

BENEDICT MEMORIAL FUND FOR A GREATER UNIVERSITY, CHANGE IN PURPOSE: In 1938 the University Mortar Board chapter established the Benedict Memorial Fund, with most of the donations secured through assignment of \$1.00 of the property deposit by students at time of registration. The February 1939 Minutes of the Board reported the establishment of this fund, indicating that it was "to be expended upon order of the President of the University, with the approval of the Regents, for any purpose that may in his judgment benefit the students or faculty of the Main University." In 1940, \$300 of the fund was used for lighting the Intramural Field. The fund, at present totalling \$709, has not been used for a number of years, and Mortar Board recommends that it now be transferred to the Committee on Loan and Scholarship Information for use as a loan fund. I recommend approval.

- E. D. FARMER SCHOLARSHIP: The Faculty Committee of the E. D. Farmer Scholarship Fund makes the following recommendations concerning the estimated August 31 balance in the amount of \$16,103.41:
  - 1. That three scholarships of \$2,100 each be made available to students of the University of Texas to attend the National University of Mexico, March December, 1958;

Familie Ratchford, Curator of the Rare Books Collection, has been awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship for study in England next year largely on the strength of her earlier work on the Wise forgeries. She will be working with Mr. Foxon of the British Museum on certain recent discoveries he has made in connection with about forty plays in the British Museum printed in the period 1600-1660 from which leaves have been stolen since 1890 and replaced by other printings. The Rare Books Collection of the University also has copies of these plays and it is highly desirable that our copies be compared with those in the British Museum to determine what we have--originals, with parts of British Museum copies rebound into ours--or outright forgeries--or the same thing the British Museum has: parts of original printings with forgeries bound in with the original.

Miss Ratchford and Dr. Ransom, who will become Director of the Rare Books Collection in September 1957, request that permission be given for Miss Ratchford to carry the plays in question to England for this study to be made. The material can be safely locked in the British Museum and used under all the usual safeguards while Miss Ratchford and British scholars make the comparative study.

I recommend approval.

FURCHASE FROM A STAFF MEMBER: The Department of Ceramic Engineering wishes to purchase a special furnace to mount on the x-ray diffraction unit and a temperature rate controller for the furnace. These instruments can be built only by the Robert L. Stone Company, the only manufacturing company acquainted with the special design. Since Dr. R. L. Stone, the President of the company, is Professor of Ceramic Engineering at the University, I recommend that the Regents be requested to approve this purchase.

# RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

In Plan 7 leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering on page 33 of the Engineering Catalogue for 1956-58, University publication No. 5611, dated June 1, 1956, delete M. E. 340, Heat Power Engineering and Laboratory, and add M. E. 140, Heat Power Laboratory and M. E. 239, Introduction to Heat Transfer.

The reason for this is that M. E. 140 retains the fundamental experiments given in M. E. 340 but the reports are much less formal. M. E. 239 is an elective course offered by the M. E. Department and covers heat transfer. The E. E. Department has desired this subject matter for several years. This rearrangement of material is desired by all concerned.

In Plan 10 leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Petroleum Engineering found on page 39 of the above mentioned catalogue delete M. E. 320, Heat Engineering, and M. E. 340, Heat Power Engineering and Laboratory and add Ch. E. 361, Thermodynamics, and three hours of electives (upper division).

The reasons for this change are: Ch. E. 361 is a course in thermodynamics with physical chemistry as a background. The study of reservoir engineering is becoming increasingly important for Petroleum Engineering. The production of oil at increasing depths and temperatures has its attendant problems of thermodynamic properties of complex mixtures of hydrocarbons and salt water.

It is contemplated to cover the essential laboratory experiments in M. E. 340 in some of the laboratory work now being given in Petroleum Engineer-ing.

The three hours upper division elective increases total electives to eleven hours. All electives are approved by the department. These three hours will be devoted to additional training in the areas of advanced geology, mathematics and physics.

Reason: the content of this course will be changed to orientational material without laboratory in line with the recommendation of the Curriculum Committee of the College of Pharmacy, Curriculum Committee of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (1956), the American Council on Pharmaceutial Education, the National Accrediting Agency for Pharmacy, and also in line with the consensus of opinions expressed at the Teachers of Pharmacy Seminar of 1955.
- 2. Pharmacy 202 (212K) is restored, placing it in a spring semester of the First Professional Year. Reason: Experience, as well as opinion, indicates that the subject matter normally in this course can best be presented as a course rather than incorporate it in to other pharmacy course(s).
- 3. Pharmacy 306 is to be moved from the fall semester of the Second Professional Year to the spring semester of the First Professional Year as Pharmacy 206 (316K) to be a companion course with Pharmacy 202 (212K).
- 4. Chemistry 416 is to be replaced in the spring semester by Pharmacy 202 (212K), and Pharmacy 206 (316K).

- 3. Bacteriology 629 is placed in this year in place of Government 610 in order to make it possible for this course to serve as a prerequisite for Pharmacy 673 (pharmacology) which is recommended for the Third Professional Year.
- 4. Zoology 414 is deleted from the fall semester and replaced by Zoology 316k and a second course in physiology (Zool. 344) is being requested as an offering by the Zoology Department since it is highly desirable to have two semesters of human physiology in the training of the pharmacist and as a prerequisite for Pharmacy 673 (pharmacology).
- 5. Accounting 611a is moved from the fall semester of the Third Professional Year in place of Marketing 337, in order to secure a more proper sequence.

The following changes are recommended:

- 1. Pharmacy 320M (Drug Marketing) is offered in the fall semester and is recommended as an applied course in place of Marketing 337, formerly offered in the spring semester.
- 2. The titles of Pharmacy 433 and 436Q are changed from Simple Preparations IIa and Advanced Preparations IIb to General Pharmacy II and General Pharmacy III respectively to allow for greater latitude in titles on the basis of course content. These new titles have been recommended by the agencies mentioned above in order to bring about greater uniformity in course titles.
- 3. Accounting 611a has been moved from the fall semester to the spring semester of the Second Professional Year to permit Pharmacy 320M to be offered in the Third Professional Year.

CATALOGUE REVISION. Approval is requested to revise the sections of the catalogue statement relating to tuition fees and definition of nonresidents to give effect to House Bill No. 265 of the 55th Legislature. The new statement of nonresident regulations will be quoted exactly. The suggested revisions of the sections regarding tuition fees are as follows:

Tuition fee. All fees are payable in full at the time of registration. Tuition is \$200 for the school year for those in the regular medical program for 1957-58 and \$300 for 1958-59. For those in the medical art and graduate programs the tuition fee is \$100 for the school year or \$50 per semester for 12 semester hours or more. (Exception: a student registering "in absentia" but for no courses pays \$15.) Graduate students carrying less than 12 semester hours are required to pay \$15 for the first 3 hours or less and \$4 for each additional hour.

Tuition fee for nonresidents. There is no distinction between resident and nonresident tuition for medical students. For the definition of nonresidents see pages 25-27. Medical art and graduate students who are nonresidents are required to pay tuition of \$400 for the school year or \$200 for each semester for a course load of 12 semester hours or more. A nonresident part-time graduate student who carries less than 12 semester hours in the long session or 4 semester hours in a summer term is required to pay \$18.50 for the first semester hour
