SAMPLING CHECK OF CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL SYSTEM: I recommend approval of an appropriation in the amount of \$2,000 from the Etter Fund (a current restricted fund) to an account entitled Etter Fund - Sampling of Classified Personnel. The purpose of this appropriation is to finance costs in connection with the survey of the Classified Personnel System by the Texas Employment Commission. This action was agreed to at your September, 1958, meeting and an interagency contract with the Commission has been negotiated and is reported in the Contract section of the docket for Main University.

CONTRACTS: In line with action taken at the December, 1958, meeting, Dr. Logan Wilson, President, has executed an agreement with the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare establishing a National Defense Student Loan Fund at Main University, Medical Branch, Southwestern Medical School, and Dental Branch. First allocation of Federal capital contributions amounting to \$27,810 has been received and the loan program will go into operation as soon as actual Federal deposits are forthcoming. The \$27,810 figure includes \$2,737 for Texas Western University for which a separate contract was signed.

On recommendation of Comptroller C. H. Sparenberg, approved by Vice-President J. C. Dolley, I recommend that the University's contract with A. R. Massey and Associates, Inc., Dallas, Texas, Insurance Consultants, be extended for another twelve-months period beginning December 10, 1958, at a fee of \$800 for this period. Mr. Massey has been the University's insurance consultant since November 18, 1954, and has rendered very satisfactory service. The previous fees charged are as follows: first year - \$3,500; second year - \$1,500; third year - \$1,000; fourth year - \$800. He has assisted in converting fire and extended coverage policies, boiler and machinery policies, and money and securities policies to a blanket system-wide basis.

Mr. Massey's services include, in addition to consultation on miscellaneous insurance matters, (1) an up-to-date list of "replacement new" valuations for fire and extended coverage insurance, (2) furnishing information on policies, rates, and adjustments in the rates, and (3) preparing a complete audit of all insurance policies including furnishing recommendations concerning changes in coverage if needed.

AUTHORIZATION FOR COMPTROLLER TO SIGN CHANGE ORDER TO CONTRACT FOR LABORATORY THEATRE BUILDING, MAIN UNIVERSITY: At the Regents' meeting held December 12, 1958, authorization was given for the Comptroller to receive bids and award a contract for the air conditioning of the Laboratory Theatre Building at the Main University, which contract has now been awarded.

In connection with this air conditioning there are certain changes and additions to the original plans which can be performed more efficiently by the General Contractor than by the Air Conditioning Contractor, and a quotation of \$2,942 for this work has been received from the General Contractor, which the architect and Comptroller agree is a reasonable price. It is therefore recommended that approval be given to the Comptroller to sign this change order, the amount needed to cover both the change order and the architect's fees thereon to come from the Allotment Account. This authority is over and above that granted the Comptroller at the December meeting to sign change orders to this contract up to an amount of \$2,000 to cover certain other modifications to the plans and specifications.

16. Negotiated Contract with Air Force Institute of Technology, signed by Vice-President and Provost H. H. Ransom, whereby the University will provide a course of instruction in "Counseling on Human Factors" for thirty-one Air Force Chaplains during the period January 12-February 6, 1959. The amount of the contract is \$4,456.25 and it will be under the direction of The Hogg Foundation for Mental Health. A = 33(60%) - 39

RENTAL OF EQUIPMENT OWNED BY A STAFF MEMBER: Dr. John Michel, Assistant Professor of Management and Assistant Psychologist, Testing and Counseling Center, owns a Perceptoscope which the Reading Improvement Program in the Center used for the past year when Mr. Michel was a graduate student and served part-time on the Center staff. Since he is now a regular member of the staff, permission is requested that he be paid \$265.50 for rental for this Long Session. This machine is not available for rental from any other source and the hourly rate of \$1.50 set by Dr. Michel is felt to be most reasonable. I recommend that payment of this rental to Dr. Michel be approved, funds to come from the Testing Scoring and Supplies account of the Center.

PURCHASE FROM A STAFF MEMBER: The School of Law wishes to purchase from Mr. Fred M. Sullivan, Lecturer in Business Law, three copies of Negotiable Instruments published by the American Institute of Banking, New York 1947, now out of print. The books are needed in the Law Library and if they could be found through secondhand book dealers, there would be S delay in securing them and the price probably would be greater than the \$4.00 per copy requested by Mr. Sullivan.  - 3. Any student, who has been placed on Scholastic Frobation, will remain on Scholastic Probation until his last semester average and his cumulative average are "C" or above.
 - 4. Any student must have a "C" grade point average overall and in his major to graduate.
 - 5. Any resident student electing work in the College of Engineering for two semesters must be registered in the College of Engineering to receive credit for an Engineering degree.

