 The Faculty Council on May 22, 1968, approved by the circularization procedure changes in the catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences in regard to Plan II (D&P 4175-77). This legislation deletes the material on pages 67-69 of the College of Arts and Sciences catalogue, 1967-69, under Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts Plan II, and presents a new section under Plan II, including A. Special Requirements, B. Choice of Work, and C., Order of Work. The changes set forth(1) accommodate certain modifications in the Plan II degree program, bringing it more nearly into line with some of the features of the revised Plan I degree program, (2) offer students a wider choice of courses in certain areas, and (3) allow the introduction of two new courses to the Plan II program. There is no increase in the total course hours required of all Plan II students.

Annual vacation entitlement for eligible employees will be a maximum of ten (10) working days. Persons who have been continuously employed for six (6) months or longer, and on at least a half-time basis, are eligible to take annual leave to the extent of one (1) day for each month of continuous employment in the fiscal year, not to exceed ten (10) working days. Annual employees, with fifteen (15) years or more of employment with the State, shall be entitled to two (2) normal working weeks plus three (3) additional normal working days of vacation in any one fiscal year.

PAY STATION TELEPHONE SERVICE

As provided for in Article V, Sec. 39, House Bill No. 5, as passed by the Special Called Session of the Sixtieth Legislature of the State of Texas, approval is requested for continuance of the present system of pay station telephone service provided at The University of Texas at El Paso by the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, El Paso, Texas. The commission received by the University is fifteen (15) percent of the gross receipts after deducting the Federal tax on long distance calls and is accounted for as State revenue.





Vacation Schedule

The two additional authorized State legal Holidays not observed by the Medical School are added to the statutory allowance to provide a total of twelve (12) working days' annual leave for the 1968-69 fiscal year. The Appropriations Bill also provides that "annual employees with fifteen (15) or more years of employment with the State shall be entitled to two normal work weeks plus three (3) additional normal working days of vacation in any one fiscal year".

SAYS SAN ANTONIO MEDICAL SCHOOL CATALOG: In accordance with recommendations of the Faculty Curriculum Committee and the Dean, it is recommended that the following text (presented here in its mock-up form) be approved for the first official catalog of the San Antonio Medical School. The curriculum and calendar conform to the existing practices at the other University of Texas medical units, and the fee schedules are the same with the following minor exceptions: microscope rental fee is optional if students have their own acceptable microscopes, and there are minor fees for identification cards and parking.

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"The objective of a medical school is to produce upon graduation neither a specialist nor a physician who can render every type of professional care, but one who, following a basic period of hospital training, is prepared to begin practice as a well-rounded, competent, safe, and conscientious physician. The function of the medical school is to create the climate in which well qualified students may acquire the knowledge, habits of study, basic skills, sound attiudes, and sense of responsibility for patients that characterize the true physician."

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The rise of modern science with its emphasis on direct Essay for observation had its origins in the sixteenth century. Medical Vesalius may be chosen as representative of the new Education cosmology. However, it is only within the present century that we have witnessed the brilliant successes of modern scientific methodology in the medical sciences. The recent work on DNA and RNA metabolism, the very stuff of life, has recolored our mentality. We can, with assurance, predict an increasing tempo in the rate of accumulation of knowledge and the impact of science upon our institutions and the architecture of society. It may be said that the first half of the twentieth century was dominated by the achievements of the physical scientists while the last half of this century belongs to

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As recently as 1925 Alfred North Whitehead stated that the unit of time for the full development and influence of an epochal thought was half a century. In the past forty years the very successes of our scientific endeavor have caused the decade to replace the century as the unit of time for a given epoch. Our culture, influenced profoundly by the rhythm of built-in obsolescence, has as a requisite for greatness an educational system programmed to prepare the individual citizen for diversity and rapid change. The revitalization of curricula in our schools of medicine, spearheaded by new schools such as our own, reflects society's concern about the preparation of young physicians to meet the needs of tomorrow. The sheer mass of data and the rapidity of obsolescence make it impossible and undesirable to attempt to teach everything known in a given field. For this reason, direction in medical education has moved rapidly to greater emphasis on rigorous scientific conceptualization rather than the evanescent, isolated vogue. Such a curriculum permits the student a wide range of electives and the opportunity for intellectual wanderlust and spiritual adventures of thought and esthetic experience. Thus, by precept, experience and emotional involvement, the early motivation of the student is preserved and he perceives the necessity for commitment to medicine as a scholarly pursuit over a lifetime.

