to candidacy.

Programs of study include foundation courses in mammalian, cellular and comparative physiology, biophysics, biochemistry, histology, genetics, statistics and related material. More advanced study is conducted through seminar-type sessions in which specialized areas in physiology and related sciences are examined in depth. Seminar courses in which a given student participates are determined by his background, interests and goals.

Students interested in physiology of marine forms or man in the sea may perform research in the Marine Biomedical Institute in Galveston.

<u>Facilities</u>: Modern, well equipped laboratories for graduate student research and individualized study areas are provided in a new building. Sophisticated electronic, mechanical, isotopic, optical and other instrumentation is available. The Medical Branch provides a library that subscribes to 3,000 periodicals, a computer center, and machine and electronics shops. The Department of Physiology also has its own machine and electronic shops. An animal hospital with laboratories for animal research has recently been opened. Laboratories in the new Shriners Burns Institute are available for physiologic research.

Background knowledge in biology, chemistry, physics and mathematics is needed for admission to and for success in graduate studies.

#### Graduate Courses:

6501. <u>Medical Physiology and Biophysics</u>. --A lecture and conference course stressing the fundamentals of mammalian physiology with consideration of the underlying principles of physics and chemistry. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, four hours a week; conference, two hours a week; second semester. Five semester hours.

6202. <u>Chemistry and Physiology of Blood</u>, --Course deals primarily with blood coagulation and fibrinolysis, but consideration is also given to effects of the composition of blood on its rheological properties. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501 and Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6204. Experimental Endocrinology. --A laboratory course in the methods and preparations commonly used in endocrinology. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6205. Aviation and Space Physiology. --Lectures and seminars on biological effects in environments beyond the earth's surface. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6306. <u>Physiology of the Kidney.--Lectures and seminars of renal structure and</u> function. Special attention is given to physicochemical aspects involved in excretory, secretory and endocrine functions of the kidney. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6307. <u>Neurophysiology</u>. --Study of mechanisms of cellular excitation, synaptic transmission, and interaction of neuron group as related to functional neurology, behavior and the related neurological sciences. Lectures, seminars and demonstrations. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6208. Experimental Mammalian Physiology, --A laboratory course in advanced techniques with discussion periods. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6309. Introductory Cellular Physiology. --Basic principles of cell function, a survey course; lectures, seminars and demonstrations. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6310. Advanced Cellular Physiology. --Physiologic mechanisms of specialized cells and their responses, including growth and division radiobiology, and molecular biology. Emphasis on recent literature. Lectures and seminars. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent, Biochemistry 6501, calculus and physical chemistry. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6311. Biophysics. -- A lecture course covering electrophysiology, physical and mathematical models for living systems, information theory and computer technology.

Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent, calculus and physical chemistry. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6112. Weekly Seminars in Advanced Physiology. --Reports of investigative work, reviews of literature and presentations of topics of interest by staff members, graduate students and visiting scientists. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, one hour a week. One semester hour.

6313. Comparative Physiology. --Lectures and seminars covering basic problems in the maintenance of the living state in invertebrate and vertebrate animals. Lecture, two hours a week; seminar, one hour a week. Three semester hours.

6914. <u>Physiology Research. --Hours and credit to be arranged after consultation</u> with staff. Maximum credit, nine semester hours.

6215. <u>Bioinstrumentation</u>. --A laboratory course covering the characteristics, applications and limitations of equipment used in modern physiology. Prerequisite: consent of instructor. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, six hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6316. Calculus for Biomedical Courses. --Differential and integral--including analytical geometry. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6317. Physical Chemistry. --Basic concepts in physical chemistry including kinetic gas theory, thermodynamics, laws of solution, surface phenomena, colloids, equilibria, reaction kinetics, membrane potential, electrical conductance and electrochemistry. Prerequisite: calculus--differential and integral. Lecture, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6318. <u>Cardiac Physiology</u>. --Seminar course on cardiac physiology; current litera -Dure used as basis for critical discussion. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or equivalent. Lecture, five hours a week. Three semester hours.

