TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS

Mrs. Devall and Gentlemen:

The dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents in Austin on March 17-18, 1961;

Main University Texas Western College Medical Branch Dental Branch M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute Southwestern Medical School Postgraduate School of Medicine

Listed below are Central Administration items which I recommend for your approval:

Recommended Amendments to the 1960-61 Budget

Office of University Lands -- Geology

- 1. RESIGN Mr. Augustus B. Wilson, Jr., Petroleum Engineer, at \$6,468 per year effective December 31, 1960.
- 2. APPOINT Mr. James R. Mollard, Petroleum Engineer, at \$6,168 per year, effective February 1, 1961, replacing Mr. A. B. Wilson, Jr., resigned. Funds available in the University Lands -- Geology budget.

3. APPOINT Mr. John Robert Morris, Clerk-of-the-Works for Undergraduate Library and Academic Center and other construction projects. Comptroller Sparenberg states that Mr. Morris has been employed since August 1, 1960 as Clerk-of-the-Works, half-time, on the Addition to the Chemistry Building at a salary rate of \$270.83 a month. During this same period he was employed by Grayson Gill, Inc., as Clerk-of-the-Works, half-time, on the New Central Water Chilling Station. The work on these two projects has now progressed to the point that it is believed that very little detailed supervision is needed on the Addition to the Chemistry Building and less than half-time supervision is needed on the New Central Water Chilling Station; whereas, the Undergraduate Library and Academic Center is in need of almost full-time supervision, and during the month of January, Mr. Morris actually was inspecting this project on a part-time basis.

The following recommendations, therefore, are made:

1. That Mr. Morris's employment as Clerk-of-the-Works on the Addition to the Chemistry Building be terminated effective as at the close of business January 31, 1961.

- 2. That he be paid for the month of January, in addition to the half-time salary he has received as Clerk-of-the-Works on the Addition to the Chemistry Building, the sum of \$243.75 for his supervision and inspection on the Undergraduate Library and Academic Center (3/8 time at \$650 a month), to come from the Architectural Supervision account for this project.
- 3. That he be appointed, effective February 1, 1961, as Clerk-ofthe-Works, 7/8 time, on the Undergraduate Library and Academic Center at a salary rate of \$568.75 a month (7/8 of \$650), to be paid from the Architectural Supervision account for this project. This appointment is to be on a month-to-month basis until further notice from this office. For the time being the other 1/8 of his time is being allocated to the New Central Water Chilling Station, and that part of his salary is being paid by Grayson Gill, Inc., architects for this project.

MAIN UNIVERSITY -- OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

Increase the salary of Dr. Ransom as President of the Main University MT by \$250 a month from January 1, 1961, to such time as he assumes the This payment is to be made from the Etter Fund or other Current Restricted Funds available for the purpose. (Approved by the Committee of the Whole on January 16, 1961.)

MAIN UNIVERSITY -- DELEGATION OF TRAVEL APPROVAL AUTHORITY TO VICE-PRESIDENT AND PROVOST

President Ransom recommends that Vice-President and Provost Smiley be authorized to approve travel requests for Main University activities as an alternate to the President.

MAIN UNIVERSITY -- APPROVAL OF TRAVEL

M-171 Mr. J. H. Craig, Research Psychologist at Defense Research Laboratory, traveled to Long Beach, California for the period January 16 - February 15, 1961, to participate in field tests of scientific equipment being developed by the Laboratory. All expenses of the travel are to be charged to the Navy contract supporting the research. The request for reassignment of duties for this period in excess of two weeks was received in the Chancellor's Office one day after the departure date. An exception to the Regents' rule on prior approval of such absence is recommended in this particular instance because of the nature of the work involved.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE -- CHANGE ORDER TO CONTRACT WITH PONSFORD BROTHERS FOR WAREHOUSE-SHOPS BUILDING

Comptroller Sparenberg reports that during the course of the construction of the Warehouse -Shops Building, additional foundation work not originally contemplated was found to be necessary in order to provide an adequate foundation for the building. The cost of the additional work amounted to \$2,293.19. In the Comptroller's opinion, concurred in by Vice-Chancellor Dolley, the most economical method possible was used by the contractors, Ponsford Brothers, in accordance with instructions from the architects. The contract with Ponsford Brothers for construction of this building contained a Contingency Allowance in the amount of \$2,000.