The social unrest of this age has underscored the dangers inherent in placidity of existence and the necessity for intellectual and social reform. The very element of instability in the future is precisely the vehicle needed to fashion a great age. For those of us in medicine, the need is for greater involvement in the major social issues of our day, for renewed dedication to those principles of service to the suffering which helped make ours the noblest and most beautiful calling. We must pledge ourselves individually and collectively to serve mankind as scientific healers in the endless war against poverty, ignorance and human suffering.



The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio was created in 1959 by an Act of the 56th Texas Legislature. Of 683 acres secured for development of a medical center, The San Antonio Medical Foundation donated 100 acres to The University of Texas for the medical school site, and gave an additional adjacent 22 acres to Bexar County for a teaching hospital. The architectural plans were completed in 1965 and under the leadership of Dean F. C. Pannill faculty recruitment was started. Through the generosity of Trinity University, the faculty and staff of the medical school were located in temporary quarters in the William L. Moody Science Building until their move to the new physical plant in July, 1968.


The main entrance of the medical school is 7703 Floyd The Site Curl Drive, opposite the Southwest Texas Methodist Hospital. The school is connected on each floor to the Bexar County Teaching Hospital by short double corridors crossing the property line. Extensive parking facilities and access roads are convenient to the complex.

The medical school is a four-story building (432,816 The Building sq. ft.) of irregular configuration including teaching laboratories, faculty offices, faculty research laboratories, student study and activity areas, library (capacity of 170,000 volumes), auditorium (600 seats), administrative offices, research animal quarters; also, supporting storage, service and mechanical areas. A separate central utilities plant has been provided to serve the medical center.

A metropolitan city of about 800,000 people, San Antonio is high on the list of America's unique, interesting and colorful cities. Known popularly as "the place where sunshine spends the winter," San Antonio enjoys normal mean temperature ranges from 52 degrees in January to 84 degrees in July. San Antonio is blessed with 3 universities and 4 colleges. It has 3,320 acres of park land; the zoological gardens and aquarium are among the finest and largest in the country. Culturally, San Antonio boasts a symphony, a Grand Opera Festival, and regular performances by internationally known concert artists, ballet and theatre groups in the new performing arts theatre. The McNay Art Institute and the Witte Museum are among the leading small museums in the nation.

12 The Bexar County Teaching Hospital-A 12-story, \$15,- Hospitals

General Information History



500,000 hospital has been constructed adjacent to and connected with the medical school. The new, 516-bed teaching hospital will provide all general hospital services. The building is specifically designed to meet the needs of a diversified teaching program. Adjacent to all patient areas are study cubicles, classrooms, student laboratories, student examining and treatment rooms. 4

Robert B. Green Memorial Hospital and the Southton Convalescent Sanitorium are incorporated into the teaching complex of The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio and are operated by the Bexar County Hospital District.

Robert B. Green Memorial Hospital is a 338 bed hospital that is a combination of the old and the new, for while patient facilities are primarily of the open-ward type, the outpatient clinic utilizes the latest in construction and design techniques. The outpatient clinic operates 40 different clinics, treating over 100,000 patients yearly. The recently constructed clinic addition to the Robert B. Green Memorial Hospital doubles the floor space of the institution and a major portion of this clinic addition is devoted to large modern departments of pathology, radiology and obstetrics-gynecology. Outpatient facilities with over 60 examining rooms are on the first floor of this addition. The hospital has a diploma nursing school, a Licensed Vocational Nursing Program in association with St. Phillip's College, a Radiology Technician School, ASCP Technician School, Intern Program, Resident Program and a Hospital Administration Program. The Robert B. Green Memorial Hospital has the only staffed emergency room in the city as well as a state operated tumor registry.