6219. <u>Gastrointestinal Physiology</u>. --Selected aspects of motility secretion, digestion and absorption in the alimentary tract are studied in depth. The course consists of lectures, discussions, library research and demonstrations. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 and Biochemistry 6501. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6220. <u>Membrane Transport.--Lectures and discussions dealing with the structure</u> and function of biological membranes; emphasis is placed on the physics and chemistry of movement of substances across membranes. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501, Biochemistry 6501, calculus and physical chemistry. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6321. Special Topics. --Study of special topics in physiology. Topics are selected and study programs arranged on an individual basis with a member of the staff. Prerequisite: consent of instructor. Three semester hours.

6222. <u>Rheology and Microcirculation.</u> --A survey of current concepts of the rheology of blood and control of microcirculation. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501. Lecture, three hours a week. Two semester hours.

6423. Cardiovascular Physiology. -- A lecture and laboratory course covering major aspects of cardiovascular functions and current techniques for quantitation. Reports of studies in scientific journals will be evaluated. Prerequisite: Physiology 6501 or

equivalent. Lecture, three hours a week. Laboratory, three hours a week. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6424. <u>Basic Neuroscience</u>, --A lecture and laboratory course stressing the basic principles of neuroanatomy and neurophysiology as they relate to the normal and diseased human nervous system. Subject matter from neuropharmacology, neurochemistry and related disciplines is included where pertinent. Also listed as Anatomy 6417. Lecture and conference, five hours a week; laboratory, three hours a week; second semester. Four semester hours. \$8 laboratory fee.

6325. <u>Cell Biology</u>.--Lectures and conferences which correlate cell structure and function. The course includes aspects of cellular organelles, genetics, energy production and reproduction. Also listed as Anatomy 6318. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501. Lecture and conference, three hours a week. Three semester hours.

6426. Endocrinology. --Lectures and conferences designed to correlate structure and functions of organs of the endocrine system. The course stresses basic and integrated aspects of the anatomy, physiology, chemistry and pathology of this organ system. Also listed as Anatomy 6419. Lecture, four hours a week; conference, two hours a week. Four semester hours.

6127. <u>Seminar in Marine Biomedicine.</u> --A seminar series including the physical and chemical properties of the sea, the response of man in an ocean environment, the nature of the adaptive mechanisms employed by marine organisms, how marine life affects man and how man affects the sea. The speakers include visitors and staff of the Marine Biomedical Institute. Seminar, two hours a week. One semester hour.

6228. Integrated Functional Laboratory I. --An interdisciplinary laboratory and conference course which studies the function of the various organ systems and how they may be altered by disease and drugs. Prerequisite: Biochemistry 6501, Physiology 6501, Physiology 6324 and Physiology 6425 or equivalents. Conference, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6229. Orientation in Physiology. --This course consists of lectures and seminars on the discipline of physiology with emphasis on its history, objectives, relationships to other disciplines, techniques in teaching and experimentation and potentials for a career. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6230. Integrated Functional Laboratory II. -- A continuation of Physiology 6228. Prerequisite: Physiology 6228. Conference, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6698. Thesis. -- Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6699, Dissertation. -- Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

<u>Programs of Study</u>: Courses and other learning experiences are available in epidemiology and biostatistics, behavioral science, environmental health, industrial health, preventive medicine, community health and health care delivery systems. Graduate programs leading to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees, as well as combined M.A.-M.D. or M.D.-Ph.D. degrees, are available to qualified students. Although 30 hours of credit, including a thesis, are required for the M.A. degree, awarding of the Ph.D. degree is based upon attainment of an adequate level of knowledge and research competence rather than upon the completion of a specified number of hours.

Programs of study are individualized and designed to prepare each student for a career in some facet of the health field, i.e., academic medicine, research, health planning and administration, and related activities in health programs and agencies.

