#### Gentlemen:

The dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents in Austin on July 22, 1961.

Main University Texas Western College Medical Branch Dental Branch M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute Southwestern Medical School Postgraduate School of Medicine

Listed below are Central Administration items which I recommend for your approval.

#### RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS TO THE 1960-61 BUDGET

#### 1. Office of the Comptroller

Change the status of employment of John Robert Morris as Clerk-of-the-Works for the Undergraduate Library and Academic Center. Since February 1, 1961, John Robert Morris has been Clerk-of-the-Works 7/8 time on the Undergraduate Library and Academic Center at the Main University at a salary rate of \$568.75 a month (7/8 of \$650), with the other 1/8 of his time being allocated to the New Central Water Chilling Station, that part of his salary being paid by Grayson Gill, Inc., architect for this project. Since the Central Water Chilling Station building is nearing completion, Mr. Morris' services are no longer needed in connection with this project, and it is, therefore, recommended that he be appointed, effective June 1, 1961, as fulltime Clerk-of-the-Works on the Undergraduate Library and Academic Center at a salary rate of \$650 a month.

2. System Personnel Office Der

Grant a military leave of absence to Joseph H. Culver for the period from June 3 through June 17, 1961, while on active duty with the United States Army Reserve at Fort Hood, Texas. Mr. Culver is employed in the System Personnel Office as Director of Employee Benefits (one-half time); he is employed in the University Personnel Office, Main University, as Assistant Director (one-half time).

Docket Errata. Amend the docket for the May 12-13, 1961 meeting of the Board of Regents to reflect the effective date of the salary increase for Joseph H. Culver to be as of March 1, 1961, rather than April 1, 1961, (from a rate of \$7,104 to a rate of \$7,440).

#### SEMIANNUAL REPORT OF GIFTS OF \$100 OR LESS

In accordance with Part Two, Chapter I, Section 1.4, of the Regents' Rules, semiannual reports of cash gifts of \$100 or less, which have been accepted by the institutional heads, have been filed with the Secretary of the Board of Regents for the six-month period ending February 28, 1961.

#### GIFTS

The following gift has been received and accepted for the purpose noted:

1. Gift of \$100 from Mr. J. A. Gooch, Fort Worth, Texas as a completely unrestricted donation. The funds have been deposited to Account #81643, Office of the Chancellor, Various Donors - Various Purposes. The gift was made in response to a written solicitation from the Chairman of the Development Board, Mr. J. M. Odom.

#### GRANT FROM FUND FOR ADULT EDUCATION

The Fund for Adult Education has entered into a Letter of Agreement with the University by which \$40,000 is granted for the purpose of constructing and equipping an educational television station serving the entire Austin -San Antonio area, to be operated in conjunction with the Southwest Texas Area Educational Television Council as licensee under the Federal Communications Commission. The grant document itemizes the equipment to be purchased with the \$40,000. The University has been advised that the Fund for Adult Education will shortly conclude regular operations, and arrangements have been made whereby the National Educational Television and Radio Center will act in the Fund's stead in all matters relating to assistance toward educational television facilities including this present grant. The program is administered by the Radio - Television Department under the direction of Professor Robert F. Schenkkan and is Supervised by Vice-Chancellor Haskew. A copy of the Letter of Agreement is on file in the Regents' Office.

#### NOMINATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIPS IN THE GRADUATE FACULTY

The Graduate Council, with the concurrence of the Graduate Dean, has approved the following nominations for membership in the Graduate Faculty. The recommendations have been approved by the institutional head concerned and by the Chancellor, and are recommended for approval by the Board of Regents:

#### ETTER ESTATE

Approval of the Board of Regents is requested for the following actions:

1. Vice-Chancellor Haskew has reported an unspent balance of \$3,723.17 in Account #81738 - 75th Anniversary Fund. This balance is being credited back to Account #82320 - Estate of Lila Belle Etter.

2. The Chancellor has authorized addition of \$1,500 to Account #81730 -Etter Estate - Special Fund. This fund was originally established by the Board of Regents to be used at the discretion of the Chancellor for administrative expenses.

#### APPOINTMENT OF PRESIDENT, MAIN UNIVERSITY

Dr. Joseph R. Smiley was unanimously elected as President of the Main University effective June 1, 1961, with the same remuneration as that which the Board had authorized for President Ransom, as follows:

> \$17,500 from General Funds, \$2,000 from Salary Supplementation Funds; \$2,700 from Etter Fund (Current Restricted), and \$2,800 from Etter Fund for purchase of annuity directly from TIAA, totaling \$25,000; and an allowance in lieu of house and utilities of \$200 per month to continue until Dr. Smiley occupies a University house (estimated October, 1961).

