In addition, the Board's approval is recommended for designation of Matthew J. Buchele, M.D., San Augustine, Texas, to make physical examinations of eligible University of Texas employees for Main University and to render medical treatment to such employees in the event of on-the-job injury. Dr. Buchele's designation is requested since it was necessary for him to give physical examinations to Main University employees who reported for work at The University of Texas Archeological Salvage Project without coming to Austin.

REPORT OF FIRE LOSS AT BLANTON DORMITORY AND INSURANCE SETTLEMENT

A fire of unknown origin occurred in Blanton Dormitory at the Main University on January 5, 1961. This property is covered by several fire and extended coverage insurance policies. These policies are required by the bond indenture and are not included as a part of the systemwide blanket fire and extended policy coverage with the \$100,000 deductible provision. The estimates of the loss and the costs of making the repairs were made by the University Physical Plant staff and were agreed to by the claims adjusters for the insurance companies.

Comptroller Sparenberg has reported that he has approved settlement and "Proof of Loss" insurance claims totaling \$2,007.99 and requests that this action be ratified by the Board of Regents. With the concurrence of Vice-Chancellor Dolley, I so recommend.

The Library title was changed at request of the University Librarian since he feels that Undergraduate Librarian is a more exact title for the work assigned to that position.

The positions in the Division of Housing and Food Service seem necessary to provide new and necessary positions to keep that area staffed and operating at required efficiency.

The Television positions reflect more nearly the type of work assigned to the encumbents than the titles now available.

FACULTY LEGISLATION: I recommend approval of the following legislation passed by the Faculty Council and/or General Faculty:

- 1. The Faculty Council at its meeting on February 20, 1961, passed a motion to create a new standing committee on Fire Protection and Safety and to change the name of the Committee on Parking, Traffic and Safety to that of Committee on Parking and Traffic.
- 2. The General Faculty on July 26, 1960, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the Faculty Council (D&P 7541) that when a new building is constructed adjacent to the south mall and between the Music Building and the English Building, it be named Calhoun Hall in honor of former President ad interim John William Calhoun.
- 3. The Faculty Council at its meeting on March 20, 1961, approved the dismissal of classes between the hours of ll:00 a.m. and l:00 p.m. on Friday, April 7 for a barbecue and entertainment at Freshman Field in connection with Round-Up activities.
- 4. The Faculty Council at its meeting on March 20, 1961, also approved the proposed changes in the School of Architecture Catalogue for 1961-63 (D&P 2901-2). This legislation reduces some of the semester hour values of courses, permits a wider choice of electives, and has the over-all effect of reducing the total hours required for the degree from 167 to 160. The changes are being made in order that the interim program for the next biennium will conform to the requirements of the new six year program recently approved by the Faculty Council and the faculties of the College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Architecture, and being submitted as a special item at the May, 1961, meeting of the Board of Regents. In the event, however, that the six year program is not adopted, the legislation here presented is desirable in connection with the present five year curriculum.

PROPOSED RENEWAL OF VENDING MACHINE CONTRACT FOR WASHERS, DRYERS, AND SOAP MACHINES IN THE UNIVERSITY RESIDENCE HALLS: I recommend that the Business Manager of Main University be authorized to renew the present contract with Capital Coin Laundromat, Inc., for a period of two years beginning September 1, 1961, and extending through August 31, 1963. This contract provides the furnishing of vending machines for washers, dryers, and soap machines in all University residence halls. The University receives 35% of the gross receipts. The contract now in effect has a provision which makes it possible that the present contract be extended upon the agreement of both parties.

In support of this request, Business Manager Landrum has submitted the following background information and explanation:

The matter of coin-operated laundry and drying machines in the residence halls is one of personal service for the students that must operate satisfactorily. Poor service or unsatisfactory equipment causes the students to "revolt" on short notice. The personal attention, cooperation and outstanding service given by Capital Coin Taundromat, Inc., during the last several years has made it possible for us to have a very satisfactory program. Last year we took bids on this concession, and Capital Coin Laundromat gave us the highest bid. We do not believe that we should advertise for this type of service for the next biennium. Thousands of dollars of equipment are required for the installation. Satisfactory maintenance service is a necessity. The financial stability of some firms who have submitted bids and who might submit bids in the future are questionable. This is a student service, and the students pay for the service and it is not really something that the University is buying. Mr. McConnell and his staff join me in the recommendation that we renew the contract with Capital Coin Laundromat, Inc., for the next biennium. It is also our opinion that any firm bidding that would give us more than 35% of the gross receipts would have to sacrifice service and thereby create an unsatisfactory operation.