Facilities: The department has ample space, equipment and other facilities to support research in all phases of preventive medicine and community health. A modern, large scale computer system with such programs as the BMD biomedical library is available and located close by. The departmental neighborhood health clinic, two county comprehensive health clinics, the Children and Youth Clinic, and the Family Planning Clinic, some of which are located in a ghetto area, provide excellent opportunities for graduate study, as does the Family Medicine program and associated clinics. The department also maintains a close liaison with the local health departments and a variety of health agencies.

Specific Admission Requirements: Applicants should have an undergraduate major in a life science. Admission requires an average of B in the last two undergraduate years, and a combined score of 1000 on the verbal and quantitative parts of the Graduate Record Examination.

# Graduate Courses:

6401. Preventive Medicine and Community Health. --Lectures, panels and demonstrations designed to emphasize the social and physical environment as well as the biological status of individuals in delineating their health problems and utilizing the necessary resources for their control; direct attention and energies to the needs of families and communities as well as individuals; and regard disease prevention as important as diagnosis and treatment. Lecture, four hours a week. First semester. Four semester hours.

6303. Principles of Statistical Reasoning (I). --Concepts of statistical reasoning as applied to the study of public health problems. The general principles of statistical

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analysis with emphasis on the design of community health studies and on the appropriate collection, tabulation, presentation and interpretation of statistical material. Topics covered include vital statistics rates, life tables, binomial and normal distributions, comparison of rates and means, and the  $x^2$  test. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6204. Epidemiology. --Basic principles of epidemiology and their application to communicable and non-communicable diseases. Lecture, one hour a week; labora-tory, three hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6205. Nutrition. --Fundamentals of nutrition, with principal emphasis on humans. Factors affecting adequacy of dietary intake, methods of determining nutritional status, the basis and development of nutritional standards, and recent advances in basic and applied research. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6206. Epidemiology and Control of Vector-Borne Diseases, --A survey of arthropods of medical importance with emphasis on the epidemiology and control of vector-borne diseases. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6207. <u>Water Supply and Pollution Control.</u> --Lectures, conferences, laboratory exercises and problems in the theory and practice of procurement, protection, treatment and utilization of water supply and of collection, treatment, disposal and reuse of wastewater. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6308. <u>Biometry</u>. --Exposition of recent developments in the design of laboratory experiments. Principles of randomization, replication and local control, analysis of variance techniques. Discussion of various experimental designs such as randomized block, Latin Square and factorial. Prerequisite: PM & CH 6303. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Three semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6209. Experimental Design. -- A survey of experimental strategies with special reference to increasing power and precision of statistical analyses. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, three hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6310. Data Processing. --Introduction to principles needed for processing data files, editing, encoding, structuring and manipulation of data, as well as timing considerations. Use of canned programs, magnetic tapes and disc files. Basic instruction in Fortran (IV) programming. Use of data processing and electronic computing equipment. Lecture, two hours a week; laboratory, four hours a week. Three semester hours.

6911. Community Health Research. --Hours to be arranged with department. Maximum credit, nine semester hours.

6312. <u>Community Health Methods. -- Laboratory and administrative techniques</u> useful in community health practice. Lecture and laboratory hours will vary each week. Three semester hours.

6113. History and Philosophy of Medicine and Community Health. --Lectures on the broader aspects of medical history from ancient to modern times. Lecture, one hour a week. One semester hour.

6214. Medical Sociology. -- Principles of social behavior in meeting health problems and conveying health concepts. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, two hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6115. <u>Seminar. --Survey of current problems</u>, programs and needs in the areas of preventive medicine and community health. One semester hour.

6216. Principles of Statistical Reasoning (II). --Sampling, testing of hypothesis, regression and correlection, contingency table analysis, non-parametric techniques, poisson and other special distributions. Life table concepts in analysis of survivor-ship from specific diseases. Prerequisite: PM & CH 6303. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, two hours a week. Two semester hours. \$4 laboratory fee.