- 6. Any student in scholastic difficulty should make an appointment to discuss his situation with the Dean. In cases of extenuating circumstances, these rules may be modified by the Dean.
- 5. The Faculty Council on January 31, 1959, approved by the circularization procedure the proposals (1) to establish an interdepartmental program in Biology, (2) to establish a major in Russian for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I, (3) to amend the introductory paragraph under the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism and to amend two requirements under the same degree, (4) to amend the foreign language requirement for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Physics, and (5) to establish a minimum registration in required courses for freshman and sophomores (D&P 2657-2660), copy of which is attached hereto as APPENDIX D.
- 6. The General Faculty on February 12, 1959, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the Faculty Council on transfer and admission to the University of Texas (General Faculty Minutes, 7288-89; 7290-91), copy of which is attached hereto as APPENDIX E.

WATVER OF NEPOTISM: Mr. Thomas A. Crosson was employed August 7, 1956, in the Purchasing Office as Administrative Assistant at \$320 per month. In February, 1957, when the University was going into its enlarged investment program, Mr. Charles J. Crosson was employed as a Security Analyst in the Investment Office at \$539 per month. At that time the Office of Classified Personnel pointed out that Mr. Thomas Crosson was being groomed for a responsible job in the Purchasing Office and that the employment of Mr. Charles Crosson might prevent his later promotion. Because of the difficulty of securing a qualified Security Analyst and because of the urgent need for the services of Mr. Charles Crosson, he was employed. Since neither of the brothers had any influence or will have on the appointment of the other, I recommend that the nepotism rule be waived in this instance and that both men be allowed to continue employment with no restriction on advancement.

APPROPRIATION FOR REPAIRS AND REMODELING TO FIVE HOUSES AT THE McDONALD OBSERVATORY: On recommendation of Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager, I recommend that an appropriation of \$12,028 from Account No. 27200, Improvements, Remodeling, and Major Repairs Allotment Account be set up for repairs and remodeling of five houses at the McDonald Observatory The remodeling program has been approved by Dr. Kuiper, Dean Whaley, Mr. Krebs, and Mr. Sparenberg and the contractor's award was made to Mr. R. D. McCready, Fort Davis, Texas. The use of the money from Main University is an interim arrangement. When the total appropriation for new construction and improvements at the Observatory is made, the amount here requested will be restored. (3279)

SUMMER SESSION 1959 - SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK: I recommend approval of the request of the School of Social Work to offer a six weeks term for the summer of 1959 and a six weeks and a nine weeks term in the summer of 1960 for second year and first year students, respectively. The Director of the School feels that this is necessary since the curriculum has been established on a time-span of two long terms and two six weeks summer terms (the first in each instance). ADDITIONAL LOCKERS FOR GREGORY GYMNASIUM: The present locker room in Gregory Gymnasium has 2,624 lockers, estimated to be about 350 to 400 short for the Fall Semester of 1958. The Departments of Intercollegiate Athletics, Intramurals for Men, and Required Physical and Health Education request that the room now used as intramural ping-pong room (but originally designed as part of the locker room) be remodeled and 688 new lockers installed. The total cost for the remodeling, purchase and installation of lockers and benches is estimated at \$12,500 and this amount is available from the Gym Store account. I recommend approval of this project.

FEES: On recommendation of the proper official, I recommend that the following changes in fees be approved:

Supplementary Fees in Art and Music for the Summer Session of nine 4004 weeks - increase by fifty percent (3085)

Correspondence Fees - Change from \$8.00 to \$10.00 per semester hour for properties and from \$10.00 to \$12.00 per semester hour for out-of-state residents. The \$2.00 increase in each case will be divided equally between the instructor's fee and administrative costs.

Required Health and Physical Education for Women - Non-student fee for Obj h

SALES TO STAFF MEMBERS: On February 17, 1959, bids were received for the sale of a 1951 Ford Sedan, operated by the Defense Research Laboratory. The high bid was \$257.69, submitted by Mr. Cecil L. Wimberley, a Draftsman in Defense Research Laboratory. I recommend that authorization be given for the sale of the Ford to Mr. Wimberley.

The Department of Business Services offered for sale an IBM typewriter. In a sealed bid sale Dr. W. R. Spriegel, Professor of Management, offered \$175.00, which was the high bid. I recommend that approval be given for the sale of the machine to Dr. Spriegel.

