 Amendment to contract dated August 15, 1963, between the Ex-Students' Association and the Austin Coca-Cola Bottling Company, Centrex Dr. Pepper Bottling Company, and Sandahl Bottling Company, providing that the bottlers will operate vending machines which will dispense beverages in 12 ounce cans for 15¢, the commission to the Association to be 75¢ per case. Heretofore these drinks have been dispensed only in bottles.

2. Amendment to the contract dated August 15, 1963, between the Ex-Students' Association and the Neelley Vending Company which increases costs on the following items to amount indicated: cigarettes, 50¢; gum and mints, 10¢; candy, 10¢ and 15¢; ice cream 15¢; sandwiches, 35¢, 40¢, and 45¢; pastrys - fried pies, 15¢; and hot canned foods, 25¢, 35¢, and 40¢. The commission percentage remains the same on all items except cigarettes, on which the commission will be increased from 5-3/4¢ to 7-3/4¢.

SIDNEY E. MEZES FUND: The Chairman of the Sidney E. Mezes Faculty Donation Committee has submitted the following report to members of the Committee: "As of September 1, 1969, the expendible balance in the account was \$4,035.58 and the endowment balance was \$20,000. On July 1, 1970, the expendible balance was \$3,777.38. Naturally, the endowment balance had not changed.

- "During the year 1969 to date, \$1,141.80 has been added by reason of interest accumulation, and \$1,400 was awarded to four members of the faculty. Actually, six awards were made but two awardees died before receiving checks. Survivors of the two saw fit to return the grant checks.
- "On the basis of information from the University Accounting Office, another interest addition will be made to the expendible fund before the end of this fiscal year, August 31, 1970. Such an addition should bring the balance to approximately the same amount as at September 1, 1969.
- "Inasmuch as the expendible fund has been retained at about \$4,000 for several years and is not drawing interest, and since the \$20,000 endowment figure is being eroded by price inflation, how would you feel about requesting transfer of say \$2,000 to the endowment balance? Naturally such action would require approval from the University's legal staff. Please express your opinion in the space below, including whether we should have a meeting to discuss the subject further. "

In his letter to the President, the Chairman indicated that five members voted in favor of the transfer and that no unfavorable ballots were received. The Legal Office has advised that the trust agreement provides that if it becomes inadvisable to use the income from the fund for the purposes set out in the instrument, the income may be used to purchase books or other materials for the library, or for other purposes in the discretion of the Regents.

At this time I recommend that the Committee's recommendation be followed by returning \$2,000 to the endowment principal.

<u>PHARMACY SCHOLARSHIP - DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, EDUCATION AND</u> <u>WELFARE:</u> The College of Pharmacy has been awarded a Health Professions Scholarship by HEW for the period July 1, 1970 - June 30, 1971, in the total amount of \$66,000. Loans to be made from this award are to be at the rate of 3%.

ESTABLISHMENT OF DAVID ALAN BENFIELD MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP IN ASTRONOMY: Mr. A. E. Benfield of Carlisle, Massachusetts, has given securities in an approximate amount of \$26,000,the income from which is to be used for scholarships for graduate students in the Department of Astronomy in memory of his son David Alan Benfield. The recipients are to be selected by vote of the faculty of the Astronomy Department, but no award in any year is to be divided between more than two graduate students.

David Alan Benfield received a BA from Harvard and entered The University of Texas at Austin in February 1967, seeking a doctoral degree in Astronomy. He had completed his course work and at the time of his death had only his doctoral dissertation to finish. He died March 23, 1970, at age of 25, as a result of falling about 70 feet while climbing a mountain in Big Bend National Park. He was an excellent climber and recently had scaled some mountains in Mexico. The trip to the Big Bend was with the newly formed Texas Outing Club.

<u>FACULTY LEGISLATION:</u> The following legislation has been passed by the University Council and/or General Faculty. I recommend approval.

]. The University Council on July 24, 1970, approved by the circularization procedure the catalogue changes in the College of Business Administration (D&P4678-79). The changes pertain to requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration, and in the area of Finance, the legislation renames some of the courses in the fifteen semester hours listings and does not specify any courses in the six semester hour section of advanced electives. The reason given is that the "changes are calculated to reflect more accurately new content of courses and to give students a wider choice in advanced business electives." In the Insurance area there are changes in the names of the courses to reflect more accurately the course content. In the Actuarial Science area changes in courses are made to provide needed new course material and to change the material formerly provided by two mathematics courses in probability and statistics which were required for actuarial majors but which are no longer offered by the Mathematics Department; to emphasize computer applications; and to renumber some courses in actuarial science to indicate a better sequential order.

<u>GRADUATE FACULTY MEMBERSHIP</u>: In accordance with the criteria set forth in the <u>Regents' Rules and Regulations</u>, Dean Whaley has recommended that the following faculty members, all of whom have been nominated by their graduate studies committees, be approved as Members of the Graduate Faculty. ### BUSINESS CONTRACT ITEMS

I recommend approval of the following proposed contracts:

1. Contract with Tri-State Broadcasting Company, Inc., 801 North Oregon, El Paso, Texas, for the exclusive AM radio broadcasting rights for the home football games for the 1970 season for the sum of \$3,120.00 and for the exclusive AM radio broadcasting rights for the home basketball games for the 1970-71 season for the sum of \$4,650.00. Invitations to bid and specifications were sent to five radio stations. Two bids were received with Tri-State Broadcasting Company, Inc. submitting the high bids for AM broadcasting.

2. Contract with KIZZ Radio Productions, P. O. Box 10035, El Paso, Texas, for the exclusive FM radio broadcasting rights for the home football games for the 1970 season for the sum of \$1,828.00 and for the exclusive FM radio broadcasting rights for the home basketball games for the 1970-71 season for the sum of \$2,587.00. Invitations to bid and specifications were sent to three radio stations with FM facilities with the high bids received from KIZZ Radio Productions.

3. Contract with Western Container Company, Inc., 7241 Stiles, El Paso, Texas, for the collection and disposal of trash, rubbish, garbage, and general debris from the campus for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1970, for 90¢ per cubic yard. Invitations to bid and specifications were sent to the only two companies in El Paso in this business with Western Container Company, Inc. submitting the low bid. The funds for this contract will come from the Physical Plant (General Services), The Union, and the Housing System budgets for 1970-71.

4. Contract with Alpha Graphics, 1021 East 6th Street, Tucson, Arizona to operate a manned copying center in The University of Texas at El Paso Library for the twoyear period ending August 31, 1972. The center will be operated primarily for the convenience of students and faculty and they will be charged 5¢ per copy for the first year and 4¢ per copy for the second year. Other services to be offered include reduction work, binding, transparencies, etc. to be charged for at rates set out in the contract. A service bar will be provided by Alpha Graphics with collating, cutting, punching, and stapling to be done free of charge. Alpha Graphics will provide the University Library 10,000 copies per month for the first year and 12,000 copies per month for the second year at no charge. The contract provides for the extension of the contract for two years by mutual consent of both parties and for termination by either party upon thirty days' written notice to the other party.