# CLARIFICATION AND UPDATING OF THE REQUIREMENTS IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE

Clarification and updating of the requirements in foreign language is recommended to bring these requirements more nearly in line with generally accepted principles in major graduate institutions. These proposed changes have been under discussion for nearly five months and have been considered by both the Graduate Council and the Graduate Legislative Council. This recommendation of the Graduate Legislative Council has the approval of the Dean of the Graduate School and President Smiley.

<u>Item I.</u> Change in the Catalogue of the Graduate School of The University of Texas, Number 6004, pages 49-50: (<u>Ph.D. Requirements</u>) Examinations in foreign languages.

#### Present Reading

By the beginning of a student's last full year (or the equivalent) of graduate work, he must pass examinations to demonstrate a satisfactory reading knowledge of at least two foreign languages designated by the appropriate committee on graduate studies and approved by the Dean as pertinent to the student's program. Only languages with a recognized scholarly literature in the student's major area will be acceptable.

On recommendation of the appropriate committee on graduate studies, and with the approval of the Dean, a candidate may substitute for a reading knowledge of two foreign languages a satisfactory speaking and reading competence in one foreign language pertinent to his major area.

On behalf of an individual student, the appropriate committee on graduate studies may petition the Dean for the substitution of some other advanced scholarship skill for one of the two required foreign languages. Approval of such substitution will not be given in instances where the scholarship skill may be considered a normal part of the student's academic development.

The language examinations will be given with the permission of the Dean by representatives of the foreign language departments concerned. Students should consult the representatives of the foreign language departments at the beginning of their graduate study here in order to get instruction concerning the requirements of the examination. These examinations must be taken in residence at the Main University.

The candidate will be expected to read publications in his major field of study.

#### Proposed Reading

The minimum general foreign language requirement for candidates for the Ph.D. degree is the demonstration of competence in reading material in the student's major field of study in one foreign language. Selection of the foreign language, to meet the minimum requirement, is made by the Committee on Graduate Studies of the appropriate department or area. Only a language with a recognized scholarly literature in the student's major area will be acceptable. Most departments, however, require reading competence in at least one additional foreign language. No student will be permitted to register for a dissertation course until he has fulfilled the general foreign language requirement. This requirement can be fulfilled only by examination, given by approved representatives of the appropriate foreign language departments, at The University of Texas.

Most students will find their pursuit of graduate programs more profitable if they may meet the general foreign language requirement upon admission to the Graduate School. Students who cannot meet this requirement upon admission are counseled to consult with their Graduate Adviser and the appropriate foreign language department to plan at once the most effective means of meeting the requirement. Item II.

Change in the Catalogue of the Graduate School of The University of Texas, Number 6004, pages 52-53: (<u>Ed.D. Requirements</u>) <u>Examinations</u> in foreign languages.

#### Present Reading

A reading knowledge of two foreign languages, or a reading knowledge of one foreign language and a mastery of statistical techniques as applied to education.

The foreign languages are French and German unless the candidate's supervising committee, with the approval of the Dean, permits the substitution for either one of Spanish as a necessary tool for the candidate's research. Substitutions for both languages may not be made.

To test his knowledge of foreign languages, the candidate must pass examinations, preferably during the second year and in no case later than six months before coming up for the degree. The examinations will be given by the foreign language departments concerned and certified by the departmental chairmen to the Dean. The candidate is advised to consult with his supervising committee and with the language departments concerned in regard to the scope of these examinations. In general, the candidate will be expected to read in the required languages certain writings in his major field of study.

The substitution of statistical techniques for either language likewise requires the approval of the committee and the Dean. The examination for testing the knowledge of statistical techniques is administered by a committee appointed by the Dean. Where statistical techniques are substituted for one of the language requirements, courses in these techniques cannot be counted in a student's minor or minors.

#### Proposed Reading

The minimum general foreign language requirement for candidates for the Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) degree is the demonstration of competence in reading material in the student's major field of study in one foreign language. Selection of the foreign language, to meet the minimum requirement, is made by the Committee on Graduate Studies in Education. Only a language with a recognized scholarly literature in the student's major area will be acceptable. Reading competence in at least one additional foreign language may be required of students in certain areas. No student will be permitted to register for a dissertation course until he has fulfilled the general foreign language requirement. This requirement can be fulfilled only by examination, given by approved representatives of the appropriate foreign language department, at The University of Texas.

Most students will find their pursuit of graduate programs more profitable if they may meet the general foreign language requirement upon admission to the Graduate School. Students who cannot meet this requirement upon admission are counseled to consult with their Graduate Adviser and the appropriate foreign language department to plan at once the most effective means of meeting the requirement.