The Comptroller, therefore, signed a change order to cover this additional work, using the \$2,000 Contingency Allowance and adding \$293.19 to the contract from the Allotment Account for the project. I recommend that the Board of Regents ratify this action.

CONTRACT FOR INSURANCE CONSULTING SERVICES

Comptroller Sparenberg recommends that the University's contract with A. R. Massey and Associates, Inc., of Dallas, Insurance Consultants, be extended for another twelve-months period, beginning December 10, 1960, at a fee of \$800 for the period. The formal agreement for this renewal was received too late for inclusion in the January docket.

Mr. A. R. Massey has been the University's insurance consultant since November 18, 1954, and has rendered very satisfactory service. The previous fees charged as as follows: first year - \$3,500; second year - \$1,500; third year - \$1,000; fourth year - \$800; fifth year - \$800; and sixth year - \$800. He has assisted us in converting fire and extended coverage policies, boiler and machinery policies, and money and securities policies to a blanket system-wide basis.

Mr. Massey's services include, in addition to consultation on miscellaneous insurance matters, (1) an up-to-date list of "replacement new" valuations for fire and extended coverage insurance, (2) furnishing information on policies, rates, and adjustments in the rates, and (3) preparing a complete audit of all insurance policies including furnishing recommendations concerning changes in coverage if needed.

The contract has been signed by Comptroller Sparenberg on behalf of The University of Texas, and ratification by the Board of Regents is recommended by Vice-Chancellor Dolley.

GIFTS:

The following gifts have been received and accepted for the purposes noted:

1. Gift of 75 shares of Delhi-Taylor Oil Corporation stock from Mr. Wofford Cain, Mercantile Securities Building, Dallas, made through Mr. Jodie Thompson. The donor directed that the stock be sold and the proceeds be expended for furnishings in the Chancellor's residence for use by Dr. and Mrs. Harry Ransom. The Endowment Officer has sold the stock, and the amount received was \$1,022.57.

2. Unrestricted gift of \$100 from Mr. Murray Kyger of Fort Worth. The funds have been deposited to Account #81643, Office of the Chancellor, Various Donors-Various Purposes. The gift was made in response to a written solicitation from the Chairman of the Development Board, Mr. J. M. Odom.

REPORT OF INCOME FROM THE WILLIAM HEUERMANN FUND FOR CANCER RESEARCH

The Endowment Office has received \$1,600 which is the twelfth partial distribution from that part of the Heuermann Estate bequeathed to The University of Texas for the use and benefit of the M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute. This sum makes a total of \$257,300 received to date by the University. The money has been deposited in the previously established accounts: \$1,181.11 to Account #82020, Current Restricted Account; \$418.89 to Account #83320, Endowment Fund.

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ETTER ESTATE TEMPORARY ADVANCE OF FUNDS TO UNIVERSITY PRESS

In May 1960, the Board of Regents authorized an advance of \$10,000 from Etter Estate funds to the University Press to take care of part of the cost of printing Roadside Flowers of Texas. This sum will be credited back to Etter funds early in 1962 when Mrs. E. D. R. Spencer makes her third \$10,000 contribution to the \$30,000 cost of this volume. The University Press has requested that the \$10,000 be transferred at this time, and this docket item is included for the record.

NOMINATION FOR MEMBERSHIP IN THE GRADUATE FACULTY

At its meeting on January 17, 1961, the Graduate Council approved the nomination of Dr. Roy Maxwell Hall, Sr., Professor of Curriculum and Instruction, for membership in the Graduate Faculty. The recommendation has been approved by President Ransom and is recommended for approval by the Board of Regents.