6217. Statistical Methods in Public Health Studies. --Designed to appraise methods employed in the study of health problems in communities and industrial, school and other groups within a community. Lectures, seminars and laboratory exercises consider problems of study, design, data collection, analysis and interpretation in current and classic statistical investigations related to: (1) assessment of levels of health in a population group, (2) factors associated with these levels, and (3) the evaluation of preventive and therapeutic measures. A critical review is presented of the use of estimation procedures for incidence and prevalence, distribution functions, sampling techniques, procedures for establishment of control and comparison groups, epidemic models, life table and other analytic approaches in follow-up studies, sequential analysis, retrospective and prospective analyses, competing risks estimates, longitudinal and cross-sectional approaches, measures of association and correlation. Prerequisite: Preferably, PM & CH 6303, 6204, 6308. Lecture, one hour a week; laboratory, two hours a week. Two semester hours. §4 laboratory fee.

6218. Chemical Ecology. --General principles of ecology and the effects of pollutants in the soil, water and air on the ecology. Lectures include such topics as physiochemical factors; biochemical factors; growth, metabolism and reproduction of organisms; principles of absorption, distribution and excretion of chemicals; kinetics of growth of competing systems; carbon and nitrogen cycles; effects of chlorinated hydrocarbons, detergents, heavy metals, sulfur compounds, nitrates, phosphates and oxidants on ecology. Course consists of thirty lecture hours. Two semester hours.

6219. Medical Education. --Designed to communicate to the students the basic principles of planning objectives, designing learning experiences, and evaluating student achievement that are of particular importance in designing and conducting instruction in medical education. Opportunities for preparing and teaching microlessons will be included in the course. Lecture, two hours a week. Two semester hours.

6698. Thesis. -- Prerequisite: Admission to candidacy for the Master's degree. Maximum credit, six semester hours.

6699. Dissertation. -- Admission to candidacy for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

# APPENDIX A

# GRADUATE STUDENT ORGANIZATION CONSTITUTION

# ARTICLE I

## NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The body shall be known as The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston Graduate Student Organization.

Section 2. The object of the Organization is to facilitate the workings of all Graduate School functions, whether educational or social, to the best interests of the Graduate Students.

# ARTICLE II

#### OFFICERS AND STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The officers of the Organization shall consist of a President, Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 2. There shall be an Executive Committee which shall consist of the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary-Treasurer, and the graduate student representatives to the Student Senate.

## ARTICLE III

#### MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of the Organization shall consist of those individuals registered either as full or part-time graduate students at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### DUES AND EXPENSES

Section 1. Each member of the Organization shall pay annually to the Organization Secretary-Treasurer such dues as are recommended by the Executive Committee and approved by the Organization.

Section 2. Fees to cover expenses for planned social events shall be payable to the Secretary-Treasurer; these fees to be determined according to the particular situation.

## ARTICLE V

#### AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority of the votes cast in an election provided such amendments have been considered by the Executive Committee and presented to the members of the Organization either at a previous meeting or in writing at least thirty days prior to the election for consideration of the amendment. The time and place for the election shall be announced in this notice.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### BYLAWS

Section 1. The Organization may establish such Bylaws as may seem necessary for the proper government of the Organization provided that such Bylaws do not in any way conflict with the Constitution and/or rules and regulations set forth by the administration of The University of Texas.

# BYLAWS OF THE CONSTITUTION

## ARTICLE I

# ACTIVITIES OF THE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The following activities are recognized as appropriate each year for The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston Graduate Student Organization; election of officers of the Organization; maintenance of communication (both educationally and socially) among students and faculty in the various departments; holding meetings for the discussion of scientific subjects; encouragement of new applicants for admission to The University of Texas Medical Branch Graduate School; arrangements for addresses by one or more individuals not necessarily to be concerned with topics in science.