The matter of changes in the foreign language requirement for the Ph.D. degree has been under discussion for nearly five months, and had been considered in the Graduate Council before its initial submission to the Graduate Legislative Council on March 27, 1961. This legislation was approved at that time in the form here presented, and was distributed to the members of the Graduate Faculty on April 14, 1961 (Documents and Proceedings, pages 260-261). As part of this distribution of the Major Legislation, there was appended an <u>ADDENDUM</u>, proposing to spell out the names of certain departments (in the areas of the humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences) which would be exceptions to the general minimum foreign language requirement. The consideration, on April 24, 1961, of the <u>ADDENDUM</u>, which failed to receive approval, actually represented a review of this Major Legislation. The procedure of the Graduate Legislative Council permits a request for reconsideration of such legislation; such a request for reconsideration, signed by fifteen members of the Graduate Faculty in the areas of Hiskow, and Germanic Languages was received. This request resulted in calling the special mosting of the Graduate Legislative Council on May 15, 1961, for the sole purpose of permitting the request for reconsideration to be heard. It may be pertinent to note that thirty-four of the thirty-seven voting members of the Graduate Legislative Council were present at this meeting. The net result of the meeting was reaffirmation of the previous action by a vote of 22 to 9. The legislation, therefore, is now transmitted to you for further consideration.

#### MINOR CHANGES IN THE CATALOGUE STATEMENT OF THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS (M.A.) (IN PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION)

The Graduate Legislative Council has approved the following minor editing in the Graduate Catalogue as it affects the Degree of Master of Arts (in Public Administration). This legislation has been classified as minor legislation by Dr. Henze, Secretary of the Graduate Legislative Council.

#### Present Catalogue Statement

1. Title of Degree

The Degree of Master of Arts (M.A.) (in Public Administration)

#### 2. Prerequisites

A bachelor's degree from The University of Texas or an equivalent degree from an approved institution is required.

A copy of the official transcript of the applicant's previous record of work at The University of Texas or other institutions shall be submitted to the Director of the Institute of Public Affairs. Final approval of admission to the program will be made by the Executive Committee of the Institute of Public Affairs and will be based upon a consideration of the applicant's undergraduate program, scholarship, personality, and other qualities of leadership, health, age, fitness for an internship, and other relevant factors.

Proposed Catalogue Statement

1. Title of Degree

2. Prerequisites

Add the following:

Students who do not have credit for six semester hours in accounting and/or statistics or other supporting approved toolsubject disciplines will be required to complete six semester hours in these disciplines in addition to the degree requirements.

#### 3. General Recommendations

It is suggested that undergraduates planning to work for this degree acquire knowledge of the organization and operation of the American system of government and of economic and social institutions.

#### 4. Requirements

For the degree of Master of Arts in Public Administration, thirty semester hours of course work, an internship, and a thesis are required. The program shall include at least twenty-one semester hours of graduate work including the thesis. The maximum number of semester hours of courses of senior rank which may be included is nine, of which not more than six may be in either the major or minor.

Twelve semester hours in public administration, as follows: six hours of Theory and Practice of Public Administration; three hours of Personnel Administration; three hours of Financial Administration.

Three semester hours in an approved seminar dealing with issues of administrative policy.

Fifteen semester hours of approved electives chosen so as to equip the students for a special area of competence in public administration. At least six of these fifteen hours must be outside the Department of Government.

An approved internship in a government agency, or, in exceptional circumstances and with approval, equivalent work.

A thesis, usually regarded as six semester hours, which may be based on experience in the internship.

#### 5. Substitution

A student who holds a Bachelor of Arts degree, or an equivalent degree such as the Bachelor of Business Administration, may be allowed six semester hours of credit for a completed Bachelor of Laws degree in meeting the requirement of thirty semester hours of course work for this degree. 3. General Recommendations

No change.

#### 4. Requirements

For the degree of Master of Arts in Public Administration, thirty semester hours of instruction are required as follows:

(1) Six graduate semester hours in the theory and practice of public administration.

(2) Eighteen graduate semester hours of approved electives in government and cognate disciplines, so chosen as to equip the student for a special area of competence in public administration. At least six of these eighteen hours must be taken in departments other than Government.

(3) An approved internship in a government agency and a bound professional report, equivalent to six semester hours, based on experience in the internship and approved by a committee appointed by the Dean.

(4) In lieu of the internship and the bound professional report, a thesis valued at six semester hours.

#### 5. Substitution

A student who holds a Bachelor of Arts degree or equivalent and a Bachelor of Laws degree may be allowed credit for six semester hours of appropriate law courses taken for the Bachelor of Laws degree in meeting the requirement of eighteen hours of elective graduate courses for this degree.