CHANGE IN HOLIDAY ALLOWANCE FOR CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL

The Appropriations Bill for the current biennium provides, "every day on which an election is held throughout the State shall also be observed as an official holiday by State employees." Higher education agencies are permitted to designate equivalent days off in lieu of State holidays not observed. A special election day on April 4 has been designated by the Governor. The Director of the Personnel Office has recommended, and I concur, that Monday, April 3 be designated as a holiday for University classified staff in lieu of April 4. April 3 is the day after Easter and is the last day of the student Spring vacation period in the Main University. Administratively, this would, therefore, be a preferable day off for classified employees at the Austin campus.

The Regents' approval is also requested for the addition of one day on or in lieu of April 4 at each of the other Component Institutions, the day designated by the Institutional Head to be reported in the respective dockets for the record.

CHANGE IN CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL PAY PLAN

In accordance with a request by Endowment Officer Stewart and Vice-Chancellor Dolley, the University Personnel Office has studied rates paid for the positions of Assistant Oil Supervisor and Assistant Land Agent. The Director of the Personnel Office reports that he attempted to determine rates paid for this type of work in other State departments and in industry but was unable to identify positions exactly comparable. He did locate a related position, Assistant Director, Oil Production and Proration, with a salary ceiling of more than \$650 per month, which is significantly higher than that now in our pay plan.

The same individual, Mr. Leroy B. Carr, is now employed in both positions, 3/4 time and 1/4 time respectively. In order to remain competitive and to encourage this staff member to remain in our employ, we concur in the recommendation of the Personnel Director that the salary ranges for these positions be increased as follows.

TEACHING ASSISTANT SALARY ADJUSTMENTS: At the July 1960 meeting of the Board of Regents, a total of \$225,000 was approved for the improvement of undergraduate teaching at the Main University, with necessary salary adjustments among the regular faculty and the teaching assistants. Subsequently out of this sum an allocation of \$75,000 was approved for salary adjustments during 1960-61 among teaching assistants. Departmental chairmen, academic deans, and the Vice-President and Provost screened the teaching assistants and agreed on those eligible for adjustment under the stated policy. Adjustments were calculated so as not to exceed \$250 per semester based on a half-time teaching status for the First Semester (a \$500 maximum for the Long Session on a half-time basis). The first year Greek and Latin courses have been changed from four hour to five hour courses, and this legislation is to adjust the requirements accordingly.

2. The Faculty Council at its meeting on December 19, 1960, approved the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences to change certain requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism.

One change allows the student to select six hours from any number of fields rather than requiring the six hours in economics. Other changes lower the number of semester hours required in Journalism and increase the number in certain other areas to adjust requirements to reduced semester hours in major.

3. The Faculty Council at its meeting on December 19, 1960, approved the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences to change the physics requirement for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemistry to include Physics 416 in the twelve hours of required Physics, because this course includes material on modern physics.

4. The Faculty Council at its meeting on December 19, 1960, approved the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences to establish a new degree of Bachelor of Science in Architectural Studies in the College of Arts and Sciences.

This degree was recommended by the School of Architecture, the principle underlying the proposal being that professional training in architecture should be built on the foundation of what has come to be known as a college education. Under this plan the student is admitted to the School of Architecture at the end of his third year (receiving the degree from Arts and Sciences on completion of his fourth year) and spends three more years in Architecture to complete his Bachelor of Architecture degree. In effect this increases the time to obtain a professional architectural degree from five to six years. However, the State Board for the Examination and Registration of Architects has stated that for students who pursue this course, only two years of practice, instead of the present three, will be required to give the graduate full professional status as an architect.

The above legislation is reported on pages 2876-82 of the Documents and Proceedings of the Faculty Council.