RECOMMENDED CHANGES IN VETERANS' PRIORITIES, DEPOSITS AND CHARGES FOR ELECTRICITY IN UNIVERSITY APARTMENTS AND TRAILER CAMP: I recommend that the following recommendations submitted by Business Manager G. W. Landrum be approved:

- 1. That starting with the long session 1961-62 all priorities in the apartments and trailer camp be eliminated and the date of application determine the applicant's place on the waiting list. This is consistent with the assignment policy in effect for our dormitories for both men and women.
- 2. That beginning immediately and to be fully effective on September 1, 1961, the deposit for the apartments and trailer camp spaces be increased from \$10.00 to \$20.00, and the deposit be made at the time the application is filed. This policy is consistent with that followed in our men and women's dormitories.
- 3. That effective September 1, 1961, or as soon after that date as meters are installed on the apartments and trailer camp spaces the occupants of each apartment or space be billed for the electricity consumed. The present rental rates are to be continued, but will include water and gas as far as the apartments are concerned and water only as far as the trailer camp lots are concerned.

Recommended Changes in Veterans' Priorities, Deposits and Charges for Electricity in University Apartments and Trailer Camp (continued)

In support of these three recommendations Mr. Landrum has furnished the following background information:

- 1. Since 1947 in operating the University Apartments first priority has been given to veterans of W. W. II and, later, to Korean veterans also. Although over half of the present occupants are veterans, there are fewer and fewer applications from this group. The veteran priority program creates confusion and difficulties for both students and the University, and it is felt that the removal of such program will not cause a hardship, but by using the "application date priority" for all students a better program will be provided for our married students.
- 2. The \$10.00 deposit required for University Apartments and Trailer Camp space since 1947 is not large enough to cover damages and unpaid bills. Also, the deposit has not been required to be made at the time of application as in our dormitory programs. By increasing the deposit and by requiring that it be made at time of application, the University would have a more valid waiting list and could evaluate the true applicants for this housing.
- 3. Since 1947 rental rates for apartments have been as follows:

Duplex apartment	\$28.00	per	month
One-bedroom apartment	25.00	per	month

Four-bedroom apartment	40.00	per	month
Trailer park lots (excluding gas)	12.00	per	month

Except for these trailer park lots, these rental rates have included all utilities (water, gas, and electricity). The apartment units and areas are requiring more and more maintenance. Instead of raising rental rates to cover maintenance, it seems more equitable to charge the occupant for electricity consumed since the amount used varies so widely from occupant to occupant depending on electrical appliances, air conditioning, etc. In 1947 the average electricity cost was \$2.62 per apartment per month; last fiscal year the average monthly bill was \$6.05 per apartment per month. The University would continue to furnish water and gas to apartments and water to trailer park. Through the Buildings and Grounds Committee at the May meeting, permission is being requested to renovate the electrical distribution system, rewire the service entrances to the apartments, and trailer camp and install kilo-watt-hour meters on each unit. It is anticipated that the cost of this work can be amortized in less than two years by charging the students for electricity. Additional revenue accrued to the project after amortization of the new installation will be used to further the maintenance program of the apartment units.

CHANGES IN RATES FOR RUSH WEEK AND GUEST RATES IN RESIDENCE HALLS: Mr. Graves W. Landrum, Business Manager, submits the following problems in connection with residence halls:

1. The present charge of \$1.00 per night for overnight guests (on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday) in residence halls, and the guest meal rates, established many years ago and based on the monthly rates, are insufficient to cover present costs of accommodating guests; also because of the low rates, there is some abuse of guest privileges, some "guests" eating regularaly at dormitories.

Changes in Rates for Rush Week and Guest Rates in Residence Halls (continued)

2. Rush Week rates for room and board in the University dormitories have been based upon the existing guest rates. The fact that the seven days of rush preceding the opening of the First Semester require that a full staff be maintained, although the residence halls do not have full occupancy, means that costs are high. It is felt that these costs should be borne by those attending Rush Week instead of having the extra cost subsidized by regular dormitory occupants.

Accordingly, I recommend approval of the following recommendations of the Business Manager:

- 1. Effective September 1, 1961, the overnight rates in the University dormitories (both men and women) be increased from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per person per night.
- 2. Effective September 1, 1961, the prices for meals to guests in women's residence halls be changed as follows:

- 3. Effective the First Semester of 1961, Rush Week charges be as follows:
 - (1) A total charge of \$14.00 in the men's residence halls for room only, entitling the occupant to seven days in the men's residence halls.
 - (2) A total charge of \$30.00 in women's residence halls, including board and room, with an entitlement for a period of seven days.

In connection with the rates for Rush Week, it is further recommended that these be flat charges, entitling the occupants to accommodations for the full seven days as set out above, but that there be no refunds in the event rush participants do not stay the full time.

NATIONAL DEFENSE STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM: Main University has submitted to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C., an application to participate in the National Defense Student Loan Program for the period July 1, 1961 - June 30, 1962. The amount requested is \$235,800 as the Federal Capital Contribution to bring the total funds available for lending from July 1, 1961 to June 30, 1962, to \$297,000 for a estimated 575 borrowers.

USE OF TEXTBOOKS WRITTEN BY FACULTY MEMBERS: I recommend approval of the use of the following as textbooks:

1. School Health Program, by Jessie Helen Haag, published by Henry Holt and Company, which sells for \$7.00 with a royalty of 13.5% on first 3,000 copies plus 2.5% annual sales exceeding 1,000 copies based upon 75% of the educational sales price and 58% of the trade sales price. This book is to be used in 1961-62.