End of Proposed Catalogue Statement

6. <u>Minor in Public Administration for a</u> Master's Degree

Students desiring to combine training in public administration with study toward a master's degree in another field may be admitted to the program of study in public administration. In addition to meeting area requirements for a master's degree, such students must secure approval of the Executive Committee as outlined under "Prerequisites" above, and plan a program of work which includes the following: six hours of Theory and Practice of Public Administration, an approved Seminar of three semester hours dealing with issues of administrative policy, and an approved elective of three semester hours of senior or graduate rank in public administration.

The Polar Ice Cream Company is awarded the bid on the basis of their bid to allow 16.5% discount on the total monthly bill for milk. The Carnation Company is awarded the contract for ice cream and ice cream products on the basis of their bid to allow an 18% discount on the total monthly bill for ice cream.

Permission to Award Contracts (continued)

We received no bids from the Austin Maid Ice Cream Company or Superior Dairies, Inc. Bids were received from Polar Ice Cream Company and Carnation Company, and these are the two concerns which have our contracts for the current fiscal year.

The unit prices bid by each company for the major products were the same. The benefit to the University is determined by the amount of discount allowed on the monthly bill. The bids were as follows:

Note: Discounts were on the total monthly bills.

A study of the individual unit prices has been made and where differences in unit prices exist we have determined the consumption of the products last year and have made computations to determine if the consumption figures at the unit prices quoted would change the overall bid awards. This study revealed that we should make awards to the companies submitting the greater discount on the monthly bill. The base unit prices are approximately the same as the base unit prices for the current fiscal year. We have been allowed by Polar Ice Cream Company for 1960-61 a 10.2% discount on milk and by Carnation Company for 1960-61 a 15.5% discount on ice cream. Therefore, we may anticipate a greater discount on the monthly bills during 1961-62 than we experienced in 1960-61 even though we will have the same suppliers. Both concerns have provided satisfactory service and have given a quality product.

2. For Laundry Service, Division of Housing and Food Service, 1961-62

We recommend that the Board of Regents approve the awarding of contracts for laundry service at the several Division of Housing and Food service units for the 1961-62 fiscal year as follows:

In Groups I and III we actually received two bids. In Groups II and IV and V, we received only one bid each for the service to these units. The price in Groups I and III is more favorable than the price paid during 1960-61. The price for Groups II and IV is the same as we paid 1960-61. The price for Group V is .2 of a cent higher than the price paid in 1960-61.

It should be pointed out that none of the laundries except Austin Laundry and Dry Cleaning Company have the capacity to do all of the University laundry work. In order to try to get competition we arrange for bids to be taken on individual groups or on a total basis. No laundry bid on all of the work. Capitol Laundry and Dry Cleaning Company offered us a bid for the first time and were successful on two of the Groups. The Driskill Laundry, who had been doing the work at Kinsolving, will receive no award for the 1961-62 year since Capitol Laundry and Dry Cleaning Company had a better price. Burtons Laundry and Dry Cleaners and San Jacinto Cleaners and Laundry were the only bidders on their respective groups and the prices they bid are the same as they held the contract during 1960-61.

I recommend that the award be made as indicated. I think the prices are reasonable and fair and substantially below the retail rate for finished flat work. A copy of the tabulation of bids is set out below, and it is my recommendation that the material contained in this memorandum plus the tabulation of bids be included in your next Regents' docket for approval at the July 22 meeting of the Board. I further request that I be authorized to sign the contracts as recommended.

3. For Laundry and Dry Cleaning - Kinsolving Dormitory, 1961-62

During the fiscal years 1958-59, 1959-60 and 1960-61 Austin Laundry and Dry Cleaning Company, Inc., Burtons' Laundry and Cleaners and Kelly Smith Cleaners, Inc., provided laundry and dry cleaning services to the occupants of Kinsolving Dormitory. The contract for these services was based on the award of contract to the lowest bidder in 1958-59 and has been renewed for the past two fiscal years. A payment of \$25.00 per month by the cleaners is made to the University.

We request permission to renew this contract for the fiscal year 1961-62 subject to the same conditions and requirements as in previous years.

### 4. Air Force ROTC Uniforms Contract, 1961-62

1-520

Sol Frank Company of San Antonio submitted the lowest acceptable bid for our Air Force R. O. T. C. uniforms contract for the 1956-57 year under the Air Force commutation of uniforms program. The contract was satisfactorily performed and was extended for the 1957-58, 1958-59, 1959-60 and 1960-61 years.