REORGANIZATION OF AREAS UNDER DEAN OF STUDENT LIFE: I recommend approval of the following, submitted by Dean of Student Services, and concurred in by Dean of Student Life:

Establish Loans and Scholarships as a separate division, headed up by a Director (on a twelve months basis), under the Dean of Student Life. A separate office for this area was recommended by a Special Committee that studied this proposal and this recommendation was approved by the Administrative Council. With the rapid growth in student aid, including the possibility of this office having to administer the Federal Loan Fund, this change is, in my opinion, absolutely essential. It is impossible to administer an efficient and effective scholarship program under our present haphazard method of handling awards. We must have a central clearing house for all scholarship information.

Establish a Student Activities Office under a new Director of Student Activities, who would also be responsible for orientation and would report directly to the Dean of Men.

Mr. J. G. Steele, serving in the 1958-59 Budget as Director of the Student Employment Bureau, was appointed Director of the Loans and Scholarships office, effective February 1, 1959, and Mr. Edwin B. Price, Serving as Assistant Dean of Men, was appointed as Director of Student Activities, effective February 1, 1959.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY

Change the material on pages 14 and 15 of the Pharmacy Catalogue No. 5805, under the present heading, "Admission to the professional work of the sophomore year," to read as follows (changes in paragraph 2 et seq. being underscored; these requirements will become effective on April 1, 1960, at which time the Five-Year Program for the Bachelor of Science degree in Pharmacy will become effective):

"Admission to the Professional Work of the Second Professional Year in No student may begin the professional work of the second professional year in pharmacy unless he meets the appropriate requirements indicated below and is formally accepted for the professional work of the second professional year in pharmacy.

1. The applicant must have completed at least sixty (60) semester hours of work, forty-eight hours of which must be in

2. (a) If all of the work prescribed in the Catalogue for the first professional year in pharmacy has been completed prior to the session in which the admission to the above year is sought, the applicant may be admitted provided he has the 1.0 grade point average (C average) on all work undertaken, whether passed or failed. Work done at the University of Texas and work done elsewhere will be averaged separately. Surplus grade points on work done here may be used to raise the average on work done elsewhere. Each semester hour of A counts 3 points; B, 2; C, 1; D and F, O.

^{*}Courses in Sophomore English, preferably those corresponding to English 310 or 318M, may be transferred as a substitute for either of these courses.

- (b) If the applicant has not completed all the work prescribed for the first professional year but has met the subject and quantitative requirements set forth in 1, he may be admitted to the professional work of the second professional year on a provisional basis if he has a 1.0 (C average) grade average, the average computed as provided in 2, a. The provisional basis of the acceptance will be cancelled if the student completes two semesters of work*, maintains a 1.0 average, and has carried at least twelve semester hours during each of the two semesters.
- 3. Applicants who have not previously been registered in the College of Pharmacy must, in addition to the preceding, satisfy all of the University's requirements for admission as prescribed in the Catalogue for their specific classifications.
- 4. (a) Students seeking admission to the professional work of the second professional year in pharmacy should make application on the appropriate forms obtainable from the office of the Dean of the College of Pharmacy, not earlier than the semester immediately preceding the semester for which admission is being sought, and not later than thirty days prior to the day of registration for that semester.

Date for Application: For the Fall Semester of the Long Session: February 15-August 15; for the Spring Semester of the Long Session: October 1-January 15.

Applications received after the final dates above will be considered only if the class is not already filled.

- (b) If the applicant's most recent registration was in the University'ε College of Pharmacy, application should be made to the Dean of that college. A complete transcript must be presented to the Dean.
- (c) If the applicant's most recent registration was in another institution or in a different division of the University, application should be made to the Registrar's office for admission to the College of Pharmacy prior to filing with the Dean an application for admission to the professional work.
- (d) A second or an additional set of transcripts beyond those needed for admission to the University is required for the use of the Dean of the College of Pharmacy. These transcripts are to be furnished by the student at his expense.
- 5. In the event the number of eligible applicants exceeds the number for which facilities are available, the final selection will be made by the College of Pharmacy on the basis of the applicant's previous scholastic records and priority of date of application.

Reason: These changes are designed to implement the proposed five-year Pharmacy program.

Approval of the above changes in requirements is requested at this time in order that an announcement might be made by April 1, 1959, to the presidents and counseling officials of the colleges and universities which might be selected by the students for prepharmacy courses. This announcement will give the students one year's notice prior to the effective date of April 1, 1960.