OUTSIDE AND ADDITIONAL DUTIES: I recommend that the staff members listed be permitted to undertake the outside and additional duties outlined, the work to be arranged so as not to interfere with University assignments, and otherwise to conform with the Regents' Rules and Regulations on outside employment:

1. Dr. Emmett L. Hudspeth, Professor of Physics, to serve as President of Texas Nuclear Corporation for some five or six months during the illness of the President. Dr. Hudspeth has been serving on the Technical Advisory Board and this new assignment would not essentially increase the time now devoted to his work with the corporation, and he would continue to be paid only as a consultant. The corporation is now being merged with Nuclear-Chicago Corporation, which will care for all routine business matters pertaining to the operation of Texas Nuclear and to most of the details of re-organization.

PURCHASE FROM A STAFF MEMBER: I recommend that the Department of Art be permitted to purchase from Mr. Loren Mozley, Professor of Art, 350 35-millimeter color slides of art and architecture of Yucatan, Chiapas, and Tabasco, at \$1.00 per slide; and 50 black and white photographs of art and architecture of Yucatan and Chiapas at \$1.00 each. This material is not elsewhere available and is being offered at approximately cost price.

ESTABLISHMENT OF CARL V. BREDT MEMORIAL FUND: A memorial fund, in memory of the late Dr. Carl V. Bredt, Associate Dean of Student Life and Dean of Men, has been established, and contributions totaling in excess of \$1,000 have been received. At present the plan is to use the fund for small loans.

MEZES FACULTY DONATION COMMITTEE: Two awards, one for \$200 and one for \$500, have been made to faculty members whose names will be reported in executive session.

EXCEPTIONS TO NEPOTISM REGULATION: The Administrative Council has approved the following two requests for exceptions to the nepotism rule for the remainder of the fiscal year:

- 1. To permit the employment of Miss Karen Bergquist as a Laboratory Research Assistant I (part-time) in the Genetics Foundation. Miss Bergquist's mother is already employed at the Genetics Foundation at a salary of more than \$450 per month.
- 2. To permit the appointment of Dr. Clifford Earl Lunneborg as part-time Special Instructor in the Department of Psychology for the Second Semester. Dr. Lunneborg's wife is employed by Dr. Alfred Castaneda of the Department of Psychology as a Research Assistant on a special project.

SALARY RANGES COVERING CLASSES OF POSITIONS IN THE CLASSIFIED SERVICE

EXPLANATION: Below are listed the salary ranges for classes of positions in the Classified Service of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. The first column indicates the index number of the class; the second column, the class title; the third column, the monthly salary range for the class, i.e., the minimum and maximum rates to be paid to incumbents of positions of the class; the fourth column, the annual salary ranges for the class; the last column the salary step number, which refers to the basic salary schedule (Table 2). The "Intermediate Steps" are those rates which fall between the indicated minimum and maximum rates and can be found in Table 2.

The salary ranges are intended to provide an equitable level of compensation for each class of employment. Ranges are determined through study and analysis of the following factors: prevailing rates of pay for comparable employment by private and other public employers, present economic conditions, present labor market conditions, past University and Medical School pay policies, and the relationship of the different classes of employment as determined through evaluation of duties and responsibilities of each position.

EXPLANATION OF CHANGES REQUESTED

- 1. Class 0001 Increase the salary range for Clerk one step from \$215-267 to \$225-279. It has become impossible to get any type of qualified clerical help for less than \$225. The NOMA Salary Survey in 1960 shows the greatest number of people in this class in Dallas are being paid between \$225 and \$300, and we feel we need this increase in order to compete for the type personnel necessary in our operation.
- 2. Class 0024 Increase the maximum salary for Administrative Assistant from \$539 to \$565. Due to the continuing growth of the medical school, the duties and responsibilities of this class are increasing steadily. In an informal survey made by the Personnel Office last year and in the NOMA Survey made last year we found that this type of secretaries and assistants are being paid as high as \$600 in Dallas and we feel we need this salary range in order to keep qualified and experienced personnel in this highly responsible position.
- 3. Class 0300 Increase the salary range of Switchboard Operator one step from \$235-292 to \$245-305. The preliminary report of the Occupational Wage Survey for 1960 reports the average salary range in Dallas for Switchboard Operator-Receptionist (which is the type operation we have) to be \$279-333, and the NOMA Survey shows a salary range of \$238-330 for the greatest number of people in this class.
- 4. Class 0700 Increase the salary range for Personnel Director two steps from \$382-514 to \$439-565. This is an adjustment to make this salary range more comparable with other positions of equal responsibilities in the medical school and with the Personnel Directors at the other competent institutions and to have a competitive salary range in the Dallas area.
- 5. Class 3212 Inclusion of Carpenter Foreman with salary range competitive with similar classification in the Dallas area.
- 6. Class 4200 Increase the maximum salary range for Custodial Worker one step from \$235 to \$245, lengthening the salary range to accommodate the wide variety of personnel in this classification.