# ASSIGNMENT OF VENDING MACHINE CONTRACT

I recommend approval of the following proposed assignment:

Assignment of contract with El Paso Automatic Vending, Inc., 1050 Eastside Road, El Paso, Texas, for vending food items and hot drinks on the U. T. El Paso campus for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971, to Western Vending Company, 4004 Kemp Avenue, El Paso, Texas effective August 1, 1970. The contract provides that assignment of the rights and privileges granted to the concessionaire may be made after obtaining written consent of the University to such assignment. The reason for the requested assignment is that Mr. John F. Ogden, President of El Paso Automatic Vending, Inc., recently suffered a heart attack and has been advised by his doctor to retire from business. Western Vending Company operates cigarette and post-mix cup vending machines at U. T. El Paso under another contract.

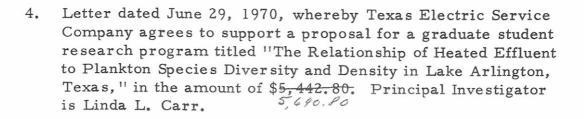

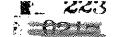

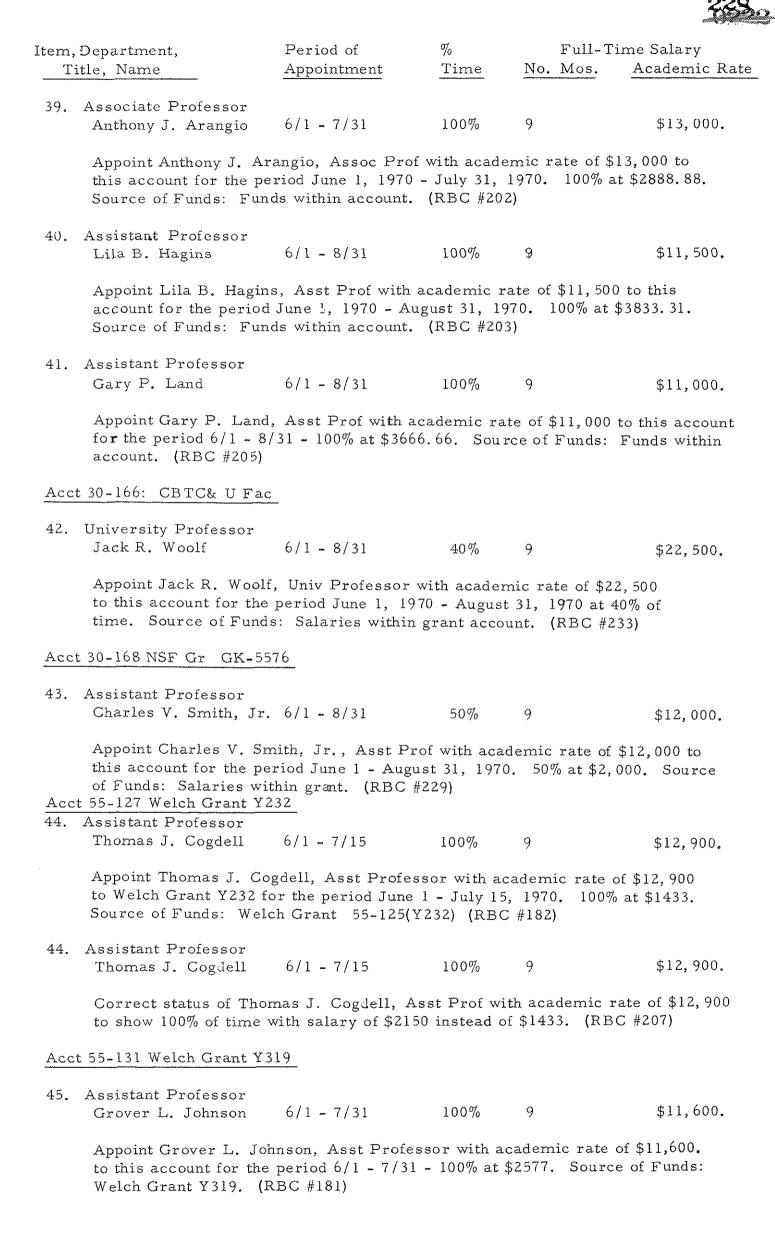

RESEARCH AND OTHER ACADEMIC CONTRACTS: The following contracts, grants and amendments have been signed by the appropriate official upon the recommendation of the respective technical directors, fiscal officers, and the Director of Research Support.

Expenditures from these contracts and grants will be made in accordance with regular University operating procedures and contractual limitations. Personnel appointments and changes will be in accordance with University salary rates and approvals. Travel and purchasing conform to established procedures.

 Grant GA-18767 by which the National Science Foundation awards \$123,000 for research effective July 15, 1970 for approximately two years. This research on "Grille Spectrometer Measurements of Night Sky Emissions" is under the director of Dr. Brian A. Tinsley, Assistant Professor, Division of Atmospheric and Space Sciences.

2. Grant 7 R01 GM18221-01 by which the National Institute of General Medical Sciences, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, provides \$8,825 for research on "Mitotic Cycle in Physarum Polycephalum" to be directed by Dr. Edmund W. Guttes, Associate Professor, Division of Biology, during the period May 1, 1970 through April 30, 1971.

3. Modification No. 5 to Contract NAS2-4674 by which the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Ames Research Center, provides \$37,000 bringing the total estimated cost and funding to \$244,000. 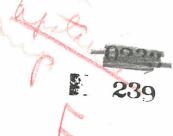

# Vacation Schedule

Two additional State Legal Holidays not observed by the University will be added to the statutory allowance to provide a total of twelve (12) working days annual leave for 1970-71, which has been the practice for a number of years.

In accordance with the Appropriation Bill, annual employees with fifteen or more years of employment with the State are entitled to an additional five (5) days of vacation, making a total of seventeen (17) working days annual leave, and those with twenty or more years of employment with the State are entitled to an additional ten (10) days, making a total of twenty-two (22) working days annual leave.

### GENERAL INFORMATION

### HISTORY

Under the leadership of Dr. Edward H. Cary, a group of prominent citizens of Dallas organized Southwestern Medical Foundation in 1939 to promote medical education and research in Dallas and the entire Southwest. After an initial period of furthering the purpose of the Foundation, Southwestern Medical College was formally established in 1943 by Southwestern Medical Foundation as the 68th medical school in the United States.

The citizens of Dallas and the Southwest subscribed funds for operating expenses, land for a building site, and a permanent building. When a new state medical school was proposed the leaders of the Foundation envisioned the possibilities of a still greater medical center for Texas and offered the equipment of the College, its library, and certain restricted funds to The University of Texas, provided the University would locate a medical branch in Dallas. After approval of the establishment of a new medical branch of The University of Texas by the Texas Legislature, the Board of Regents, upon the recommendation of the House of Delegates of the Texas Medical Association, accepted this offer of the Foundation. Thus, the College, in full operation, became Southwestern Medical School of The University of Texas in September, 1949; its policies guided by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas. In 1954 the name of the institution was changed to The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, and 1966 to The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas. The campus site on Harry Hines Boulevard was occupied in 1955. Southwestern Medical Foundation, working in cooperation with the Board of Regents of The University of Texas, plans to continue to promote medical and health education at all levels and research and the development of Southwestern Medical Center.

In April of 1968 the Coordinating Board for the Texas College and University System, The Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, and the office of the Chancellor, The University of Texas System, authorized Dr. Charles C. Sprague, Dean, The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas to procede with the planning to establish the School of Allied Health Professions at Dallas. A committee was formed to select a dean and to develop the school, and Dr. Richard D. Burk, Chairman of the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, was appointed as Dean in February 1969. During 1969 the School of Allied Health Professions was organized as a budgeted unit of The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas.