On page 43 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1957-1959 under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan II," under "A. General Restrictions,"

CHANGE the first paragraph

From: "All of the work under Plan II must be done at The University of Texas either in residence or by correspondence."

To: "All of the work under Plan II must be done at The University of Texas. Frior approval of the Chairman of the Plan II Committee must be obtained for any work done by correspondence."

Reason: To insure that Plan II students take all work in residence or secure prior approval for work taken by correspondence.

On page 45 of the same Catalogue under "B. Rules Governing the Order and Choice of Work," under the "Senior Year,"

CHANGE requirement "4 (a)" (as amended by the Circularization-No Protest Procedure and approved by the Faculty Council May 20, 1958)

From: "Philosophy 314 (Problems of Philosophy) or 318 (Introduction to Ethics), and 322 (Science and the Modern World) or 327 (Contemporary Philosophy)."

To: "Six semester hours of philosophy (approved)."

Reason: To liberalize the Plan II philosophy requirement.

On page 49 of the same Catalogue, under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE the third paragraph of requirement 2 (as amended by the Circularization No-Protest Procedure and approved by the Faculty Council April 18, 1958)

From: "If a student who has taken language at another college believes he is entitled to a standing more advanced than that shown by the University's evaluation of transfer credits, he may request a placement test to determine whether he may go beyond the level at which he has been placed; or, if he believes he has achieved the proficiency required for the degree, he may request an advanced standing examination in the last course required for the degree by applying first to the Chairman of the appropriate language department."

To: "If a student is given transfer credit for two six-hour courses in a language approved for this degree, taken at another college before he first transfers to the University, he may be considered to have satisfied the language requirement for this degree. A student who is given transfer credit for less than twelve semester hours in an approved language may request a placement test to determine whether he is entitled to enter a higher language course than that permitted by the University's evaluation of his transfer credit."

Reason: The first paragraph above is that intended for degrees requiring six hours of sophomore language. The original intention of the School of Journalism was to include, instead, the second paragraph above, since this is the paragraph used in other degrees which require only three hours of sophomore language. The above substitution in no way changes the amount of language required for the degree of Bachelor of Journalism.

/Degree Program for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I, with a major in Biology to be inserted on page 35 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "C. Majors and Minors"

This program is intended for students planning to pursue teaching careers.

Major: (a) Biology 607; (b) Bacteriology 316 or 629; (c) at least six hours of botany chosen from Botany 320, 321, and 328; (d) Zoology 316K, and Zoology 41h or 332 or 376K; (e) enough additional hours elected in bacteriology, botany, or zoology or any combination thereof, to total thirty semester hours, at least twelve of which must be advanced.

First Minor: Twelve semester hours of chemistry, physics, or mathematics.

Second Minor: Six semester hours of a subject listed under the first minor which is not offered as the first minor, or of education.

For teacher certification under this program the requirements as set forth in the "Programs for Degrees in Combination with Provisional Certification (Permanent Type) for Teaching in the Public Schools of Texas" must be met. 7

Reason and Explanation: Undergraduate students in the College of Arts and Sciences, wishing to prepare for a career of high school teaching in biology or related sciences, have heretofore had to specialize to an extent that is not consistent with the broad nature of biology.

The purpose of the proposed program is to combine the advantages of a broad liberal education with preparation for teacher certification in biology. This program has already been approved for teacher certification by the Texas Education Agency, and it is the desire of these departments to formalize this degree program in the College of Arts and Sciences. No new department or degree is contemplated, but rather a collection of courses is offered which forms an interdepartmental program.

Recommendation of the Department of Germanic Languages

On page 38 of the same Catalogue under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "C. Majors and Minors" ADD the following:

Major: Russian 406, 407, 312K, 312L, 315, and fifteen semester hours of advanced Russian, including Russian 670.

First Minor: Twelve semester hours of at least sophomore rank in any subject chosen, with the approval of the major advisor, from those offered in the College of Arts and Sciences, Education, or Fine Arts.

Second Minor: Six semester hours of at least sophomore rank in another subject offered in the Colleges named above.

Reason and Explanation: The expansion in instruction in the Russian language now under way necessitates a major in this field. Russian 312K and 312L will replace 612; Russian 315 is a new course, Conversation and Composition I; Russian 670 is a new course, Survey of Russian Literature.