Mr. Dustin and Colonel Porter have recommended that consideration be given to extending the present contract with Sol Frank Company for the academic 1961-62 year. This recommendation is made on the basis that the present uniform contract has been very satisfactory in all respects, and I concur in the recommendation made by Mr. Dustin and Colonel Porter. The same conditions, specifications, and considerations would be in effect. We have contacted Sol Frank Company, and they have assured us of their interest in continuing the contract. FACULTY LEGISLATION: I recommend approval of the following legislation passed by the Faculty Council and/or General Faculty:

1. On June 12, 1961, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the College of Fine Arts to make a catalogue change in the Department of Music (D&P 2929) to add Music 225L to Curriculum and Music Education which had been inadvertently omitted from catalogue material.

2. On June 12, 1961, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the College of Business Administration to change the name of the Department of Business Services to the Department of General Business (D&P 2930) since the new title will be somewhat more descriptive of the work of the department and will be more in line with department titles at other leading colleges of Business Administration.

3. On June 12, 1961, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the College of Arts and Sciences regarding a catalogue change in the Department of Military Science (D&P 2931) permitting the substitution of one of several specified three semester hour courses for three semester hours of Military Science instruction previously provided. The value of certain courses in the Military Science curriculum has been changed so that the Military Science courses now taken by students seeking a commission total 21 semester hours. One of the academic courses listed is to be elected to complete 24 semester hours of instruction in the Army ROTC program required for commissioning.

4. On May 3, 1961, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the College of Business Administration regarding changes in its catalogue (D&P 2906-08), eliminating certain degree programs and changing certain required courses, all in line with the desires of the administration and the directives of the Commission on Higher Education for the College to strengthen its undergraduate degree structure and to give the student increased flexibility in his choice of courses.

5. On May 3, 1961, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Education regarding proposed changes in degree programs for 1961-63 (D&P 2911-17). These changes do not increase the number of hours required for a degree but rather reallocate hours already in the programs. They do essentially two things: (1) Strengthen the subject matter preparation of teachers, particularly in the majors and minors; seven of the changes are directed toward stronger major and minor preparation; four of the changes increase the number of subject matter electives. (2) Make specific some of the hours already required in education, that is, five of the changes specify courses must be in secondary education in accordance with new state regulations.

6. On May 26, 1961, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences regarding changes in degree requirements (D&P 2919-26), (1) making changes in required courses for minors in Bacteriology, and in majors and minors in Geology for the B. A. Degree, Plan I, thus strengthening the student's program in these areas; (2) revising Plan II so that students whose work is below standard in the freshman and sophomore years will be dropped from Plan II curriculum, and those students who continue in Plan II will be required to follow the departmental honors programs where such have been established; (3) discontinuing the giving of a B. A. Degree on completion of one year in medical school, the medical schools feeling that it is desirable for the applicant to have completed his B. A. Degree before entering medical school; (4) for the B. A. Degree in Geology, adding the second semester of calculus to the mathematics requirement and strengthening the elective program without increasing the number of hours required; and (5) specifying the Writing for Science Majors course as part of the English requirement for the B. S. Degree in Medical Technology, giving wider selection of zoology and physics courses, and making other minor changes concerning application for the senior year of training.

#### TRAVEL

I recommend approval of travel requests for the following, with expenses paid from accounts not specifically providing for travel:

1. Dr. Walter Donald Roberts, Physician, Specialist (Internal Medicine), May 7-14, 1961, to Miami, Florida, to attend the annual meeting of the American College of Physicians, expenses to be paid from funds of the Outpatient Division.

2. Mr. Harold John Plass, Jr., Associate Professor of Engineering Mechanics, April 23-29, 1961, to Chicago, and Urbana, Illinois, Lafayette, Indiana, and Ann Arbor, Michigan, to visit the Illinois Institute of Technology, Northwestern University, University of Illinois, Purdue University, and the University of Michigan for the purpose of meeting with graduate students in Engineering Mechanics and related fields to find possible qualified members of the Engineering Mechanics faculty, expenses to be paid from the Maintenance and Equipment account of the department.

#### SALE OF UNIVERSITY EQUIPMENT

1. Mr. Graves W. Landrum, Business Manager, recommends the sale of several pieces of equipment located at the Balcones Research Center for which it is expected an amount in excess of \$1,000 will be received. The items represent a part of the old Magnesium Plant equipment which was turned over to us originally under our contract with the Federal Government. Advance approvals have been received from the Federal Government through the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare for the sale of this equipment. Since the equipment serves no useful purpose to the University, I recommend that the Purchasing Agent secure bids on the basis of sealed proposals with the awards to be made to the highest bidder upon recommendation of Professor J. Neils Thompson, Director, Balcones Research Center, Mr. Carl J. Eckhardt, Director of Physical Plant, Mrs. M. K. Doss, Purchasing Agent, and Mr. G. W. Landrum, Business Manager.

