ACCEPTANCE OF GIFTS OF \$100 or LESS: I recommend that henceforth each administrative head be empowered to accept cash gifts to The University of Texas of \$100 or less, within the policies of the Board of Regents and Legislature governing the acceptability of gifts, and to deposit such gifts to the appropriate accounts. Such gifts are to be reported to the Board of Regents either in the next regular docket or semiannually at the first Board meeting in each calendar year and the last regular Board meeting in each fiscal year at the discretion of the administrative heads of each of the component institutions.

Reasons: The volume of such gifts is increasing rapidly and detailed docketing of each such gift constitutes a heavy burden of clerical work. The procedure recommended is one which the Board of Regents authorized for M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute on December 5, 1947, and it has worked very satisfactorily. The Council on Administrative Policy endorsed this recommendation.

MAIN UNIVERSITY -- SALARY INCREASES OF \$1,000 OR MORE: I recommend approval of the following salary increases:

- 1. Dr. George W. Watt, Professor of Chemistry, from \$9,500 to \$10,500 for nine months, effective September 16, 1956, additional funds to come from Salary Supplementation Fund.
- 2. Dr. Hubert Winston Smith, Professor of Law and Director, Law-Science Institute, from \$11,300 for twelve months to \$11,300 for nine months, effective September 16, 1956.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE - SCHOOL OF NURSING: At its regular quarterly meeting on July 9, the Texas Commission on Higher Education acted to approve "A Proposal to the Texas Commission on Higher Education for the Establishment of a School of Nursing at Texas Western College of the University of Texas." Legislative authority had been given by the Fifty-fourth Legislature for the establishment of such a school and funds therefor had been provided, subject to approval by the Texas Commission on Higher Education.

WAIVING OF NEPOTISM REGULATION - MEDICAL BRANCH: Dr. Charles R. Allen, Chairman and Professor of the Department of Anesthesiology, has recommended the appointment of Dr. George William Nordholtz Eggers, Jr., as Instructor in Anesthesiology at a salary of \$6,000 for twelve months, effective September 1, 1956. Dr. Eggers is the son of Dr. G. W. N. Eggers, Professor of Orthopedic Surgery (parttime) at a salary of \$4,400 for twelve months. I recommend that the nepotism regulation be waived to permit the appointment of Dr. G. W. N. Eggers, Jr.

RESEARCH CONTRACTS: The following contracts and amendments have been negotiated by the Office of Government Sponsored Research and have been signed by the Vice-President upon the recommendation of the appropriate Technical Director, the Director of the Office of Government Sponsored Research, and the Business Manager. I recommend your approval and ratification of signatures:

- 1. Supplemental Agreement No. 9 to Contract AF 19(604)-494, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Force Cambridge Research Center, changes the Air Force Administrative Office and amends the report requirements. The research on measurement and analysis of refractive index of the atmosphere continues under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering and Director, Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory.
- 2. Change Order No. 11 to Contract AF 33(600)-22582, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Materiel Command, adds the sum of \$15,000.00 to the contract funds. No other changes are made. The research continues under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics and Director, Defense Research Laboratory.
- 3. Supplemental Agreement No. 12 to Contract AF 33(600)-22582, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Materiel Command, authorizes the University to pay for certain items purchased prior to June 30, 1956, although delivery might be made subsequent to June 30, 1956, the expiration date of the contract. The research continues under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics and Director, Defense Research Laboratory.
- 4. Contract AF 33(600)-33446, by which the Department of the Air Force, Air Materiel Command, provides \$125,000.00 for certain studies. 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HOUSING OF NEGRO STUDENTS.--At the January, 1955, meeting of the Board the policy was adopted "to advise Negro students that the housing facilities open to them are San Jacinto Dormitories D and F and the McGinnis House, the only facilities presently designated as graduate dormitories for men, . . "

The McGinnis House (310 East 21st Street) is presently being renovated and the lower floor is to house the Director's and Business Office of Men's Residence Halls while the upstairs may possibly be available for student housing. I recommend that the phrase "and the McGinnis House" be deleted from the action taken at the January meeting, and that the following sentence be added: "The President of the University is authorized to designate other San Jacinto Dormitories for Negro men students if the housing demand from Negro students warrants such action."

FACULTY LEGISLATION: The following legislation has been passed by the General Faculty and/or Faculty Council. I recommend approval.

- 1. The General Faculty on May 8, 1956, approved amending the .