Southton Convalescent Sanitorium is a 250-bed, extended-care and geriatrics facility located in south San Antonio. All admissions to Southton are via transfer from the teaching hospitals.

Brooke General Hospital, a major activity in the Brooke Army Medical Center, is located at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. Patients come to the 1,150-bed hospital, one of the Army's largest teaching hospitals, from the San Antonio area as well as from throughout the United States and Overseas. Patients arrive almost daily by way of the Military Airlift Command evacuation planes from Europe, Alaska, the Far East, or from any other point where U.S. military personnel are stationed.

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Brooke General Hospital is operated for definitive medical and surgical care of military and authorized civilian personnel; it also provides out-patient medical, surgical and dental care to authorized personnel. Intern and residency training programs are conducted for medical and dental officers. Training for officer and enlisted personnel is also carried on in physical therapy, occupational therapy and selected medical technology. The U.S. Army Surgical Research Unit, the only organization of its kind in the Army, conducts research in trauma of particular significance to military medicine. Studies at Brooke General Hospital in the treatment of burns are conducted to such an extent that the hospital has now been designated as the Army's burn treatment center.

Wilford Hall USAF Hospital, Lackland Air Force Base, the primary component of the Aerospace Medical Division, is a modern 1,100-bed general hospital admitting approximately 25,000 patients annually. It furnishes full-scale medical care not only to the military population, dependents and retired personnel in the San Antonio area but also to patients referred by other Air Force installations in the United States and overseas. The hospital is a center for cardiac surgery, cardiopulmonary function, histopathology, radioisotope, cobalt therapy, speech and hearing. It also has a complete diagnostic unit and area dental laboratory.

The Library

The library is a primary resource in the medical school for individual learning, as well as a repository of information to serve the teaching, research and medical care functions of the medical center. It provides a laboratory in which the student can acquire the necessary skills in information processing which will serve him for the rest of his professional life. An active program of orientation in the use of medical reference sources is one of the important functions of the library.

The library is located adjacent to the student activities area, where the book store, snack shop and other facilities are available, and where 200 of the individually assigned student carrels are conveniently situated. Individual study spaces are available in the library, as well as areas for group study and the use of audio visual equipment.

The projected capacity of the library is 170,000 volumes. Although it will be some years before full capacity is achieved, the collection already numbers some [5 25,000 volumes, after less than two years of activity. The library is currently receiving some 1,500 periodical titles and is rapidly adding to its stock of cataloged monographs and serials; it is also a repository for single concept films. 4

Among the other literature resources in San Antonio is the excellent School of Aerospace Medicine Library at Brooks Air Force Base, with a collection of over 90,000 volumes. There is close cooperation between the Aerospace Medical Library and the library of the medical school. The medical school library is a charter member of the Texas Council of Health Science Libraries which serves to coordinate the literature services of the medical branches of The University of Texas and other state medical libraries.

The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio is fortunate in having loan funds for needy students. Application blanks and complete information concerning loans available to medical students can be obtained in the Office of the Registrar. Loan funds are listed below.

A limited number of tuition scholarships have been Scholarships made available by the State Legislature. In addition, some scholarship funds are provided by the Health Professions Scholarship Program. Awards of the latter are based on proven financial need.

George W. Brackenridge Scholarship Established in 1965 by the Trustees of the George W. Brackenridge Foundation. The income from this fund will be awarded annually to students enrolled in the Medical School at San Antonio.

Pfizer Scholarship Charles Pfizer and Company has provided a scholarship of \$1,000 to be awarded to a student at The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio. The recipient is selected by the Scholarships and Awards Committee.

