CHANGE ORDER TO CONTRACT WITH ROBERT E. MCKEE (Texas Western College): I recommend approval and ratification of the action of Mr. Charles H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, in signing Change Order No. 3 to the contract with Robert E. McKee, General Contractor, Inc., for the construction of an Addition to the Engineering Building and an Addition to the Dining Hall at Texas Western College, involving an addition to the contract price of \$778.58. This change order involves a number of minor changes in the plans and specifications, and there is sufficient money in the allotment account to cover this change order and the architect's fees thereon.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION AND AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR UNDERGROUND TELEPHONE DUCT SYSTEM AT MEDICAL BRANCH: At the January meeting, an appropriation of \$15,000 was made for the construction of an Underground Telephone Duct System to serve the Apartment Building, Dormitories, and Cafeteria, Lounge, and Faculty Housing Building at the Medical Branch in Galveston, and authorization was given to Mr. C. H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, to take bids and award a contract for this project. The low bid received was \$16,330 by O'Rourke Construction Company of Houston, Texas, the work to be completed in 50 calendar days. In order to accept the low bid and have a small amount available for contingencies, I recommend that an additional \$2,000 be appropriated to this project from the Available Fund Unappropriated Balance.



The book by Mr. Vines represents the fruits of over 20 years of labor; it will be an invaluable reference work, containing descriptions of more than 1,500 species (and 1,200 illustrations) of trees, shrubs, and vines which occur in Texas and adjacent states. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE DAN DANCIGER PUBLICATION FUND (Continued) Proceeds from the sale of these two books (and all books financed from this fund) are to be deposited in the Dan Danciger Publication Fund and reinvested by the Press in other important books which shall be approved for publication by the Director and Faculty Advisory Board of the Press. Each book so published will contain a special page acknowledging the fund out of which it is financed.

I recommend that this gift be accepted as a supplement to our publication funds and that the appreciation of the Board be expressed to Mr. Danciger.

Clabaugh, all of the Department of Geology, to do a small amount of petrographic and mineralogic work for Dow Chemical Company; and the two latter to do about three or four hours work for Standard Oil Company of Texas, for which they will be paid approximately \$30. 609

2. Dr. Darrell S. Hughes, of the Department of Physics, to continue as consultant to the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratories, for the period July 1, 1955 - June 30, 1956.

3. Mrs. Janet McGaughey and Miss Phyllis Young, both of the Department of Music, to accept a \$25 fee for a recital given at Texas A & M College.

4. Dr. Walter L. Moore, of the Department of Civil Engineering, to work with consulting engineers on a phase of an investigation being made of a proposed dam site on the Guadalupe River, the time required to be about four days and the rate of pay about \$75 per day.

5. Mr. Angel Reyes, Mr. Edward Fiorelli, Mr. Albert Gillis, and Mr. Horace Britt, of the Department of Music, to accept a stipend of \$80 each for a concert to be given at the New Mexico A & M College.

6. Mr. Raymond Dawson, Mr. E. A. Ripperger, and Mr. Hudson Matlock, all of the College of Engineering, to assist the Shell Oil Company in testing piles for off-shore structures in the Gulf of Mexico, the fee to be \$75 per day plus expenses.

7. Mr. R. Gommel Roessner, of the School of Architecture, to design a private residence.

8. Mr. R. R. Krezdorn, of the Department of Electrical Engineering, to do a limited amount of consulting work, fees to be charged to be at least as high as recommended by Texas Society of Professional Engineers.

9. Mr. W. A. Cunningham, of the Department of Chemical Engineering, to serve as a special consultant to the Texas Crude Oil Company of Fort Worth, compensation to be at the rate of \$100 per day plus expenses.

10, Mr. William S. Lowe, Jr., Research Associate, Bureau of Business Research, to do consulting work for Syndreco, Inc. of Austin, the time required to be approximately five hours per week.

11. Miss Helen Haupt, of the Department of Music, to accept 80% of fees paid for private lessons to non-University students given from January through May, 1955, in the total amount of \$53.60, the remaining 20% to be added to the Fine Arts Foundation Scholarship Fund.

12. Dr. Byron Short, of the College of Engineering, to continue to serve as a consultant in connection with the agreement between the Bureau of Engineering Research and the Texas Gulf Sulphur Company, the latter company to pay \$200 per month for the period of the agreement.

ROTC PROPERTY INDEMNIFICATION BOND: At the December 1954 meeting of the Board President Wilson was authorized to sign a Bond for Safekeeping of Arms, Tentage and Equipment Issued to Educational Institutions in the amount of \$10,000, replacing one in the amount of \$200,000 executed in 1947. After the Bond was signed on behalf of the University, the Army advised that \$5,000 was a sufficient sum for the Bond and on the executed copy returned for the University's file, the amount was changed to that figure. This is reported for information and to recommend ratification of this action. TRANSFER OF HILL HALL ANNEX TO MEN'S RESIDENCE HALLS: I recommend approval of the transfer of Hill Hall Annex from the Athletic Council to Men's Residence Halls at the end of the Second Semester of 1954-55, the building to be designated as San Jacinto Dormitory A. The Athletic Council is to be paid \$13,400, representing 50% of the amount they spent on the building at the time it was transferred to them. The funds are to be provided from the following sources: \$6,800 from Account No. 6291 - Veterans' Housing Project, Contract No. HA Tex-41718 MPH-955-Unallocated Balance to the Athletic Council's General Account, and \$6,600 to be paid by San Jacinto Dormitories to the Athletic Council for furniture and improvements to the building, this payment after transfer of the dormitory at the end of the Second Semester.