 General Faculty regulation with regard to Qualifications of Candidates for election to the Faculty Council by omitting the word "successive" and substituting the word "three" for the word "two," the amended portion (Qualification No. 2) to read as follows: "No elected member shall be qualified to serve for more than three terms." (General Faculty Minutes 6677)
- 2. The Faculty Council on May 12, 1956, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the College of Business Administration that accounting and finance majors may offer credit in Accounting 376 (Accounting Communications) in lieu of Business Writing 221 (Report Writing) to meet the requirements for the B.B.A. degree (D&P 2297).
- 3. The Faculty Council on June 16, 1956, approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences proposing (1) to amend the requirement for a major in German for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (2) to amend the United States History requirement for degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences; (3) to amend the requirements for a major in chemistry for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts and some of the requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemistry; (4) to amend one requirement for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Geology; and (5) to amend the requirement for a major in psychology for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I (D&P 2309-12).
- 4. The Faculty Council on June 18, 1956, approved also by the circularization procedure the recommendation of the College of Pharmacy proposing to change Accounting 811a (Elementary Accounting) -- 4 hours, to Accounting 611a (Elementary Accounting) -- 3 hours (D&P 2313).

CHANGE IN GRADUATE CATALOGUE: Dean Brogan reports that the following legislation dealing with the level of course work required for the master's degree has been approved by the Graduate Faculty by the circularization-no-protest procedure and submits it for approval and inclusion in the Graduate Catalogue on page 27 as the final sentence of the item "Rank of courses." I recommend approval.

At least six semester hours of the courses included in the student's program for a master's degree, exclusive of the thesis, shall be in those designated as exclusively for graduate students.

EMPLOYMENT OF CLERK-OF-THE-WORKS FOR ROTC BUILDING: Under the provisions of the Appropriation Bill and in accordance with the University's contract with Atlee B. and Robert M. Ayres as Associate Architects for the ROTC Building and the Outside Utilities and Drives for this building, I concur in Mr. Sparenberg's recommendation of the appointment of Mr. John Hansen of Temple, Texas, as Clerk-of-the-Works for this project at a monthly salary of \$650, effective May 31, 1956, funds to come from the account for Architectural Supervision for the ROTC Building.

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ESTABLISHMENT OF TEACHER EDUCATION FOUNDATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS: The proposal of the College of Education to establish this internal foundation has been approved by the Development Board in accordance with policy of the Board of Regents adopted at the April 1956 meeting. I recommend adoption of the following resolution establishing the Teacher Education Foundation:

WHEREAS, there exists a need for financing research, faculty activity, and enrichment of the programs of teacher education at The University of Texas in addition to normal budgetary provisions, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of interested parties to encourage and assist in such financing,

IT IS NOW RESOLVED that the Board of Regents of The University of Texas hereby authorizes and establishes the <u>Teacher</u> <u>Education</u> Foundation of The University of Texas,

AND FURTHERMORE, that the purpose of said Foundation shall be to foster the progress and development of research, service, curriculum improvement, student quality, and faculty competence in the field of teacher education under circumstances acceptable to the Board of Regents subject to provisions hereinafter set out.

- 1. The funds of the Foundation shall be used to supplement the funds available to the College of Education from regular budgetary sources, and shall not be used for the ordinary operating expenses of the College of Education or any of its Departments. Funds of the Foundation may be used to provide scholarships and fellowships for students, to finance research, to defray the costs of field services and investigations, to provide study opportunities for faculty members, to supplement salaries of faculty members, to pay expenses of consultants, advisory groups and committees, to defray travel expenses of faculty and staff, and to defray such other costs as fall within the purpose of the Foundation, subject to the general and specific regulations of the Board of Regents.
- 2. A donation to the Foundation may be made for a specific purpose and may be given the name of the donor or other designation specified by the donor; e.g., the Richard Roe Fund of the Teacher Education Foundation; or may be given as undesignated funds which shall be used in accordance with provisions established in this Resolution.
- 3. The Board of Regents shall hold, manage, control, sell, exchange, lease, convey, mortgage or dispose of in any manner and for any consideration or on any terms, the said gifts, funds, or property in their discretion, and shall from time to time pay out of the income, or if the income be insufficient, out of the principal, all expenses of trust and all expenditures incurred in furthering the purposes of the trust.
- 4. Neither any donation to the Teacher Education Foundation nor any fund or property arising therefrom in whatever form it may take shall ever be any part of the Permanent University Fund nor shall the Legislature have power to be in anywise authorized to change the purposes thereof or to divert such donation, fund or property from those designated purposes.
- 5. There shall be an Executive Committee of the Teacher Education Foundation which shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be the Dean of the College of Education who shall serve as Chairman, one of whom shall be a member of the Graduate Faculty, one of whom shall be a voting member of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, and the remaining two of whom shall be voting members of the faculty of the College of Education. The appointive members of the Executive Committee shall be named for four-year staggered terms by the

Board of Regents upon nomination of the President. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to make all recommendations to the President of the University for allocation of funds, and expenditures pursuant to approved allocations shall be upon vouchers executed by the Chairman. The Executive Committee shall adopt its own rules of procedure.

6. As in the case of all other University funds, authorization for expenditure of all funds from the Foundation shall be vested in the Board of Regents, and recommendations for such expenditures shall be made to the Board of Regents by the President and to the President by the Executive Committee as hereinbefore constituted.