Admission to the Medicial Curriculum Admission to a medical school is necessarily a complicated and carefully evaluated process. Minimal standards for admission to the medical curriculum are set by The University of Texas Medical System, and each school (depending on its individual programs, needs, and numbers of applicants) sets standards that are generally above these minimal requirements. Since the total number of applicants usually exceeds the number of places available in the entering class, each school, in its own way, makes a genuine effort to select the students which are felt to be best qualified for a particular program.

In essence, then, each student must earn for himself a place in the medical curriculum. Only the best qualified individuals will be admitted to the programs leading to the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

The University shall not discriminate either in favor of or against any person on account of his or her race, creed, or color, with respect to the admission and education of students, the employment and promotion of teaching and non-teaching personnel, student and faculty housing and activities conducted on premises owned or occupied by The University.

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The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio is a new school with a relatively young faculty, and a curriculum designed to permit maximum flexibility of programs. The philosophy of the curriculum is that medicine is currently involved in a state of change, thus the program must first prepare the student to accept change, and the program itself must be flexible and able to incorporate new ideas and principles into the study and practice of medicine. This philosophy is directly concerned with admissions since it is becoming increasingly apparent that medicine is a social science and the physician must be a part of the community. Therefore, one of the attributes considered in addition to grades and academic performance is the degree of citizenship awareness and community responsibility exhibited by applicants. Thus the admissions process concerns itself not only with scholastic preparation, achievement and intellectual discipline in the physical and biological sciences, but also with the attitudes and disciplines toward the humanities. Therefore, as best as is possible, the applicant is judged for ad-17

mission on maturity, ability to make decisions, judgement and showledge of the needs and necessities of the community. Without secrificing academic standards, all attempts are made to find well-rounded individuals to enter the program of medicine at San Antonio.

Generally, a student is encouraged to pursue his interest in college toward a baccalaureate degree, whether his major field be biology, chemistry, mathematics, philosophy or history. However, one must keep in mind the minimum requirements for admission. It has been the custom to give preference to students with a baccalaureate degree; however, candidates with ninety semester hour credits are evaluated closely. If they are higher than average academically and possess the necessary maturity they are considered for admission.

The Committee on Admissions makes the final decision as to who is admitted to medical school. This decision is made after a student has been interviewed and carefully evaluated.

In order to be considered eligible for admission to the medical school, applicants must have an average of at least "C" on each prescribed premedical course. In general, applicants should have an over-all average of "B" or better to receive favorable consideration.

1. English:

One year of freshman English, plus precific course one year of sophomore English or the Requirements * equivalent in Humanities course work.

2. Biology:

One and one-half years. This should include one year of general biologyzoology including adequate laboratory in vertebrate dissection. **Note:** Two years of Biology will be required for matriculation in 1971; only one year may be completed by advanced standing examination; one year must be completed in residence at a college and must include formal laboratory work.

 Mathematics: One year of college mathematics (Algebra and Trigonometry or advanced mathematics). Note: One-half year of Analytical Geometry or Calculus will be required for matriculation in

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September, 1971.

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One year as required for science 4. Physics: majors.

Two years; one year of General Chem-5. Chemistry: istry and one year of Organic Chemistry as required for science majors and including the corresponding laboratory experience.

In keeping with the policies of the University governing advanced standing, it is necessary that premedical students who already have credit for two years of college work take all additional work in an accredited senior college or university.

appear on the applicant's transcript. A health form to be completed by the applicant and a licensed Doctor of Medicine must be submitted as part of the formal application for admission. This form is furnished with the application blank. Physical examinations will be given by members of the staff at the beginning of each academic consist.

staff at the beginning of each academic session.

Certification of immunizations as listed below will be required of all entering students prior to registration. A form to be used for certification by a licensed physician will be furnished to applicants granted admission. A military service immunization record will satisfy these requirements.