A planning year budget was submitted and approved by the Chancellor's office with a legislative appropriation provided for the fiscal year 1969-1970. In August 1969 Dr. Harry J. Parker was appointed Associate Dean to develop curriculum and institutional liaisons.

Initial physical facilities for offices and classrooms were secured at Methodist Hospital of Dallas, an affiliate teaching hospital of the Medical School. The School of Allied Health Professions and The University owe a great debt of gratitude to Methodist Administrative Officers for making available these office and classroom facilities. Plans for permanent facilities adjoining the Medical School are being developed.

Baylor University Medical Center has been a substantial contributor to the initiation of the School of Allied Health Professions in terms of support, faculty and counsel for the Physical Therapy program. Without this support, the Physical Therapy program would have been delayed in its development and initiation. Parkland Hospital similarly has provided considerable assistance for the curriculum in Nutrition and Dietetics and the curriculum in Medical Technology.

The fall of 1969 six curricula (Dietetic Internship, Medical Records Administration, Physical Therapy, Medical Technology, Rehabilitation Science, and Health Sciences Instructional Media Technology) were submitted to the Board of Regents and approved on October 31, 1969. These curricula were then transmitted to the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, which approved the school's organization, curricula, certificates and degrees involved on March 13, 1970.

In September 1970, programs in Physical Therapy, Medical Technology, Rehabilitation Science and Dietetic Internship were the first programs to be implemented.

### FACILITIES

### Buildings

Administrative and business offices and classrooms, student laboratories, faculty offices and research facilities are provided in modern educational buildings adjacent to Methodist Hospital and The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas.



### Library

The Medical Library, organized in 1943, now contains approximately 95,000 volumes and receives currently over 1,600 domestic and foreign serial publications.

Gifts and books and journals from private libraries served as the nucleus around which the Library has grown to its present size. Through the mediums of purchase, gifts, and exchange, efforts are being made to acquire a well-rounded collection of books and to complete files of journals recognized as indispensable to medical research. Among many contributions special funds have been provided by the Grigsby Estate, the Laurence S. Kahn Memorial Fund, the Mrs. Ruth Anderson Fund, the Baylor Medical Alumni Library Association, and Friends of the Medical Library.

In 1949 the New York Academy of Medicine donated to Southwestern Medical School 12,000 volumes - the larger portion of a gift of 20,000 volumes received by the New York Academy of Medicine from the New York Public Library. They represent the original collection of medical books accumulated by the New York Public Library during the nineteenth century when Dr. John Shaw Billings, earlier noted for his association with the Army Medical Library, was connected with the New York institution.

The Medical Library is located on the ground floor of the Basic Science Building. Library service is available from 7:45 A.M. to 10:00 P.M. Monday through Friday; from 7:45 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. on Saturday; and from 1:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M. on Sunday. Class instruction in using the Library is given to students, and individual instruction is given as needed to individuals using the Library.

### STUDENT HEALTH AND HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN

All students are required to present a statement from their physician indicating the condition of health prior to admission.

All students are required to have Group Health Insurance which can be obtained during the registration period of the first enrollment in the School of Allied Health Professions.

All information regarding costs, benefits, and requirements can be obtained through the Dean's Office.

### HOSPITALIZATION AND OUT-PATIENT CARE

Out-patient services are being planned to be available through the Methodist Hospital Health Service Clinic.

Information regarding out-patient clinic hours, location, and costs can be obtained from the Dean's Office.

Attention is called to the fact that a student is free to select his own physician for out-patient health care. The University accepts no responsibility either financial or professional for out-patient care secured by the individual. The School of Allied Health Professions is advantageously situated in that it has the generous cooperation of the many hospital facilities of the city and vicinity. Among these, the following facilities are utilized in the teaching program of the School.

Parkland Memorial Hospital is located on a site immediately adjacent to the Medical School campus and is the principal teaching hospital of The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas. It was occupied in the Fall of 1954 and currently has a capacity of 622 beds and 88 bassinets. A \$23,000,000 expansion program is now underway that will increase Parkland's capacity to 855 beds and 91 bassinets. Construction is planned for completion in late 1974. In addition to the inpatient facilities, an active emergency service is operated with approximately 140,000 emergencies yearly.

The Parkland Memorial Outpatient Department is located in the south wing of Parkland Memorial Hospital. This is a unit which was added in 1957-58 at a cost of over one million dollars and now averages 226,000 patient visits annually. An additional floor was completed during 1967, enlarging the clinic by approximately 20 per cent. All patients are available for teaching purposes.

All clinical specialty services are represented in the Outpatient Clinic along with the Social Service Department and certain laboratory services.

Woodlawn Hospital has a capacity of 143 beds. These are divided with 75 beds in the Chest Division, 36 in the Psychiatric Division, and 60 in the Extended Care Unit. This, together with the services furnished at Parkland Memorial Hospital, makes the Dallas County Hospital District a general hospital with the broadest possible scope.

Baylor University Medical Center is a modern, well-equipped general hospital with a present capacity of 800 beds. A \$10,000,000 development program is now underway which will increase Baylor's capacity to 1,000 beds. A 12-bed coronary care unit and three new intensive care units were opened recently, and a psychiatric unit and extended care facilities also are planned for the near future. The outpatient department, with approximately 17,500 visits per year, offers scheduled clinics in physical medicine, internal medicine, general surgery, obstetrics, gynecology, orthopedics, proctology, thoracic surgery, radiology, tumor, dermatology, urology, and oral surgery.

Methodist Hospital of Dallas, with 536 beds and 56 bassinets has recently completed a new 120 bed wing with a Coronary Care Unit and an Intensive Care Unit. The general acute hospital is owned and operated by the North Texas Conference of the Methodist Church. A 144 bed branch hospital also is in final planning stages. This general hospital will be located eight miles southwest of the main hospital facility at Loop 12 and Polk. Methodist operates an out-patient clinic five days a week with an average of more than 15,000 visits per year. About 1,200 clinic patients are hospitalized per year. Special services include dental, pediatrics, new medicine, gastroenterology, allergy, dermatology, postpartum, obstetrics, urology, physical medicine, hematology, neurology, eye, ear-nose-throat, orthopedics, cardiology, pulmonary, metabolic, gynecology, general medicine and surgery. On September 1, 1967, a new Cardiopulmonary Institute was established at Methodist by two Medical School faculty members.

St. Paul Hospital is a completely new 484 bed hospital on Harry Hines Boulevard and Inwood Road in the Medical Center. The new facility, opened in December, 1963, replaced the old hospital established in 1896 as Dallas' first general hospital. The modern, well-equipped Esther Hoblitzelle Clinic Building, adjacent to the hospital, was designed for the medical student, intern, and resident, as well as the patient. Some 20,000 annual outpatient visits give the house staff an opportunity to care for patients through the clinics of medicine, surgery, obstetrics, gynecology, post-partum, physical medicine, pediatrics, wellbaby, orthopedics, proctology, urology, dermatology, allergy, eye, ear-nose-throat, cardiology, hematology and neurosurgery. In addition, St. Paul operates an active emergency service. Operated by the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, the hospital's 500-plus medical staff enjoys a continuing education program whereby lecturers from throughout the world and professors from the Medical School bring the newest concepts to staff and sectional meetings.