ESTABLISHMENT OF ACCOUNTING EDUCATION FUND WITHIN THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION FOUNDATION: At the May 29, 1953, meeting of the Board of Regents, approval was given to the establishment of the College of Business Administration Foundation, which provided in part that the "Foundation may accept endowments, the income of which may be used, or funds to be used directly . . ." and that "Donations to the Foundation may be given the name of the donor or other designation specified by the donor . . ."

The Beta Alpha Psi Alumni are sponsoring the establishment of the Accounting Education Fund within the Business Administration Foundation and have requested Board approval. I recommend that such approval be given and that the following resolution be adopted setting forth the purposes and administration of the fund:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS

adopted at its meeting Municiple 27-12,1956

The Accounting Education Fund

There is hereby established the Accounting Education Fund of the College of Business Administration Foundation of The University of Texas. Monies deposited in this fund shall be held separate as an endowment, the income of which shall be devoted solely to the furtherance of accounting education, accounting research, and the progress of accounting in the Department of Accounting of the College of Business Administration of The University of Texas. The principal may be used for expenses of trust and expenditures incurred in soliciting funds for the trust.

An Accounting Education Fund Advisory Committee shall be appointed annually by the Chairman of the Department of Accounting of the College of Business Administration to make recommendations to the Budget Council of the Department of Accounting concerning expenditures from the income of the endowment in implementation of the stated purposes of the fund. All vouchers for expenditures, except for expenses of trust, shall be originated by the Budget Council of the Department of Accounting and submitted to the Dean of the College of Business Administration.

In the event that the total principal does not amount to \$10,000 at the end of five years, the Advisory Committee established in the preceding paragraph may recommend to the Board of Regents that both the income and principal be expended in carrying out the purposes of the fund; otherwise expenditures shall be solely from income on the principal, except as noted in paragraph one above.

LEASE OF RED RIVER PROPERTY TO DELTA UPSILON FRATERNITY: I concur in the recommendation of Business Manager G. W. Landrum, that the Miller property on Red River Street be re-leased to Delta Upsilon Fraternity at the rate of \$200 per month, lease agreements to be signed by the Business Manager for the period June 1-August 31, 1956, and for the fiscal year 1956-57. At the time this property was acquired by the University it was under lease to this group through May 31, 1956, and there seems no other particular use at this time that could be made of it by the Main University.

RECORDING BY UNIVERSITY A CAPPELLA CHOIR: Request Records, Inc., New York City, has asked that the University A Cappella Choir make a recording for the occasion of the Stephen Collins Foster centennial celebration. Eleven other colleges and universities are participating in this project by making records of Foster songs. The money from the sale of the album (twelve songs) will be used for the perpetuation of the Foster Shrine on the Suwannee River in Florida. There will be no cost to the University in making the record but the University will receive a royalty of one cent per record. I recommend approval of this undertaking and that such sums as are received be added to the Fine Arts Foundation.

SIDNEY E. MEZES FACULTY DONATION COMMITTEE: The Sidney E. Mezes Faculty Donation Committee has made two awards of \$400 each. The names of the recipients will be reported in Executive Session of the Board.

- 6. Crisis in Coastal Shipping, by J. L. Hazard, published by Bureau of Business Research, which sells for \$3.50 with no royalty to author.
- 7. The Pharmacist in Retail Distribution, by A. H. Chute and Esther J. W. Hall, which sells for \$6.50 with 72% royalty to each author.
- 8. Figuring for Merchandising Profit, by A. H. Chute, published by Bureau of Business Research, which sells for \$0.50 with no royalty to author.
- 9. This Is Teaching, by L. D. Haskew, published by Scott, Foresman and Company, which retails for \$4.50 with 10% royalty to author. Dr. Haskew has directed the publishing company to keep track of all royalties earned by sales in Austin and he will give them to the Teacher Education Foundation of the University.

Mr. Strain also requests permission to assist the San Antonio Chapter of Chartered Life Underwriters in conducting a similar class in that city, compensation to be from \$500 to \$1,200.

SALARY RANGES COVERING CLASSES OF POSITIONS IN THE CLASSIFIED SERVICE

EXPLANATION: Below are listed the salary ranges for classes of positions in the Classified Service of The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. The Cirst column indicates the index number of the class; the second column, the class witle; the third column, the monthly salary range for the class, i.e., the minimum and maximum rates to be paid to incumbents of positions of the class; the fourth column, the annual salary range for the class; the last column the salary step number, which refers to the basic salary schedule (Table 2). The "Intermediate Steps" are those rates which fall between the indicated minimum and maximum rates and can be found in Table 2.

The salary ranges are intended to provide an equitable level of compensation for each class of employment. Ranges are determined through study and analysis of the following factors: prevailing rates of pay for comparable employment by private and other public employers, present economic conditions, present labor market conditions, past University and Medical School pay policies, and the relationship of the different classes of employment as determined through evaluation of duties and responsibilities of each position.