Recommendations of the School of Journalism

On page 49 of the same Catalogue under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism" under "A. Prescribed Work," in the introductory paragraph CHANGE the last sentence by adding the words underlined:

"Planned programs are available in mimeographed form for those students interested in the following fields: (1) news-editorial journalism;

(2) community journalism;
(3) magazine editing;
(4) advertising;
(5) public relations;
(6) teaching of journalism."

Reason: To adjust the Journalism program to teacher certification plans which have been developed in the College of Arts and Sciences.

On page 50 of the same Catalogue under the same Degree under "A. Prescribed work," CHANGE requirement 9

From: "Six semester hours of advanced courses in one of the following subjects; economics, education, government, history, home economics, sociology, or speech."

To: "Six semester hours of advanced courses in one subject, in addition to work mentioned in requirements 1 and 10, to be approved by the student's advisor."

Reason: To permit the student a greater choice in a field of minor concentra-

On the same page under the same Degree CHANGE Requirement 10

From: "Thirty-six semester hours in accordance with Plan I or Plan II below. Not more than thirty-six semester hours of journalism nor more than twenty semester hours of advertising nor more than thirty-six semester hours in a combination of journalism and advertising may be counted toward the Bachelor of Journalism degree.

"Plan I:

(1) Journalism 312K, 312L, 320, and 824.

(2) Nineteen additional semester hours of journalism; or nineteen semester hours of journalism and advertising, including not more than nine hours of advertising. These hours should be chosen in accordance with the journalism sequence being followed by the student. Six of the nineteen hours must be of senior rank.

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"Plan II:

(1) Journalism 312K, 312L, and 824a.

(2) Advertising 340J, 342J, and 369J.

(3) Marketing 337, and three additional semester hours selected from the following: Marketing 339, 360, 363, or Retailing 369.

(4) Eleven semester hours selected from the following: Advertising 345J, 347J, 360M, and 371M; Journalism 325, 333, 336, 377K, 278, 379; Journalism 201 if taken in the freshman year."

To: "From thirty-four to thirty-eight semester hours in accordance with Plan I or Plan II below. Not less than thirty-four nor more than thirty-eight semester hours of journalism, or a combination of journalism and advertising, may be counted toward the Bachelor of Journalism degree. The maximum amount of advertising that may be counted is twenty semester hours.

"Plan I:

(1) Journalism 312K, 312L, 320, and 624.

(2) From nineteen to twenty-three additional semester hours of journalism, or in combination of journalism and advertising, including not more than nine semester hours of advertising. These hours should be chosen in accordance with the journalism sequence being followed by the student. Six of these hours be in journalism must be of senior rank.

"Plan II:

(1) Journalism 312K, 312L, and 624a.

(2) Advertising 340J, 342J, and 369J.

(3) Marketing 337, and three additional semester hours selected from the following: Marketing 339, 360, 363, or Retailing 369.

(4) Ten to fourteen semester hours selected from the following: Advertising 345J, 347J, 360M, 371M, and 379J; Journalism 325, 333, 336, 377K, and 278; Journalism 201 if taken in the freshman year."

Reason: To permit the student an increased flexibility in course combinations.

Recommendation of the Department of Physics

On page 59 of the same Catalogue under "Bachelor of Science in Physics," under "A. Prescribed Work," CHANGE the first paragraph of requirement 7 (as amended by the Circularization-No Protest Procedure and approved by the Faculty Council April 18, 1958)

From: "(a) French 406, 407, and 314K, or German 406, 407, and 315K (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test), or the equivalent in another foreign language approved by the Department of Physics, at least six hours of which must be in reading physics or allied subjects; or (b) a reading knowledge (defined below under special requirement B 2) of either French or German or another foreign language approved by the Department of Physics."

To: "(a) French 406, 407, and 314K, or German 406, 407, and 315K, or Russian 406, 407, and 312K (or 612a) (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test), or the equivalent in another foreign language approved by the Department of Physics, at least six hours of which must be in reading physics or allied subjects; or (b) a reading knowledge (defined below under special requirement B 2) of either French or German or Russian or another foreign language approved by the Department of Physics."