I recommend further that the rental rates for the dormitory be set at \$60 per semester per student for double rooms, \$90 for single rooms, and \$135 per semester for single rooms with private baths.

REMOVAL OF RESIDENCE ON THE KINSOLVING SITE: To make way for the construction of the Kinsolving Dormitory, it is necessary to remove the present buildings from the tract of land. I concur in the recommendation of the Business Manager that he be authorized to have specifications prepared and bids taken for the removal of the house, garage, etc., now on the land; further, that he be authorized to award the contract to the highest bidder, provided this bid results in a payment to The University of Texas, and that the proceeds of the sale be credited to Account No. 9457 -"Dormitory for Women on Kinsolving Tract" allotment account.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR COOLING TOWER AND PIPING FOR THE COOLING TOWER: At the meeting of the Board of Regents on January 29, 1955, the Comptroller was authorized to take bids and award contracts for a Four-cell Cooling Tower and Piping for the Cooling Tower at the Main University. The bids on the two projects were received and tabulated on March 8 and March 15, 1955, respectively, and awards to the lowest bidders meeting specifications are as follows:

I recommend ratification of this action.

SALE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY: The Department of Ceramic Engineering wishes to sell some twenty-two items of equipment no longer needed. The Acme Brick Company of Fort Worth has bid \$10,050 on eleven of the items, this price being in excess of the original cost, which was \$9,058.99. Since the amount for these items is in excess of \$500, I recommend that the Regents approve the sale of this property.

SCARBROUGH AWARDS FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING: The Scarbrough Awards were given this year to Dr. DeWitt C. Reddick, Professor of Journalism, and to Dr. Margaret Anne Eppright, Professor of Home Economics.

LABORATORY FEE FOR DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS SERVICES: The demand for typewriting courses is so great that it will be necessary, with the slightest increase in enrollment, to have another laboratory equipped with at least forty typewriters. The Department of Business Services requests, and I recommend approval, that beginning in September, 1955, a \$2 laboratory fee be charged for intermediate and advanced shorthand, secretarial practice, and transcription, typewriters being used for a major part of these courses. These additional fees, along with the \$2 laboratory fee already established for all typewriting courses, will pay for the new machines within a short period of time. WAIVING OF NEPOTISM: Dr. Harold W. Stevenson, Assistant Professor of Psychology, is presenting a proposal for research to the Hogg Foundation. If the grant is made, Dr. Stevenson requests that his wife, Mrs. Nancy Guy Stevenson, who has served at Stanford University as a research assistant in Psychology, be permitted to work on the project for one or two years on not more than a half-time basis. I recommend that the nepotism rule be waived and Mrs. Stevenson be allowed to be employed.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS: I recommend ratification of your approval by "no-objection-within-five-days" procedure of Mail Dockets XXXIV, XXXV, XXXVI, XXXVII, XXXVIII, XXXIX, and XL, copies of which are attached.

GRADUATE SCHOOL REGULATIONS: I recommend approval of the following, submitted by the Graduate Legislative Council:

"It is recommended that the present rules on grades of scholarship, General Information Bulletin #5408, pages 67-68, be amended by striking out all exceptions whereby the rules for graduate students are different from the rules for undergraduate students.

"Under item 6, change the present rule to read: The incomplete work must be made up within four months after the symbol X is recorded.

"Under item 7, change the present rule to read: Unless a grade has been reported in the meantime by the instructor, the symbol X shall be changed to symbol F (except in thesis, 98, or dissertation, 99, courses), and the course must be repeated if credit for the work is desired."

The Graduate Legislative Council further recommends:

- 1. Subject to the following restrictions, graduate credit will be given for grades of A, B, or C, for work done at The University of Texas.
- 2. All of the advanced work that has been counted or could be counted for the student's graduate major must have a strict B average (not including the thesis or dissertation, for which only A or B will be credited).
- 3. All of the advanced work that has been counted or could be counted for the student's graduate minor or minors must have a strict B average.
- 4. A student must also maintain a strict B average on all advanced courses including prerequisite work for his major or minor.
- 5. In each of the fields of work listed above, for each semester hour with a grade of C the student must make a semester hour with a grade of A.

ATOMIC ENERGY COMMISSION: Because of the increasing interest in uranium prospecting in certain areas of Texas, the Atomic Energy Commission plans to maintain a small office in the State, as a part of their Reconnaissance Branch. The chief of this Branch, Mr. Howard S. Stafford, has requested the University's permission for the AEC office to be located physically with our Bureau of Economic Geology. This arrangement is desirable from the standpoint of our Bureau, since it would enable the Bureau to keep abreast of Atomic Energy Commission field geological activities and uranium developments in Texas. At the present time, the Bureau of Economic Geology maintains some space at the Balcones Research Center for its cooperative program with the U. S. Geological Survey. Space for the Atomic Energy Commission could be provided also in these quarters. I recommend that approval be given for providing office space for the Commission. Dr. John T. Lonsdale, Professor of Geology ATOMIC ENERGY COMMISSION (Continued) and Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology, is to be the responsible officer for coordinating the Commission's local activities with those of the University. 612

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS: On recommendation of the proper committee of award, the following scholarships and fellowships have been granted:
