Mrs. Devall and Gentlemen:

The dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents in Austin on September 23-24, 1960:

Listed below are Central Administration items which I recommend be approved:

1959-60 Budget

Office of the Comptroller

1. Terminate the appointment of Mr. Fay E. Powell, Clerk-of-the-Works employed on a monthly basis, effective at the close of business July 31, 1960. This termination is recommended jointly by the Comptroller and Associate

Architect Preston M. Geren and affects only the project entitled, "Addition to the Chemistry Building, Main University." The salary rate was \$541.67 per month. (No. 835)

2. Appoint Mr. John R. Morris as Clerk-of-the-Works, half-time, to replace Mr. Powell on the Addition to Chemistry Building project, on a month-to-month basis at \$270.83 per month to be paid from the Architectural Supervision account for the project. Mr. Morris is also employed one-half-time by Grayson Gill, Inc., in the same capacity on the New Central Water Chilling Station building. Appointment to be effective August 1, 1960.

University Lands - Geology 3. CORRECTION OF ERROR IN JULY 1960 DOCKET. Correct the listing of the 1960-61 budget, Item 2 on Page C-1, of the July Docket, and change this reference to 1959-60 budget.

No change in salary is recommended at this time. The Comptroller has recommended this change following a study of the duties of the position by the Classified Personnel Office.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY TO VICE-PRESIDENT AND PROVOST President Ransom recommends, and I concur in the recommendation, that Dr. J. R. Smiley, Vice-President and Provost, be given blanket authorization to sign any document requiring the President's signature except those which may be specifically prohibited by State law or Regents' Rules. The Regents' approval of this arrangement is requested, to be effective

immediately for an indefinite period.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - EXCEPTION TO NEPOTISM RULE

President Ransom recommends, and I concur, that the anti-nepotism rule be waived to permit employment of Mrs. Avalyn V. Parker as Technical Reports Editor I in the Institute of Marine Science. She is the wife of Dr. Patrick Parker, Research Scientist III, in the same department, whose salary is \$6,468 for 12 months. Mrs. Parker's starting salary would be \$3,348 for 12 months. Recruitment of qualified professional personnel is difficult because of the location of the Institute, and the Director, Dr. H. T. Odum, feels that the requested exception would be primarily for the benefit of the Institute. (This item is included in the Central Administration docket because it arrived too late for inclusion in the Main University docket.)

CONTRACTS AND GRANTS

1. Award of \$248,761, of which \$99,504 is furnished as the initial C-44 allocation, for National Defense Student Loan Funds by Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, for academic year 1960-61. This grant was signed by the Chancellor upon the advice of Vice-Chancellor Haskew who coordinates the program for the University System. The initial allocation is prorated as follows among the participating component institutions:

2. (ITEM FOR RECORD IN THIS SECTION OF DOCKET. SEE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE REPORT FOR ACTION.) Grant No. NSF-Gl3974, by which the National Science Foundation, Washington, D.C., provides \$400,000 for partial support of a CDC 1604 computer system. The estimated cost of a CDC 1604 computer system is \$930,000. The grant, which will be directed by Professor David M. Young, Jr., Director of the Main University Computation Center, is effective for a period of approximately one year beginning September 1, 1960. (This item received too late for customary inclusion in Main University docket.)

3. Support of two scholars by Welch Foundation under its "Visiting Scholar Program," by which the Foundation pays the salary and travel expenses of selected scholars for one-year appointments. Initially, Dr. Daniel Bovet has been selected for such appointment at the Southwestern Medical School and Dr. Hans Jonassen at the Main University. The Foundation prefers that no publicity be issued concerning the details of the appointment, except with its approval. The award agreement is on file in the Board of Regents' office.

MEDICAL BRANCH - PROPOSED REPAIR AND REMODELING WORK IN ASHBEL SMITH BUILDING - APPROPRIATION FROM INSURANCE RESERVE FUND On August 2, 1959, a fire destroyed a student lounge area and furnishings

located in the west end of the first floor of the Ashbel Smith Building at the Medical Branch. Since that time, the Medical Branch staff has been considering possible measures to recommend regarding the remodeling in view of the fact that the minimal use of the space by students did not seem to justify restoring it for that purpose. The Business Manager now recommends, and the Comptroller concurs, that the space be rehabilitated and rented to the Co-Op Bookstore, with a small amount of the space reserved for use as a student lounge.

The total estimated cost of remodeling the area is \$15,471, with the work to be done by the Medical Branch Physical Plant staff. The Co-Op Bookstore will pay an annual rental of at least \$2,000. The rehabilitation cost attributable to the fire loss is set at \$9,489. These figures have been reviewed by the Comptroller and his Architect and have their approval based on detailed costs submitted by the Medical Branch. It is, therefore, proposed to charge the \$9,489 against the account entitled, "Reserve to Cover Possible Losses Under \$100,000 Deductible Clause of Blanket Systemwide Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance Policy," with the appropriation made from Available University Fund Unappropriated Balance. General funds (unappropriated surplus) are to be allocated for the remainder of the remodeling expense. In addition to consideration of the Physical Plant aspects of the matter, the legal aspects have been reviewed and approved by University Attorney Burnell Waldrep.

Although this repair and remodeling project is under \$20,000, a major portion of the funds comes from the Available University Fund, and the Comptroller has therefore specified that requisitions, vouchers, contract awards, etc., which involve expenditures from the Available University Fund will have to be approved by the Comptroller.

TRANSFER OF ACADEMIC PORTION OF RADIO-TELEVISION (1960-61 Budget)

I recommend approval of the transfer of the academic portion of RadioTelevision, now budgeted in the School of Journalism, College of Arts and Sciences, to the Department of Speech, College of Arts and Sciences. All the items now in the budget, filled and unfilled positions, and all lump-sum accounts, as well as those handled in this docket, will be transferred intact, except that of the \$5,000 item for Maintenance and Operation in Radio-Television, Journalism, \$4,000 will be transferred to Radio-Television, Speech, and \$1,000 into the Maintenance and Operation account of the Department of Speech.

DISCONTINUANCE OF OFFICE OF DEAN OF STUDENT SERVICES (1960-61 Budget)

I recommend that the Office of the Dean of Student Services be discontinued beginning September 1, 1960, and that the items appearing in the 1960-61 Budget for that office be handled as follows:

Dean of Student Services - unfilled position at \$10,400 - lapse to Unallocated Unfilled Positions

Administrative Secretary - Mrs. Sue C. James at \$4,020 - transfer to Office of the President

Supplemental Agreement No. 6 to Contract AF 33(616)-3985, which establishes the fixed overhead rate of 36.5% of Salaries and Wages for the period September 1, 1957 through August 31, 1958, and a provisional rate of 36.5% subsequent to September 1, 1958, until a new rate is established. The research continues in the Military Physics Research Laboratory under the direction of A. E. Lockenvitz, Professor of Physics.

Supplemental Agreement No. 6 to Contract AF 33(616)-5164, which establishes the fixed overhead rate of 31.0% of Salaries and Wages for the period September 1, 1957 through classified August 31, 1958, and a provisional rate of 31.0% subsequent to September 1, 1958, until a new rate is established. The research continues in the Defense Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. C. P. Boner, Professor of Physics.

Supplemental Agreement No. 4 to Contract AF 33(616)-5581, which establishes the fixed overhead rate of 36.5% of Salaries and Wages for the period September 1, 1957 through August 31, 1958, and a provisional rate of 36.5% subsequent to September 1, 1958, until a new rate is established. The research was conducted in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering.

Supplemental Agreement No. 2 to Contract AF 33(616)-5597, which establishes the fixed overhead rate of 36.5% of Salaries and Wages for the period September 1, 1957 through August 31, 1958, and a provisional rate of 36.5% subsequent to September 1, 1958, until a new rate is established. The research on wave functions for atoms of the first row of the periodic table and certain of their ions was directed by Dr. C. W. Scherr, Assistant Professor of Physics.

Supplemental Agreement No. 3 to Contract AF 33(616)-5832, which establishes a provisional rate of 36.5% of Salaries and Wages subsequent to September 1, 1958, until a new rate is established. The research on relativity and gravitational theories continues under the direction of Dr. Alfred Schild, Professor of Mathematics.

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Supplemental Agreement No. 3 to Contract AF 33(616)-6257, and Wages subsequent to September 1, 1958, until a new rate is established. The research of th which establishes a provisional rate of 36.5% of Salaries is established. The research on the instrumentation and operation of a moon reflection communication receiving station continues in the Electrical Engineering Research Laboratory under the direction of Dr. A. W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering.

Ransom, whereby the University will conduct a Counseling and Guidance Training Institute. The term of the contract is February 18, 1960 June 30, 1961, and the total price \$88,517. The institute will be under the direction of Dr. Royal Embree.
- 21. Grant Agreement No. SCC-27849 with the Government of the United States of America, signed by Vice-President and Provost H. H. Ransom, whereby a grant is made to the University in the amount of \$17,750 to assist the Department of State in the furtherance of its educational and cultural exchange program whereby the university will plan and carry out a United States Student Leader Seminar in Chile. - 23. Vending Machine Concession Contract with Capital Coin Laundromat, Inc., signed by Business Manager G. W. Lendrum, whereby laundry facilities as a service to students residing in dormitories under management of the University will be furnished during the period September 1, 1960 to August 31, 1961, the University to receive 35% of the gross receipts. This contract was awarded on a sealed bid basis, nine bids being received, and the next two highest being 33-1/3% by Austin Speed Wash Company, and 30% by Austin Service, Inc.