Required Immunization Prior to Matriculation

- 1. Smallpox
- 2. Tetanus
- 3. Diphtheria
- 4. Poliomyelitis (if not previously immunized)

The medical and dental schools of The University of Residence Texas are authorized to accept as members of their freshman classes a limited number of nonresident students whose qualifications would place them among the top ten per cent of the entering class. Residence in Texas for premedical work does not satisfy the bona fide residence requirement.

Nonresident student, defined:

1. A nonresident student is hereby defined to be a student of less than twenty-one (21) years of age, living away from his family and whose family resides in an-10 other state, or whose family has not resided in Texas

for the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date of registration; or a student of twenty-one (21) years of age or over who resides out of the state or who has not been a resident of the state twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date of registration.

2. Individuals twenty-one (21) years of age or over who have come from without the state and who are gainfully employed within the state for a period of twelve (12) months prior to registering in an educational institution shall be classified as "resident students" as long as they continue to maintain such legal residence in the state.

3. Individuals twenty-one (21) years of age or over who have come from without the state and who register in an educational institution prior to having resided in the state for a period of twelve (12) months shall be classified as "nonresident students" and such "nonresident student" classification shall be presumed to be correct as long as the residence of such individual in the state is primarily for the purpose of attendance at educational institutions; provided, however, that a "nonresident student" may be reclassified as a "resident student" upon representation of conclusive evidence that he has in fact been a legal resident of Texas for at least twelve (12) months immediately preceding such reclassification. Any such individual so reclassified as a "resident student" shall be entitled to pay the tuition fee for a resident of Texas at any subsequent registration for as long as he continues to maintain his legal residence in Texas. It is further provided that the provisions of this paragraph relating to nonresident student registration fees shall not apply to junior colleges located immediately adjacent to state boundary lines, which institutions shall collect from each nonresident student who registers for twelve (12) or more semester or term hours of work an amount equivalent to the amount charged students from Texas by similar schools in the state of which the said nonresident students shall be a resident.

4. Individuals of twenty-one (21) years of age or less whose families have not resided in Texas for the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the date of registration shall be classified as "nonresident students" regardless of whether such individuals have become the legal wards of residents of Texas or have been 21

adopted by the residents of Texas while such individuals are attending educational institutions in Texas or within a year prior to such an attendance or under circumstances indicating that such a guardianship or adoption was for the purpose of obtaining status as a "resident student."

5. All aliens shall be classified as "nonresident students"; provided, however, that an alien who is living in this country under a visa permitting permanent residence or who has filed a Declaration of Intention to become a citizen with the proper federal immigration authorities shall have the same privilege of qualifying for resident status for fee purposes under this Act as has a citizen of the United States.

6. The Governing Boards of the several state-supported institutions of higher learning are authorized to assess and collect from each non-resident student failing to comply with the rules and regulations concerning nonresident fees, a penalty not to exceed \$10 a semester.

7. Officers, enlisted men and women, selectees or draftees of the Army, Army Reserve, National Guard, Air Force, Air Force Reserve, Navy, Navy Reserve, or Marine Corps of the United States, who are stationed in Texas by assignment to duty within the borders of this state, shall be permitted to register themselves, their husband or wife as the case may be and their children, in state institutions of higher learning by paying the regular tuition fee and other fees or charges provided for regular residents of the state of Texas, without regard to the length of time such officers, enlisted men or women, selectees or draftees have been stationed on active duty within the state.

8. Teachers, professors, or other employees of Texas State institutions of higher education, shall be permitted to register themselves their husbands or wife as the case may be and their children, in State institutions of higher learning by paying the regular tiution fees and other fees or charges provided for regular residents of the State of Texas, without regard to the length of time such teachers, professors, or other employees of Texas State institutions of higher learning have resided within the state.

The Medical College Admission Test, administered for Medical College the Association of American Medical Colleges by The Admission Test 22 Psychological Corporation, 304 East 45th Street, New

York, New York 10017, must be taken by each applicant. This test is offered twice each year at various colleges and universities throughout the country. Information relative to dates, times, etc., may be obtained from preprofessional advisers or by writing direct to the Psychological Corporation.