2. With the concurrence of Business Manager G. W. Landrum, I recommend approval of the request of Dean J. R. D. Eddy that the Division of Extension be permitted to sell the following five vehicles in order that the sale prices can apply on the purchase of new vehicles.

Two 1955 Chevrolet Carryalls Two 1957 Chevrolets (one-half ton) One 1955 Ford Station Wagon

The University will advertise for bids which are expected to be within the national average value. The 1955 Carryalls will range from \$325 to \$485, the 1957 Chevrolets from \$905 to \$1,095, and the Ford from \$370 to \$525. The proceeds of the sale will be deposited to the Little Campus Motor Pool Revolving Fund.

PURCHASE FROM A STAFF MEMBER: In accord with Chapter IV, Section 10, Part Two of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents, it is recommended that permission be given to purchase one Beltone Audiometer for the testing of hearing from Dr. Joe A. Bailey, Instructor in Speech, for \$22.50. The price of a new instrument would be \$350, and a used one in good condition would be \$175. Dr. Bailey found this one in a pawn shop when he was on a trip, and since he is Chairman of the Departmental Equipment Committee of the Department of Speech and knew that an audiometer of this type was needed, he purchased it out of his own funds. The department now wishes to purchase it for departmental use -- its intended purpose -- out of the Maintenance and Equipment account of the Department of Speech. USE OF TEXTBOOKS WRITTEN BY FACULTY MEMBERS: I recommend that approval be given for the use during the 1961-62 Long Session of the following textbooks M-174 written by members of the faculty:

Vector and Tensor Analysis, written by H. V. Craig, Professor of 1. Mathematics, published by McGraw-Hill Book Company, which sells for \$7.50. with a royalty of approximately 12% to author.

2. The Mathematics of Investment, written by R. C. Osborn, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, published by Harper and Brother, which sells for \$4.25, with a royalty of  $12\frac{1}{2}\%$  to the author.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT: I recommend that the staff members listed be permitted to undertake the outside duties outlined, the work to be arranged so as not to interfere with University assignments, and otherwise to conform with the Regents' Rules and Regulations on outside employment:

In a part from 1. Mr. Walter Lehn, Associate Professor of Germanic Languages, to serve as professional consultant to the Office of the State of Utah Supervisor of Modern Foreign Language Education in connection with its offering of Arabic to students in certain selected high schools in Utah.

2. Mr. James J. Kelly, Social Science Research Associate, Bureau of Business Research, to assume the editorship of the Lone Star Catholic, an eight-page weekly Diocesan newspaper.

E. D. FARMER INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND: At the June 1959 meeting of the Board of Regents approval was given to a revision of the rules governing the E. D. Farmer International Scholarship Fund. The E. D. Farmer Scholarship  $\sqrt{2}$ Committee now proposes the following changes in this revision, in which I concur and so recommend for your approval. The Committee states that the net effect of these changes is to remove any limitation as to birthplace of the parents of applicants and to emphasize graduate study, and that the changes will benefit the University without in any way vitiating the original intention of the donor.

Paragraph 2 of Section III, 2, "Qualifications of Applicants":

#### Present Version

Applicants from the Republic of Mexico must have been born in Mexico of parents also born in that Republic, and who have not resided in the United States of America for more than one year after their twelfth birthday. They must have completed satisfactorily the Preparatoria, or equivalent unit, in Mexico and must be able to meet the admission requirements of the particular college or school of The University of Texas to which admission is sought.

#### Proposed Version

Applicants from the Republic of Mexico must have been born in Mexico. They must have completed satisfactorily the Preparatoria, or equivalent unit, in Mexico and must be able to meet the admission requirements of the particular college or school of The University of Texas to which admission is sought. Preference will be given to applicants who have graduated from a Mexican university.

## E. D. Farmer International Scholarship Fund (continued)

Paragraph 3 of Section III, 2, "Qualifications of Applicants":

#### Present Version

Applicants from the State of Texas must have been born in Texas of parents born in the United States of America, and who have not resided in the Republic of Mexico for more than one year after their twelfth birthday. They must have completed satisfactorily at least two years of study in a reputable college or university, at least one year of which was at The University of Texas, and they must be able to satisfy the admission requirements of the particular unit of the National University of Mexico to which admission is desired.

#### Proposed Version

Applicants from the State of Texas must have been born in Texas. They must have completed satisfactorily at least two years of study in a reputable college or university, at least one year of which was at The University of Texas, and they must be able to satisfy the admission requirements of the particular unit of the Mexican university to which admission is desired. Preference will be given to students who have graduated from The University of Texas.