Children's Medical Center, located at 1935 Amelia Street, is a completely new 118 bed general medical facility servicing children from birth through 18 years of age. Colorful new quarters were occupied in August 1967. A non-profit, community owned, charitable organization established in 1913 as a hospital for infants, the Center now offers a complete program for medical, surgical and psychiatric patients both private and charity. In addition to a regular program of diagnosis and treatment of illnesses, specialty clinics numbering 24 are conducted in the large Outpatient Department. Patient visits to the Outpatient last year numbered 56,675; patients admitted to the hospital totaled 4,532. A pioneer in open-heart surgery, Children's Medical Center is the Regional Congenital Heart Disease Center for the Southwest. The Professor and Chairman of the Department of Pediatrics, at the Medical School, serves as the Chief of Staff of the Center and coordinates the medical and training programs for externs, pediatric interns and residents, Parkland Memorial Hospital affiliates with the teaching program in sharing its pediatric, newborn and contagious disease sections with the Center.

Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children, a charitable institution, is owned and operated by the Scottish Rite Masonic bodies of Texas. It has 78 beds and specializes in pediatric orthopedics and neurology. The hospital has an accredited orthopedic residency training program affiliated with the Medical School. It also offers clinical training in physical therapy, occupational therapy and recreational therapy; all of which are affiliated with area educational institutions.

The Dallas Veterans Administration Hospital is a 778-bed general medical and surgical hospital which includes a psychiatric service of 80 beds and a tuberculosis section (a part of the pulmonary diseases service) of 66 beds. All of the clinical facilities are available to the teaching program and are used for both undergraduate and graduate training. There are services in internal medicine, surgery, pulmonary disease including tuberculosis and nontuberculosis sections, radiology, laboratory, physical medicine and rehabilitation, psychiatry, including a mental hygiene clinic and day care treatment center, neurology, psychology, radioisotopes, dental, outpatient, social work, a prosthetics center, and an audiology and speech pathology clinic. The surgical service includes sections of general surgery, urology, orthopedics, thoracic surgery, ophthalmology, otolaryngology, and neurosurgery. All training is under the direction of the Dean's Committee and supervised by a large full-time faculty augmented by consultants who make regular visits. The hospital library is excellent with rapid interlibrary loan facilities available when needed. The hospital has an advanced research program with particularly outstanding laboratory facilities in the fields of biochemistry, endocrinology and metabolism.

Presbyterian Hospital of Dallas, a general acute hospital, is a teaching hospital of The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas. The \$11,000,000 hospital is located on a 71.2 acre site at 8200 Walnut Hill Lane just off North Central Expressway. Opened to the public in May, 1966, it is the first new major general hospital to be created in the community since 1927. In addition to the 350 beds which it currently provides the community, the hospital has already filled in areas which will permit its ready expansion to

505 beds as required to meet the health needs of Dallas. The hospital offers complete diagnostic and treatment facilities for medical, surgical, obstetric and pediatric care. It is a reference hospital in that it is equipped to handle diagnostic problems sent to it from throughout the Southwest. Special facilities include an Intensive Care Unit of 13 beds with cardiac care facilities, and a new \$650,000 psychiatric unit opened in December, 1967. Through this 13,500 square-foot area, Presbyterian Hospital of Dallas offers all of the major psychiatric services set forth in the comprehensive community mental health program. All of the Clinical facilities are available to the teaching program of the Medical School and School of Allied Health Professions.

The Dallas Rehabilitation Institute is a modern facility having been constructed in 1961 and specifically designed in keeping with physical needs of a program of comprehensive rehabilitation. It is located in the Brookhollow District of Dallas, near the City-County Hospital and Southwest Medical Complex composed of Parkland Hospital, St. Paul Hospital, Callier Speech and Hearing Center, the Medical School, the new Wadley Research Center, and the Locke Medical Building. The Center borders on the grounds of the Brookhollow Country Club. The facility has approximately 55,000 sq. ft. of usable space and has an assessed value of over 1 1/2 million dollars. It holds the distinction of being the first center of its kind in the country which was planned as a comprehensive rehabilitation center, from selection of the site to design and furnishing. The center provides medical, psychosocial and vocational services to disabled individuals on both an outpatient and an inpatient basis.

# OPPORTUNITIES -

## Scholarships and Fellowships

Occasionally special funds are made available for students by firms and individuals. Information regarding such opportunities can be obtained through the Office of the Dean.

### REHABILITATION ASSISTANCE

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission offers assistance for tuition and required fees to students who have certain physical or emotional handicaps, provided the vocational objective selected by the handicapped person has been approved by an appropriate representative of the Commission. Through this State agency, other rehabilitation services are available to assist handicapped persons to become employable.

Application for this type of assistance should be made to the nearest Rehabilitation Office. Inquiries may be addressed to: Commissioner, Texas Rehabilitation Commission, Medical Park Tower, 1301 West 38th Street, Austin, Texas 78705.

### ORGANIZATIONS

Any student enrolled is entitled to student membership in the association representing the discipline. The purposes of these organizations are to promote interest in the profession with specific aims toward service and fellowship for the social, intellectual and professional benefit of each member. Membership entitles the student to the journal of the profession and to attend its meetings. These student memberships are available for the American Physical Therapy Association, American Dietetic Association, American Society of Medical Technologists, National Rehabilitation Association, among the major organizations. Students are encouraged to join the profession's local, state and regional groups as well. Further information can be obtained from the departmental faculty and journals.



In addition, the Association of Schools of Allied Health Professions, a new group representing all the allied health team is a highly desirable organization for all students. The Dean's Office can provide information about this organization.

Honorary fraternities and sororities are available, and those students who are interested can secure information from the Dean's Office.

### AWARDS

The School of Allied Health Professions at The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School Outstanding Student Award.

This award will be given each year for the highest academic performance in each curricula.

DRESS

As a future professional person, there are rules of dress to be observed. It is expected that students enrolled in the preprofessional courses will not come to classes, staff conferences, meetings, or any activity dressed in shorts or in any unconventional attire.

Where there are special clothing or uniform requirements for a specific curriculum, the student will be notified upon acceptance into that curriculum.

All students are required to wear name tags as well as the sleeve patch of curriculum in which they are enrolled. The sleeve patch is worn on the left shoulder sleeve.

### EXPENSES

# FEES AND DEPOSITS

Students are entitled to enter class or laboratory when their fees and deposits have been paid. Payment may be made by personal check for the exact amount due, provided the bank transit number is encoded thereon in compliance with revised Federal Reserve Bank regulations.

## All fees are subject to change without prior publication.

A filing fee of \$5 is required of each applicant at the time application is made. On acceptance by the school an applicant is required to send to the Dean a certified check or money order for \$30 to serve as a registration deposit. When the student matriculates (unless he is registering in absentia), \$20 of this amount is applied to the Tuition Fee mentioned below and \$10 is applied to the Property Deposit. The deposit is forfeited if the applicant withdraws after the deadline or fails to matriculate in the year for which admission is granted.

Property Deposit. The deposit of \$10 covers fines, breakage of equipment, loss of books, and miscellaneous charges. This amount must be replaced as necessary upon the request of the Business Manager. The amount of the property deposit remaining in the student's account will be refunded to him upon graduation or withdrawal from school. Property deposits which remain unclaimed for a period of four years after the student's last day of attendance shall be forfeited and shall become operative to the permanent use and purpose of a scholarship fund for needy and for deserving students. (51st Leg. Reg. Ses. 1949)



Registration and Tuition Fee (Regular Session). All fees are payable in full at the time of registration. A portion of the applicant's deposit as mentioned above is applied to the tuition fee at the time of registration.