Selective Service

Medical schools are privileged to request deferment for undergraduate premedical students who have been accepted for the next entering class. Selective Service Form #103 will be sent to the Selective Service Board at the time each student is formally accepted into the medical school. So long as the student remains in good scholastic standing the medical school will continue to submit Form #103 at the end of each academic year to support the student's request for deferment. It should be clearly understood, however, that the Selective Service Local Boards have the responsibility for classification and the Board's determination is final, subject to appeal. The appeal must be made within ten days of the mailing of a reclassification notice. Each student must keep his Local Selective Service Board informed at all times as to his whereabouts and activities.

Advanced Standing

Applicants for advanced standing can be considered only if they have fulfilled the general premedical scholastic requirements for admission to the corresponding first year class in this school, including satisfactory performance on the Medical College Admission Test. If previous premedical training is fully satisfactory, and if the applicants are eligible for continuing study at the last medical school attended, their applications will be submitted to the Admissions Committee as soon as transcripts of work taken during the first term of the current year are available. Complete transcripts of premedical and medical performance must be submitted with applications, together with a letter of honorable dismissal and evaluation from the dean of the last medical school attended. Students who have been dropped from the rolls of any medical school, whatever the reason, and who are not eligible for return to that school need not apply.

Application Applications for any year will be accepted from July Procedure 1 through December 31 of the preceding year.

Applicants must submit the following:

- 1. Formal application blank accompanied by \$5.00 filing fee
- 2. Health form

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- Official transcripts from each college or university attended (as each semester is completed, a supplemental transcript should be furnished)
- Evaluation from Preprofessional Advisory Committee
- Scores on the Medical College Admission Test (as soon as available)

Personal interviews are granted at the discretion of the Committee on Admissions. Well-qualified applicants will be invited for interview early in the interview period.

Recommended F Acceptance a Procedures a Association of American Medical Colleges b

For the information of prospective medical students and their advisers, the procedures regulating acceptance to medical school are printed below. These are the recommended procedures of the Executive Council of the Association of American Medical Colleges and have been approved by the membership of the Association. These procedures are now observed by most medical schools, including The University of Texas Medical School at San Antonio.

- "1. No offer of admission to medical school should be made to an applicant more than one year before he will enter the course of instruction offered by the medical school.
- "2. When an offer is made to an applicant, he should have not less than two weeks in which to make his reply.
- "3. Prior to January 1st, the student receiving an offer may be required to file within two weeks a statement of intent, or a deposit, or both. The statement of intent should leave the student free to withdraw if he is accepted by a school he prefers; and the deposit. which should not exceed \$100, should be refundable without question if the request for refund is made before January 15th.
- "4. Offers made after January 1 may require a reply within two weeks, and also a deposit, not in excess of \$100, which may be credited against tuition charges if the student matriculates in the school, and which may be forfeited if he does not.

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- "5. Each medical school should prepare and distribute to applicants and college advisers a detailed schedule of its application and acceptance procedures, and should adhere to this schedule unless it is publicly amended.¹/
- **6. No medical school should use any device which implies that acceptance of its offer creates a moral obligation to matriculate at that school. Every accepted applicant should know that he is free to deal with other schools and accept an offer from one of them even if he has paid a deposit to another school and must forfeit it. Every accepted applicant does retain under all circumstances an obligation to notify a school promptly if he decides not to accept its offer to him, and to withdraw at once if after accepting an offer from a school, he receives and accepts an offer from another school he prefers.
- "7. Each school is free to make appropriate rules for dealing with accepted candidates who hold one or more places in other schools without adequate explanation. These rules should recognize the problems of the student who has multiple offers, and also of those applicants who have not yet been accepted."

Tuition and fees for each academic year are due and **Tuition, Fees** payable in full at the time of registration and a student **and Deposits** is not registered until his fees are paid in full.

Filing Fee A fee of \$5 is required of all applicants at the time application is made.