Adequate funds were not included in the original budget for the employers matching share payable to the Social Security Administration. #### Section 2:

2.01 - DATE, NUMBERS, DENOMINATION, AND MATURITIES: That said bonds shall be dated July 1, 1961, shall be numbered consecutively from 1 to 6000, both inclusive, shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 each, aggregating \$6,000,000, and shall become due and payable serially in their numerical order on July 1st in each of the years 1962 to 1981, both inclusive, in the respective amounts shown in the following schedule, to-wit:

THE BOARD OF REGENTS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO ISSUE OTHER ADDI-TIONAL PARITY BONDS AND NOTES which shall be equally and ratably payable from the same source and secured in the same manner as the Series 1958 Bonds, the Series 1959 Bonds, the Series 1960 Bonds, and the bonds of this issue, but such Additional Parity Bonds and Notes may be issued only pursuant to and subject to the terms and conditions provided and contained in the Resolution.

#### Section 7:

<u>DEFINITIONS</u>: That, as used in this resolution, the following words, terms, and expressions shall mean and include, and are defined, as follows:

(a) <u>Permanent University Fund</u>, or <u>Fund</u>: the Permanent University Fund as created by Article VII, Section 11, Constitution of Texas, further implemented by the provisions of Title 49, Chapter 1, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

(b) University: The University of Texas.

(c) <u>Board of Regents</u>, or <u>Board</u>: the Board of Regents of The University of Texas.

(d) <u>Interest of the University</u> in the income from the Permanent University Fund: all of the income to the Permanent University Fund from grazing leases on University lands, and all of the other income from such Fund, after making provision for the payment of the University's proportion of the expense of administering such Fund, excepting one-third of the income arising and accruing to the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas from the 1,000,000 acres of land appropriated by the Constitution of 1876 and the land appropriated by the Act of 1883, as more particularly defined by Chapter 42, Acts of the 42nd Legislature of Texas, Regular Session, 1931 (Article 2592, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes).

(e) <u>Bonds</u>: the \$6,000,000 Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1961, dated July 1, 1961, authorized by this resolution.

(f) <u>Resolution</u>: this resolution authorizing the issuance of the Bonds.

(g) <u>1958 Bond Resolution</u>: the resolution adopted by the Board of Regents on the 23rd day of July, 1958, authorizing the issuance of the \$5,076,000 Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Refunding Bonds, Series 1958, dated July 1, 1958.

(h) <u>1959 Bond Resolution</u>: the resolution adopted by the Bcard of Regents on the 9th day of July, 1959, authorizing the issuance of the \$4,000,000 Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University

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Fund Bonds, Series 1959, dated July 1, 1959.

(i) <u>1960 Bond Pesolution</u>: the resolution adopted by the Board of Regents on the 13th day of July, 1960, authorizing the issuance of the \$6,000,000 Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Bonds, Series 1960, dated July 1, 1960.

(j) <u>Outstanding Bonds</u>: the outstanding bonds of the \$5,076,000 Series 1958 Bonds, \$4,000,000 Series 1959 Bonds, and \$5,000,000 Series 1960 Bonds, referred to above.

(k) Additional Parity Bonds and Notes: the additional parity bonds and the additional parity notes permitted to be issued pursuant to Section 17 of the 1958 Bond Resolution, which Section 17 is referred to in the 1959 Bond Resolution, the Series 1950 Bond Resolution, and this Resolution.

(1) <u>Interest and Sinking Fund</u>: the "Board of Regents of The University of Texas Permanent University Fund Interest and Sinking Fund" established by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas in the State Treasury under the provisions of the 1958 Bond Resolution, which Fund is referred to in the 1959 Bond Resolution, the Series 1960 Bond Resolution, and this Resolution.

#### Section 8:

<u>8.01</u> - BONDS AND OUTSTANDING BONDS ON A PARITY: That it is hereby certified and recited that the Bonds authorized by this Resolution are Additional Parity Bonds permitted and authorized to be issued by Section 17 of the 1958 Bond Resolution, and that all conditions and requirements of said Section 17 have been or will be met prior to the delivery of the Bonds herein authorized. The Outstanding Bonds and the Bonds herein authorized, and the interest on all of same, are and shall be on a parity and in all respects of equal dignity.