The resident tuition for Allied Health Professions students is \$50 per semester for twelve or more semester credit hours; the non-resident tuition for medical art and graduate students is \$200 per semester for twelve or more semester credit hours. Texas residents registering in absentia must pay \$15 per semester; non-residents registering in absentia must pay \$18.50 per semester. Students who register for fewer than twelve semester credit hours must pay tuition as set forth in the table (p.S-28-9)according to the number of hours for which they are registered.

Exception: A resident of Texas registering in absentia will pay a net fee of 15; a non-resident of Texas registering in absentia will pay a net fee of 18.50.

Visitor's Fee. A visitor's fee of \$5 a semester or term is required of persons not registered for credit and the visitor must pay the laboratory fee the same as for credit. If the visitor desires to use the library, a non-student library deposit of \$5 is required.

Graduation Fee. A graduation fee of \$25, payable at registration for the final year, is required of those students who elect to receive their degree from The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas School of Allied Health Professions. Students who withdraw before graduation are entitled to a refund in full of this fee.

Refund of the Registration and Tuition Fee (Regular Session). A student who officially withdraws from school during the first term is entitled to a refund of two-thirds of the tuition; a student officially withdrawing during the second term is entitled to a refund of one-third of the tuition. No fees other than graduation and tuition fees are refundable.

In no case shall the total refund exceed 70% of the tuition. No refund will be made until the expiration of 15 days after the beginning of classes. A check covering all refunds due will be mailed to the address left with the Business Office. No refund will be granted unless applied for within one year after official withdrawal.

Refund of Registration and Tuition Fee (Summer Registration). A student who officially withdraws will receive a refund of tuition as shown below:

In no instance shall the refund of tuition reduce the net fee paid below \$15 for Texas residents and \$18.50 for non-residents. Refund procedures for the Summer Registration are the same as those for the Regular Session.

Exemption of ex-servicemen. Texas residents who were residents of Texas at the time of entry into the military service may be eligible for exemption from academic fees. These individuals must have entered the Armed Forces prior to February 1, 1955, have been honorably discharged and not now be eligible for educational benefits provided by the United States Government. Children of members of the Armed Forces who died while in the service may also be exempted from academic fees. Further details regarding these exemptions may be obtained in the Business Office.



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Payment of fees for handicapped students. The Texas Education Agency, throughs its Vocational Rehabilitation Office, offers payments of tuition and other fees and services to civilian students (normally nonveterans) who have certain physical handicaps, provided the vocational objective selected by the students has been approved by a representative of the division. Application for vocational rehabilitation should be made to the Austin Rehabilitation District Office, 100 1/2 west Tenth Street, or to the District Rehabilitation Office nearest the student's home.

## OTHER EXPENSES

Living arrangements. The School of Allied Health Professions does not furnish living quarters for its students. Housing is an individual matter and each student must make his own arrangements. The Oak Cliff and Colorado Blvd. areas have many apartment and boarding houses, but competition is keen enough to make early efforts necessary. Estimated living costs for room range upward from approximately \$100 per month.

Campus parking. Limited parking facilities are available on the medical school grounds but not on the grounds of Methodist Hospital. Any student wishing to park on the Medical campus will be required to obtain a permit and pay a parking and registration fee. Student parking must be restricted to areas designated and violations of the parking regulations may result in loss of parking privileges on the campus.

Identification cards will be available for each student and will be needed for access to certain installations and departments associated with the student's training.

The method by which these are obtained and the cost is announced during registration periods.

All students are expected to wear name tags upon their uniform or classroom attire. Information about acquisition and costs is available during registration periods.

#### GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

A student seeking admission must present:

- 1) Filing fee \$5.00
- 2) An application for admission including a recent photograph  $2\frac{1}{4} \ge 2\frac{1}{4}$
- 3) An official transcript of his entire college record certified by registrar of college(s) involved.
- 4) Three (3) letters of reference from:
  - a. Undergraduate advisor
  - b. Instructor in college major
  - c. Personal friend regarding character
- 5) A physician's statement regarding condition of health

A personal interview may be required at the discretion of the Dean's Office.

All credentials should be sent directly to the Dean of the School of Allied Health Professions. Much time and trouble will be saved by sending this official record not later than six months prior to the opening of the semester.

Basic Requirements for Admission to Baccalaureate Degree Programs: (minimum 90 semester hours)



English - 12 semester hours (Composition, 6 hours, and English or American Literature, 6 hours)

Speech - 3 semester hours

Math - 3 semester hours (College Algebra or equivalent)

History - 6 semester hours (U.S., 3 hours, and Texas, 3 hours)

Government - 6 semester hours

Sciences - 12 semester hours of which 6 are in Biologic Science For Rehabilitation Science Curriculum - 1 year of Science (8 semester hours)

Humanities - 12 semester hours (preferably from Philosophy, Psychology, Sociology, Economics)

Electives or Special Requirements for each curriculum total 36 hours minimum.

Admission dates vary with each curriculum and a prospective student is advised to check the specific admission dates for the curriculum to which he is applying. Generally September, January and June are times when curricula begin instruction.

### Orientation

During the first week of each school semester several sessions will be held to familiarize the student with school regulations, curricular matters, geography and travel problems, and any matters that facilitate the student's smooth entrance into the educational program.

## Regulations:

- 1. Transferred grades are never lowered, they are filed just as they appear on the student's transcript. For degree purposes, grades earned at other institutions will not be averaged with work done at this University.
- 2. Credit is generally allowed on the above basis for work done in institutions which are fully approved by the regional accrediting agency in the section in which the institution is located.
- 3. An applicant, whether a new student or a former student of the University, who has attended another collegiate institution is not at liberty to disregard any part of his collegiate record and apply for admission to the School of Allied Health Professions on the basis of a partial record of his college work, but is subject without exception to the regulations given above.
- 4. All credits given students from other colleges are conditional. If, in any case, the work is of low grade, credit allowed may be reduced.
- 5. In the School of Allied Health Professions, an Admissions Committee has been established to evaluate credits of transfer students if special problems arise, and to interpret and evaluate the subject matter knowledge of students who transfer from schools in foreign countries. This Admissions Committee has, at its disposal, the advice of departments concerned with subjects on which evaluation is required. Students have the right to appeal to the Admissions Committee on any questions concerning transfer of credit.
- 6. The School of Allied Health Professions will accept credits obtained through the College Level Examination Program (CLEP). The School does not administer the examination but can provide information about the program.



#### RESIDENCE

Rules and regulations for determing residence status are contained in Article 2654c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes. Where a student has doubts concerning his status as a legal resident of the State of Texas, he may obtain a copy of these regulations from the Office of the Dean.

### REGISTRATION

Registration Days: In the calendar appearing on page three, registration days for each semester are indicated. The student is urged to plan his work with care, consulting especially those of the teaching staff under whom the main work will be taken, bearing in mind the requirements for the degree.

<u>Registration for Courses</u>: The only way to become a member of a class is to register for it through the proper registration procedure. A student cannot receive credit for a course for which he is not registered.

A student is not registered, is not in the University, is not entitled to University privileges, until he has paid his fees.