- 5. The Faculty Council at its meeting on January 9, 1961, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Pharmacy (D&P 2884-85) to make changes in its catalogue as follows: (1) Change the general catalogue requirements to exclude pre-pharmacy year from the student's minimum residence requirement; (2) delete certain catalogue material on admissions to restrict registration of all pharmacy students to that college; and (3) make eight course changes involving dropping or adding laboratories, moving course requirements from one level to another, broadening choice of electives, all within the present semester hour requirement for the pharmacy degree.
- 6. The Faculty Council at its meeting on February 15, 1961, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences (D&P 2893-94) to establish a major in American Studies for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I. This proposal is based upon a careful study of programs existing in at least seventy-two American

universities and colleges, including a number of large state universities. The
College believes that the acceptance of the proposed program would not involve
any additional appointments to the faculty or require a greater amount of
teaching time than is now involved in the giving of existing courses.

- 7. The Faculty Council at its meeting of February 20, 1961, approved the recommendation of the Admissions Committee on changes in requirements for admission to the College of Business Administration (D&P 2892). This is to make sixteen units the minimum for entrance beginning September, 1963.

Because the continuing turnover in the personnel in the job classifications of Building Utility Operator and Maintenance Man was so heavy, a survey of these classifications was made. It appeared that the present salary ranges for these positions is much too low when compared to other positions of equal responsibility, both on and off the campus.

The Key Punch Operator position change is recommended on the basis of a survey of salary rates for the same positions in other state offices, our beginning rate being less than that paid by seven out of ten state departments answering the survey. The Texas Employment Commission minimum rate is \$265, ranging up to \$315.

The change in Publications Production Manager's range is recommended after checking with the Executive Secretary of the Association of American University Presses and the Director of the University of California Press, who gave normal ranges for Production Manager from \$7,500 to \$11,000 and from \$8,940 to \$10,860, respectively. This change in rates will keep the University in a competitive position in seeking qualified applicants.

The change in Sales Manager's range is necessary to bring the salary of the present incumbent within the range.

The position of Key Punch Operator II is needed because our Data Processing Section needs someone experienced in the operation of the Key Punch Machine and the Key Punch Verifier to lend assistance to Mr. Coffey in the supervision of the work. The creation of this title will expedite the processing of the work in the section and will improve its general efficiency.

The growth of the University has made increasing demands on the Department of Construction and Maintenance in the Physical Plant and there is need for additional supervisory personnel. At the present time the Carpenter Foreman is responsible for both the Carpenter Shop and the Cabinet Shop, even though these two operations are physically separated. For these reasons the addition of the positions of Assistant Cabinetmaker Foreman and Cabinetmaker Foreman is recommended.

The Studio Technician, Art, is recommended at the request of Mr. Donald B. Goodall, Chairman of the Department of Art, to provide for the employment of a person to do semi-technical work in the preparation and demonstration of studio materials and methods in the field of Art.

The Scoring and Tabulating Supervisor position is recommended to reflect more accurately the responsibility of the position occupied by an employee now classified as Tabulating Equipment Operator II.

The Television Program Director position has heretofore been held part-time by a person with academic rank, but after considering the duties and responsibilities of the positions in Radio-Television, it was decided that this position should now be included in the Classified Personnel Pay Plan.

USE OF COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMINATION BOARD ACHIEVEMENT TEST IN ENGLISH COMPOSITION: On recommendation of Dr. G. V. Anderson, Director of the Testing and Counseling Center, concurred in by Dr. Mody C. Boatright, Chairman of the Department of English, and by Vice-President and Provost J. R. Smiley, I recommend that after September 1961 high school seniors who wish to enroll in the University be required to take the achievement test in English composition of the College Entrance Examination Board at a cost of \$2.00 per student.

This test is recommended instead of the proficiency test of the Department of English since beginning September 1961 students entering the University from high school will be required to present scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the CEEB, and the English test can be taken the same day the SAT is taken. This will eliminate the giving the English test during orientation.