Registration Deposit A check or money order in the amount of \$30 made payable to The University of Texas is required of all applicants accepted for admission. This deposit will be applied against tuition at the time of initial registration. In accordance with the policy approved by the Association of American Medical Colleges, the deposit will be refunded if the applicant changes his decision and notifies the medical school before January 15th. After that date the deposit is not refundable.

Each student is required to pay a student health fee as authorized by the State Legislature and approved by the Board of Regents. As part of the University Health Service program, the student is eligible for medical care throughout his period of enrollment in the medical school. The University Health Service is staffed by medical school physicians and services provided are physical examinations, immunizations other than those required prior to admission, tuberculin testing, and routine studies as well as roentgen ray examinations at the time of entry and at periodic intervals thereafter. Students who may be ill or desire consultation may make appointments to be seen as necessary. Diagnostic studies, medications, and other therapeutic modalities are available and a physician is on call twenty-four hours a day for emergency care.

Diploma Fee A fee of \$25 will be required and is payable at the time of registration for the final year inmedical school.

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Exemption of Ex-servicemen Men and women who are residents of Texas and who hold an honorable discharge from the Armed Forces of the United States during World War II, the Korean War, or served on active military duty for more than 180 days during the Cold War, and who were bona fide residents of this a

State at the time of entering such service are by State law exempt from the payment of all fees except library and laboratory fees, student health fees, or similar fees and deposits. The benefits and provisions of this act shall also apply to the benefit of the children of members of the United States Armed Forces where such members of the Armed Forces were killed in action or died while in the service during World War II, the Korean War, or the Cold War. Veterans are not eligible for the above outlined benefits under State law until their eligibility for educational benefits from Federal Funds through the Veterans Administration has expired.

Handicapped Students The Texas Education Agency, through its Vocational Rehabilitation Office, offers payment of tuition and other fees and services to students (normally non-veterans) who have certain physical handicaps, provided the vocational objectives selected by the student have been approved by the representative of the division. Application for vocational rehabilitation should be made to the Austin Rehabilitation District Office, 1001/2 West Tenth Street, or to the District Rehabilitation Office nearest the student's home.

Microscopes Microscopes are rented to students enrolled in the first two years by the school at a cost of \$60 per academic year. These instruments are of uniformly high quality, will be maintained by the school, and all students will be required to use them.

Books and Equipment The approximate cost of books and equipment for the first year (excluding microscope rental) will be \$275. This is an estimate and actual costs may vary somewhat with changes in prices.

Living Arrangements Single students will be housed on the 12th floor of the Bexar County Teaching Hospital during the 1968-1969 academic year. The rental will be \$40 per month for a double room, \$65 per month for a single room. There is no University housing for married students and they must make their own arrangements. The Office of the Registrar will maintain house and apartment listings and will assist students whenever possible with housing arrangements.



Curriculum Plan



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


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Grades and The Faculty of Medicine has the responsibility of de-Promotions termining the qualifications of each student to practice medicine. The grading of written, oral, and practical examinations form an important framework for evaluating skill and competence, but it should be clearly understood by every student that integrity, initiative, industry, motivation, professional attitude and performance under stress are such essential attributes in the life of a physician that they will not be ignored in determining the final grade.

> The exact mechansim of grading various types of examinations or personal performance varies among the separate departments and teachers and there is no set pattern. However, the final grade for a reportable period is determined by majority opinion of the members of the department who teach in each course. All grades, which are reportable to the Office of the Registrar for permanent record, are reported as letter grades on the following basis:

- Excellent
- Good B
- Satisfactory C
- Poor performance, but passing
- Unsatisfactory performance
- Incomplete
- WP Withdrew Passing
- WF Withdrew Failing

Progress Grades as follows:

- S Satisfactory
- U Unsatisfactory

From the grades reported, a grade point average is computed for each student on the basis of a system of quantitative and qualitative weighting which has been approved by the Faculty of Medicine.