Students are urged to register on the appointed days. No student may register for credit later than the last registration day (See Calendar on Page 3) except with the approval of the Registrar and the Chairman of the Department concerned.

Any student who registers with these permissions, after the appointed days, will be required to pay a special charge of five dollars (\$5) to defray the costs of these extra services required to effect his late registration.

### STUDENTS RESPONSIBLE TO THE DEAN

Each student, by registering, enters the School of Allied Health Professions, and except as to conduct is therefore, under the jurisdiction of the Dean of the School. This involves jurisdiction over the student's program of study and degree requirements. Students taking courses in the school are subject to the regulations of the school.

## CURRICULA

## DEGREES

The Bachelor of Science degree is granted by the School of Allied Health Professions.

Degree Requirements:

- 1. A Baccalaureate degree may be awarded by the parent undergraduate institution under the terms of the contractual agreement between the two institutions.
- 2. Degree granted by School of Allied Health Professions.

No degree may be granted until all obligations of the student - academic moral, and financial - have been satisfactorily discharged.

The University is not responsible for debts contracted by individual students or by student organizations. On the other hand, the University expects all students and student organizations to conduct themselves honorably in all commercial transactions. The University will not assume the role of a collection agency for organizations, firms and individuals to whom students may owe bills, nor will the University adjudicate disputes between students and creditors over the existence or the amounts of debts. A student, however, is expected to perform his contractual obligations and in the event of conduct on the part of a student clearly



demonstrating a flagrant disregard of his commercial obligations (refusal to pay or meet admitted debts or obligations will be thus construed), action will be taken appropriate to the age of the student and other circumstances:

- 1) In the event of such conduct, the parent of minors will be notified and requested to intervene.
- 2) In the case of a married student or a student over 21 years of age, the student will be requested to make prompt payment or to negotiate a reasonable plan for payment with his creditor or creditors.
- 3) In the event that the actions prescribed in (1) and (2) above do not result in the payment or agreement to pay admitted obligations, one or more of the following actions, as determined appropriate in the particular case, may be taken:
  - (a) A bar against admission of the student
  - (b) Withholding the student's grades and official transcript
  - (c) Withholding of a degree to which the student otherwise would be entitled.

## GRADES

Grades. The standing of a student in his work is expressed by grades made up from the classwork and from examinations. There are five grades: A (excellent), B (above average), C (average), D (pass), F (failure). To pass in a course for undergraduate credit, it is necessary to secure a grade of at least D. After being reported to the Registrar, a grade may not be changed unless an error has been made by the instructor. Grades are given by semesters; however, in a course extending through two semesters no credit is given until both semesters of the course have been completed.

Symbols. Under certain circumstances, instructors may use symbols in reporting a student's standing in his semester's work. The symbol P is reported for a student who has been permitted to postpone an examination; the symbol R, for a student who has been permitted a re-examination; the symbol X, for a student who, under specific circumstances, has incomplete class or laboratory work, and the symbol CR, for a student who, under specific circumstances has taken a course on the Pass Fail basis.

When an academic deficiency is incurred, the student is referred to the Advisory Committee for investigation. Immediately thereafter the Advisory Committee makes recommendations to the Dean regarding solution of the student's problem.

A student incurring academic deficiency may, on the basis of the recommendations of the Committee, be asked to withdraw from school, to repeat the year's work, or to remove the deficiency by whatever means the Advisorv Committee may propose.

When the student is allowed to repeat the work of a year or any part thereof, he may be required to achieve any grade level which the Advisory Committee may stipulate.

The Advisory Committee is composed of representatives of each teaching department of the School of Allied Health Professions. Its function is to review all important aspects of each student case referred to it and to make appropriate recommendations to the Dean.



## Outside Work

The Allied Health Professions curricula require the major portion of a student's time and concentration. Some few students find it possible to have outside employment and still maintain a high quality of school work. School assignments and agency duties cannot be altered to fit a work schedule for an individual. Any student who wishes to seek employment must obtain written approval of the Dean. Such approval may be given only in those instances where a good quality of student work is demonstrated.

## CORE CURRICULUM

These courses are applicable to all curricula within the School of Allied Health Professions:

AHP 4211 History, Administration, Economics, Law, and Ethics of Health Care

2 semester hours - required of all students in any curricula in the School of Allied Health Professions.

The course covers the history of medical and health care in the world and United States. Current health care administrative practices, hospital organization, and health systems will be evaluated. The economics of health care, governmental and private support as well as business and industrial use of health plans will also be studied. Demography and fiscal aspects of health are analyzed. Ethics and legal aspects for all health workers as it relates to all health systems are interpreted.

AHP 4013 Research Problems

1 - 3 semester hours - available as elective to all students.

This course provides the student with an apportunity to analyze and report results of a study of a specific problem that involves actual patients and/or procedures found in hospitals, institutions, agencies and health care systems. Study of simple statistical methods, report writing and use of literature is also part of this experience.

AHP 4012 Directed Readings

1 - 3 semester hours - available as elective to all students.

This course provides the student with an opportunity to read in depth in those chosen specialized areas with the guidance of an instructor familiar with the subject. Analysis and interpretation of rehabilitation, behavioral science, business, economics, and health literature are stressed.

AHP 4010 Orientation

O semester hours - required of all students in any curricula.





For all beginning students designed to provide information on: school policies, geography of training settings, travel, dress, professional matters, and to provide a forum for student involvement in their curriculum. Meetings for the first 6 weeks of each semester are scheduled.

AHP 4014 Computer Fundamentals; Introduction to

O semester hours - available as elective to all students.

The application of computers to the health care fields; computer language and equipment; digital computer hard-ware. Time - 4 sessions, 2 hours each. Course offered periodically throughout the year.

AHP 4015 Basic Statistics

O credit - available to all students as elective

Designed to acquaint the student with basic statistics including descriptive statistics, linear regression and correlation and tests of significance for quantitative and qualitative variable. Time - 8 sessions, 1 hour each. Offered periodically during academic year.

AHP 4216 Pathology (Lecture and demonstration) 2 semester hours

A study of the fundamentals of general pathologic processes correlated with the clinical science symptoms and the Clinical Course of those diseases which are likely to be encountered by allied health personnel involved in patient care.

AHP 4817 Human Physiology and Gross Anatomy (Lecture and Lab)

8 semester hours

Surface anatomy, arthrology, myology, neurolocomotion, cardiovascular, respiration, metabolism, digestion, circulation, elimination, reproduction, acid base balance, water balance, glandular systems.

A twelve week course offered in the summer term only. Required of Instructional Media and Physical Therapy students, Medical Record Administration (lecture only), and other students who have not met this prerequisite for their curriculum. Lectures are 5 days a week. Laboratory varies in complexity and intensity with the need of each curriculum.

## Faculty:

Instructors for these courses will be drawn from the faculty of the School of Allied Health Professions including the Dean and Associate Dean and the Department Chairmen. Supplemental faculty is available from The University of Texas (Southwestern) Medical School at Dallas.

## DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL THERAPY

#### Baccalaureate Degree and Certificate Curriculum

Physical Therapy is a health profession concerned with the prevention of disability, and with the evaluation, the maintenance, and improvement of the functions of the musculoskeletal, neuromuscular, cardiovascular, and respiratory systems of the individual. Evaluation procedures may include tests of respiratory, sensorimotor, circulatory and developmental status, and assessment of the level of independent function.