## ARTICLE II

#### MEETINGS

Section 1. The President, and in his absence the Vice-President, and in the absence of both, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Organization shall preside at all meetings.

Section 2. The order of business at each meeting shall be prepared by the Secretary-Treasurer in consultation with the Executive Committee.

Section 3. At least one meeting must be held each year for the transaction of business and presentation of members seeking election to office. This meeting should be held shortly after the beginning of the fall semester. The date and time of this meeting and all other meetings shall be determined by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. Special meetings shall be called by the Executive Committee at any time during the school year in response to a written request to that effect signed by at least five (5) members of the Organization.

Section 5. No business meeting of the Organization shall be held at any time unless a notice of such meeting shall have been mailed five (5) days previously to each member of the Organization.

Section 6. A quorum for transaction of business shall be two-fifths of the total membership and at least two members of the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE III

## ELECTED OFFICIALS - DUTIES AND TERMS OF OFFICE

Section 1. The President and Vice-President shall be elected annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office. The President shall be the moderator ' of all meetings of the Organization and be the Chairman of the Executive Committee. The Vice-President shall serve as Social Chairman and, in the absence of the President, will assume those duties.

Section 2. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected annually and shall be eligible for re-election. The duties of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep the minutes of the Organization and Executive Council Meetings and shall be responsible for the financial affairs of the Organization.

Section 3. Two graduate students shall be elected annually to serve as Graduate Student Representatives to the Student Senate. In addition to representing the Graduate School in the Student Government, one (of the two) shall be a member of the Honor Council. Section 4. The terms of office shall begin one (1) day after the election and shall end on election day the following year.

Section 5. In the event of a vacancy in any office or committee the President or, in the case of his absence or incapacity, the Vice-President, shall make a temporary appointment until the next election.

## ARTICLE IV

# EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary-Treasurer, and the graduate student representatives to the Student Senate. The Executive Committee shall have charge of arranging programs for meetings and shall transact such other business as may arise in the interval between meetings. Actions by the Executive Committee shall require a favorable vote by a majority of the entire committee.

Section 2. The president of the Organization shall act as the representative of this Organization at all meetings of the Student American Medical Association Council. He shall exercise his vote in this council to the best interests of the graduate student body and the University as a whole. All matters arising at SAMA Council meetings which pertain directly to the graduate student body shall be discussed by the Executive Council and the President's vote directed by the decision of this Executive Council meeting. All such votes cast shall be reported in the following Graduate Student Organization Bulletin.

Section 3. The Executive Committee will appoint a student to serve as an editor of the graduate student section of THE SYNDROME, and to make other such appointments as the need arises.

## ARTICLE V

## NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. Nominations for the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Senators, and Honor Council Representative will be open for one (1) week following written notice to each member of the Organization. The procedure for the nomination of candidates will be determined by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. One week after nominations have closed, elections will be held with voting by secret ballot at the time and place determined by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. As stated in Article II, Section 3, a special meeting of the Organization shall be called at least one day prior to the election for the purpose of presenting the nominees to the members.

## ARTICLE VI

## COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committees shall be formed to deal with any matters which are other than those within the realm of responsibility of the Executive Committee, or to assist the Executive Committee in the performance of their functions.

Section 2. The President, with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall

appoint Special Committees as the needs of the Organization require.

# ARTICLE VII

#### DUES AND EXPENSES

Section 1. Each member shall pay annually dues and assessments as set by the Executive Committee, and the schedule of such dues and assessments shall be offered for ratification at the next meeting of the Organization. All dues and assessments are due and payable to the Organization Secretary-Treasurer immediately following their ratification.

Section 2. Expenses incurred by the Organization shall be paid by the Secretary-Treasurer after certification by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. An annual financial report shall be made to the Organization by the Secretary-Treasurer.


