FURNITURE AND EQUIPMENT FOR WHITIS DORMITORY AT 2500 WHITIS AVENUE,

MAIN UNIVERSITY: Vice-President and Provost H. H. Ransom has approved
the following submitted by Mr. F. C. McConnell, Director of the
Division of Housing and Food Service, concurred in by Business Manager
G. W. Landrum, and I recommend that \$10,000 be transferred from Account

Some \$30,000 was appropriated for the purpose of renovating Whitis Dormitory for use of Negro women students. It seems doubtful that this sum would be sufficient to cover both the rehabilitation program for the building and the purchase of furniture and equipment.

MILITARY LEAVE: I recommend approval of military leave for Mr. Joseph H. Culver, Director, Office of Workmen's Compensation Insurance and Other Staff Benefits, for the period June 4-18, 1960.

ABSENCE IN EXCESS OF TWO WEEKS (MAIN UNIVERSITY PERSONNEL): I recommend approval of request of Mr. Arthur J. Edwards, Training Specialist -- Acting Assistant Director of the Industrial Education Division of the Industrial and Business Training Bureau, Division of Extension, to be away August 5-21, 1960, to go to Menomonie, Wisconsin, to attend the Trade and Industrial Education National Leadership Development Conference conducted by the U. S. Office of Health, Education, and Welfare to obtain information, materials, and ideas for use in the University's teacher training program, expenses to be paid from the Maintenance, Equipment, and Travel account of the Bureau.

This leaves in the account the \$1,500 allocation in lieu of house and utilities. Later, at the time Doctor Ransom moves into a University house, a proportionate share of this \$1,500 is to be transferred to General College Administration, leaving in the account for the Vice-President the unused balance to be lapsed to General Revenue.

I recommend that the Auditor be authorized to pay from the Available University Fund during 1960-61 the salary amounts set out in the Appropriation Bill for President under Central Administration and Vice-President under Main University to Chancellor Wilson in Central Administration and President Ransom in Main University. (This action does not require that the amount of the Available University Fund be increased in either the Central Administration budget or the Main University budget.)

46. Mr. Charles I. Francis of Houston, and Mr. Hugh Lamar Stone, of San Angelo, are two of the trustees of The Law School Foundation, which makes contributions to the School of Law. Both Mr. Francis and Mr. Stone have contributed generously to the Foundation, and while no report of such contributions is made to the Regents, I recommend that the Secretary of the Board express to these men the appreciation of the Board for their generosity. Mr. Francis several years ago made a contribution of \$6,400 to the endowment fund of the Foundation, and recently transmitted an additional gift of 200 shares of Texas Eastern Transmission Corporation common stock having a total value of \$5,576. Mr. Stone earlier has made a contribution of \$2,000; more recently he has given a check for \$3,000 and 100 shares of Gulf Oil Corporation stock valued at \$3,000.

FACULTY LEGISLATION: I recommend approval of the following legislation passed by the Faculty Council and/or General Faculty:

1. The Faculty Council on April 26, 1960, by the circularization procedure approved the recommendations of the School of Law that the following sentence be added at the end of the first paragraph under Grades and Credits on page 31 of the 1958-59 Law School Catalogue: "Unless special permission is given by the Dean, a student who drops a two semester course after the first semester examination will have his first semester grade apply to his overall average at one-half the course's semester hour value, but will receive no credit in the course." (D&P 2819)

Reason: The dropping of a two semester course after a low examination grade in the first semester often enables a weak student to remain in the School of Law beyond the period when he should be dropped. The Dean of the Law School should be able to suspend this rule when genuine hardship is the proximate cause of the low grade.

2. The Faculty Council on May 16, 1960, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the Admissions Committee to change the requirements for admission to the College of Engineering and to the College of Fine Arts. (D&P 2820) M-4060 mass

At the present the College of Engineering and the College of Fine Arts require 15 units from high school for entrance to the University. The current catalogue spells out the 16 unit requirements for entrance into College of Arts and Sciences effective September, 1963, and the present legislation indicates that effective September, 1963, the College of Engineering and the College of Fine Arts will require 16 entrance units and specifies the following requirements: for Engineering, 3 units in English, 4 units in mathematics, 2 from the sciences and 2 from the social sciences; for Fine Arts, 3 units in English, 2 in mathematics, two units from each of two of foreign languages, natural sciences, and social studies.

3. On June 8, 1960, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences (D&P 2825-26) and the recommendations of the College of Engineering (D&P 2827) as set out below.

Arts and Sciences

Mathematics may be offered as minor for students majoring in English

Major requirements for French and for Spanish permit substitution of French 312K and 312L for French 612, and Spanish 312K and 312L for Spanish 612, and require at least six (instead of three) semester hours (in each field) to be of senior rank.

Engineering

Eliminates several courses for degree requirements (mostly inspection trips) from various departments, and allows only three hours of electives (instead of six) in the ROTC program. This is done because the number of hours for the Engineering degree has been reduced from between 7 to 11 hours in the various degree plans, and to make the elective program freer than before, it has been necessary to reduce the credit given for the ROTC program.

ABSENCES IN EXCESS OF TWO WEEKS (EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ACTION): I recommend approval and ratification of action of Executive Committee on the following:

- 1. Dr. William Junius Carter, Professor of Mechanical Engineering, June 13-July 20, 1960, to Los Angeles and Berkeley, California, to confer with individuals at various universities regarding experiments in engineering education and to attend the West Coast meeting of the Applied Mechanics Division of ASME, travel expenses to be paid from Excellence funds.