Patients are referred for physical therapy by physicians. Treatment programs are designed to develop or restore muscle strength, range of joint motion, coordination and endurance, to relieve pain, to develop new motor skills, and to assist the patient to achieve realistic goals consistent with his functional capacity.

Physical therapy is implemented through direct patient care, through instruction of patients, their families and supportive personnel, and through coordination and consultation with other health professionals in the community. The curriculum in Physical Therapy provides one program of education for two classifications of students:

- (1)Degree course - the fourth or professional training year of a Baccalaureate degree program in cooperation with area undergraduate institutions, and
- (2) Certification course a one academic year professional training course for those who already possess an undergraduate degree including courses in certain pre-requisite subjects (physics, chemistry, biology, etc.)

The curriculum covers one academic year plus two summer semesters and provides a minimum of 51 semester hours of credit.

The program has been developed to meet the accreditation standards of the Council on Medical Education (AMA) in collaboration with the American Physical Therapy Association.

The Curriculum in Physical Therapy begins in June of each year.

All students will have an opportunity to meet as a group to discuss problems peculiar to their disciplines.

<u>AHP 4817</u> Human Physiology and Gross Anatomy (Lecture and Laboratory) 8 semester hours

Surface anatomy, arthrology, myology, neurolocomotion, cardiovascular, respiration, metabolism, digestion, circulation, elimination, reproduction, acid base balance, water balance, glandular systems.

A twelve week course offered in the summer term only. Required of Instructional Media and Physical Therapy students, Medical Record Administration (lecture only), and other students who have not met this prerequisite for their curriculum. Lectures are 5 days a week. Laboratory varies in complexity and intensity with the need of each curriculum.

P.T. 4322 Kinesiology (lecture and laboratory) 3 semester hours

Mechanics of skeletal muscular activity; the application of the principles of physics and physiology to the detailed analysis of normal and abnormal body movements.

<u>P.T. 4423</u> Theory and Procedures I-A and I-B (lecture and laboratory) 9 semester hours

A. Physical and physiological principles providing the basis for the use of physical agents and massage. Demonstration and practice in their application for therapeutic purposes.

<u>P.T. 4225</u> Neurology and Neuroanatomy (lecture and demonstration) 2 semester hours

Lecture and demonstration: Anatomy of the nervous system of man including the neural structural units, an anatomy of the central and peripheral nervous systems and its correlation to clinical symptomology. Rehab Sc. 4347 Psychological Aspects of Illness and Disability (Lecture) 3 semester hours

An introduction to the emotional and mental reactions associated with biologic illness and impairments with emphasis on client or patient psychological needs, conflicts, adjustment mechanisms, signs and symptoms of severe emotional distress; contributions of psychology to care and treatment; reactions of family and society to the chronically ill and disabled. 287

P.T. <u>4128a</u> Physical Therapy Seminar I 1 semester hour

A critical review of current publications pertinent to the field of physical therapy. Students will engage in report writing, interpreting research and have practice in developing research projects.

P.T. 4129 Physical Therapy Seminar II 1 semester hour

A continuation of Physical Therapy Seminar I.

P.T. 4027 Clinical Orientation I (Practicum) 1 semester hour

Clinical observation with gradually increasing responsibility for the application of learned techniques of patient care.

P.T. 4127a Clinical Orientation II (Practicum) 1 semester hour

Continuation of Clinical Orientation I with increased time in the clinical setting and additional treatment responsibility.

P.T. 4620 Clinical Education 6 semester hours

Sixteen weeks of clinical experience in approved affiliate institutions. This experience shall include four weeks each at a general medical and surgical facility, a rehabilitation facility and a pediatric facility, and a facility whose caseload is primarily patients with neurologic involvement.

#### DEPARTMENT OF REHABILITATION SCIENCE

### UNDERGRADUATE CURRICULUM IN REHABILITATION SCIENCE

A curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Science degree in rehabilitation science is offered. Students matriculate into this program in their fourth year of undergraduate education and/or after having completed successfully a minimum of 90 semester hours of college work.

The curriculum covers one academic year and provides a minimum of 3<sup>4</sup> semester hours of credit. Students are admitted either in September or January. It is recommended that the student begin in September in order to pursue the desired sequence of courses and experiences.

The purpose of the program is to provide training for students who desire to pursue a career in rehabilitation and other human service fields. The goal is to increase the manpower in the allied health professions for those disciplines whose primary focus is toward assisting the disabled and disadvantaged to achieve the maximal realization of their potentials. Specifically, the program is to prepare personnel for positions in vocational rehabilitation agencies, rehabilitation centers, sheltered workshops, occupational skill training schools and other human service agencies where they may function as rehabilitation specialists, casework assistants, employment interviewers, work evaluators, and placement specialists, etc.

## Admission Requirements

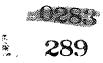
Students must meet the admission requirements of the School of Allied Health Professions which include an acceptable grade-point average on all previous college work (minimum of 90 semester hours). Each applicant must complete the program application blank and tests and submit an official transcript of his entire college record and three letters of reference. The Admissions Committee of the School of Allied Health Professions shall determine the applicant's fitness for admission in accordance with the quality of his credentials and the recommendation of the Chairman of the Department of Rehabilitation Sciences.

In addition to the general requirements for admission to the School of Allied Health Professions, the following courses are recommended as highly appropriate for the Rehabilitation Science Curriculum.

Psychology of Personality Industrial and/or Personnel Psychology Urban Sociology Sociology of Ethnic Groups Introduction to Business Management Social Psychology

#### Curriculum

The Curriculum is designed to provide the student with a strong background in the various disabilities and their implications for independent living, basic interviewing and counseling skills, and the multi-disciplined approach to the problems of the disabled and disadvantaged. The program is predicated upon the close integration of academic knowledge and practical skills. The students are simultaneously involved in both didactic course work and in clinical experiences.

Successful completion of this curriculum will provide the student with a minimum of 34 semester hours of upper level undergraduate credit.

## DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

Introduction to Rehabilitation 3 semester hours credit

Orientation to rehabilitation concepts, philosophy, and legislation in both public and private agencies. Historical development of rehabilitation, its legal basis, and organizational structure, rehabilitation facilities and agencies serving of disabled and disadvantaged persons.

#### Techniques of Interviewing 3 semester hours credit

Integrated didactic and experiential approach to the development of basic interviewing and counseling skills used in working with clients throughout the various phases of the rehabilitation process. Supervised interviewing and counseling sessions will be provided with rehabilitation clients.

### Survey of Disabling Conditions 3 semester hours credit

Study of disabling conditions, including: congenital and acquired physical handicaps, mental retardation, psychiatric problems, drug and alcoholic addiction, behavioral disorders, social and cultural disadvantaged and aging. Incidence of each disability, appropriate treatment, and the relationship with sociological factors.

### World of Work

3 semester hours credit

A survey of the history of work, and philosophy and psychology of work as related to different societies. Analysis of work classification systems, the relationships of economic system to work consumption, information media about work, industrial and business appraisal of work, and automation with its effect upon the individual.

#### Basic Casework Principles

3 semester hours credit

Introduction to the casework method and the various techniques expected of beginning rehabilitation workers, such as interviewing, application and intake process, social history taking and its significance, method of presentation and report writing, with emphasis upon working as a part of the rehabilitation team in an on-going coordination of services to a client.