The final letter grades and grade point averages are presented, usually within two weeks after the final examination, to the appropriate Grading and Promotions Committee. Final decisions concerning the grading, class standing, promotion, probation, conditions, failure and personal performance are made by these committees, and reviewed by the Dean of the medical school. Final grades are released only through the Office of the Registrar.

No student will be promoted until all work of a given ,,

year is completed and passed. Any student with a weighted average of less than "C" will be placed automatically on scholastic probation. Probationary recommendations are made by the Grading and Promotions Committee and submitted to the Dean of the medical school for final action. 1 10

Absence and Withdrawals Short leaves of absence may be granted in cases of illness or other emergency with the understanding that the student will arrange with his instructors to make up all of the work which he has missed. Absence for any cause should be reported to the Office of the Registrar.

Students who take leave from the medical school without notice or who fail to report to the Office of the Registrar after leave of absence will automatically terminate their connection with the medical school.

In addition, students who fail to register and pay tuition and fees within the specified dates will be considered to have terminated their connection with the medical school unless they receive prior permission to register and pay tuition at a later date.

Students who wish to withdraw from the medical school in good standing for physical or other personal reasons either during the academic year or after they have been promoted to the next year, must submit a written request to the Dean stating their reasons for withdrawal, the period of time involved and their intentions concerning resumption of medical studies. If the Dean approves the request for withdrawal, he may grant the student permission to delay registration for one calendar year or to re-enter medical school at the beginning of the next regular session. In each case, the student must submit a written request for re-admission and must furnish evidence satisfactory to the Dean that the physical condition or other reason necessitating withdrawal has been corrected to the point that the student is ready to resume medical studies. The request for re-admission must be filed at least one month prior to the proposed date of re-entry into the medical school.

Students who have been promoted to the next year and wish to withdraw to enroll in a recognized graduate school, must submit a written request to the Dean. If the Dean approves the request, he may grant the student permission to delay his registration for one calendar year. Each student must submit a written request for re-admission and must furnish evidence satisfactory to the Dean that he is ready to resume his medical studies. The request for re-admission must be filed at least one month prior to the proposed date of reentry into medical school.

Students who withdraw from medical school with less than a "C" average for the work in progress at the time of withdrawal will be considered to have withdrawn failing (WF). In all cases not specifically covered above, re-admission to medical school will be subject to action by the Committee on Admissions.

It must be clearly understood by all matriculants that the faculty of the medical school has the authority to drop any student from the rolls, or to refuse re-admission at any time prior to graduation, if circumstances of a legal, moral, health, social, or academic nature justify such action. A student who has been dropped from the rolls may formally apply for re-admission and each such application will be subject to the action of the Committee on Admissions.

Student Debts

by individual students or by student organizations. On the other hand, the University expects all students and student organizations to conduct themselves honorably in all commercial transactions. The University will not assume the role of a collection agency for organizations, firms, and individuals to whom students may owe bills, nor will the University adjudicate disputes between students and creditors over the existence or the amounts of debts.

The University is not responsible for debts contracted

A student, however, is expected to perform his contractual obligations and in the event of conduct on the part of the student clearly demonstrating a flagrant disregard of his commercial obligations (refusal to pay or meet admitted debts or obligations will be thus construed), action will be taken appropriate to the age of the student.

In the event of nonpayment to the University, one or more of the following actions may be taken: (a) a bar against re-admission of the student, (b) withholding of the student's grades and official transcript, (c) withholding of a degree to which the student otherwise would be entitled.

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The degree of Doctor of Medicine is awarded upon satisfactory completion of the prescribed curriculum,

Requirements for Graduation recommendation of the Faculty of Medicine and certification by the Board of Regents. Candidates must (1) be at least twenty-one (21) years of age at the time the degree is awarded; (2) present evidence of good moral character; (3) offer satisfactory evidence of having properly fulfilled all academic requirements of the medical curriculum, and (4) comply with all necessary legal and financial requirements.

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



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