Reason: Russian has been approved in the case of a good many students in the past under the provision mentioned in the current catalogue which gives the Chairman this discretion, and the Department of Physics would now like to include Russian as one of the three languages which do not require any special approval for students under this program.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

On page 31 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1957-59 under "DEGREES" under "GENERAL REQUIREMENTS" ADD the following paragraph:

"14. Each degree program is arranged in the sequence best calculated to insure orderly progression of the student's college work. A first-semester freshman, if registering for 12 semester hours or more, must include a minimum of nine semester hours of courses specified under "Prescribed Work" in one of the plans for a degree in the College of Arts and Sciences. Likewise, he must include a minimum of nine semester hours of such courses in each long session enrollment until he has accumulated 48 semester hours of credit. Transfer students with less than 48 semester hours of credit shall also be bound by this regulation. At the Dean's discretion, adjustment may be made when exceptional circumstances exist or when a student has gained credit through advanced placement examination or when the student is enrolling for less than 12 semester hours of credit in a long-session semester."

Reason: Under the present regulations, a considerable number of incoming freshmen fill their programs with elective courses and thus do not confront their requirements until later. This procedure complicates their program at a later level, generally delays graduation, and causes considerable extra expenditure of time on the part of advising faculty members.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

1. In the General Information catalogue of the University as applicable to all transfers change section to read as follows:

Any student who wishes to transfer from one college to another within the University must be certified as having advised with a representative of the Dean of the College in which he is currently registered. In the College of Engineering, any student, who transfers from Engineering while on Scholastic Probation and wishes to re-enter the College of Engineering. From another college of The University while on probation, must receive the approval of the Dean of Engineering.

2. In the General Information catalogue of the University on page 25, in the section "High-ranking applicants" change section to read as follows (to be effective for students entering September, 1960):

High-ranking applicants--In order that applicants with high grades may have an opportunity to enter the University even though they may not have completed the required pattern of high-school subjects, special provisions have been made for their admission.

Any applicant who ranked in the upper half of his high-school graduating class, who has a satisfactory admission test score, and who has a total of at least fifteen acceptable units may enter any division except the College of Engineering or the School or Architecture with deficiencies in any group or groups except English.

Furthermore, any applicant who ranked in the highest quarter of his graduating class and who also makes a median score or higher on the University admission test may enter any division except the College of Engineering or the School of Architecture without deficiencies being assessed.

3. In the General Information catalogue of the University on page 27, delete the whole section "Removal of deficiencies" under the center head "School of Architecture and College of Engineering" and substitute the following paragraph (to be effective for students entering September, 1960):

A student must present all of the above units in order to be admitted to the College of Engineering or the School of Architecture. A student who wishes to enter the College of Engineering or the School of Architecture but who does not have all of the units specified above may enter any other division of the University for which he is eligible and take courses without credit toward engineering or architecture degrees to make up the units lacking for admission to engineering or architecture. Two units in algebra, one unit in plane geometry, and one-half unit in solid geometry are offered by correspondence by the Division of Extension of the University. Extension classes in second-year algebra, plane geometry, and solid geometry are offered on the campus. The fee for each course is \$10.00. A student who lacks physics takes Physics 403 without degree credit, at no extra charge. A student who lacks science for admission to architecture takes three hours of anthropology, chemistry, biology, or geology without credit toward engineering or architecture degrees at no extra charge.

A student may save time by making up the units he lacks in summer school or by taking courses by correspondence, or both.

4. In the General Information catalogue of the University add to the requirements for admission the following statement (to be effective for students entering September, 1960):

Students transferring to the University from other institutions must have at least a \underline{C} average on all courses undertaken, whether passed or failed.

"Effective September, 1963, the minimum unit requirements for admission to the College of Arts and Sciences will be: English, 3; foreign languages (Group C), 2; science (Group D), 2; mathematics (Group E), 2; social sciences (Group F), 2; additional from any group (but not more than two from Group G), 5; total, 16. A student satisfying all the requirements except the foreign language, including sixteen acceptable units, will be admitted with a deficiency in foreign language." The specific unit requirements for admission to other colleges and schools will remain the same, except that the total number of admission units must be sixteen and no more than two units may be presented from Group G.

Not more than six units will be accepted in any combination of fine arts subjects.

Applied music must be accompanied by music theory. Band, orchestra, and chorus are accepted only if they have been offered as curricular subjects, not as activities, and if the prerequisite of Music I as outlined by the Division of Professional Standards of the Texas Education Agency has been observed; no more than three units and no less than one unit of applied music will be accepted.

3In each language counted a minimum of two units must be taken.

¹Biology may not be counted by a student offering either botany or zoology. It is recommended that biology be taken in preference to either botany or zoology.

⁵Arithmetic and general mathematics are not accepted in the Mathematics Group. Both are accepted in Group G.

This includes such courses as higher algebra, probability and statistics, analytic geometry, calculus.