## Psychological Aspects of Chronic Illness and Disability 3 semester hours credit

An introduction to the emotional and mental reactions associated with biologic illness and impairments, with emphasis on client or patient psychological needs, conflicts, adjustment mechanisms, signs and symptoms of severe emotional distress; contribution of psychology to care and treatment; reactions of family and society to the chronically ill and disabled. Required of all Physical Therapy students.

## Vocational Services for the Disabled and Disadvantaged 3 semester hours credit

An analysis of the principles, assumptions, and approaches of the various vocational services available to the disabled and disadvantaged. Focus on techniques of Vocational Evaluation (social, psychological, functional capacity, simulated and real work); Work Preparation (work adjustment, work conditioning, personal-social adjustment, and skill training); and actual selective Job Placement. Includes study of community training and industrial resources.

### Rehabilitation I

2 semester hours credit

Lecture and demonstration: A multidisciplined approach to the problems of the chronically ill and/or severly disabled individual including the psychological aspects of disability. The student is provided the opportunity to contribute to the care of a patient in cooperation with professionals from the other health and health related professions.

## Rehabilitation II

2 semester hours credit

Continuation of Rehabilitation I with special emphasis upon mentally or emotionally disabled and culturally disadvantaged clients. Group discussions to aid the student summarize and integrate concepts of rehabilitation practices. Focus is upon applying the various concepts, principles and knowledge gained from actual case services to the disabled and disadvantaged.

### Practicuum I

#### 2 semester hours credit

Supervised field experience in rehabilitation agencies in serving the disabled. Experiences are supervised by University Faculty and the Professional Staff of the cooperation agencies.

#### Practicuum II

2 semester hours credit

Continuation of Practicuum I repeated for credit with a different agency.

## Clinical Facilities

The cooperating community agencies and the departments and divisions within the Medical School offer a valuable opportunity to contribute to the student's understanding of the physically disabled (including heart, cancer and stroke patients, amputees, paraplegics, etc.), the mentally retarded, the emotionally disturbed and the culturally disadvantaged. Since the program will be located within a metropolitan area with numerous social and rehabilitation agencies as well as a major medical center, learning experiences with many disabled groups can be easily integrated into the student's program.

Affiliate Teaching Institutions

1. Dallas Rehabilitation Institute (Caruth)

This is a modern comprehensive rehabilitation center which has medical and vocational rehabilitation programs as well as workshops. DRI serves all disability groups and has special programs for the severely disabled, the mentally retarded, and the drug addict. The center provides a complete interdisciplinary program. Here students will receive special medical lecture, observe the various therapies, participate in client case conferences and study individual cases. The students can gain experience in interviewing, counseling, testing, and planning client programs.

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## DEPARTMENT OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY

### Baccalaureate Degree and Certificate Curriculum

Medical technology offers opportunities for service to students interested in biological and chemical sciences. Medical technologists are skilled laboratory workers who perform laboratory tests and analyses that aid physicians in diagnosis and treatment of patients. These include chemical and physical analysis of body fluids (clinical chemistry and urinalysis), examination of blood and its component cells (Hematology), isolation and identification of bacteria, viruses, and parasites from diseased persons (clinical microbiology and parasitology), testing of blood serum for antibodies indicative of specific diseases (serology), preparation and staining of tissues obtained by surgery or autopsy for examination by a pathologist (histological technic), collection, processing and storage of blood, pre-transfusion testing and other immunohematologic procedures (blood banking). Such testing procedures may disclose subtle changes that might not be detected in other ways. 0286 292

The medical technologist must know the theory and scientific fundamentals as well as the procedures for testing. Technologists work in clinical laboratories, medical schools, research organizations, public health agencies, pharmaceutical companies and other industrial organizations.

The curriculum is organized so that the twelve month training period is equivalent to the senior year in college. On completion of the academic course work and directed clinical laboratory experience, the student is eligible for a Bachelor of Science degree in Medical Technology and is eligible to take the qualifying examination of the Registry of Medical Technologists.

The curriculum is jointly approved by the Board of Schools of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists and by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association. It satisfies the requirements of the Registry of Medical Technologists with respect to content and clock hours. The Curriculum begins in February, June, and September.

#### SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Completion of three years (90 semester hours or 135 quarter hours) of college training in an accredited college or university is a prerequisite of which credit in the following courses is required:

1. Biologic sciences: 16 semester hours (24 quarter hours) including one full academic year of general biology and/or zoology, both lecture and laboratory.

The remaining biology courses may be selected from the following courses: physiology, comparative anatomy, bacteriology, parasitology, histology, genetics or other biology courses acceptable toward a biologic science major.

2. Chemistry: 16 semester hours (24 quarter hours) including one full year of general college chemistry lecture and laboratory. Survey courses will not be acceptable.

Other courses may be chosen from: qualitative analysis, quantitative analysis, organic chemistry, biochemistry, or other chemistry courses acceptable toward a major in chemistry.

3. Mathematics: 3 semester hours (4 quarter hours) of college mathematics.



4. Electives: Sufficient credits to give 90 semester hours. Although not required, basic courses in physics and typing are recommended.

### General Information

The student should inform himself on the standards and practices of the School of Allied Health Professions as stated in previous sections of this catalogue.

PROFESSIONAL APPAREL: During rotation on services in the hospital laboratories, washable white uniforms and comfortable white shoes are required. Women are required to wear appropriate hose. Excess jewelry such as bracelets, large earrings, and necklaces are in poor taste.

## Description of Courses

In addition to formal lectures, students will be required to spend prescribed rotation on the various services of the Parkland Memorial Hospital Pathology Laboratories. During the hospital assignment there will be conference teaching and demonstration of laboratory methods by Registered Medical Technologists who serve as clinical instructors. In addition, laboratory practice will be under the supervision of these technologists.

The required 30 semester hours credit in Medical Technology as follows:

### Med. Tech. 4935 - Clinical Chemistry

50 formal lectures and 15 weeks laboratory rotation. The course covers automated and manual procedures for chemical analysis, instrumentation, quality control, and their relationship to medical problems.

## Med. Tech. 4130 - Histology

### 1 semester hour credit

9 semester hours credit

15 hours conference teaching and 3 weeks laboratory rotation. The course covers very basic techniques of processing, cutting, and staining tissue specimens.

## Med. Tech. 4131 - Urinalysis

### 1 semester hour credit

9 formal lectures and 4 weeks laboratory rotation. The course covers the anatomy and physiology of the urinary system, routine and special tests in urinalysis, renal function, gastric analysis and stool examination.

### Med. Tech. 4733 - Immunology and Serology 7 semester hours credit

25 formal lectures and 6 weeks laboratory rotation in the Blood Bank and 4 weeks laboratory rotation in serology. The course covers basic immunology, serological procedures, immunohematology, and the collection, processing, storage and pre-transfusion testing of whole blood and its components and derivatives.



4 semester hours credit

21 formal lectures and 8 weeks laboratory rotation. The course covers hematopoeisis, normal and abnormal cell morphology and hemoglobins, blood dyscrasis, and the mechanisms of coagulation and coagulation disorders.

## Med. Tech. 4834 - Microbiology and Parasitology 8 semester hours credit

27 formal lectures and 12 weeks laboratory rotation. The course covers basic bacteriological methods for the isolation and identification of common pathogenic bacteria, fungi and animal parasites and their relationship to human disease.