  Dr. Carter is not teaching this summer but will be appointed June 13-August 996 17, 1960 in the Bureau of Engineering Research. He is chairman of the committee supervising the engineering science program now being given at the University, and it is in this connection that he has been given the assignment of visiting other schools with like programs.
- 2. Dr. Howard Thomas Odum, Director of the Institute of Marine Science, May 23 June 10, 1960, to go to Instituto de Biologica Marina and El Junque, Mayaguez, and Lajas, Puerto Rico, to complete measurements of photosynthesis on rain-forest and mangrove leaves and to determine species variety curve in a coral reef. This research is part of the work authorized under the National Science Foundation Cooperative Graduate Fellowship Program, Improvement of Graduate Programs in the Sciences grant, and his travel expenses will be charged to that account.
- 3. Dr. Louis S. Kornicker, Research Scientist IV, Institute of Marine Science, to be away from the Institute June 5 August 3, 1960, to undertake biogeological research on Alacran Reef, a coral reef off Yucatan, Mexico. Dr. Kornicker is the recipient of a National Science Foundation grant in support of this research, and his expenses will be charged to grant funds.
- 4. Miss Freddie Little, Clerk-Typist in the Psychological Research Foundation, which is supported by funds from the U.S. Public Health grant, June 8 25, 1960, to be reassigned to Jemez Springs, New Mexico, to assist with research and analyzing research data at The Humans Relations Training Laboratory, directed by Dr. Robert Blake, Professor of Psychology, who is also director of the Psychological Foundation. All expenses will be paid from grant funds. (Released on approval of President Wilson June 8, 1960, with answers from two members of the Executive Committee).
- 5. Mrs. Florence D. Wilson, Research Scientist III, Genetics Foundation, which is supported by contract and grant funds, to be away June 18 August 22, 1960, on a trip to the Rocky Mountain Chain in New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Utah, and perhaps Arizona, to collect Drosophila for population genetics studies.

SALE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY: Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager, has forwarded the request of Mr. J. Neils Thompson to sell certain items of surplus property purchased from the Federal Government at low cost. Before such property is sold, it must have been kept for a certain period of time, and the sale must have the approval of the Texas State Property Agency. Both of these requirements have been met. A list of the property, which includes such items as grinders, blueprint machine, duplicating machines, etc., was circulated to University departments but no interest was indicated.

Accordingly, since the total price may exceed \$1,000, your approval is requested to sell the items to the highest bidder based on sealed proposals.

SALE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY TO A STAFF MEMBER: The Extension Teaching and Field Service Bureau offered for sale last fall two dictaphones and a transcriber at \$160 each. This equipment was offered to University departments on December 9, 1959, but none were interested, and on open market by sealed bid sale, and no bids were received. Miss Margaret Peck, Dean of Women, wishes to purchase one dictating machine with carrying case for \$160. I recommend that approval be given for the Extension Teaching and Field Service Bureau to sell the article to Miss Peck.

REVISIONS IN THE 1960-61 BUDGET OF THE TEXAS UNION: Mr. Graves Landrum, Business Manager, has submitted the following in regard to the 1960-61 Union Budget. I recommend approval of his recommendations.  $\mathcal{M} = 1/2$ 

Mr. Nolen's (Director of the Union) letter of June addressed to you and approved by Deans Nowotny and McCown contain two recommendations:

- 1. The first recommendation that \$63,000 of the amount remaining in the Texas Union Fees Clearing Account be appropriated for equipment, furnishings and remodeling is in my opinion a valid request. Therefore, I recommend that an appropriation of \$63,161.70 be made from the Texas Union Fees Clearing Account to a separate account in the Auxiliary Enterprises' series of accounts to an account entitled "Texas Union Special Account for Equipment, Furnishings and Remodeling." This account is not to be used as a regular operating account, but it is to be used at the discretion of the Union Board to do the necessary remodeling, refurnishing and providing the necessary equipment and furniture not provided through the regular construction accounts paid from building bond proceeds.
- 2. The second recommendation is that \$50,000 of the Texas Union Fees Clearing Account be transferred to the Sinking Fund for retirement of the Texas Union Bonds and thereby applies against the \$193,000 Reserve Fund required by the Bond Resolution. I recommend that \$50,000 be transferred to the Texas Union Bond Sinking Fund account. This recommendation does not mean that the amount required from the operating budget for the next six years be reduced, and in presenting the 1960-61 Texas Union operating budget, an amount of \$32,000 has been included instead of the \$24,000 recommended by Mr. Nolen in his letter of June 6.

IABORATORY FEES EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER, 1960: Senate Bill No. 6, passed by the 56th Legislature, third called session reads in part as follows: "... any such educational institution shall make and collect a laboratory charge in an amount sufficient to cover in general the cost of laboratory materials and supplies used by a student; provided, however, that such charge shall be not less than two dollars (\$2.00) nor more than eight dollars (\$8.00) for any one (1) semester or summer term from any student in any one (1) laboratory course."

A request was sent to deans and departmental chairmen of departments offering laboratory courses asking that fees be reviewed and recommendations be submitted for the fees to be charged for each laboratory course based on the cost of laboratory materials and supplies used by a students. On the basis of these recommendations, I recommend approval of the fees indicated in the attached Laboratory Fee Schedule, to be effective September 1, 1960.