8.02 - BONDS SECURED BY FIRST LIEN: That, pursuant to the authority conferred upon the Board of Regents by the provisions of Section 18 of Article VII, Constitution of Texas, approved by vote of the people of Texas at the election held August 23, 1947, and pursuant to the provisions of the amendment to said Section 18 of Article VII approved by vote of the people of Texas at the election held November 6, 1956, and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 255, Acts of the 55th Legislature of Texas, Regular Session,

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1957, the Outstanding Bonds together with the Bonds authorized by this Resolution and all other Additional Parity Bonds and Notes, when issued pursuant to the provisions of Section 17 of the 1958 Bond Resolution, and the interest on all of same, shall be and are hereby equally and ratably secured by and payable from a first lien on and pledge of the Interest of the University in the income from the Permanent University Fund as such Interest is defined in Section 7(d) of this Resolution.

#### Section 9:

<u>9.01</u> - <u>ADDITIONAL PAYMENTS INTO INTEREST AND SINKING FUND</u>: That, in addition to the moneys required to be transferred to the credit of the Interest and Sinking Fund in connection with the Outstanding Bonds under the provisions of the Series 1958 Bond Resolution, the Series 1959 Bond Resolution, and the Series 1960 Bond Resolution, the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall, for the benefit of the Bonds herein authorized, transfer to the Interest and Sinking Fund out of The University of Texas Available University Fund (the fund in the State Treasury to which is deposited the Interest of the University), on or before November 1, 1961, and semi-annually thereafter on or before May 1st and November 1st of each year while the Bonds or interest thereon are outstanding and unpaid, a sum of money equal to the amount of interest or principal and interest (when both are scheduled to accrue and mature) which will become due on the Bonds on the January 1st or July 1st next following. 9.02 - AVAILABILITY OF MONEYS AT PLACES OF PAYMENT:

(a) That, to the end that moneys will be available at the places of payment in ample time to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds as such principal and interest respectively mature, on or before November 5, 1961, and semi-annually thereafter on or before May 5th and November 5th of each year while any of the Bonds or interest thereon are outstanding and unpaid, the Comptroller of the University, or such officer as may hereafter be designated by the Board of Regents to perform the duties now vested in such officer shall perform the following duties: (1) prepare and file with the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas a voucher based on which said Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall draw a warrant against the Interest and Sinking Fund in the

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amount of the interest or principal and interest (when both are scheduled to accrue and mature) which will become due on January 1st or July 1st next following; and (2) in the event Bonds shall have been called for redemption on January 1st or July 1st next following of any year, prepare and file with said Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas a voucher based on which said Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall draw a warrant against funds of the University legally available for such purpose in an amount sufficient to redeem the Bonds thus called.

(b) That, whenever a voucher is so filed with the Comptroller of Fublic Accounts of the State of Texas, he shall make the warrant based thereon payable to the order of that place of payment situated in the State of Texas, specified in Section 3.02 of this Resolution, and shall deliver such warrant to said place of payment on or before the November 15th or May 15th next following.

(c) That the place of payment situated in the State of Texas, designated in Section 3.02 of this Resolution, shall, out of moneys remitted to it under the provisions of this Section 9.02, and not otherwise, make available at the other places of payment specified in said Section 3.02, funds sufficient to pay such Bonds (whether payable to bearer or payable to the registered holder thereof) and such of the interest coupons as are presented for payment at such places of payment, and said place of payment situated in the State of Texas by accepting designation as such place of payment agrees and is obligated to perform such service.

<u>9.03</u> - <u>CANCELLATION AND FORWARDING OF EONDS AND COUPONS UPON PAYMENT</u>: That all Bonds and interest coupons paid by the places of payment, after cancellation by perforation, shall be forwarded by such places of payment to the University at Austin, Texas.

<u>9.04</u> - <u>PAYMENT OF CHARGES OF PAYING AGENTS</u>: That the Board of Regents shall make provision with the places of payment designated as paying agents for the rendition of a statement to the University for any sums due such paying agents for services rendered in connection with the payment of the Bonds and interest coupons by said paying agents, and the amount of

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such charges shall be paid by the University from funds available for such purpose. Section 10:

ADOPTION OF PROVISIONS OF SERIES 1958 BOND RESOLUTION: That all of the language, terms, provisions, covenants and agreements of Sections 15 to 19, both inclusive, of the 1958 Bond Resolution be and are hereby referred to and adopted and made applicable to the Bonds authorized by this Resolution for all purposes; and, without in any way limiting the foregoing, it is expressly provided that the Board of Regents reserves the right and power to issue and deliver Additional Parity Bonds and/or Additional Parity Notes pursuant to the provisions of Section 17 of said Series 1958 Bond Resolution, to which Section 17 reference is hereby made for full particulers.

#### Section 11:

<u>APPROVAL AND REGISTRATION OF BONDS</u>: That it shall be the duty of the Chairman of the Board of Regents or some officer of the Board acting under authority from him to submit the record of the Bonds, and, after the Bonds shall have been executed, to submit the Bonds to the Attorney General of the State of Texas for examination and approval.
